




RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION AMENDING THE FY 2022/23 AND FY 2023/24 UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP) AND AUTHORIZING THE DE-OBLIGATION OF CONSOLIDATED PLANNING GRANT (PL) AND URBAN ATTRIBUTABLE (SU) FUNDS FROM THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the designated urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 49 U.S.C. 5303, 23 CFR 450.310, and Florida Statutes 339.175, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and a portion of Flagler County as defined by the Metropolitan Planning Area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 23 CFR 450, and Florida Statutes 339.175, require the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization and the Florida Department of Transportation to enter into an agreement clearly identifying the responsibilities for cooperatively carrying out the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) portion of the Metropolitan Planning Process and accomplishing the transportation planning requirements of state and federal law; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO shall endorse and amend as appropriate, the plans and programs required by 23 C.F.R. 450.300 through 450.324, among which is the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO developed and approved the FY 22/23 to FY 23/24 UPWP for the period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the FY 22/23 to FY 23/24 UPWP requires an amendment to de-obligate funds that will not be sent by the end of the fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the de-obligated funds will be reauthorized and made available in FY 24/25 of the new UPWP, effective July 1, 2024.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) that the Chairperson of the TPO (or his/her designee) is hereby authorized to:

 De-obligate \$980,814 in Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Transportation Management Consolidated Planning Grant (PL) funding from year two of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23 and 2023/24 UPWP so that these funds may be allocated in FY 2024/25 to support the planning tasks identified in the proposed Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and

- De-obligate \$176,378 in Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Transportation Management Urban Attributable (SU) funding from year two of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23 and 2023/24 UPWP so that these funds may be allocated in FY 2024/25 to support the planning tasks identified in the proposed Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and
- 3. Authorize the Executive Director to execute an Amendment to the River to Sea TPO Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement to de-obligate the funds.

RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION SUPPORTING THE ST. JOHNS RIVER TO SEA LOOP TRAIL

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) Plan establishes the vision for implementing a connected statewide system of greenways and trails for recreation, conservation, alternative transportation, healthy lifestyles, a vibrant economy, a high quality of life; and

WHEREAS, the St. Johns River to Sea Loop is a 260-mile Shared-Use, Non-Motorized (SUN) Trail traversing Flagler, Volusia, Brevard, Putnam, and St. Johns Counties; and

WHEREAS, the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail is one of fourteen regionally significant trails in the FGTS Plan that cross multiple counties, attract national and international visitors, and serve as an opportunity for economic and ecotourism development; and

WHEREAS, the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail showcases the natural value of Florida's wildlife areas, ecology, natural resources, and serves as a main corridor for critical links and trail connectedness across the state; and

WHEREAS, the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail is the second leading regional trail priority in the State of Florida, behind the Coast-to-Coast Trail; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Greenways and Trails Council will be developing a prioritized/reprioritized list of the current FGTS regional trails at their March 27-28, 2024 meeting in Winter Haven, Florida; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO is a strong proponent of the provision of bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the River to Sea TPO that the:

- 1. River to Sea TPO supports the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail as one of the leading regional trail priorities in the State of Florida; and the
- 2. Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or his designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit this resolution to the following:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation;
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation);
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation);
 - d. Florida Greenways and Trails Council;
 - e. East Central Florida Regional Planning Council (ECFRPC);
 - f. Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC);
 - g. Members of the Central Florida MPO Alliance; and
 - h. Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Office of Greenways and Trails (OGT);



Florida Greenways and Trails Act, Chapter 260, Florida Statutes (F.S.)





Florida Greenways and Trails Council (FGTC)

- Established in Chapter 260.0142, F.S.
- Advises the department on greenway and trail related issues.
- Promotes intergovernmental cooperation and private partnerships for developing the greenways and trails system.
- Recommends **priorities** for critical links in developing and managing the system.







Florida's Greenways and Trails System Includes:

- 1,500-mile Florida National Scenic Trail.
- 1,515-mile Florida Circumnavigational Saltwater Paddling Trail.




What Makes a Trail Town?



Trail Town celebration events are great for publicity and community involvement.







Land & Paddling Trail Designation Program



Designation Program


- Land trails, greenways, blueways, and sites across the state can be designated as part of the Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) through an application process and voluntary landowner agreement.
- Lands may be public or private.
- Paddling trails are included.





Purpose of Designation

- Further the goals and objectives of the FGTS, creating an **interconnected system**.
- Encourage **voluntary partnerships** in conservation, development, and management of the system's many pieces.
- Provide **recognition** for individual pieces of the system and partners involved.
- Raise public awareness of the conservation and recreation benefits of the system.



On April 13, a representative for SORBA Jax along with one of the landowner/ representatives of Jeremy's Hill at Attero Park went to Tallahassee to petition for Attero Park to be included in the Florida Department of Environmental Protection Greenways and Trails designation. Attero Park is a 100-acre former landfill boasting 60+ ft of elevation and is located just south of downtown Jacksonville. The vote was unanimous for the designation. This is the first time private land has received this designation in Jacksonville. And is only the eighth project in the



Basic Criteria

 A designated land or waterway must protect and/or enhance natural, recreational, cultural or historic resources.

AND

• Provide linear open space, a hub or a site.

OR

 Promote connectivity between or among conservation lands, communities, parks, other recreational facilities, cultural sites, or historic sites.



Paddling Trail Criteria

- Local, regional or state entity agrees to be the **manager** of the trail in terms of development and long-term maintenance. The manager must agree to monitor the trail at least once a year.
- At least **three miles** in length.
- Adequate **public access**.
- Adequate **information** is provided in terms of difficulty, mileage, safety considerations and environmental conditions.
- **Campsites** and **overnight stops** are only required when public access points are further than **20 miles** apart so that paddlers can complete day trips in a reasonable amount of time.





Benefits of Designation


- Gives **public recognition** to local greenway and trail projects.
- Private landowners receive **liability** protection.
- Lands and waterways receive additional consideration in some acquisition and grant programs, such as the Florida Communities Trust Land Acquisition Program, the Recreational Trails Grant

Best Foot Forward for pedestrian safety

Volusia County Program Updates

THE PROBLEM:

Central Florida is consistently ranked one of the most dangerous metro regions for pedestrians in the United States.



THE MISSION:

To increase the number of drivers stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks, as Florida law requires, through community **education**, low-cost **engineering**, highvisibility **enforcement**, and data-driven **evaluation**.

THE PROGRAM:



Best Foot Forward is a grassroots pedestrian safety program that brings together government, law enforcement, and advocacy partners to work toward increasing pedestrian safety at crosswalks.







Expected Benefits of the BFF Program:



- Reduced Pedestrian Incidents
- Community Engagement
- Improved Walkability

Data Collection Spotlight: Comparing 4-lane, 35 mph roads



Ponce Inlet: S. Atlantic Ave. & Winterhaven Park

Baseline data from January shows that drivers yield to pedestrians at this crosswalk 83% of the time, which shows that the combination of flags and in-street signs can be an inexpensive countermeasure to improve driver yield rates if the right conditions are present.



Daytona Beach: S. Atlantic Ave. & Poinsettia Rd.

Despite good countermeasures such as stop bars, "Stop Here for Peds" signs, and yellow pedestrian signs on both sides of the road, only 25% of drivers are yielding here. Context such as land use, daily traffic, & pedestrian visibility are important factors.

Crossing Guards See Crosswalk Enforcement Ramping Up in Six Central Florida Counties

O February 18, 2024

Brevard County, Enforcement, Marion County, Orange County, Osceola County, Seminole County, Volusia County

Operation Best Foot Forward wrapped up its most expansive enforcement to date last Friday, with 14 law enforcement agencies across six counties issuing 366 warnings and citations to drivers that failed to yield to pedestrians. Many of the crosswalk locations chosen for enforcement were located within one mile of a school where students walk, in recognition of Crossing Guard Appreciation Day earlier this month. In total, there were 25 enforcement details conducted at 22 crosswalk locations.





The Volusia County portion is covered under project <u>452443-1</u>, and is estimated to begin construction in Summer 2024.



The purpose of this project is to repave State Road (S.R.) 44 from N. Hill Avenue to the eastbound Interstate 4 (I-4) on ramp, with the exception of the proposed limits of a new roundabout at the S.R. 44 intersection with Kepler Road. The roundabout will be constructed under a separate design-build project, (FPID No. <u>431922-1</u>) scheduled to begin in summer 2024. Improvements also include safety and operational upgrades such as correcting slopes at two curves and upgrading the guardrail at the I-4 overpass. Pedestrian safety improvements include enhanced intersection lighting, upgraded pedestrian signals, and reconstructed sidewalk curb ramps to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards. **There are no lane closures at this time.**

The contractor is completing work behind a concrete low profile barrier wall.



The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is performing maintenance on two existing State Road (S.R.) 46 bridges. One bridge connects Volusia and Seminole Counties over the St. Johns River, and the other bridge carries S.R. 46 over the Cabbage Slough waterway in Volusia County.


Long columns, known as piles, form the supports for both bridges. The purpose of this project is to install fiberglass pile jackets around the existing bridge piles. These pile jackets will serve as a protective covering that will reinforce and extend the life of each bridge.

The Barracuda Bridge is closed to vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Barracuda Boulevard, including the Barracuda Bridge, is closed from The Middle Way to Quay Assisi in New Smyrna Beach, Volusia County. This stretch of Barracuda Boulevard will remain closed until project completion, which is estimated to be Summer 2024. Motorists and pedestrians wishing to access the Marine Discovery Center and properties on Quay Assisi and adjacent side streets will be directed through a temporary detour route along Quay Assisi and North Causeway.

Watercraft access will be maintained during construction of the new Barracuda Bridge. However, there will be brief instances in which marine traffic access will be limited in the work zone for safety purposes. During these short closures, boaters are encouraged to use the channel below North Causeway to access Indian River North.







The contractor continues to work on the demolition of the bascule bridge.



The purpose of this project is to replace the existing State Road (S.R.) 44 bridge over the St. Johns River, also known as the Whitehair Bridge, with a high-level fixed span bridge. During construction, the existing S.R. 44 bridge will remain open for drivers to use while the new bridge is constructed to the south of the existing bridge. 

The deployment seeks to provide early detection of traffic incidents, such as stopped vehicles or queuing, and display an advanced warning on roadside signs with flashing beacons approaching the incident. The goal is to provide ample notification to roadway users of unsafe traffic conditions ahead, so that motorists can take precautionary measures to reduce secondary crashes.
- Update: The contractor has installed the advanced incident warning sign structures and performed testing on the system on February 27.
