I. <u>Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance</u>

The meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by Chairperson Jason Aufdenberg. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held in a hybrid format with 12 voting and two non-voting members physically present; four voting and two non-voting members were virtually present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

Chairperson Aufdenberg stated the members participating virtually are doing so as a result of social distancing restrictions associated with COVID-19. Rulings from the Florida Attorney General require that the members physically present take a vote to allow virtual participation due to "extraordinary circumstances".

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Belin to allow members attending virtually to participate and vote.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Eik and carried unanimously.

II. Public Comment/Participation

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of November 10, 2021 BPAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to approve the November 10, 2021 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Leal and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentation and Discussion Items</u>

A. Presentation and Discussion of FDOT's Safety Program

Ms. Loreen Bobo, FDOT, gave a PowerPoint presentation of FDOT's Safety Program and their target of Vision Zero for fatalities and serious injuries; each project is reviewed to see what can be done to improve safety on the roadways. Safety projects must have a cost/benefit ratio; they only receive \$21 million for safety projects in District 5; however, safety measures are put into all projects. The safety office works with every FDOT department to improve safety and strive for zero fatalities. FDOT wants to provide a unified effort to greatly reduce crashes and the effects of crashes to ultimately get to zero fatalities and serious injuries. She reviewed FDOT's strategic plan's three foundations which include collaboration, infrastructure and education and explained each. She explained Vision Zero and noted there are federal resolutions being considered to reach that goal by the year 2050. Supporting slower speeds on roadways is one way to lower the statistics and she reviewed some countermeasures that assist in achieving slower speeds such as roundabouts, chicanes, raised crosswalks and narrower lanes. She reviewed ways that members could help such as encouraging safety enhancements in developments and permits. She explained the High Visibility Enforcement Program and encouraged members to get their police and sheriff's departments to participate.

Members discussed the presentation and made suggestions.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Updated Safety Data and Targets</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated it is the time of year when the TPO reviews crash data to help establish safety targets for 2022; the targets are based on a five-year rolling average. It is a federal requirement to adopt safety targets for five performance measures; fatalities, serious injuries, non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries, rate of fatalities and the rate of serious injuries. This is the fifth year the TPO has had to adopt these targets. FDOT has a target of Vision Zero meaning zero fatalities and serious injuries. The TPO supports FDOT's Vision Zero as a vision but the TPO's requirement is to adopt an annual target. In 2018, 2019 and 2020, the methodology used to establish the targets was based on a 2% annual reduction in each safety performance measure; a 2% reduction is what the TPO felt could be attainable. She explained that last year they continued to reduce that target by 2% when measures are trending downward; however, if the measure is trending upward, the previous year's target would be retained. This is the methodology used to set the targets for 2022. She reviewed the data and explained how the targets are set; the previous year's target for fatalities, non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries, and the fatality rate will be retained; the targets for serious injuries and rate of serious injuries were met so new targets will be set. Next month a resolution to adopt the 2022 targets will be presented for a recommendation of approval.

Members discussed the data in detail and it was explained again how the 2022 targets were set and where the data was obtained (Signal Four Analytics of the University of Florida). Members also discussed various solutions on how to meet the targets including collaboration with law enforcement and other agencies; strategies to reduce fatalities and serious injuries; and funding for safety projects.

C. Presentation and Discussion of Updated Transit Safety Data and Targets

Mr. Harris gave a PowerPoint presentation of the updated transit safety data and targets; he explained MAP-21 and the FAST Act require transit agencies to develop a Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan (PTSAP) and a Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan. He showed a video provided by The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) regarding these plans. There are three transit agencies within the TPO's planning area; Votran, SunRail and Flagler County Public Transportation. It is also a requirement for transit providers that are recipients of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds to set safety targets and update these targets annually. He explained that a PTASP is not required for SunRail due to FDOT's Safety Oversight Program or for Flagler County Public Transportation as they do not receive FTA Section 5307 funds. The TPO adopts the transit safety targets set by the transit operator (Votran). He reviewed the transit safety performance measures and data; fatalities, injuries, reportable safety events and system reliability. The goal is to use the plan to reach or maintain a state of good repair. He reviewed the asset categories of the TAM which include equipment, rolling stock, infrastructure and facilities. A resolution to update the transit safety targets will be back next month for a recommendation of approval.

V. Staff Comments

→ DeBary SUN Trail Project Ribbon Cutting Event

Mr. Harris announced Volusia County is planning a ribbon cutting for the SUN Trail project in DeBary; this is a portion of the Spring to Spring Trail and the St. John's River to Sea Loop. The ribbon cutting will be Friday, January 21, 2022 at 11:00 am at Rob Sullivan Park; 200 West Highbanks Road, DeBary.

Chairperson Aufdenberg asked if this trail will connect Lake Beresford Park to Titusville.

Mr. Harris replied yes; it is a continuous trail to Titusville.

→ Votran Service Changes

Mr. Harris announced Votran has implemented temporary service changes due to a driver shortage. He reviewed the changes and noted the details are provided in the agenda. Votran is currently actively recruiting drivers .

→ 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

Mr. Harris stated the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law details for Florida are provided in the agenda. Most notable is USDOT has introduced a new program: Safe Streets for All. It will provide additional funding to local and tribal governments in Florida to support their efforts to advance the Vision Zero plan and other improvements to reduce crashes and fatalities especially for bicyclists and pedestrians.

→ 2022 Call for Projects

Mr. Harris stated the TPO's 2022 Call for Projects continues; it opened December 3, 2021 with a deadline to submit projects of February 25, 2022. There are four bicycle/pedestrian studies currently underway through the TPO's consultants; hopefully, these studies will be finalized this month so the local governments can apply for projects recommended in the studies.

Mr. Harris announced FDOT is holding a public meeting today to discuss safety improvements along SR A1A in Ormond Beach; it is at 5:30 pm at the Casements, 25, Riverside Drive, Ormond Beach. This project is on the TPO's priority list.

Ms. Nicoulin announced that the TPO received the Outstanding Planning Study Award from the Florida Planning and Zoning Association (FPZA) for the Paratransit Service Analysis; Mr. Harris was the Project Manager.

Mr. Daun referred to the new Complete Streets for All program and asked if in order to receive funding local governments will need a Vision Zero plan or safety plan.

Mr. Harris replied he believes so but is not positive; the law is new and staff is still reviewing the details. He will have another update next month.

Mr. Harris referred to the 2023-2027 Florida Greenways and Trails Systems (FGTS) Plan update and stated they did not implement the TPO's recommended updates to the plan; he will be meeting with them to discuss it. It is a probability that he will develop new updates to submit this year; he will bring those to the BPAC and the TPO Board for approval in the next few months.

VII. <u>BPAC Member Comments</u>

Ms. Moss announced FDOT is holding a public meeting regarding the Mason Avenue Corridor Planning Study on Wednesday, January 19, 2022 at 5:30 pm at the Midtown Cultural and Education Center in Daytona Beach; it will be a hybrid meeting. She announced that Oslo, Norway claims to have reached Vision Zero in 2019. The Community Traffic Safety Teams (CTST) encourage law enforcement agencies to participate in the High Visibility Enforcement Program; however, law enforcement agencies are understaffed and are unable to do so at this time.

Mr. Daun provided comments regarding the new Amazon warehouse on the Bellevue Avenue extension and the proposed east/west trail to DeLand. Volusia County will have to do due diligence and conduct traffic pattern and capacity studies and include bicycle/pedestrian facilities because that was going to be the east/west trail to DeLand. It is a county road which is why he asked Ms. Bobo about using safety funds on local or county roads because this could be a potential issue. He wants to contact FDOT or Volusia County regarding the intersection of US 1 and Fairview Avenue (County Road 4040) because of the construction of apartments it is becoming a major east/west link as people do not want to use LPGA Boulevard or International Speedway Boulevard; there is no green arrow turn signal to turn onto US 1.

Mr. Dodzik announced he and Mr. Coletti attended the Call for Projects meeting in Palm Coast this morning; there was good representation from Palm Coast and Flagler Beach. There was a good discussion and all want to be more proactive and accomplish projects.

Mr. Harris asked if they were going to submit applications to the TPO through the Call for Projects this year.

Mr. Dodzik replied it appears that way; either collectively or individually. His understanding is that this TPO only covers a portion of Flagler County but rest of the county has another TPO.

Mr. Harris replied the R2CTPO serves the entire urbanized area in Flagler County; the rest of Flagler County has to work directly with FDOT for the unurbanized areas. There is not another TPO in Flagler County.

Ms. Winsett announced that for traffic signal improvements or other issues within Volusia County, the best way to get something done is to go to www.Volusia.org to the service request page and put the request in writing. It gives citizens the opportunity to explain what the problem is and what they would like to see done; routes the request to the appropriate department. There is not the perfect Volusia County employee to address committee members questions

and/or concerns regarding engineering, funding, programs, etc.; she does her best but members should put their requests and/or concerns in writing to the elected officials and managers. If members cannot find the correct page on the website they can contact her for assistance.

Chairperson Aufdenberg announced that on Saturday he got a sneak peek at the Daytona Beach Riverfront Esplanade which is the reconstructed East Coast Greenway and a section of the St. John's River to Sea Loop. He walked the entire length from Beach Street to New Smyrna Beach and it is scheduled to open to the public in April. The part of the trail from International Speedway Boulevard to Orange Avenue is a little behind; he does not have a time schedule for that yet.

B. REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2022-## ADOPTING THE R2CTPO 2022 SAFETY PERFORMANCE TARGETS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) issued final rules on the transportation performance measures required for the State Departments of Transportation (DOTs) and Metropolitan/Transportation Planning Organizations (M/TPOs). The final rule requires targets to be set for the five-year rolling average of the following five safety performance measures:

- Number of Fatalities
- Number of Serious Injuries
- Rate of Fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled
- Rate of Serious Injuries per 100 million vehicle miles traveled
- Number of Non-Motorized Fatalities and Serious Injuries

At the January board meeting, TPO staff presented background information on historical crash data as well as targets adopted in prior years. Prior year targets were re-set annually based on an annual two percent reduction for each safety performance measure. The proposed 2022 Targets continues to utilize the same methodology from previous years by reducing targets by two percent when measures are trending downward. However, for measures where the data is trending upwards, the proposed 2022 target retains the previous year's target.

Resolution 2022-## adopts the River to Sea TPO Safety Performance Targets for the year 2022. The proposed safety targets are presented in Exhibit "A".

RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION ADOPTING TRANSPORTATION SAFETY TARGETS

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the FHWA issued a final rule based on section 1203 of the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) and with consideration to provisions in the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act), which identified national transportation goals, outlined standards for measuring and reporting safety data and established five safety performance measures; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with 23 C.F.R. 490.209(a), the Florida Department for Transportation (FDOT), as part of the annual development of the State Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), has developed safety targets for each of the five safety performance measures; and

WHEREAS, 23 C.F.R. 490.209(c), requires that each Metropolitan Planning Organization establish safety targets and report progress over time in reaching the adopted targets; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO recognizes certain limitations in the availability of data required to develop data sets for the planning area in Flagler County where the planning area boundaries do not align with the county boundaries.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the River to Sea TPO that the:

- 1. River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization supports the intentions of FDOT outlined in the State HSIP for Calendar Year 2022 including a target of zero for each of the safety performance measures and establishing an interim measure for each of the five measures; and the
- 2. River to Sea TPO Board and advisory committees have reviewed and endorsed the safety related transportation performance data and targets as shown in Exhibit A; and the
- 3. Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or his/her designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit these targets to the:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation; and
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and the
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation).

Basis for Establishing Targets:

The River to Sea TPO continues to reduce the target by two percent when measures are trending downward. However, if the measure is trending upwards, the previous year's target is retained. The following 2022 Safety Performance Targets are adopted for the Five-Year Rolling Average in each of the performance measures categories:

Fatalities

2022 Five-Year Rolling Average Target: 131.6

The 2022 Target retains the adopted five-year rolling average target from the year 2021.

Serious Injuries

2022 Five-Year Rolling Average Target: 679.8

The 2022 Target is calculated based on a two percent annual reduction in the total number of serious injuries from the year 2020.

Fatalities Rate:*

2022 Five-Year Rolling Average Target: 1.784

The 2022 Target retains the adopted five-year rolling average target from the year 2021.

*VMT specific to the planning area is not currently available, which includes all of Volusia County and a portion of Flagler County. As such, the fatalities rate was calculated using the data available for the entirety of Volusia and Flagler County, pending the provision of data at the planning area level.

Serious Injuries Rate*

2022 Five-Year Rolling Average Target: 9.146

The 2022 Target is calculated based on a two percent annual reduction in the serious injuries rate from the year 2020.

*VMT specific to the planning area is not currently available, which includes all of Volusia County and a portion of Flagler County. As such, the serious injuries rate was calculated using the data available for the entirety of Volusia and Flagler County, pending the provision of data at the planning area level.

Non-Motorized Serious Injuries and Fatalities

2022 Five-Year Rolling Average Target: 103.4

The 2022 Target retains the adopted five-year rolling average target from the year 2021.

C. REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2022-## ADOPTING THE R2CTPO 2022 TRANSIT SAFETY PERFORMANCE TARGETS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) issued a final Public Transportation Agency Safety Action Plan (PTASP) rule on July 19, 2018. The rule requires certain recipients and sub-recipients of FTA grants that operate public transportation to develop and implement a PTASP based on a safety management systems approach. Development and implementation of PTASPs is anticipated to help ensure that public transportation systems are safe nationwide. A key component of the PTASP rule is a requirement for transit providers to annually establish transit safety performance targets. MPOs, including the R2CTPO, also must establish transit safety targets for the metropolitan planning area and incorporate transit safety into the metropolitan transportation planning process.

In 2012, the Moving Ahead for Progress Act (MAP-21) mandated the FTA to develop a rule establishing a strategic and systematic process of operating, maintaining, and improving public capital assets effectively through their entire life cycle. The Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan Final Rule 49 USC 625 became effective October 1, 2016 and established four performance measures to approximate the State of Good Repair (SGR) for four categories of capital assets. Calculating performance measures helps transit agencies to quantify the condition of their assets, which facilitates setting targets that support local funding.

Resolution 2022-## adopts the River to Sea TPO Transit Safety Performance Targets for the year 2022. The proposed safety targets are presented in Exhibits "A" and "B".

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) issued the final rule-making needed to implement requirements established through the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) and subsequent provisions in the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act), which identified national transportation programs for measuring, reporting and target setting of the transportation system; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan (PTASP) final rule 49 C.F.R. Part 673, certain operators of public transportation systems that are recipients or subrecipients of FTA grant funds are required to develop safety plans that include the processes and procedures necessary for implementing Safety Management Systems (SMS); and

WHEREAS, in accordance with 49 C.F.R. 625.25(a) and 625.45(a), providers of public transit have developed Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plans and established performance targets for maintaining a State of Good Repair (SGR) for transit assets; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with 49 C.F.R. 625.45(e), transit service providers are to coordinate with Metropolitan (or Transportation) Planning Organizations to select TAM performance targets; and

WHEREAS, 23 C.F.R. 490.105(a), requires that each Metropolitan (or Transportation) Planning Organization establish a program of Transportation Performance Management (TPM) that includes transportation measures and targets and each organization will report progress in reaching the adopted targets; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO supports the efforts of partner agencies, the FDOT and transit service providers in coordinating the data required to develop measures and setting performance targets; and

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the River to Sea TPO that the:

- 1. River to Sea TPO Board and advisory committees have reviewed the data provided and support the Transit Safety Performance Targets in the PTASP for each federal safety performance measure defined by FTA in the National Public Transportation Safety Plan (fatalities, injuries, reportable safety events, and system reliability) as shown in Exhibit A; and
- 2. River to Sea TPO Board and advisory committees have also reviewed the TAM Plans provided and support the transit SGR targets as shown in Exhibit B; and the
- 3. Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or his/her designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit these targets to the:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation; and
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and the
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation).
