- K. APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2024-08 SUPPORTING THE ST. JOHNS RIVER TO SEA LOOP TRAIL

The St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail is a 260-mile, Shared-Use, Non-Motorized (SUN) trail through Flagler, Volusia, Brevard, Putnam, and St. Johns Counties. In March 2016, the Florida Greenways and Trails Council (FGTC) designated the Coast-to-Coast Trail the #1 regional trail and the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail the #2 regional trail in Florida. With the passing of SB 106 in 2023, Chapter 260.0142(4)(2), Florida Statutes, was amended to include the following language:

Recommend priorities for regionally significant trails within the Florida Greenways and Trails System for inclusion by the Florida Department of Transportation in the Florida Shared-Use Nonmotorized Trail Network as defined by s. 339.81. For purposes of this section, the term "regionally significant trails" means trails that cross multiple counties, attract national and international visitors and serve as an opportunity for economic and ecotourism development; showcase the natural value of this state's wildlife areas, ecology, and natural resources; and serve as main corridors for critical links and trail connectedness across the state.

Because of the additional statutory language, the FGTC will be developing a prioritized/reprioritized list of the current regional trails. Draft Resolution 2024-08 expresses support for the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail to maintain its priority status.

#### I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum

The River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Board meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by TPO Chairperson Cloudman. The roll was called, and it was determined a quorum was physically present. The meeting was held as a hybrid with thirteen voting members physically present and one voting member virtually present.

#### II. Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mayor Alfin to allow members attending virtually to participate and

vote. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hartman and carried unanimously.

#### III. Public Comment/Participation

There were no public comments.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mayor Partington to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion was seconded by Vice Mayor Politis and carried unanimously.

#### V. Action Items

#### A. Review and Approval of the River to Sea TPO's FY 2022/23 Independent Audit Report

Mr. Zach Chalifour, James Moore & Company, provided in-depth details of the River to Sea TPO's FY 2022/23 Independent Audit Report. He stated that overall, it was a great process and went much smoother than in the previous years. There were no findings for significant risk. He noted that there was one comment that came from the audit, related to having three entries to help adjust and reconcile the year-end balances for presentation purposes.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mayor Alfin to approve the River to Sea TPO's FY 2022/23 Independent Audit Report. The motion was seconded by Commissioner McCool and carried unanimously.

#### B. Review and Approval of Resolution 2024-01 Amending the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) (Roll Call Vote Required)

Ms. Nicoulin gave in-depth details of the TIP amendment which included two projects. One is a West Volusia County intersection improvement project at the intersection of Dr. MLK Junior Boulevard and Orange Camp Road; noting that there is extra federal and local funding available for this project. The other project is a transit project and will be funded with 5311 funds (local agencies that support paratransit in rural areas).

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MOTION: A motion was made by Council Member Reinhart to approve Resolution 2024-01 amending the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Commissioner Cantu and carried unanimously by roll call vote.

#### C. Review and Approval of Resolution 2024-02 Adopting the 2024 River to Sea TPO Safety Targets

Ms. Nicoulin gave a PowerPoint presentation and explained the process of adopting the 2024 River to Sea TPO Safety Targets. She stated that TPOs can either adopt the state's target of zero or come up with their own. The TPO is recommending adopting FDOT's target of zero as it did last year. She discussed the five performance measures including fatalities and serious injuries statistics and provided statistics for fatalities/serious injuries and bike/pedestrian serious injuries in Volusia and Flagler Counties over the last ten years.

Ms. Nicoulin answered members' questions regarding this being population, or road safety-related and if bike and electric vehicle data would be looked at.

MOTION: A motion was made by Vice Mayor Politis to approve Resolution 2024-02 adopting the 2024 River to Sea TPO Safety Targets. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Gillis and carried unanimously.

#### D. Review and Approval of Resolution 2024-03 Adopting the 2020 Adjusted Urban Area Boundary

Ms. Nicoulin provided details regarding the adoption of the 2020 Adjusted Urban Area Boundary. She noted that there were two revisions since they were presented at the October TPO Board meeting; she explained the revisions in Flagler County using the maps provided in the presentation.

Ms. Nicoulin answered Vice Mayor Eckert's question regarding possible adjustments to Lake Helen boundaries. Ms. Nicoulin noted she would follow up with Vice Mayor Eckert and FDOT and make the changes, if necessary, before submitting the adjusted urban area boundary.

MOTION: A motion was made by Council Member Robins to approve Resolution 2024-03 adopting the 2020 Adjusted Urban Area Boundary with possible adjustments to the Lake Helen boundary. The motion was seconded by Council Member Reinhart and carried unanimously.

#### VI. <u>Presentations, Status Reports, and Discussion Items</u>

#### A. Presentation and Discussion of FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Ms. Nicoulin gave a presentation and provided in-depth details on the tasks of the UPWP. She discussed the required activities and unique projects. She provided the process for the development and submittal of the UPWP and explained that today's purpose was to see if there are any areas or activities that the TPO Board would like to see the TPO undertake, investigate, or identify within the UPWP moving forward. She held a similar discussion at the CAC and TCC meetings earlier this month and they identified safety as a priority, as well as expanding Bike/Walk Central Florida's Best Foot Forward Pedestrian Safety Program into Flagler County. During the discussion that occurred with the BPAC, they suggested coordinating with the east Volusia cities to expand the trails and trail connections.

Ms. Nicoulin answered members' questions regarding public awareness and municipalities working together and providing a TPO 101 training; long-range planning being included in the UPWP; transportation impact analyses (TIAs) being up to date in short- and long-term planning; and school safety studies.

Ms. Nicoulin stated that the TPO is required to submit a draft UPWP in March and the final UPWP will need to be submitted in May. The TPO will be looking at consolidating some of the tasks and will bring this topic back to the TPO Board for further discussion and approval.

#### B. Presentation and Discussion of Amendment to the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)

Ms. Nicoulin provided details of the proposed amendment to the Connect 20245 LRTP. She discussed the request from the city of Daytona Beach for the I-4 Connector and US 92 modification project which will be developer-funded. She explained the existing infrastructure and noted the proposed changes. Ms. Nicoulin explained the process of LRTP amendments and stated that this project will need to be listed in the LRTP as a developer-funded project in order for them to submit the request to FDOT. She added that this does not

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preclude the developer from seeking other grants or other funding outside of TPO funding. The TPO Board is expected to take action on this at the February 28 meeting.

Ms. Nicoulin answered members' questions regarding other options, and if city and consultant representatives can be brought in to discuss this in further detail before the TPO Board votes on it.

Ms. Jessica Gow, Cobb Cole Law Firm, noted that this project is operating in tandem but also outside of the general TIA review for this site. She noted that the TIA is in the final stages of approval at the county level and explained the two-phase process of the TIA.

#### C. FDOT Report

{Handout provided}

Ms. Kia Powell provided the FDOT report. She announced the most up-to-date project information can be found at <a href="www.cflroads.com">www.cflroads.com</a>. She also announced that FDOT has identified ten crosswalks in Volusia County that they will begin data collection on for the Bike/Walk Central Florida's Best Foot Forward Pedestrian Safety Program. She noted that the Steering Committee will report progress on the data collection at a meeting on February 29, 2024.

Vice Mayor Politis asked if the crosswalks would be the new improved ones with flashing lights in the roadway and flashing signs. He also mentioned that in the past an FDOT representative had discussed making everything uniform.

Ms. Powell stated that she would meet with him individually after the TPO Board meeting.

#### VII. <u>Executive Director's Report</u>

Ms. Nicoulin discussed FDOT's correspondence regarding the new Greenhouse Gas Emissions Performance Measure. In December, a final rule was issued by FHA which requires the State DOTs and MPOs to set targets for Greenhouse Gas Emission reduction with this measure. FDOT has taken a position and elected not to set targets for this measure. She noted the uncertainty of how this new performance measure might impact the MPOs. She also stated that the MPOAC will be discussing it during their meeting tomorrow.

Ms. Nicoulin provided an update on House Bill 7049/Senate Bill 1032 which abolishes the MPO Advisory Council (MPOAC), the statewide council of MPOs. This bill provides numerous changes for the MPOs moving some of their responsibilities to FDOT. FDOT would then be required to review each MPO's LRTP and return them if they are not satisfied. Federal law gives LRTPs and decisions to the local governments. There are some inconsistencies with the federal requirements in terms of the LRTPs. This bill also requires FDOT to create quality performance metrics to evaluate each MPO by scoring or ranking them. If an MPO falls under a certain performance metric it could be placed under the control of the Secretary of Transportation for a period not to exceed one year, which would allow the Secretary of Transportation to come in and assume the role of the Executive Director and the Chair of the MPO. The MPO with the highest quality performance score would receive \$5 million from the State Transportation Trust Fund for projects and its Work Program; therefore, creating competition between MPOs. This too will be on the agenda at the MPOAC meeting tomorrow.

Ms. Nicoulin also announced the FDOT Safety Summit in Titusville on February 27 and the upcoming MPOAC Institute training.

#### VIII. River to Sea TPO Board Member Comments

Commissioner McCool announced that she is now in remission from stage 4 cancer and expressed her gratitude to the TPO Board members for their space, closeness, and support during her battle over the last year.

#### IX. River to Sea TPO Chairperson Comments

Chairperson Cloudman noted the information items included in the agenda packet and encouraged members to review the attendance reports to ensure they are being represented.

#### I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum

The River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Board meeting was called to order at 9:01 a.m. by TPO Chairperson Cloudman. The roll was called, and it was determined a quorum was not physically present. The meeting was held as a hybrid.

Mayor Alfin and Mayor Chasez requested that members attending virtually be allowed to participate in the meeting.

#### II. **Pledge of Allegiance**

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

#### III. **Public Comment/Participation**

There were no public comments.

Ms. Nicoulin stated that items H and I on the Consent Agenda will need approval and can be brought back for approval at next month's meeting. She explained past processes that were used when a physical quorum was not present at the TPO Board meetings.

Mayor Chasez procedurally recommended that the Executive Committee take action on the Timesheet Review Report at their March 6, 2024 meeting, and the TPO Board ratify their decision at their March 27, 2024 meeting. There were no objections.

#### ٧. **Action Items**

#### A. Review and Approval of Resolution 2024-04 Amending the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) (ROLL CALL VOTE REQUIRED)

Ms. Nicoulin provided detailed information regarding the amendment to the LRTP which adds the I-4 Connector and US 92 Interchange Modification and Improvement Project as developer-funded to the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Cost Feasible Plan. The proposed amendment has been out for public comment for thirty days; none have been received to date.

Mayor Chasez procedurally recommended that the Executive Committee take action on Resolution 2024-04 amending the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) at their March 6, 2024 meeting, and the TPO Board ratify their decision at their March 27, 2024 meeting. There were no objections.

Mayor Alfin asked what the incentive is for the developer to fund the project.

Ms. Gow explained the incentive for the developer to fund the project in detail noting that it is essentially for quality of access.

## B. Review and Approval of Resolution 2024-05 Amending the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) (Roll Call Vote Required)

Ms. Nicoulin provided detailed information regarding the amendment to the TIP which included two railroad safety projects.

Mayor Chasez procedurally recommended that the Executive Committee take action on Resolution 2024-05 amending the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) at their March 6, 2024 meeting, and the TPO Board ratify their decision at their March 27, 2024 meeting. There were no objections.

#### C. Review and Approval of Draft FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Task Activities for FDOT/FHWA Review

Ms. Nicoulin provided in-depth details of the UPWP amendment. She explained the UPWP activities and the process of approval. She noted the revisions to the task activities list and how it was consolidated into fewer tasks. She explained the process that will take place after the document is approved and discussed the funding allocations: the Consolidated Planning Grant; FTA grants; PL funds; SU funding; SS4A funds; transit activities; and feasibility studies. She provided details of the de-obligation process and explained how unused funding rolls into the following year.

Mayor Chasez requested adding the development of procedures and rules for golf cart use inside cities due to the growing use of golf carts as a form of transportation.

Ms. Nicoulin stated that golf carts are sometimes considered multimodal transportation. The current LRTP has a section dedicated to multimodal transportation, but it does not specify call-out golf carts as one of those modes. She stated that the TPO could come up with some policy guidelines as they have done in the past regarding automated vehicles.

Mayor Chasez procedurally recommended that the Executive Committee take action on the Draft FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Task Activities for FDOT/FHWA review at their March 6, 2024 meeting, and the TPO Board ratify their decision at their March 27, 2024 meeting. There were no objections.

#### VI. Presentations, Status Reports, and Discussion Items

#### A. FDOT Report

Ms. Kia Powell provided the FDOT report. She announced the most up-to-date project information can be found at <a href="https://www.cflroads.com">www.cflroads.com</a>. She also announced that there are three current intermittent road closures; the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail is complete; SR A1A at Ormond Beach has a new safety improvement, and FDOT opened a new mid-block crosswalk at the intersection of Rockefeller Drive and A1A.

Members asked questions regarding SR 100 from Palm Coast to Flagler Beach and the construction at Exit 104 on I-4. Ms. Powell noted she would meet with the members after the meeting regarding their questions.

#### VII. Executive Director's Report

Ms. Nicoulin provided updates on the TPO's office relocation; HB 7049/SB 1032; the TPO's outreach and activities; the FDOT Safety Strategic Plan Workshop, and Best Foot Forward progress.

#### VIII. River to Sea TPO Board Member Comments

Mayor Alfin discussed Palm Coast's comprehensive plan and noted that the city is inviting the public to provide input on the future vision of Palm Coast over the next twelve months.

Vice Mayor Eckert stated that he had a meeting with Ms. Nicoulin regarding TPO procedures last month. He noted that this meeting showed him the importance of the citizens' committees and their involvement in the TPO.

Vice Mayor Lindlau announced the septic sewer conversion in Indian Harbor Estates. The conversion will take three hundred septic tanks offline and convert them to a central sewer system. They received approval last week to start hooking up homes.

Mayor Chasez discussed the Live Local Act in detail. She stated that the bill, as it was passed, envisions cities making their own regulations on how to move forward when live local projects come to their staff for approval. She suggested embedding processes and requirements into the land development codes now.

#### IX. River to Sea TPO Chairperson Comments

Chairperson Cloudman expressed his appreciation for everyone who attended the TPO Board meeting. He stated that it may be time to revise the TPO Bylaws to perhaps have the Small City Alliance members be permitted to vote in the absence of a physical quorum. He noted that Volusia County had an employee appreciation event and that is why there were no Volusia County Council Members present. He also announced that the city of DeLand is getting an extension to the multi-use path that goes through the middle of the city.

**Dear Council Members:** 

I am writing this letter to express Flagler County's support for the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Regional Trail Corridor (River to Sea Loop) and the current priority ranking of the corridor.

The St Johns River to Sea Loop is Florida's oldest, longest planned, multi-use, multi-county trail system through the American Southeast connecting five east central Florida counties. The loop is approximately 260 miles long and is currently the 2nd ranked Florida state-funded SUNTrail corridor.

The region's support of the River to Sea Loop is strong and growing. In Flagler County, we have a growing system of trails and greenways that tie into and support the corridor. Flagler County and the City of Palm Coast recently completed a parks masterplan which showed strong public support for continued investment in trail infrastructure. A highlight of our trails system is the recently completed Graham Swamp Trail (GST) and Flagler Greenways Pedestrian Bridge over SR 100 that has recently been added to the SUNTrail network, that connects to the existing Lehigh Trail and will connect to the future Bulow Creek Headwaters Regional Park Trail south of SR 100. The GST & Pedestrian Bridge over SR 100 project was named the "Project of the Year" in the Roads & Highways category by the American Public Works Association.

We understand the Florida Greenways and Trails Council is contemplating re-ranking of the regional trail corridors, a decision that will impact future SUNTrail funding. The #1 ranked trail is the Coast-to-Coast Trail which is completely or nearly completely funded. We hope the decision will be to retain the St Johns River-to-Sea Loop in the #2 position, or if the Coast-to-Coast is considered complete, to promote the Loop to #1.

While there have been important improvements to the Loop, much work still needs to be done. Long sections of the Loop, specifically a 42-mile-long gap along Highway 17, are incomplete and are vital to the Loop fulfilling its role as the great northeast Florida connector to the rest of the Florida SUNTrail network. Additionally, there are multiple gaps along the coast and in many urban areas. These gaps are not just inconveniences – they represent safety hazards with no safe alternate route. These gaps prevent the Loop from reaching its full potential.

Flagler County is committed to a robust trail and greenway system for our residents and visitors. On behalf of the DeLeon Springs Community Association, Inc., we respectfully request that the St. Johns River-to-Sea Loop, currently the second ranked Florida State-funded SUNTrail in the Florida State Regional Trail System, be reranked <u>first</u> during your upcoming Florida State Regional Trail System review.

The St Johns River-to-Sea Loop is Florida's longest planned, Multi-County SUNtrail system, connecting five Florida Counties, yet it remains uncompleted.

The Coast-to-Coast trail is essentially finished and the benefits of your dedication to its completion can clearly be seen. Reranking the St. Johns River-to-Sea Loop to first position would now give it the priority status it desperately needs, and deserves, to fund the completion of this vitally important 260-mile Loop Trail.

The positive economic impact and outstanding recreational opportunities this Loop Trail would provide to the counties of Volusia, Brevard, Flagler, Putnam and St. Johns cannot be overstated. Additionally, this Loop Trail offers safety advantages for those that choose this trail for alternate travel. As such, it is also an investment in protecting Florida's delicate, natural environment from the negative impacts of motorized vehicle traffic.

The counties of Volusia, Brevard, Flagler, Putnam and St. Johns continue to support the Memorandum of Understanding created and passed to support the building and maintenance of the St. Johns River-to-Sea Loop, for the benefit of all. But as citizens of DeLeon Springs within Volusia County, we cannot overstress the value of this Loop Trail for our little unincorporated community.

The St. Johns River-to-Sea Loop now runs right through our economically depressed community, and it has given new hope to our citizens. Our community takes great pride in having this world-class trail within our area. I can attest that it is used every single day by walkers, hikers, cyclists; everyone from babies in strollers to the elderly, who did not have access to anything like this, prior to Volusia County completing this portion of the Loop Trail. It now connects us to other

communities to the south and will soon be extended northward via FDOT's completion of the four laning of US Hwy. 17 to Lake Winona Road in DeLeon Springs.

While there have been incremental advancements to the Loop Trail, there is still a 40+-mile gap along US Hwy 17, making it impossible to connect us to the rest of the Florida SUNTrail network. The Loop Trail brings eco-tourists to our area, and the economic and recreational impact of this portion of the Loop Trail has been a tremendous boon for our community. We do not want to lose the excitement and momentum of the continuation of the Loop Trail, by having it end abruptly at US Hwy. 17 and Lake Winona Road, for years to come.

We respectfully request that the St Johns River-to-Sea Loop be reranked to the first position so it receives the priority funding that is vital to moving this project through to completion. So many people, of every background, within these five counties and beyond, are awaiting the completion of this Loop Trail and all the economic, recreational and safety benefits it will provide to the citizens of our counties, and the thousands of additional eco-tourists it will bring to Florida.





# A. APPROVAL (RATIFICATION) OF RESOLUTION 2024-06 AMENDING THE CONNECT 2045 LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN (LRTP) (ROLL CALL VOTE REQUIRED)

#### **Background Information:**

The City of Daytona Beach requested an amendment to the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) to add the I-4 Connector and US 92 Interchange Modification and Improvement Project as a developer-funded project to the Strategic Intermodal System Cost Feasible Plan. At their December 20, 2023 meeting, the Daytona Beach City Commission approved Resolution 2023-487 requesting the proposed amendment. A copy of that resolution describing the amendment and a conceptual plan depicting the proposed improvements are provided in the agenda package.

The requested amendment was presented at the January 24, 2024, TPO Board meeting as an information item. Following the meeting and in accordance with the TPO Public Participation Plan, a 30-day public review and comment period was opened. There were no public comments received on the proposed amendment.

The requested amendment was presented to the Citizens Advisory Committee and the Technical Coordinating Committee as an action item at their February 20, 2024, meetings. Both committees recommended unanimous approval of the amendment.

At the February 28, 2024 meeting of the TPO Board, additional information was presented depicting other recommended improvements associated with the proposed development. Those maps are included in the agenda package. At the meeting, however, a physical quorum was not present, and this item was not able to be voted on. In accordance with TPO Bylaws, emergency approvals of TPO programs or documents may be made by the TPO Chairperson if the time constraint is such that action at the next scheduled meeting of the TPO Governing Board would significantly delay progress on a project, subject to the approval being brought back to the full TPO Board at their next scheduled meeting for ratification.

At their March 6, 2024 meeting, the Executive Committee reviewed and recommended approval of the proposed amendment to the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). Following the meeting, the TPO Chairperson approved Resolution 2024-06 authorizing the Emergency Amendment to the LRTP.

This resolution is being presented to the TPO Board for ratification.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 2023-487

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION ("TPO") ADD CERTAIN DEVELOPER-FUNDED MODIFICATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE I-4 CONNECTOR AND US 92 INTERCHANGE TO THE TPO LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Transportation Element of the City of Daytona Beach Comprehensive Plan sets forth the City of Daytona Beach's goal of promoting safe and efficient traffic circulation serving existing and future land uses; and

WHEREAS, the safe and efficient movement of people and cargo is the priority for transportation networks within the City's jurisdictional boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Interstate 4 (I-4) and US 92 corridors are major gateways into the City; and

WHEREAS, Sungate Logistic Park is a planned development on approximately 860 acres of land located northeast of West International Speedway Boulevard and Indian Lake Road, that was approved for development by City Ord. No. 2022-416; and

WHEREAS, Sungate Logistic Park is anticipated to have approximately 5.5 million square feet of commercial/industrial/institutional space, generate an estimated \$904.4 million in gross annual economic output in a typical year, and create at least 5,883 total permanent jobs; and

WHEREAS, Sungate Logistic Park will be a key economic driver whose success will be impacted by the I-4 and US 92 corridors; and

WHEREAS, the developer of Sungate Logistic Park has proposed to fund certain improvements and modifications to the I-4 connector and US 92 interchange; and

WHEREAS, in support of the Developer's efforts, the City has applied to the Florida Department of Transportation ("FDOT") for an Interchange Access Request, with the Interchange Modification Report ("IMR") attached thereto describing the proposed improvements in further detail; and

WHEREAS, in addition to directly supporting the regionally significant economic benefit anticipated to result from the development of Sungate Logistic Park, these improvements would assist with future growth and traffic movements, potentially eliminate hazardous turning movements by truck traffic at US-92 and Old DeLand Road, eliminate dangerous high-speed weaving between the I-4 off-ramp and the median opening on US 92 at Old DeLand Road, and eliminate the high speed merging condition from the eastbound I-4 off ramp to US 92; and

WHEREAS, a need for these improvements is evidenced by safety and efficiency concerns associated with the existing interchange configuration; and

WHEREAS, in addition to these proposed improvements, development of the Sungate Logistic Park will provide upgrades to roadway infrastructure within a key corridor of the City; and

WHEREAS, the proposed reduction in speed limit on US 92 as part of the construction of the Sungate Logistics Park entrance will reduce speeds and improve safety; and

WHEREAS, the proposed traffic signal at the US 92 entrance to Sungate Logistics

Park will include safety improvements such as street lighting and signalized pedestrian crossing
opportunities; and

WHEREAS, these modifications, when taken as a whole, will improve safety, provide enhancement of the region's transportation network, and bolster economic development efforts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF DAYTONA BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. The City Commission of the City of Daytona Beach hereby requests that the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) add the I-4 Connector and US 92 interchange modifications and improvements to the TPO Long Range Transportation Plan included in the Interchange Access Request, with the Interchange Modification Report ("IMR") further described in the recitals, which modifications and improvements are to be funded by the Sungate Logistics Park developer, as a developer-funded Strategic Intermodal System improvement for the safety of the traveling public.

SECTION 2. All resolutions in conflict are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall take effect upon adoption, and an executed copy of which shall be transmitted to the TPO Executive Director as soon as possible.





WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, 23 CFR 450.324(g)(11) requires that each long range transportation plan include a financial plan that demonstrates how the adopted transportation plan can be implemented; and

WHEREAS, 23 C.F.R. 450.306 establishes the planning factors that must be considered by each metropolitan planning organization in the development of a long-range plan; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO is seeking to amend the Connect 2045 LRTP to reflect the developer-funded I-4 Connector at US 92 Interchange Modification and Improvement project as shown in Amendment 6; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO has solicited public comment on the proposed amendment during a public review period meeting the required 30 days as prescribed in Chapter 8 of the adopted plan and the TPO's Public Participation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO Citizens Advisory Committee and Technical Coordinating Committee recommended approval of the amendment at their February 20, 2024 meetings; and

WHEREAS, at the February 28, 2024 meeting of the River to Sea TPO Board, a physical quorum was not present and items slated for action were unable to be voted on; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 3.3 of the River to Sea TPO Bylaws, emergency authorization of TPO programs, documents, or amendments may be made by the TPO Chairperson if the time constraint is such that action at the next scheduled meeting of the TPO Governing Board would significantly delay progress on a project, subject to the approval being brought back to the full TPO Board for ratification at their next scheduled meeting; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO Executive Committee met on March 6, 2024 and recommended approval of the amendment.

**Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved,** that the requested amendment to the Connect 2045 LRTP, as shown in Amendment 6, is authorized by the River to Sea TPO Board Chairperson, on behalf of the River to Sea TPO Board on March 6, 2024; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the aforementioned amendment shall be ratified by the full River to Sea TPO Board at its regular scheduled meeting on March 27, 2024.




Figure 22: Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects





In accordance with TPO Bylaws, emergency approvals of TPO programs or documents may be made by the TPO Chairperson if the time constraint is such that action at the next scheduled meeting of the TPO Governing Board would significantly delay progress on a project, subject to the approval being brought back to the full TPO Board at their next scheduled meeting for ratification.



The de-obligation of planning funds releases federal funds previously authorized but not expended by the TPO. Funds de-obligated in the second year of a two-year Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) are made available for the first year of the new UPWP.

The de-obligation of funds will allow activities and projects that will be started prior to the end of the fiscal year to continue in the new fiscal year without interruption of funding as well as fund other projects that are being deferred until the new fiscal year. The de-obligation of funds will allow these funds to be "rolled forward" from the current fiscal year into the new fiscal year and be available in year one of the new UPWP.

The requested amount of de-obligated funds is \$980,814 of Consolidated Planning Grant (PL) funds and \$176,378 of Urban Attributable (SU) funds. The de-obligated funds will be reflected in the new UPWP and will continue to support the TPO's planning activities and tasks.

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 49 U.S.C. 5303, 23 CFR 450.310, and Florida Statutes 339.175,the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and a portion of Flagler County as defined by the Metropolitan Planning Area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 23 CFR 450, and Florida Statutes 339.175, require the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization and the Florida Department of Transportation to enter into an agreement clearly identifying the responsibilities for cooperatively carrying out the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) portion of the Metropolitan Planning Process and accomplishing the transportation planning requirements of state and federal law; and

**WHEREAS**, the River to Sea TPO shall endorse and amend as appropriate, the plans and programs required by 23 C.F.R. 450.300 through 450.324, among which is the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO developed and approved the FY 22/23 to FY 23/24 UPWP for the period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the FY 22/23 to FY 23/24 UPWP requires an amendment to de-obligate funds that will not be sent by the end of the fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the de-obligated funds will be reauthorized and made available in FY 24/25 of the new UPWP, effective July 1, 2024.

1. De-obligate \$980,814 in Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Transportation Management Consolidated Planning Grant (PL) funding from year two of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23 and 2023/24 UPWP so that these funds may be allocated in FY 2024/25 to support the planning tasks identified in the proposed Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and

- 3. Authorize the Executive Director to execute an Amendment to the River to Sea TPO Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement to de-obligate the funds.

## A. PRESENTATION AND UPDATE ON THE BEST FOOT FORWARD FOR PEDESTRIAN SAFETY HIGH VISIBILITY CROSSWALK ENFORCEMENT OPERATION

#### **Background Information:**


Bike/Walk Central Florida, a nonprofit advocacy organization that administers pedestrian and bicycle safety programs across the Central Florida region has recently partnered with the Florida Department of Transportation to bring the Best Foot Forward for Pedestrian Safety program to Volusia County, expanding on its current footprint in Orange, Seminole and Osceola Counties.

The program takes a four "E" approach to educate drivers on the driver yield law and encourage community members to stop and let people at marked crosswalks cross the street. The program has been ongoing in Orange, Seminole, and Osceola counties for over 10 years with significant results.

In February 2024, five High Visibility Crosswalk Enforcement Operations were completed in Volusia County. Law enforcement officers issued 94 citations and 24 warnings to motorists who failed to yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.

Bike/Walk Central Florida will provide an update on Operation Best Foot Forward for Pedestrian Safety.

driver yield rates if the right conditions are present.



Daytona Beach: S. Atlantic Ave. & Poinsettia Rd. Despite good countermeasures such as stop bars, "Stop Here for Peds" signs, and yellow pedestrian signs on both sides of the road, only 25% of drivers are yielding here. Context such as land use, daily traffic, & pedestrian visibility are important factors.

#### B. UPDATE ON THE RIVER TO SEA TPO 2024 ANNUAL CALL FOR PROJECTS

#### **Background Information:**

The River to Sea TPO annually submits to the Florida Department of Transportation a prioritized list of projects for implementation within the TPO Planning Area. These priorities are used by FDOT to program State and Federal transportation funds. Programming commitments made by FDOT are included in its Five-Year Work Program and the TPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

Projects on the Priority List come from a variety of sources including the Long Range Transportation Plan (which populates the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Roadway list and the Regionally Significant Non-SIS Roadway list); the SUN Trail Program (which populates the SUN Trail list); regional transit agencies (which populate the Transit Projects List), and local governments (which populate the lists for Traffic Operations Projects, Bicycle/Pedestrian Projects, Transportation Planning Studies, and Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) Eligible Projects.

The priority list is updated annually by the TPO, and this process begins with the Call for Projects to solicit project applications from local governments in the traffic operations, bicycle/pedestrian, and transportation planning study categories. These project applications are ranked based on an established set of criteria by a subcommittee made up of members from the TPO advisory committees. From these rankings, the TPO develops a draft list of project priorities that it makes available for public review and comment. The List of Prioritized Projects is formally reviewed by the TPO advisory committees and adopted by the TPO Board during their June meeting.

TPO Staff will lead a discussion on the List of Priority Projects and the process used to annually update the list as well as provide and summary of the project applications received during this year's call for projects.



The purpose of this project is to increase capacity and enhance safety along U.S. 17/State Road (S.R.) 15 from south of Spring Street to Lake Winona Road. The project widens U.S. 17 from two lanes to four lanes to enhance mobility in the area. A new roundabout at the intersection of U.S. 17 and Spring Garden Avenue/Spring Garden Ranch Road is also being constructed to improve operations and safety.

This project also includes a multi-use trail from Spring Garden Avenue to Lake Winona Road and a new entrance into the Department of Forestry compound. This project is a portion of the overall project approved in the 2006 PD&E study to widen U.S. 17 to north of S.R. 40 (FPID No. 410251-1).

Another segment, project 410251-4, proposes to widen U.S. 17 from south of Winona Road to S.R. 40 and includes a new bridge over Deep Creek, as well as a wildlife crossing culvert.

There are no lane closures at this time.

## 445300-1 S.R. 44 Resurfacing from N Hill Ave to Eastbound I-4 On Ramp

Estimated Completion: Summer 2024

Update: The contractor is working on sidewalk and minor roadway widening.



The purpose of this project is to repave State Road (S.R.) 44 from N. Hill Avenue to the eastbound Interstate 4 (I-4) on ramp, with the exception of the proposed limits of a new roundabout at the S.R. 44 intersection with Kepler Road. The roundabout will be constructed under a separate design-build project, (FPID No. 431922-1) scheduled to begin in summer 2024. Improvements also include safety and operational upgrades such as correcting slopes at two curves and upgrading the guardrail at the I-4 overpass. Pedestrian safety improvements include enhanced intersection lighting, upgraded pedestrian signals, and reconstructed sidewalk curb ramps to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.

**Monday, March 11, from 2 p.m. to 6 a.m.,** the eastbound I-4 (S.R. 400) off-ramp to International Speedway Boulevard (U.S. 92/S.R. 600) to facilitate paving operations on the off-ramp. Should the work not be completed on March 11, the ramp will also be closed on **March 12, from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.**

Additionally, intermittent nighttime single lane closures will occur on northbound International Speedway Boulevard between the I-4 overpass and Tomoka Farms Road from **March 11 through March 14, from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. each night,** to complete paving of the travel lanes.



This project involves widening International Speedway Boulevard (U.S. 92/S.R. 600) between the Halifax River Bridge and S.R. A1A to provide two travel lanes, a 6-foot-wide sidewalk headed westbound, and a 10-foot-wide sidewalk headed eastbound. Improvements also include resurfacing along International Speedway Boulevard, building a raised median, and upgrading the traffic signals at Halifax Avenue, Peninsula Drive (S.R. 441), Grandview Avenue and S.R. • Update: The contractor is working on pile jackets at the S.R. 46 bridge over the St. John's River.



The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is performing maintenance on two existing State Road (S.R.) 46 bridges. One bridge connects Volusia and Seminole Counties over the St. Johns River, and the other bridge carries S.R. 46 over the Cabbage Slough waterway in Volusia County.

Long columns, known as piles, form the supports for both bridges. The purpose of this project is to install fiberglass pile jackets around the existing bridge piles. These pile jackets will serve as a protective covering that will reinforce and extend the life of each bridge.

**Thursday, March 14, and Friday, March 15, if needed, from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.,** single lane closure on the westbound lane of the State Road 46 bridge over the St. Johns River for a concrete pour.

**Thursday, March 21, and Friday, March 22, if needed, from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.,** single lane closure on the westbound lane of the State Road 46 bridge over the St. Johns River for a concrete pour.


## 437935-1 Barracuda Boulevard over the Canal Bradano Waterway Bridge Replacement

• Estimated Completion: Summer 2024

 Update: Barracuda Blvd is closed from The Middle Way to Quay Assisi. The contractor is continuing sea wall work.



This project involves removal and replacement of the Barracuda Bridge in New Smyrna Beach, Volusia County. The original bridge was built in 1965, and The City of New Smyrna Beach has contracted with the FDOT to construct a new bridge.

## The Barracuda Bridge is closed to vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Barracuda Boulevard, including the Barracuda Bridge, is closed from The Middle Way to Quay Assisi in New Smyrna Beach, Volusia County. This stretch of Barracuda Boulevard will remain closed until project completion, which is estimated to be Summer 2024. Motorists and pedestrians wishing to access the Marine Discovery Center and properties on Quay Assisi and adjacent side streets will be directed through a temporary detour route along Quay Assisi and North Causeway.

Watercraft access will be maintained during construction of the new Barracuda Bridge. However, there will be brief instances in which marine traffic access will be limited in the work zone for safetv purposes. During these short closures, boaters are encouraged to use the channel below North Causeway to access Indian River North.

## 438982-1 U.S. 1 (Ridgewood Ave) Signalization Improvements at 6th St, 8th St, Walker St, and Flomich St



Estimated Completion: Early 2024

Update: All signals on this project have been installed and are operational. The contractor

is working on traffic loops and paving operations.



The purpose of this project is to implement improvements on U.S. 1 (Ridgewood Avenue/State Road S.R.] 5) at the intersections of 6th Street, 8th Street, Walker Street, and Flomich Street in Holly Hill, Volusia County. The existing concrete strain poles supporting the traffic signals at each intersection will be replaced with steel mast arms. Work also includes resurfacing the roadway within each intersection, minor pavement widening, and sidewalk and curb ramp improvements to enhance pedestrian safety and mobility.

Monday, March 11 and Tuesday, March 12, March 12, from 7: 30 p.m. to 5 a.m. both nights, single lane closures at the U.S. 1 intersections of Flomich St, Walker St., and 8th St. for paving operations.

Wednesday, March 13, and Thursday, March 14, from 7:30 p.m. to 5 a.m. both nights, multi-lane closures at the U.S. 1 intersections of Walker St. and Flomich St. for traffic loop work.



This project consists of concrete slab replacement and joint repairs on International Speedway Boulevard [U.S. 92/State Road (S.R.) 600] in DeLand and Daytona, U.S. 1 (Ridgewood Avenue/Dixie Freeway/S.R. 5) in Edgewater and Port Orange, and Woodland Boulevard (U.S. 17-92/S.R. 15) and New York Avenue (S.R. 44) in DeLand.

For historical purposes, the below information refers to a project that was completed in January 2021, 441682-1-72-02.

This project involved repairing and replacing concrete slabs along U.S. 92 from Kepler Road in DeLand to Educators Road in Daytona Beach. The work included repair and replacement of concrete slabs, shoulder rework and widening, and striping of the roadway.

## 429556-1 S.R. 44 Over the St. John's River Bridge Replacement



contractor continues to work on the demolition of the bascule bridge.



The purpose of this project is to replace the existing State Road (S.R.) 44 bridge over the St. Johns River, also known as the Whitehair Bridge, with a high-level fixed span bridge. During construction, the existing S.R. 44 bridge will remain open for drivers to use while the new bridge is constructed to the south of the existing bridge. After construction, the existing bridge will be removed.



minimizing accidents due to wrong way driving. This technology will be implemented at all 6 ramps on I-95 at Palm Coast Parkway interchange, I-95 at Matanzas Woods Parkway interchange, and at I-4 at SR 44 interchange. The WWVDS initiative supports the FDOT's commitment to achieving zero fatalities and serious injuries on the State Highway System. ## Best Foot Forward for Pedestrian Safety Crosswalk Enforcement

In February, Bike/Walk Central Florida partnered with the Volusia County Sheriff's Department, Holly Hill Police Department, New Smyrna Beach Police Department, Ormond Beach Police Department, and the Daytona Beach Shores Police Department to conduct quarterly high-visibility crosswalk enforcement operations. These crosswalk enforcements are part of a more comprehensive effort to educate drivers about Florida's right-of-way laws and curb the pattern of aggressive behavior towards pedestrians. During the operation, plainclothes officers cross the street at marked crosswalks, giving drivers enough time to yield as <u>Florida law requires</u>. Uniformed officers are monitoring driver behavior and drivers who fail to stop are pulled over and may be issued a warning or a citation of at least \$164 and three points on their license. The five Volusia County crosswalk enforcement operation locations included:

- S. Atlantic Ave. & Ocean Ave in New Smyrna Beach
- S. Atlantic Ave. & Bellemead Dr. in Daytona Beach Shores
- Ocean Shore Blvd. & Tom Renick Park in Ormond Beach
- Walker St. & Center Ave. in Holly Hill
- Dirksen Dr. & Mansion Blvd. in DeBary

In total, for the five high-visibility enforcement operations, 24 warnings were given to drivers and 94 citations were issued.
