I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance

The meeting of the Volusia Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) <u>Bicycle/Pedestrian</u> <u>Advisory Committee</u> (BPAC) was called to order at 3:00 p.m. by Chairperson Robert Storke. The roll was called and it was determined that there was a quorum.

Chairman Storke introduced Ms. Patricia Lipovsky, Volusia County, District 2 to the committee.

II. Public Comment/Participation

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of January 8, 2014 BPAC Meeting Minutes

Motion: A motion was made to approve the January 8, 2014 BPAC meeting minutes by Ms. Nicoulin. The motion was seconded by Mr. Aufdenberg and unanimously approved.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2014-## Reaffirming the Volusia TPO's Policy for Establishing and Maintaining Transportation Priority Projects

Mr. Keeth stated each year the TPO re-visits the policies that guide the priority project process which identifies new projects for funding and ranks them. This resolution identifies the various lists on which the TPO places and prioritizes the projects and identifies which projects are generally protected in terms of their priorities and cannot be jumped by other projects that come along. The only substantive change on this resolution from last year is the proposed addition of a new category of projects; the Regional Trail Priority List. The TPO anticipates funding with Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds that the state administers as opposed to the Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds the TPO receives. The other changes are for clarification.

Motion: A motion was made by Ms. Grenham to recommend approval of Resolution 2014-## reaffirming the Volusia TPO's policy for establishing and maintaining transportation priority projects. The motion was seconded by Ms. Nicoulin and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2014-## Reaffirming the Volusia TPO's Policy for the Annual Allocation of Extra Urban (XU) and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Funding

Mr. Keeth stated this list identifies the funds the TPO receives for projects; those funds are identified as extra urban funds allocated directly to the TPO; the TPO has been allocating 40% to ITS/Safety projects, 30% to transit and the remaining 30% to bicycle/pedestrian projects. This resolution is proposing to hold that same allocation of XU funds and formalizing the decision made to establish a limit on bicycle/pedestrian project costs; \$1.5 million in a single year and no more than \$3 million total per project. There is also a change in wording to clarify the Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds referred to in the TPO policy which is intended to mean only those Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds from the federal government that are allocated directly to the TPO for the TPO's control and distribution. It includes a new paragraph under number five recognizing the regional trail list and noting any additional Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds administered by the state be applied to those projects.

Motion: Ms. Nicoulin made a motion to recommend approval of Resolution 2014-## reaffirming the Volusia TPO's Policy for the annual allocation of Extra Urban (XU) and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Funding. The motion was seconded by Ms. Merens and carried unanimously.

D. Appointment of Members to the 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Subcommittee

Mr. Harris stated the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Subcommittee is responsible for working with the TPO staff and is comprised of members from the Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC), the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), the Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) and the Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB). He stated the dates and times of the subcommittee meetings have not been determined yet. There is information in the agenda packet regarding roles and responsibilities of this subcommittee. He stated Ms. Jean Parlow, TPO staff, is the project manager for the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP).

Mr. Aufdenberg asked the duration of the committee's business.

Mr. Harris replied now until the adoption of the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) which will be September of next year.

Motion: Ms. Grenham made a motion to appoint Ms. Colleen Nicoulin, Ms. Wendy Hickey and Mr. Bill Pouzar to the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Subcommittee. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

IV. Presentation and Discussion Items

A. Presentation on the International Speedway Boulevard (US 92) Pedestrian Safety Project and Widening of I-95

Mr. Bauknecht gave a PowerPoint presentation on the I-95 Widening project and the International Speedway Boulevard (US 92) Pedestrian Safety Improvement project.

Ms. Lipovsky asked Mr. Bauknecht to be more explanatory in his presentation due to her being sight-impaired.

Ms. Lipovsky asked if there has been any discussion about installing accessible pedestrian signals for the vision-impaired where the free-flow turn lanes and pedestrian islands are being eliminated.

Mr. Bauknecht stated that has been discussed and the request for proposal is being written now; Ms. Deborah Tyrone, FDOT's pedestrian contact, can help with that.

Mr. Mostert stated he was unfamiliar with the term "compensatory treatment" and asked for an explanation and if there will be any adverse effect.

Mr. Bauknecht replied compensatory treatment is taking storm water from one area and taking it to another basin to treat it; it will not cause any adverse effects.

Discussion continued regarding the International Speedway Boulevard (US 92) pedestrian improvement program.

Mr. Bauknecht stated that this is a true design/build project and there are issues that will be dealt with during construction.

B. Presentation on the Racers Who Ride Foundation [handout provided]

Mr. Pouzar stated Racers Who Ride is a recently formed nonprofit organization to publicize the fact that some race car drivers and crew members ride bicycles. The goal is to promote bicycle safety and courtesy. The organization hopes to get substantial donations from the car companies like Ford, Chevrolet, etc. in order to produce videos. They want to increase their online presence via social media, and eventually with support from the Ad Council and National Highway Safety Administration, do some public service announcements.

Ms. Nicoulin asked if there are any events associated with this organization scheduled.

Mr. Pouzar replied eventually there will be; hopefully next year they will have some events scheduled with some drivers.

Mr. Bustos stated this was something the Federal Transportation Administration (FTA) should push to help humanize bicyclists and educate people on bicycle/pedestrian safety.

Mr. Mostert asked if this was a national campaign and if it was strictly public service announcements they were doing.

Mr. Pouzar replied yes, it is a national organization; the focus right now is on safety and as the organization gets bigger there may be other areas they branch out into.

C. Presentation on the Volusia TPO Priority Process Schedule

Mr. Keeth stated the priority process kick-off is where the TPO calls for projects that will be funded through the TPO. There are three categories of funding; federal extra urban (XU) funds for bicycle/pedestrian projects and Traffic Operations/ITS/Safety projects; federal Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds for transportation alternative projects which can be enhancements to the transportation systems or landscaping projects when they are not stand alone. This year the TPO will put together a regional trails list separate from the bicycle/pedestrian list. The call for projects went out a week ago on Monday, February 3, 2014, with an April 11, 2014 deadline (Note: the project application deadline was subsequently pushed out to May 9, 2014). There has been discussion on how to fund smaller projects such as sidewalks; it is not cost effective to fund those through normal channels and the TPO is trying to find an alternative such as swapping out federal funds with local funds which would free the projects from administrative burdens. If it is decided to modify the process the deadline will be extended. The TPO will hold two workshops on February 20, 2014; one on the west side of the county from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm at DeLand City Hall in the downstairs conference room and the other from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm in the TPO conference room.

Ms. Nicoulin asked about Palm Coast and Flagler County being included.

Mr. Keeth replied the TPO has not officially added them yet but they are invited to attend.

D. Status Update on the Mobile Safety City by Volusia County Schools

Mr. Clark gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Mobile Safety City and how they have progressed in putting the program together. The school board is seeking funding for runner mats used for the roadways and bicycle paths that are durable and would be a more permanent solution.

Discussion ensued regarding issues with the mats and possible solutions.

Ms. Nicoulin asked if the Mobile Safety City was geared toward certain grades or if it was available to all the students.

Mr. Clark replied it is for all students.

V. Staff Comments

Update on the Doris Leeper Preserve Trail Feasibility Study

Mr. Harris stated the city of Port Orange withdrew the Doris Leeper Trail Feasibility Study project; the city council had some concerns about the impact on the residents; at least 30 residential parcels would be affected.

Mr. Bustos asked how the residents would be affected.

Mr. Harris replied the corridor that the project was going to use had no right-of-way in the public domain; it would have to go behind a residential subdivision; the city would have to apply for easements, ask for donations of right-of-way, or would have had to acquire right-of-way from the residents. The project would have been difficult; maintenance, annual inspections, the eventual demolition, etc.; all played a role in the decision to withdraw. The TPO will remove this project from the priority list.

Update on Volusia County Bicycling Map for the Experienced Cyclist

Mr. Harris stated the TPO will be making enhancements to the bicycle map including larger text for labels to make it more readable; a lot of the designated routes are being made bolder and enhanced. The TPO will also be taking a close look at the routes as some of them do not make a complete loop or do not connect.

Mr. Bustos stated that bicyclists would like to see more street names added as reference points; mostly it is just main streets named.

Mr. Harris asked for specific examples.

Mr. Bustos replied he would show Mr. Harris on the map.

Mr. Harris stated he attended the groundbreaking ceremonies on January 27, 2014 for the Rail Trail, one in Edgewater and one in Osteen.

VII. BPAC Member Comments

Mr. Bustos stated there are two pieces of legislation to be aware of; first the Coast-to-Coast connector is back on track and getting total support across the board. The other piece of legislation is increasing the penalty for bicycle/pedestrian hit-and-run accidents to be as severe as the penalty for driving under the influence (DUI). The language will define bicycle/pedestrians as vulnerable road users which will also increase the penalty.

Mr. Mostert stated New Smyrna Beach had a scoping session regarding the appropriateness of the site for the spaceport at Shiloh and over 450 people attended.

Mr. Aufdenberg gave an update on his proposal to the university for bicycle parking; it has moved up to the planning committee. He also stated the new telescope at Embry-Riddle University is in; they have all the mechanical parts but are waiting on the mirror.

Ms. Tyrone stated she is looking for communities to work with on any bicycle/pedestrian planning issues, corridor studies, etc.

Mr. Cotton stated Votran launched the new website with a lot of new features and Ms. Heather Blanck will be making arrangements to give a presentation in the near future. He also reminded the committee of the fare increase effective February 16, 2014.

VIII. Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 4:37 p.m.



SunRail Connectivity Study




Study Purpose





C) Presentation on the Community Transportation Survey

Background Information:

The TPO is developing a survey program to better understand the priorities and preferences of its constituents related to transportation planning and implementation for its planning area. Kittelson & Associates, Inc. one of the TPO's General Planning Consultants, has been retained to facilitate the survey development, dissemination, and analysis. They will be giving an overview of the survey schedule and scope.

This survey is intended to be conducted every two years, as needed, and will help provide insights for the TPO as it makes decisions on transportation priorities. It will also form a baseline that may be followed up with focus groups or subsequent surveys.

Specific goals of the survey include the following:

- Ascertain the transportation wants, needs, problems, preferences, and suggestions from residents, business community, elected officials, and other stakeholders
- Provide a baseline of data that the TPO can compare against a future surveying efforts in order to ascertain trends
- Act as an educational tool and expose each person who takes it to the benefits, mission, and programs of the TPO
- Add to the TPO database of interested residents, businesses, and visitors

FLORIDA BICYCLE MONTH

WHEREAS, bicycling plays an important role in the lives of millions of Floridians by safely providing means to travel to work, school, and parks and is a popular form of recreation, exercise, and helps motivate tourism; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Department of Transportation and many local governments throughout the state have adopted goals and policies to develop a multimodal transportation system that supports transportation alternatives, including the bicycle, and encourages the use of bicycles for transportation on Florida's roadways; and

WHEREAS, roadway safety for vulnerable road users, including bicyclists, has been elevated to a critical priority of the Florida Department of Transportation in order to reduce fatalities and serious injuries and encourages motorists to share the roadways with bicyclists and for bicyclists to observe all traffic laws; and

WHEREAS, bicycle usage promotes health and wellness in the state and is an important part of encouraging all citizens to develop habits of physical activity to become or stay fit, avoid obesity, and reduce the risk of many chronic diseases and conditions; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Greenways and Trails System Plan advances the creation and sustainability of bicycling trails by establishing the vision for a connected trails system that enhances Florida's economy, tourism, health, alternative transportation, recreation, conservation, and quality of life; and

WHEREAS, nearly 25 million residents and tourists participate in bicycling annually, with more than 18.4 million bicyclists using paved trails and nearly 6.5 million on unpaved trails; and

WHEREAS, bicycles provide an alternate and economical means of transportation to work, thus increasing access to employment, and increased bicycle usage can help provide mobility for those without access to a motor vehicle, and increase existing road and parking capacity when people choose bicycling for utilitarian trips, reducing the number of automobiles on roadways;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Rick Scott, Governor of the State of Florida, do hereby extend greetings and best wishes to all observing March 2014 as *Florida Bicycle Month*.

Tom Staed Veterans Memorial Bridge

Study Description

Volusia County is holding a public information meeting to discuss the bridge replacement for the Tom Staed Veterans Memorial Bridge. The Volusia County Council selected the high-level fixed bridge option from the Project Development and Environmental (PD&E) study on January 6, 2011. Federal funding has been secured, and construction is expected to run from early 2015 to early 2017. For more information on the study, please visit www.veteransmemorialbridge.com.

This meeting is the first of two public meetings planned as part of a community-based evaluation to communicate with the public and gain ideas from the local community. The second public meeting will be tentatively held in summer 2014.

Meeting Information

A public meeting to discuss the bridge replacement of the Tom Staed Veterans Memorial Bridge will be held on Tuesday, March 11th, 2014 at the City Island Recreation Hall located at 108 E. Orange Ave. in Daytona Beach, FL 32114. The meeting will be from 5:30 PM to 7:00 PM, with a presentation at 5:45 PM.

A Project Advisory Committee (PAC) has been created for this project to help with the development of the design elements. The meetings are tentatively scheduled to be at the beginning of each month, beginning in May 2013. A summary from each committee meeting is posted on the project website (www.veteransmemorialbridge.com) within a few weeks following each meeting. The committee has discussed which bridge types they prefer, which aided the design team in creating three (3) different bridge alternatives. Utilizing what was discussed in the PAC meetings, the design team completed a bridge development report (BDR), which analyzed and compared all three alternatives by a number of factors and criteria including cost, maintenance, aesthetics, constructability, construction schedule, hydraulics, viewshed, and environmental impacts. Each of these categories were weighted and each bridge was scored based on their performance. Based on this criteria, it was determined that the Open Spandrel Design was the best alternative to move forward with in design. Below is a rendering of the Open Spandrel Bridge design selected. The memorial plaza layout and fishing piers have also been selected in the PAC meetings for County Council approval. However, the aesthetic elements of the fishing piers, bridge piers, lighting, and veteran memorials are still in discussion.

- TPO staff issues **call for new projects** application packets sent out to all interested parties (Monday, February 3).
- Except as noted below, local governments are NOT required to submit a new application for a
 candidate project already on the VTPO's List of Priority Projects (LOPP). However, if a local
 government would like for its project(s) to remain on a list for funding, that local government must
 submit a letter to the VTPO reaffirming its support for the project(s). Candidate projects on the list of
 projects ready for Feasibility Study will not be moved to the list of projects ready for Project
 Implementation until a Feasibility Study has been completed AND the local government has submitted
 an application for Project Implementation to the VTPO.
- TPO staff hosts **workshops** with local governments to discuss the Priority Project process and application requirements: East Volusia and West Volusia (scheduled February 20).
