I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance

The River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by Chairperson Ted Wendler. The roll was called, and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. The meeting was held in a hybrid format with eleven voting and four non-voting members physically present, and four voting and four non-voting members virtually present. The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Hall to allow members attending virtually to participate and vote.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Lodge and carried unanimously.

II. Public Comment/Participation

Mr. Richard Hamilton, a Flagler County citizen, stated that he is supportive of the Flagler Beach trail gap funding and requested an update on how the new Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices through FDOT might affect some of the local safety projects.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Recommend Approval of the November 8, 2023 BPAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to recommend approval of the November 8, 2023 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Ms. Bonds and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval (Ratification) to Amend the List of Shared-Use Non-Motorized (SUN) Trail Projects

Mr. Stephan Harris gave in-depth details of the amendment to the List of Shared-Use Non-Motorized (SUN) Trail projects. He stated that maps were provided in the agenda packet. He also noted that this item will be on the CAC/TCC agenda later this month. He discussed the areas where the Work Program will address gaps.

Mr. Harris answered members' questions regarding previously washed-out areas and the additional option.

Ms. Nicoulin gave a summary of the amendment and noted that the action for today is to put this project on the TPO's Priority List. She explained the process of adding projects to the TPO's Priority List.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lodge to recommend approval to amend the List of Shared-Use Non-Motorized (SUN) Trail Projects. The motion was seconded by Ms. Sharp and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2024-## Adopting the 2024 River to Sea TPO Safety Data and Targets

Ms. Nicoulin gave a PowerPoint presentation and explained the process of adopting the 2024 River to Sea TPO Safety Data and Targets Resolution. She stated that TPOs can either adopt this target or come up with their own. The TPO has recommended adopting FDOT's target of zero. She discussed the five performance measures including fatalities and serious injuries statistics and provided statistic charts for fatalities/serious injuries and bike/pedestrian serious injuries in Volusia and Flagler Counties over the last ten years.

Ms. Nicoulin answered members' questions regarding measures being taken to separate fatalities and serious injuries statistics; achievable goals; whether Target Zero is state-mandated or federal, and whether the TPO has to meet the goals in order to get funding.

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Bonds to recommend approval of Resolution 2024-## adopting the 2024 River to Sea TPO Safety Data and Targets. The motion was seconded by Mr. Lodge and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentation and Discussion Items</u>

A. Presentation and Discussion of the FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

{Handout Provided}

Ms. Nicoulin gave an overview of the process for the UPWP in detail and explained that today's presentation is more of a brainstorming activity.

Mr. Harris gave a PowerPoint presentation and provided in-depth details of the provided handout. He discussed the required activities and unique projects. He noted that counters will be installed on some of the local trails, the exact locations of the counters are yet to be determined.

Mr. Harris answered members' questions regarding whether the data from the counters will be available to the public; the purpose of the counters; if other municipalities can use the counter data, and who will be looking at the data.

Members provided possible projects to be in the UPWP such as an app for the Bicycle Suitability Map, help with planning the Active Transportation Workshop, education for bicyclists and pedestrians, identifying school crossing zones where cameras could be installed, and increasing the TPO staff size.

V. Staff Comments

Ms. Nicoulin announced that FDOT is putting together a safety summit tentatively scheduled for February 27, 2024, and noted that she will provide more details at next month's meeting.

B. REVIEW AND RECOMMEND APPROVAL OF THE DRAFT FY 2024/25 AND FY 2025/26 UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP) BICYCLE/PEDESTRIAN TASKS FOR FDOT/FHWA REVIEW

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) outlines the annual activities and funding for the TPO over a two-year period. The next two-year UPWP will become effective July 1, 2024. The TPO's transportation planning activities are funded in large part through federal grants. These federally funded transportation planning activities must be identified and approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and FDOT in advance of each fiscal year. The activities, products, and budgeted funds must be documented in the TPO's Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) which is updated every two years. At last month's meeting, TPO staff reviewed the draft tasks for consideration.

TPO staff will provide an update on the recommended tasks and activities as well as the funding allocations to be included in the draft FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 UPWP.

IV. PRESENTATIONS AND DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF PEDESTRIANS, BICYCLISTS AND ROUNDABOUTS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Roundabouts can be safer than traditional intersections and can shorten travel times for both drivers and pedestrians. As motorists move through the roundabout in the same direction, the chance of a potential head-on collision is greatly reduced. Roundabouts have been shown to reduce the number of fatal and severe injury crashes by 78 percent to 82 percent compared to a stop-controlled intersection or a signalized intersection, according to the Federal Highway Administration. Furthermore, motorists must slow down when using a roundabout, helping to make the road safer. Roundabouts also keep traffic moving, as opposed to intersections, which force drivers and pedestrians to wait at stoplights or at stop signs for vehicles to cross. While navigating intersections comes naturally to most drivers, some might not be as used to using roundabouts. Similar to an intersection, a motorist should decide which direction he or she wants to go in before approaching the roundabout. Always pay attention to the upcoming signage to understand which lane to take to reach your exit.

Before entering the roundabout, drivers should slow down to about 10 to 15 mph and yield to any pedestrians or cyclists attempting to cross in crosswalks. Also, before entering, drivers should yield to traffic within the roundabout. Once there is a gap in traffic, the driver can enter the roundabout. Traffic in roundabouts moves counterclockwise, in other words, to the right. While driving through the roundabout, the driver should stay in their lane and then exit at the street they want to go on. If an emergency vehicle approaches, the driver should drive through the roundabout before pulling over, as they would if they were crossing an intersection during that situation.

Pedestrians should stay on the walkways and only cross at designated crosswalks. If needed, the pedestrian can stop in the middle of the crosswalk at the splitter island. Pedestrians have the right-of-way. They should not enter the center island of the roundabout. Cyclists have the choice of using a roundabout as a motorist would or using it as a pedestrian would. If a cyclist chooses to ride with the vehicle traffic, they must follow the same rules that vehicles follow and signal which direction they will go, just as a vehicle would. If a cyclist chooses to use a walkway, they should yield the right-of-way to pedestrians. Cyclists should also walk their bicycles across crosswalks.


Roundabouts: How They Work for Pedestrians & Bicyclists



Modern roundabouts are designed with important pedestrian safety features. For example, the design ensures that vehicles pass through at slower speeds and face fewer conflict points than at traditional intersections.


Pedestrians:


Crosswalks are set further back from vehicle traffic, allowing drivers more time to react to people in the roadway before merging into or out of the roundabout. Triangular islands between lanes of vehicle traffic give pedestrians a safe place to wait if they choose to cross only one direction of traffic at a time.



Bicyclists:

Bicyclists can choose to ride through the roundabout with traffic (FIG. A) or walk their bicycles through the pedestrian crosswalks (FIG. B) - much like they would in a traditional intersection. Always give pedestrians the right of way, and use hand signals when riding with traffic.


Anatomy of a Roundabout

Modern roundabouts have been proven safer and more efficient than other types of circular intersections, such as a neighborhood traffic circle or large rotary. Roundabouts have certain distinguishing features and characteristics, which are labeled in the illustration to the right.

ROUNDABOUT FAQS

Q. How is a modern roundabout different from a traffic circle or rotary?

- A. Modern roundabouts are typically smaller than the large, high-speed rotaries, which are common in the Northeast. In addition, roundabouts are typically larger than neighborhood traffic circles used to calm traffic. A roundabout has these characteristics:
 - » Counterclockwise Flow Traffic travels counterclockwise around a center island.
 - » Entry Yield Control Vehicles approaching the roundabout yield to traffic already circulating in the roundabout.
 - » Low Speed The design of approaching roadway and the diameter of the roundabout ensures low speeds through the intersection.

Q. How do roundabouts improve safety?

A. The illustration to the right shows how traditional intersections have 32 conflict points, which roundabouts reduce to just eight. Roundabouts remove right angle conflicts, which lessens the severity of crashes at these types of intersections. Incidents that do occur in roundabouts are at low speeds and are typically sideswipe, glancing collisions.

Q. How should a driver yield to emergency vehicles?

A. If you have not entered the roundabout, pull over to the right and allow the emergency vehicle to pass. If you have already entered the roundabout, continue to the closest exit and pull into it to allow the emergency vehicle to pass.

Q. How do large vehicles navigate a roundabout?

A. Roundabouts are designed to accommodate all vehicles, including tractor-trailers, emergency vehicles, recreational vehicles, etc. To accommodate the vehicle turning path as the vehicle makes its way through the roundabout, a truck apron around the inside of the circulating roadway provides the space needed. The apron is slightly elevated and visually different from the circulating roadway. This different color helps make it clear that the truck apron is not a lane for smaller vehicles or a pedestrian walkway.
