I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum/Pledge of Allegiance

Vice Chairperson Peterson called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) to order at 1:15 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held in a hybrid format with fourteen voting and one non-voting members physically present and five voting and one non-voting members virtually present.

Vice Chairperson Peterson stated the members attending virtually are doing so as a result of social distancing restrictions associated with COVID-19. Rulings from the Florida Attorney General require that members physically present vote to allow virtual participation and voting due to "extraordinary circumstances".

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Delaney to allow CAC members attending virtually to participate and vote. The motion was seconded by Mr. Martel and carried unanimously.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

II. <u>Press/Citizen Comments</u>

There were no press/citizen comments.

III. Action Items

A. <u>Review and Approval of February 16, 2021 CAC Meeting Minutes</u>

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to approve the February 16, 2021 CAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Blais and carried unanimously.

B. <u>Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2021-## Amending the FY 2020/21 to 2024/25</u> <u>Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) (Roll Call Vote Required) with a Presentation and Discussion of</u> <u>FDOT Districtwide Freight Program</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated two projects are being added to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); one programs \$2 million for a PD&E study for a FDOT Districtwide Truck and Freight Alternative Site Analysis and the other programs grant funding for a transit project for the Center for the Visually Impaired. She introduced Ms. Kellie Smith, FDOT, to give a presentation on the Districtwide Truck and Freight Alternative Site Analysis.

Ms. Smith gave a PowerPoint presentation and noted a public service announcement (PSA) video is available regarding the truck parking issue; she was unable to show the video due to a technical issue but she encouraged members to watch it later. She announced FDOT will be kicking off the PD&E truck parking analysis this summer. Truck parking is a critical issue and the number one issue for commercial truck drivers. She explained Jason's Law was enacted as part of MAP-21; as part of that, it directed the US DOT to conduct a survey and a comparative assessment to evaluate the ability of each state to provide adequate truck parking for commercial vehicles engaged in interstate transportation; assess the volume of commercial vehicle traffic in each state; and develop a system of metrics to measure the adequacy of commercial vehicle parking facilities in each state. Over 40% of truck drivers spend over an hour searching for a place to park which results in an annual loss of \$5.1 billion in revenue. FDOT completed a statewide truck parking survey in March 2020; there are currently 298 truck parking facilities with 10,000 truck parking spaces available throughout the state. There is a need for more truck parking; 3,400 additional spaces are needed statewide today. The statewide study showed the I-4 corridor is the most critical corridor in the state for truck parking. FDOT District 5 conducted Phase I of a Truck Parking Study Phase 1 which assessed the existing truck parking capacity and future truck parking demand throughout the district. I-4 in District 5 is 75 miles and the only truck parking along the stretch is in the Longwood area; there are 36 spaces available in District 5 with an additional 89 spaces in Polk County, just south of the district boundary. The current demand for truck parking spaces in District 5 is 481, by 2025 it will be 750, and 883 by 2040. Truck parking demand is expected to continue to grow as new industrial facilities continue to locate along the corridor. FDOT District 5 secured federal freight funds to conduct a PD&E study for this endeavor; it will evaluate and recommend potential truck parking sites that will be viable for either public and/or private sector development to meet the estimated truck parking demand along the corridor through 2040. The analysis will include heavy public and local engagement, engineering analysis, and an environmental assessment. A preliminary concept design will be performed for every recommended, viable site. The PD&E study will include extensive local engagement and public involvement; they want to ensure they right project in the right place and public input is critical to the process. Design is funded for 2021, right-of-way from 2023 to

2027 and construction in 2026. This is a need we have as a region and it is important to work together to find a solution. She noted that they do not yet have a site for the design, right-of-way or construction.

Vice Chairperson Peterson asked if they are looking at multiple sites throughout District 5 and if there is a limit to the number of sites; if they are looking at two or three sites or as many as possible.

Ms. Smith replied the estimated demand for truck parking spaces for 2040 is 883 and they want to be able to fill that need; they do not yet have any sites in mind. They want to take the PD&E through the full process; they do not want to lose the information from the previous studies but the sites identified in those may not be the ones to move forward.

Ms. Foltz asked if the estimated demand for 883 truck parking spaces was statewide.

Ms. Smith replied no, that is just for the I-4 corridor.

Vice Chairperson Peterson noted that Flagler County is not listed in the list of counties included in the study.

Ms. Smith replied the project is for counties identified in the I-4 corridor within District 5; Seminole, Orange, Osceola and Volusia Counties. They have a separate project on I-75 to look at truck parking needs and will eventually do the same for I-95 which includes Flagler County.

Ms. Foltz referred to the freight concept sites and asked how many truck parking spaces they would include.

Ms. Smith replied it depends on where the site is and the size of the property; also, the input from the local agencies involved and the public. It will depend on the land use of the parcels identified; she cannot say at this point until they have the analyses of the sites. They have the scope and have started negotiations with their consultant. They will bring back more information as the process moves along; they want to ensure this is a collaborative process for everyone.

Discussion continued.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Martel to recommend approval of Resolution 2021-## amending the FY 2021/21 to 2024/25 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Blais and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentation Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of List of Project Priorities</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated each year the TPO develops a List of Priority Projects (LOPP); the current list is available on the TPO's website and lists the projects prioritized in our planning area that are able to access federal and state resources. The projects on the LOPP come from a variety of different sources; she explained the different lists. She reviewed the flow chart of the annual priority project process. Prior to opening the annual Call for Projects, the subcommittees meet to review the process, project applications and guiding resolutions and discuss any issues that may have occurred the previous year as well as ways to improve the process. This year, the Call for Projects opened at the end of November and closed at the end of February; local governments submit projects applications for bicycle/pedestrian, traffic operations and planning studies. She is in the process of scheduling the TIP Subcommittee now and the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee meets tomorrow. The TIP Subcommittee reviews the project applications for traffic operations and planning studies. The applications are scored based on a set of criteria used, including safety, congestion, etc., and the LOPP is updated with the new projects. A draft LOPP is presented in May to the advisory committees and TPO Board with formal adoption in June. Once adopted, the LOPP is submitted to FDOT; it conveys the TPO's priorities in the planning area to FDOT and they use the list to update their tentative Work Program. Projects that move into the Work Program, the TPO

uses that information to develop the new TIP for the next fiscal year; a draft TIP is also presented in May and adopted in June.

Mr. Castagnacci asked if a project is prioritized, if it is already in the TIP and or if it will be added to the TIP.

Ms. Nicoulin replied new projects received from the local governments during the Call for Projects are not part of the TIP; she referred to the LRTP and stated everything the TPO does is grounded in the LRTP. The traffic operations and bicycle/pedestrian programs the TPO have established and the funding associated with them are identified in the LRTP. The projects that populate those programs and the funding for those projects are reviewed every year. Getting a project onto the priority project list is the first step to adding it to the TIP.

Vice Chairperson Peterson asked how many project applications were received this year.

Ms. Nicoulin replied for four project implementation and one feasibility study applications were received for the bicycle/pedestrian program and eight project implementation, four feasibility studies and one planning study application were received for traffic operations.

Mr. Storke referred to Action Item B, Recommendation of Approval of a TIP Amendment, and noted it required a roll call vote.

Ms. Nicoulin replied yes, it does require a roll call vote. She asked for a motion to re-open the item.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to re-open Action Item B, recommend approval of Resolution 2021-## amending the FY 2021/21 to 2024/25 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), for a roll call vote. The motion was seconded by Mr. Blais. A roll call vote was taken and the motion passed with one opposing.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Transportation Safety</u>

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation of transportation safety and stated this has been a difficult presentation to assemble as there have been recent incidents as well as the release of the Dangerous by Design Report last week. We are doing good, hard work relating to safety and to see crashes increasing is difficult. Safety is complicated and there is not a silver bullet to fix the issue. The TPO is only one agency that participates in the effort and we will continue to do so. She reviewed the five-"E's" of safety; evaluation, engineering, enforcement, encouragement and education. She noted FDOT has added emergency response and four "I's" to their list; information, innovation, insight and investment. We have to figure out how to use all the different strategies to make a safer transportation system. We should also consider equity and empathy; there are populations that are disproportionately impacted by unsafe conditions. Empathy is important because if we are not concerned enough about others we will continue to have increasing crashes. The participants in this process include FDOT, local governments, MPOs, law enforcement, advocacy groups, health agencies and users of the transportation system. We use the transportation system every day and it is important to recognize and message that this is not someone else's problem fix; it is the responsibility of everyone involved. She explained FDOT's "Vision Zero" policy and stated it is intended to be a shift in the way we think about transportation safety. Over the last few decades, transportation safety has been viewed as an inevitable byproduct of transportation. She suggested we approach it like the airlines do a plane crash or Votran views a transit-related crash and determine if the event could have been prevented and if so, why it was not and how it could be prevented in the future. FDOT has three plans that guide their safety approach across the state; the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), Highway Safety Plan (HSP) and the Highway Safety Implementation Plan (HSIP). These plans outline the strategies they will pursue based on a review of the data. She will send a link to FDOT's website where the plans are available for review. She reviewed portions of the plans and stated FDOT had 394 safety projects in 2018 statewide totaling approximately \$155 million. FDOT is clear about what is important to them and they are identifying ways to fix the issues. The TPO wants to support and complement FDOT's efforts.

She continued the presentation and reviewed some of the TPO's resources including required efforts such as the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), planning studies, project

priority list, etc. Projects in the TIP by law have to be tied to the safety performance targets the TPO must set each year to show how the projects are addressing safety. She gave an overview of safety studies the TPO has completed over the last few years. The TPO also participates in many safety awareness and community events. She reviewed what some of the safety studies revealed in regards to the factors that contribute to crashes such as distracted driving, impaired driving, etc. The TPO sets safety targets for our planning area based on the data; FDOT sets targets at the state level. They are striving for Vision Zero. Targets started to be required a few years ago and FDOT submitted their first two-year report; the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) determined that the state has not made significant progress towards meeting its safety goals. This is not because FDOT has not been doing enough; they have but they need to do more as does the TPO. We will continue to work in that direction. The role of the TPO is to prioritize projects and target funding, complete planning studies, set safety targets and conduct public education and outreach. The challenge is the TPO is but one organization and does not write the laws, enforce the laws, or build projects; however, we can influence funding of projects, and promote and educate the public. The question is what else can we do; she reviewed items currently in the TPO's work plan including pursuing the improvements identified in the top ten crash locations, implement programs identified in the Community Safety Action Plan (CSAP), produce crash maps and promote efforts to reduce posted speeds. She asked members to provide input on what additional information they may need and if there is a study or analysis they think that needs to be completed.

Vice Chairperson Peterson asked if there was a way to segregate accidents that are human error; he commented you could have the safest road in the world but if someone steps out into traffic there is not a safety mechanism to prevent it. There was an unforeseen accident in Flagler County that resulted in four fatalities; it might be helpful if police reports could designate those accidents that officers feel are unpredictable. We cannot prevent accidents 100% but we ought to be able to include those that we may have never thought would occur.

Ms. Bollenback replied some accidents are not preventable but she would argue those are few and far between. If an accident is caused by a blown tire, it could be that the tire was worn, there was debris in the road or the driver could have been speeding. A lot of things could contribute to an accident that are considered to be preventable. FDOT's Vision Zero is not intended to be absolute but instead to be no preventable accidents.

Ms. Foltz referred to the Dangerous by Design Report and the increase of crashes across the nation; Florida had 8 locations in the top 20. She asked what other highly populated cities that do have the same crashes like Seattle, Chicago or New York are doing.

Ms. Bollenback replied FDOT under the prior leadership of Secretary Mike Shannon was doing just that; finding out what was different about District 5 versus other areas around the state and other states. We are not going to be shy about stealing someone's good ideas to make a difference. She does not know the answer to her question; speed is being looked at as it is becoming a bigger area of focus.

Discussion continued.

C. <u>FDOT Report</u>

The FDOT report was provided in the agenda.

Mr. Delaney commented Dunlawton Avenue was repaved a couple of years ago and commented there are already some failures; he asked who is responsible for that.

Ms. Smith replied she would have FDOT's Operations Department take a look at it and get back to him.

D. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

The Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports were provided in the agenda.

V. <u>Staff Comments</u>

Ms. Nicoulin announced there are two new CAC members in attendance; Mr. Ed Fendley, alternate for Flagler Beach, and Ms. Kerry Karl, the DeLand representative.

She explained Jason's Law was enacted as part of MAP-21; as part of that, it directed the US DOT to conduct a survey and a comparative assessment to evaluate the ability of each state to provide adequate truck parking for commercial vehicles engaged in interstate transportation; to assess the volume of commercial vehicle traffic in each state; and to develop a system of metrics to measure the adequacy of commercial vehicle parking facilities in each state. Over 40% of truck drivers spend more than an hour searching for a place to park which results in an annual loss of \$5.1 billion in revenue. FDOT completed a statewide truck parking survey in March 2020; there are currently 298 truck parking facilities with 10,000 truck parking spaces available throughout the state. There is a need for more truck parking; 3,400 additional spaces are needed statewide today. The statewide study showed the I-4 corridor is the most critical corridor in the state for truck parking. FDOT District 5 conducted Phase I of a Truck Parking Study which assessed the existing truck parking capacity and future truck parking demand throughout the district. Interstate 4 in District 5 is 75 miles long and the only truck parking along the stretch is in the Longwood area; there are 36 spaces available in District 5 with an additional 89 spaces in Polk County, just south of the district boundary. The current demand for truck parking spaces in District 5 is 481, by 2025 it will be 750, and 883 by 2040. Truck parking demand is expected to continue to grow as new industrial facilities continue to locate along the corridor. FDOT District 5 secured federal freight funds to conduct a PD&E study for this endeavor; it will evaluate and recommend potential truck parking sites that will be viable for either public and/or private sector development to meet the estimated truck parking demand along the corridor through 2040. The analysis will include heavy public and local engagement, engineering analysis, and an environmental assessment. A preliminary concept design will be performed for every recommended, viable site. The PD&E study will include extensive local engagement and public involvement; they want to ensure they have the right project in the right place and public input is critical to the process. Design is funded for 2021, right-of-way from 2023 to 2027 and construction in 2026. This is a need we have as a region and it is important to work together to find a solution. She noted that they do not yet have a site for the design, right-of-way or construction.

Mr. Paradise asked if a link to the presentation could be provided to the members.

Ms. Nicoulin replied the link is available on the TPO's website under the TCC agenda but she will send it out.

Mr. Paradise asked when the public meetings were expected to occur.

Ms. Smith replied after they finalize the scope they will send it to the TPO for review; once comments are received and they negotiate with their consultant, FDOT will kick off with the local agencies and stakeholder groups. They plan on having as much public involvement as possible to make sure they do the right project in the right place.

Mr. Paradise asked if we could expect something this summer.

Ms. Smith replied they hope to have the project under contract within the next few months and with an expectation to start by the latest this summer.

Mr. Paradise stated there have been some potential sites that have come through the county; he assumes those sites will be looked at again. He asked if that was accurate.

Ms. Smith replied they will discuss at the kick-off meetings some of the sites evaluated in the Phase II study because they do not want to throw that data away but at the same time, it will not necessarily be the sites they look at first. They want to get feedback on what sites are most viable for the area.

Mr. Paradise asked if this has been coordinated with the adjacent FDOT district in the southwest tier of I-4.

Ms. Smith replied FDOT took the TIP amendment to the MetroPlan Orlando Board earlier this month for approval.

Mr. Paradise asked about the Tampa and Polk County area.

Ms. Smith replied they are coordinating with District 1 and District 7 based on some of the truck parking studies they have done; the study they looked at is just for our district but they are talking with them because they have previous truck parking projects.

Chairperson Mendez asked if FDOT is asking the TPO for the \$2 million to fund the study.

Ms. Smith replied no, they have secured a federal freight grant from Tallahassee.

Ms. Nicoulin added that the amendment will add the project to the TIP.

Chairperson Mendez commented that they have seen a list of sites previously and asked if there was a list of projects included in this study.

Ms. Smith replied they are starting with a blank slate to make sure the involvement of the local agencies and communities is taken into consideration before doing any additional analysis.

Chairperson Mendez stated the cities along I-4 do not all agree that Volusia County should have truck parking; Orange City filed an objection to truck parking at the I-4 interchange but Deltona welcomed it. She hopes that FDOT is hearing from all the different agencies involved.

Mr. Paradise stated the city of Deltona is not averse to discussing it but wants it to be a joint effort that represents the interests of West Volusia County collectively.

Ms. Bollenback asked Ms. Smith to explain exactly what FDOT is doing with this study as it is a different approach.

Ms. Smith replied one of the things they are looking at from all of their PD&E perspectives is they want to make sure they do not go down the wrong path so they are implementing phasing of the PD&E. The first component would like a planning level analysis with public engagement and feasibility assessments to ensure they are taking

the right project to the community. They are hoping to vet out some things with the stakeholder groups and local agency involvement prior to taking it to the public. It is a different approach they are taking to try and streamline the PD&E process.

Discussion continued.

Ms. Bollenback noted that communication is challenging these days and the TCC is the group that is technically knowledgeable and briefs the city and county commissioners. The concern here is that the original PD&E study completed by Ghyabi & Associates investigated closing the Richey Green Rest Area in Longwood and moving it to Volusia County; that included a public meeting in the Orlando area but no one was aware of it. The TPO was told by Ms. Noranne Downs, FDOT, at the time that it was just a high-level conceptual study; however, it was included in the Phase 1 report as a study that has been completed. It does acknowledge that there were objections by Volusia County; it did not mention the River to Sea TPO but the TPO provided objections as well. She asked if there was any discussion of the Longwood truck stop closing and if that was a consideration in this study.

Ms. Smith referred to the first study FDOT completed and stated they acknowledge that it was not conducted in the way they wanted. FDOT wants to put a focus on including and fully engaging the local agencies and communities as they move projects forward in the TPO area. They have made changes to projects based on community engagement. They know they have not done things right in the past but they are changing the path forward. The Longwood truck stop has been a topic of discussion in the past but from the estimated 2040 demand for truck parking and until they can address that need, it will not be discussed because there is a big need for it to be addressed first.

Chairperson Mendez asked if the study would not only include potential site selection but an improvement plan that goes along with any site selection or if it is just a site selection with no suggested improvements.

Ms. Smith replied they are looking at the traffic component as well to see what the site impacts are.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lear to recommend approval of Resolution 2021-## amending the FY 2020/21 to 2024/25 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Paradise and passed with one opposing by a roll call vote.

IV. <u>Presentation Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of List of Project Priorities</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated each year the TPO develops a List of Priority Projects (LOPP); the current list is available on the TPO's website and lists the projects prioritized in our planning area that are able to access federal and state resources. The projects on the LOPP come from a variety of different sources; she explained the different lists. She reviewed the flow chart of the annual priority project process. Prior to opening the annual Call for Projects, the subcommittees meet to review the process, project applications and guiding resolutions and discuss any issues that may have occurred the previous year as well as ways to improve the process. This year, the Call for Projects opened at the end of November and closed at the end of February; local governments submit project applications for bicycle/pedestrian, traffic operations and planning studies. She is in the process of scheduling the TIP Subcommittee now and the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee meets tomorrow. The TIP Subcommittee reviews the project applications for traffic operations and planning studies. The applications are scored based on a set of criteria used, including safety, congestion, etc., and the LOPP is updated with the new projects. A draft LOPP is presented in May to the advisory committees and TPO Board with formal adoption in June. Once adopted, the LOPP is submitted to FDOT; it conveys the TPO's priorities in the planning area to FDOT and they use the list to update their tentative Work Program. Projects that move into the Work Program and have funding are pulled off the TPO's priority list. Once the legislature approves FDOT's Work Program, the TPO uses that information to develop the new TIP for the next fiscal year; a draft TIP is also presented in May and adopted in June.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Transportation Safety</u>

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation of transportation safety and stated this has been a difficult presentation to assemble as there have been recent incidents as well as the release of the Dangerous by Design Report last week. We are doing good, hard work relating to safety and to see crashes increasing is difficult. Safety is complicated and there is not a silver bullet to fix the issue. The TPO is only one agency that participates in the effort and we will continue to do so. She reviewed the five "E's" of safety; evaluation, engineering, enforcement, encouragement and education. She noted FDOT has added emergency response and four "I's" to their list; information, innovation, insight and investment. We have to figure out how to use all the different strategies to make a safer transportation system. We should also consider equity and empathy; there are populations that are disproportionately impacted by unsafe conditions. Empathy is important because if we are not concerned enough about others we will continue to have increasing crashes. The participants in this process include FDOT, local governments, MPOs, law enforcement, advocacy groups, health agencies and users of the transportation system. We use the transportation system every day and it is important to recognize and message that this is not someone else's problem fix; it is the responsibility of everyone involved. She explained FDOT's "Vision Zero" policy and stated it is intended to be a shift in the way we think about transportation safety. Over the last few decades, transportation safety has been viewed as an inevitable byproduct of transportation. She suggested we approach it like the airlines do a plane crash or Votran views a transit-related crash and determine if the event could have been prevented and if so, why it was not and how it could be prevented in the future. FDOT has three plans that guide their safety approach across the state; the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), Highway Safety Plan (HSP) and the Highway Safety Implementation Plan (HSIP). These plans outline the strategies they will pursue based on a review of the data. She will send a link to FDOT's website where the plans are available for review. She reviewed portions of the plans and stated FDOT had 394 safety projects in 2018 statewide totaling approximately \$155 million. FDOT is clear about what is important to them and they are identifying ways to fix the issues. The TPO wants to support and complement FDOT's efforts.

She continued the presentation and reviewed some of the TPO's resources including required efforts such as the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), planning studies, project priority list, etc. Projects in the TIP by law have to be tied to the safety performance targets the TPO must set each year to show how the projects are addressing safety. She gave an overview of safety studies the TPO has completed over the last few years. The TPO also participates in many safety awareness and community events. She reviewed what some of the safety studies revealed in regards to the factors that contribute to crashes such as distracted driving, impaired driving, etc. The TPO sets safety targets for our planning area based on the data; FDOT sets targets at the state level. They are striving for Vision Zero. Targets started to be required a few years ago and FDOT submitted their first two-year report; the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) determined that the state has not made significant progress towards meeting its safety goals. This is not because FDOT has not been doing enough; they have but they need to do more as does the TPO. We will continue to work in that direction. The role of the TPO is to prioritize projects and target funding, complete planning studies, set safety targets and conduct public education and outreach. The challenge is the TPO is but one organization and does not write the laws, enforce the laws, or build projects; however, we can influence funding of projects, and promote and educate the public. The question is what else can we do; she reviewed items currently in the TPO's work plan including pursuing the improvements identified in the top ten crash locations, implement programs identified in the Community Safety Action Plan (CSAP), produce crash maps and promote efforts to reduce posted speeds. She asked members to provide input on what additional information they may need and if there is a study or analysis they think that needs to be completed.

Chairperson Mendez referred to the Walkability Study and the draft of what Complete Streets means and asked if that program was finalized.

Ms. Bollenback replied Mr. Harris may have more information regarding the Walkability Action Institute; she noted we have moved to a Complete Streets template.

Mr. Harris stated yes, it was finalized. The Walkability Action Institute was followed by the adoption of a Complete Streets policy. The TPO also tweaked the criteria for ranking project applications to award extra points if the project includes Complete Streets components.

Chairperson Mendez asked if traffic operations applications that are prioritized are more safety focused or if capacity improvements are because of concurrency needs.

Ms. Nicoulin replied it is a combination of both; the TPO has received a number of projects that address safety concerns.

Chairperson Mendez commented that in 2011, the state of Florida removed transportation concurrency but it may still be in some comprehensive plans; she asked if concurrency has killed the transportation network and if we are building more lanes because we have to meet concurrency rather than looking at how our transportation system operates. She asked if it was state level concurrency that has got us into this; the only way to undo it is to look at transportation differently from what we have always done.

Ms. Nicoulin replied operational improvements were identified in the LRTP and money was set aside to fund those local initiatives; those are not capacity projects but roundabouts or Complete Streets projects. We have identified a need for incremental improvements or instead of a road widening look at operational improvements.

Discussion continued.

C. FDOT Report

The FDOT report was provided in the agenda. Ms. Taylor stated there are no public meetings planned in the TPO planning area for March or April.

Mr. Fegley asked if the adaptive traffic signal at SR 44 and Airport Road is still on schedule.

Ms. Taylor replied she would get a status update and get back to him.

D. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

The Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports were provided in the agenda.

E. Staff Comments

Ms. Nicoulin introduced new TCC members, Mr. Joseph Barker, alternate from DeBary, and Mr. Mike Disher, Ponce Inlet Representative.

- Programs funding in the amount of \$5,013,251 for the design and construction phases of the northbound US 1 over Turnbull Creek bridge replacement project in New Smyrna Beach (FM # 447117-1)
- Programs funding in the amount of \$1,443,412 for the design, right-of-way and construction phases for a signalized pedestrian crossing at the intersection of SR 600 (US 92) and Lockhart Street in Daytona Beach (FM # 447698-1).
- Programs funding in the amount of \$6,790,000 which includes \$1,850,000 for the PD&E study for the I-95 at LPGA Blvd. interchange, including the bridge over the Tomoka River and LPGA Blvd. from US 92 to Williamson Blvd., and \$4,940,000 for the design phase of the interchange improvement (FM # 448456-1).
- Programs funding in the amount of \$428,815 for a grant funded small urban fixed route capital transit project for bus and bus facility improvements (FM # 448171-1).
- Programs funding in the amount of \$812,913 for a grant funded large urban fixed route capital transit project for bus and bus facility improvements (FM # 448171-1).







Explanation: This modification will add the necessary funding for the SunRail Phase II North expansion for the Central Florida Commuter Rail System. The Central Florida Commuter Rail Commission (CFCRC) and Volusia County Officials previously approved Option 2 that will extend the Districtwide project an additional 12 miles from the DeBary SunRail Station to the DeLand Amtrak Station.

Value Engineering has resulted in a reduction of Federal (FTA) matching funds needed for design, right of way, and construction. Therefore, the original estimate of \$34 Million has been reduced to just under \$22.5 Million. A TIP Modification is required to reflect these changes.

Background Information:

The River to Sea TPO is seeking to amend the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan to reflect updated funding for the Central Florida Commuter Rail System Phase II North Expansion. This project will extend SunRail from the existing northern terminus at the DeBary station north to DeLand.

At the time of adoption of Connect 2045 in September of 2020, this project was not included in the current TIP and specifics associated with this project, such as project timing and costs, were not known. Accordingly, the project was referenced in Connect 2045 as an aspirational unfunded transit project.

Public outreach for the Connect 2045 LRTP amendment requires a 30-day notice and comment period, which will begin on April 25, 2021 and extend to the TPO Board meeting on May 26, 2021.

At the committee meetings this month, TPO Staff will review the changes to be included in the proposed amendment.

- As social restrictions are lifted, the TPO is monitoring the scheduling of public events, helmet fittings, in-person presentations, etc. to identify opportunities for resuming public outreach and safety awareness activities
- Social media, e-mail and the TPO website are all being used to keep committee/board members, stakeholders
 and the public up-to-date on our activities
