Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance I.

The River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) meeting was called to order at 2:02 p.m. by Chairperson Ted Wendler. The roll was called, and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. The meeting was held in a hybrid format with twelve voting and four non-voting members physically present; and two voting and one non-voting member virtually present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Coletti to allow members attending virtually to participate and vote.

The motion was seconded by Ms. Belin and carried unanimously.

Chairperson Wendler introduced newly appointed BPAC members, James Lowry and Laura Schweinsberg.

II. Public Comment/Participation

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of the March 13, 2024 BPAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Belin to approve the March 13, 2024 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2024-## Adopting the FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and Authorizing the Execution of the FDOT/Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement

Mr. Harris reviewed the changes to the draft UPWP for the next two years beginning on July 1, 2024. He discussed the reduction of the number of tasks. He noted the link provided in the agenda packet for members to access the draft UPWP. He also compared the old and new tasks and explained the tasks that are being merged.

Mr. Harris answered BPAC member questions regarding when the FY begins and ends; what the asterisks stand for; if all this information is included in the link provided in the agenda; request to provide further explanation of the "Responsible Staff" column and what's the difference between ongoing and as requested.

Ms. Nicoulin explained the reasoning behind using the verbiage "ongoing and as requested" in the UPWP document. She also noted some corrections that will be made to the UPWP document.

Mr. Harris then answered more BPAC member questions regarding giving a short version of the Greenhouse Gas emissions targets and if the bike corridors relate to the wildlife corridors.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lodge to recommend approval of Resolution 2024-## Adopting the FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and Authorizing the Execution of the FDOT/Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentation and Discussion Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Florida Department of Transportation's Approach to Complete Streets, Context Classifications, and Facilities for Bicyclists and Pedestrians</u>

Tiffany Gehrke; FDOT State Complete Streets Coordinator, provided a PowerPoint presentation of Complete Streets Program. She provided FDOT's mission statement. She discussed what FDOT's Complete Streets approach is about. She provided details of the context classification system guide. She mentioned the FDOT's Design Manual, Traffic Engineering Manual, and the Access Management Guidebook-bike facilities. She provided details of what counts as a bicycle facility. She also provided detailed information of shared use paths and urban side paths. She discussed the importance of connected networks, and the multimodal Q/LOS

handbook. She provided what can act to fulfill pedestrian facility needs and options to designing for connectivity and access.

Ms. Gehrke answered BPAC members questions regarding raised reflectors, rumble strips and roundabouts being dangerous for cyclists; the widths of sidewalk separated bike lanes; and what plans are being made for the increased use of motorized scooters and bicycles.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Make Every Ride Count Initiative</u>

Ms. Blankenship provided a PowerPoint presentation of the Make Every Ride Count Initiative. This initiative is a Nationwide effort to support a bike friendly America by encouraging individuals to participate in logging their rides on the Love to Ride app. The program is free to participate in. A few key objectives of this initiative are for riders to provide feedback; increase awareness of biking safety and infrastructure needs and establish a national comfort rating benchmark for transportation planners. Ms. Blankenship discussed key features of the Love to Ride App which included comfort rating; data uses and the benefits of the App. She also discussed the different ways for everyone to support this initiative.

Ms. Blankenship answered BPAC members' questions regarding sharing the initiative information with local bike shops; rating the comfort levels of rides and maps being included in the App.

V. Staff Comments

- → BPAC Project Review Subcommittee Meeting- Mr. Harris announced that the Subcommittee meeting begins at 3:30 p.m. following the BPAC meeting.
- → Expansion of VoRide Mobility on Demand Service- Mr. Lunceford provided details of the recent VoRide expansion area. He noted that VoRide has provided thirteen thousand trips to date and is averaging a 4.8-star rating.

Mr. Lunceford answered BPAC member questions regarding plans to expand to the east side of Volusia County and how many VoRide vehicles are currently in service.

VII. BPAC Member Comments

Mr. Coletti stated that he and his wife recently road Gobblers Lodge Trail in Edgewater and plan to do so again due to how nice it was.

Ms. Moss announced and provided details of the walk on Flagler Avenue stress study in New Smyrna Beach is being held on April 17, 2024 at from noon- 1:00 p.m. and 6:00- 7:00 p.m. Anyone interested in participating in the stress study should contact Ms. Moss via email.

Mr. Mostert and Mr. Lodge applauded Ms. Ardito and her group for their recent successful Trail Alliance event.

Ms. Ardito discussed the Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program (ATIIP) stating that there is \$45 million in funding available. The deadline to submit bids is June 17, 2024. She noted that Rails to Trails is offering coaching sessions and provided a handout noting that this is important and time sensitive. Ms. Ardito answered BPAC members' questions regarding the ATIIP program.

Mr. Aufdenberg discussed riding his bike to Ormond noting that the crosswalks at the intersection of Hand and Clyde Morris are completely obliterated and he plans to contact the county to see about getting those crosswalks repainted. He also noted that the very wide sidewalks along Granada are very nice to ride on as an alternative to the

bike lane. He discussed how he was sharing the five-foot sidewalk space along Clyde Morris with families and women pushing strollers because there is no shoulder part of the way on Clyde Morris.

Ms. Blankenship read some comments virtually provided by Mr. Richard Hamilton: Mr. Hamilton stated that he will send Mr. Coletti a separate note about the rumble strips on A1A; his question for Ms. Gehrke was how to make sure this blended principle she outlined (which we all want to support) gets incorporated into projects and he provided an example. Ms. Blankenship then read Ms. Gehrke's response suggesting changing early involvement in projects and input would be very valuable.

Mr. Coletti asked for any updates on all of Flagler County being incorporated in this TPO.

Mr. Harris stated that the TPO is currently waiting for the Governor to sign off on the Apportionment Plan.

A. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF THE DRAFT FY 2024/25 TO FY 2028/29 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The TPO is required by 23 U.S.C. 134(j) and Florida Statute 339.175 to develop a Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The TIP is a program of transportation projects covering a period of five years. The TIP is developed and formally adopted by the TPO each year. It must be consistent with the Long Range Transportation Plan, and is required for projects to be eligible for funding under Title 23 U.S.C. and Title 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53. The TIP is developed in cooperation with FDOT, local governments, public transit operators, and the public.

The TIP lists capital and non-capital surface transportation projects supported with state and/or federal funds. All regionally significant projects requiring an action by FHWA or FTA regardless of funding source and projects that implement paratransit plans required for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act are required to be included. Florida law also requires the TIP to include a list of locally and privately funded projects for informational purposes.

TPO staff will lead a discussion regarding the development of the draft FY 2024/25 to FY 2028/29 TIP and provide an update on notable changes to bicycle and pedestrian projects.

NHTSA Finalizes Key Safety Rule to Reduce Crashes and Save Lives

Starting in 2029, vehicle manufacturers must make automatic emergency braking, which reduces vehicle and pedestrian crashes, standard in cars and light trucks

Making this safety feature standard, rather than a luxury, is part of the Department's National Roadway Safety Strategy to address the crisis of deaths on our roads

WASHINGTON – Today, the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) finalized a new <u>Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard</u> that will make automatic emergency braking (AEB), including pedestrian AEB, standard on all passenger cars and light trucks by September 2029. This safety standard is expected to significantly reduce rear-end and pedestrian crashes.

NHTSA projects that this new standard, FMVSS No. 127, will save at least 360 lives a year and prevent at least 24,000 injuries annually. AEB systems use sensors to detect when a vehicle is close to crashing into a vehicle or pedestrian in front and automatically applies the brakes if the driver has not. Pedestrian AEB technology will detect a pedestrian in both daylight and in darker conditions at night. This will significantly reduce injury or property damage and associated costs from these crashes.

"The new vehicle safety standards we finalized today will save hundreds of lives and prevent tens of thousands of injuries every year," said **U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg**. "The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is not only making historic investments in transportation, it's also ushering in a new era of safer travel by ensuring new cars and light trucks are equipped with automatic emergency braking, making our roads safer for drivers and pedestrians alike."

"Automatic emergency braking is proven to save lives and reduce serious injuries from frontal crashes, and this technology is now mature enough to require it in all new cars and light trucks. In fact, this technology is now so advanced that we're requiring these systems to be even more effective at higher speeds and to detect pedestrians," said **NHTSA Deputy Administrator Sophie Shulman**. "Most new vehicles already come with AEB, and we expect that many cars and light trucks will be able to meet this standard ahead of the deadline, meaning even more lives will be saved thanks to this technology."

The new standard requires all cars be able to stop and avoid contact with a vehicle in front of them up to 62 miles per hour and that the systems must detect pedestrians in both daylight and darkness. In addition, the standard requires that the system apply the brakes automatically up to

90 mph when a collision with a lead vehicle is imminent, and up to 45 mph when a pedestrian is detected.

The standard fulfills a provision in the <u>Bipartisan Infrastructure Law</u> to establish minimum performance standards requiring that all passenger vehicles be equipped with AEB. This standard also advances the Department's <u>National Roadway Safety Strategy</u>, which was launched in January 2022 to address the national crisis in traffic fatalities and serious injuries. The National Roadway Safety Strategy adopts the safe system approach and builds multiple layers of protection with safer roads, safer people, safer vehicles, safer speeds and better post-crash care. As part of the safe system approach, this new vehicle safety standard highlights safer vehicles and USDOT's effort to expand vehicle systems and features to help prevent crashes.

This final rule applies to nearly all U.S. light vehicles (*gross vehicle weight rating* of 10,000 pounds or less). A Final Regulatory Impact Analysis that presents the benefits and costs associated with the standard is included in the <u>Final Rule</u>. More information on the rulemaking process is available at <u>Transportation.gov</u>.

In June 2023, NHTSA and the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration announced a separate notice of proposed rulemaking that would require <u>heavy vehicles</u>, including tractor trailers, to have AEB, which the agencies are in the process of finalizing.

Operation Best Foot Forward Begins April 30 to Promote Pedestrian Safety Around Central Florida Parks & Trails

ORLANDO, FLA. – April 30, 2024 – Recognizing that less than 50% of Central Florida drivers are yielding to pedestrians near parks and trails, the Best Foot Forward for Pedestrian Safety program will be kicking off its quarterly pedestrian safety enforcement, dubbed *Operation Best Foot Forward,* to bring awareness and education to drivers to keep pedestrians safe near parks and trail crossings in Central Florida.

Law enforcement agencies will be conducting a two-week high-visibility crosswalk enforcement from Tuesday, April 30 to Friday, May 10 across six Central Florida counties: Osceola, Orange, Seminole, Volusia, Brevard and Marion as part of FDOT's Target Zero initiative to reduce traffic-related serious injuries and deaths to zero.

During Operation Best Foot Forward, plainclothes officers and deputies will cross streets at marked crosswalks, giving drivers enough time to slow down and stop safely. Drivers who do not stop as Florida law requires will be pulled over and face a minimum \$164 citation and three (3) points on their driver's license. Most crosswalks chosen for enforcement are near parks and trail crossings.

According to data collected by the Best Foot Forward for Pedestrian Safety program this year, only 49% of drivers yield to pedestrians within a half-mile of parks and only 46% of drivers yield to pedestrians at trail crossings. In a recent <u>study by Injury Prevention</u>, the risk of child pedestrian fatalities is more than twice as high near parks compared to schools. This may be related to the built-in environment within school zones that slows down drivers during times when children are most likely to be walking. This quarter's operation aims to instill that same sense of cautiousness around parks and trail crossings, especially as the school year comes to an end and more children will likely spend time outdoors at parks and trails.

Operation Best Foot Forward is part of the Best Foot Forward coalition's larger effort to improve road safety. Studies show that driver behavior changes when you combine these enforcement strategies, education, and engineering over a sustained period. Crosswalk locations include:

The Best Foot Forward for Pedestrian Safety (BFF) program is administered by the local non-profit Bike/Walk Central Florida (BWCF). BFF was created to reverse the conflict between pedestrians and drivers by focusing on one specific behavior change – getting more drivers to yield for pedestrians at marked crosswalks as Florida law requires. More than a campaign, Best Foot Forward is a behavior change-based program designed to improve road safety through consistent and persistent education, high-visibility crosswalk enforcement, and low-cost engineering countermeasures at marked crosswalks. Best Foot Forward operates in six Central Florida counties and is the largest pedestrian-focused grassroots coalition in the nation, working with more than 40 local and regional partners. Since launching in 2012, the percentage of drivers yielding to people in marked crosswalks has increased from 17% to more than 50% on roads with a speed limit of 35 mph and lower and 2% to 45% on roads 40 mph and higher. FDOT Flagler Avenue Data Walk

On April 17, FDOT held a walk to gather data measuring the impact of the new exclusive pedestrian phase traffic signal at the intersection of Peninsula Ave and Flagler Ave. Using MPATH, a platform that uses your movement activity data to calculate locations where you are feeling stress or comfort, patterns are identified while using infrastructure such as the Flagler Ave pedestrian signal. Using this data, facilities that present increased stress can be identified which could lead to the prevention of future accidents. MPATH filters out our linear increases in heart rate due to physical stress and allows the data on emotional stress to be calculated. Ultimately, by mapping the stress felt along the roadway, FDOT can quantify how pedestrians actually feel while walking the phased intersection.
