I. <u>Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance</u>

The meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by Chairperson Jason Aufdenberg. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held in a hybrid format with 11

voting and two non-voting members physically present; and five voting and two non-voting members virtually present.

Chairperson Aufdenberg stated the members participating virtually are doing so as a result of social distancing restrictions associated with COVID-19. Rulings from the Florida Attorney General require that the members physically present vote to allow virtual participation due to "extraordinary circumstances".

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Eik to allow members attending virtually to participate and vote. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wendler and carried unanimously.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

II. <u>Public Comment/Participation</u>

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Recommend Approval of March 9, 2022 BPAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by to Mr. Storke approve the March 9, 2022 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Coletti and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2022-## Adopting the River to Sea TPO Title VI Plan

Ms. Blankenship stated a presentation was given last month on the River to Sea TPO's Title VI Plan; no comments have been received and no changes have been made since last month. The public comment period is open until April 27, 2022 when the TPO Board will take action on the document.

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Belin to recommend approval of Resolution 2022-## adopting the River to Sea TPO Title VI Plan. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2022-## Adopting the River to Sea TPO Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan

Ms. Blankenship stated a presentation was given last month on the River to Sea TPO's Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan; there have been a couple of changes since then. The data in Tables 1 and 2 were updated to the most current and just released data from the 2016-2020 American Community Survey; she explained the data was changed from the top five languages spoken at home to the LEP household data in Volusia and Flagler Counties. The grammatically incorrect sentence below the tables was also updated.

Ms. Belin asked if the TPO was surprised by the huge difference in the numbers.

Ms. Blankenship explain the LEP used to reflect the top five languages spoken at home but now the data reflects the LEP speaking households; therefore, it is a different statistic. LEP persons that speak Spanish was 2.7%; now LEP households in Volusia County are 10%. There is a large percentage of LEP households in Volusia County, especially in Deltona, Pierson, and Northwest Volusia County.

Mr. Lodge asked if the BPAC is being asked to approve a plan or are they acknowledging that the TPO will adjust the way it does things because there are LEP households in the planning area that need to understand transportation.

Ms. Blankenship explained the LEP Plan ensures that the TPO provides outreach and is aware that there are Spanish and Indo-European language speaking persons and that we may need a translator at certain events; the TPO tries to make all services, programs and processes available to everyone. She explained a four-factor

analysis was conducted to assess the frequency the TPO would come in contact with LEP individuals and the services deemed to be required; transcribed in Spanish are the bicycle/pedestrian safety video, the Tell the TPO survey, and the TPO's website has Google translate. Table 1 references data for Volusia County and Table 2 is for Flagler County; Flagler County has a higher percentage of Indo-European speaking persons than Spanish speaking. It was asked why Spanish was not considered to be an Indo-European language; Ms. Blankenship will look into that.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Wendler to recommend approval of Resolution 2022-## adopting the River to Sea TPO Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan. The motion was seconded by Mr. Lodge and carried unanimously.

IV. Presentation and Discussion Items

A. Presentation and Discussion of Updates to the Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) Plan and Maps

Mr. Harris gave a PowerPoint presentation of proposed updates to the Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) Plan and maps; he explained the FGTS is made up of existing, planned and conceptual trails and ecological greenways that form a connected, integrated statewide network. He reviewed the history of the plan and the schedule for the update for 2023 to 2027. They are currently in the period of accepting comments from the public and the stakeholders through May 31, 2022.

Ms. Ardito asked if the BPAC has a consolidated group of comments or if it is individual comments.

Mr. Harris replied that preferably the BPAC would agree on comments and approve a motion accepting those comments to recommend to the TPO Board. Individual comments could be included in that. He continued with the presentation and explained the Office of Greenways and Trails (OGT) has a number of maps but the maps we are concerned with are those type of trails on the TPO's priority list; Land Trails Opportunity Maps and Priority Trails Maps. TPO staff is suggesting three revisions; to upgrade the Palm Coast to Bulow Trail and the SR 40 Trail Corridor from current opportunity trail corridors to priority trail corridors. He gave the trail limits for both trail corridors and noted that SR 40 is currently undergoing a widening and the plan is to build the trail within the FDOT right-of-way of the widened road.

Ms. Belin asked if impact fees are being used for the widening and if the trail will be away from the roadway.

Mr. Harris replied he did not know if impact fees are being used; and yes, the trail will be separated from the roadway.

Members discussed the alignment, limits and safety of the trails; it was noted that if a trail is funded with SUN Trail money there is a requirement that it be a separated shared use path from the roadway. It was asked if there is a prioritization process other than through SUN Trail; if a trail is a Tier 1 trail such as the Coast to Coast Trail and the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail. These trails connect to the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail. The SUN Trail network runs along US 1 and they try to stay within a half-mile east and west of US 1. Mr. Harris explained for several years there has been interest in connecting the SUN Trail corridor to the ocean; a PD&E study was conducted a few years ago that examined the New Smyrna Beach area but closed out with it being a no-build area and there was not a consensus on a local preferred alternative. A new PD&E study will begin in the upcoming fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022; Volusia County has envisioned a connection that would go from the SUN Trail network utilizing the North Causeway east to Peninsula Drive and ending at Grayce K. Barck Beach Park in New Smyrna Beach where there are sidewalks to access the ocean. This recommended alignment is being proposed to add as an opportunity corridor. The TPO is asking for feedback today; this will also be presented to the other advisory committees and TPO Board and be back next month for action on a recommendation to the TPO Board to submit to the OGT before the comment period closes.

Members discussed the proposed revisions in detail including the text of the system plan. Mr. Harris requested member comments be provided to him in an email.

Mr. Daun asked if the TPO is allowed to propose four revisions to the plan and maps; he would like to propose a motion adding an opportunity trail along the Halifax River from Ponce Inlet to the Casements in Ormond Beach.

Mr. Eik reminded members that this is a presentation and not an action item; he objects to a motion on this as it is not on the agenda.

Mr. Harris requested Mr. Daun send him the specific alignment he is asking for and noted he can include it as part of the action item next month. The FGTS Council will adopt a new plan for 2023 to 2027 in December and the hope is to have our proposed revisions included in that adoption. He noted that the OGT will be holding public workshops in the coming months and representatives will be present to answer questions from the public and stakeholders.

Discussion continued regarding the proposed revisions. Mr. Harris explained that the TPO's role is to make suggested changes to the plan and maps which the TPO Board will approve. In 2017, the TPO provided suggestions with a resolution that was sent to OGT; something similar will be done this time. If members have any comments on the draft plan, please let staff know.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Current Status of the Flagler County Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update</u>

Mr. Martin Catalá, Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR), introduced Ms. Victoria Perk to give the presentation.

Ms. Perk gave a PowerPoint presentation of the Flagler County Transit Development Plan (TDP) major update; the TDP is a local document with regional considerations that involves effective public engagement. They have looked at what is needed versus what is attainable to be achieved over the next several years. The TDP is a living document and will continue to evolve and incorporate new ideas and opportunities. One of the last steps in the development of the TDP update is to find potential transit alternatives for the area; those alternatives are divided into two categories; existing services and new services that may be viable in the county.

Mr. Catalá explained the most immediate need is to improve reservation lead time; it is currently at two weeks out. New software has been purchased with grant funds that will improve their scheduling and they want to implement online and mobile reservations. He reviewed the other targeted improvements that are geared to drive ridership up; expanding service hours and days of service, hiring more drivers, developing hiring and retention polices, etc. All of the improvements are contingent on securing additional federal funding (FTA Section 5307). The expansion of services is being proposed as a pilot project; FDOT offers three-year grants that could be used to support pilot projects. Same day service is being considered as a pilot project as is traditional and deviated fixed route service. Another mode being considered for a pilot project is on-demand service; it could be a partnership with services such as Lyft or Uber. These are the improvements that will be included in the TDP.

Members provided comments regarding the proposed improvements; the purchase of new vehicles was discussed and available grant programs to fund them. It was explained that electric vehicles are not being considered at this time as Flagler County Public Transportation does not have the maintenance capacity to manage different types of fleets. Electrification of vehicles would be a significant effort to prepare for. It was asked if the vehicles will have bike racks or the ability to carry other micro-mobility devices; the buses do have bike racks but have not moved towards the infrastructure required for micro-mobility devices.

Members continued to discuss various aspects of the draft TDP including staffing issues, services and the online reservation system; it was suggested to have the reservation system consider bikes and micro-mobility devices.

C. Presentation and Discussion of Updates to the Draft River to Sea TPO Public Participation Plan (PPP)

Ms. Blankenship explained the Public Participation Plan (PPP) outlines the strategies the TPO uses to ensure that the public is able to participate in the decision-making process in ways that are both meaningful and inclusive. In addition, the plan identifies how the TPO will promote and encourage public participation. She reviewed

some of the major updates to the PPP that are being proposed; TPO staff listing has been updated; the Twitter page and Microsoft Teams were added among which included updates to the quick reference tables; to change the public notices from five business days to seven days which is in line with what we currently provide and allows for holidays. The ongoing public participation strategies was also updated. The PPP goes out for public comment for 45 days on April 27, 2022 through June 10, 2022 and will be back for recommended approval in June.

Chairperson Aufdenberg recommended adding an acronym list for funding sources used in the TIP to the acronym section.

Ms. Nicoulin explained that the acronyms used in the TIP are different than those typically used in other documents because of those funding sources; if it is a TIP-specific funding source, it is listed as an appendix in the TIP. A draft TIP will be presented for review next month and those acronyms can be discussed then.

Mr. Lodge asked how often the PPP is updated and how an individual would communicate their ideas or comments regarding transportation to the TPO.

Ms. Blankenship replied the PPP has been typically updated every three years; however, the TPO is proposing to update it every two years. Comments can be made via phone, email or in person; staff will direct inquiries to the information they need or direct them to the right agency.

Chairperson Aufdenberg referred to page 9 of the PPP and noted the phrase "consists of elected officials" is in there twice; it seems redundant.

Ms. Blankenship replied she will look at that.

Mr. Cotton announced the Volusia County Council has approved everyone to ride fixed route and Flex service for free on Earth Day, Friday, April 22, 2022. Votran staff will be out on the buses that day to determine how many new riders versus regular riders there are; he asked for volunteers to assist with this and provided his email address, jcotton@volusia.org.

VII. BPAC Member Comments

Ms. Ardito announced more information regarding the Earth Day Trail Day on the A1A on the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Alliance website.

Mr. Coletti announced he will be riding from Palm Coast to Ponce Inlet on the upgraded trail corridor on Monday.

Chairperson Aufdenberg announced the latest version of his bike map now includes the sidewalk gaps on Peninsula Drive.

Mr. Oebbecke thanked Ms. Blankenship for attending the Community Day event in Ponce Inlet on April 2, 2022.

Ms. Ardito thanked Ms. Blankenship and Chairperson Aufdenberg for attending Trails Day in Flagler Beach.

Mr. Eik advised anyone riding along Moody Boulevard in Flagler Beach to go slowly so they can see the progress being made on the Graham Swamp Trail.

Mr. Walters referred to the Providence Boulevard Trail in Deltona which is sitting on top of a giant water project and is now underway; the idea is to pump 12 million gallons of water a day to send north as an alternate to non-potable water to water their lawns. The purpose is to install the pipes and put the trail on top of them; the project is underway.

Mr. Daun shared two videos of what is being proposed regarding SR A1A crosswalk safety at a public meeting tomorrow from 5:30 pm to 7:00 pm at the Shipley Center; the videos showed lights embedded into the crosswalks instead of rectangular, rapid flashing beacons (RRFBs). It is important to bicycle/pedestrians as we will not likely get an update to these state roads for another 20 years. He noted he emailed Mr. Harris the proposed map for a trail from Ponce Inlet to Granada Boulevard.

Chairperson Aufdenberg thanked TPO staff for coming to Embry Riddle Aeronautical University (ERAU) for the FDOT session regarding improvements on Clyde Morris Boulevard. He sent FDOT a long letter that they should not have painted bike lanes on that road due to the high traffic volume; he praised them for the leading pedestrian signals they have recently installed on Oakridge Boulevard but added that it needs protected bike lanes. He had other suggestions and was happy they listened; there will be a nice trail connecting Beville Road and International Speedway Boulevard (ISB).

RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION AMENDING THE FY 2021/22 TO FY 2025/26 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO shall annually endorse and amend as appropriate, the plans and programs required by 23 C.F.R. 450.300 through 450.324, among which is the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO's adopted TIP is required to be consistent with the Florida Department of Transportation's adopted Five-Year Work Program; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Department of Transportation has provided additional information to the River to Sea TPO regarding the FDOT adopted Five-Year Work Program.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the River to Sea TPO that the:

- 1. River to Sea TPO's FY 2021/22 to FY 2025/26 TIP is hereby amended as shown in Attachment "A" attached hereto and made a part of this resolution; and the
- 2. Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or his/her designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit the FY 2021/22 to FY 2025/26 TIP as amended to the:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation;
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation);
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and the
 - d. Department of Economic Opportunity.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) outlines the annual activities and funding for the TPO over a two-year period. The next two-year UPWP will become effective July 1, 2022. The TPO's transportation planning activities are funded in large part through federal grants. These federally-funded transportation planning activities must be identified and approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and FDOT in advance of each fiscal year. The activities, products and budgeted funds must be documented in the TPO's Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) which is updated every two years.

In February and March, UPWP Tasks and funding allocations were discussed and presented to the TPO advisory committees and board for review and comment. Following these discussions, a full draft document was compiled and submitted to FDOT and FHWA for their review and posted for public comment. 

MAP UPDATE 2021 - 2022

The Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) Plan and maps are being updated in 2021 through 2022. We are reaching out to you and others involved in trail planning to receive input on both the Opportunity and Priority land and paddling trail maps.

The FGTS Plan ties together the local, regional and state plans and collaborative efforts for greenways and trails, bicycle and pedestrian, master plans and other plans of communities, agencies and non-profits throughout Florida to create two levels of FGTS maps:

- Level 1 The Vision: Land Trail and Paddling Trail Opportunity Maps.
- Level 2 Priority Trails Map: The spine of a statewide system identified from the Opportunity Maps and the Florida Ecological Greenways Network Map.

For each Opportunity and Priority Trail corridor, we need to verify the corridor's alignment and make a determination whether the corridor should be **kept**, **modified** or **deleted**.

FLORIDA GREENWAYS & TRAILS SYSTEM (FGTS)

MAP UPDATE 2021 - 2022

The Greenways and Trails System **Priority corridors** are the focused vision for trails in the state and rank higher for implementation than the Opportunity corridors. **Priority corridors** are comprised of a subset of the **Land Trail and Paddling Trail Opportunity maps**.

To be recognized as a **Land and Paddling Priority corridor**, it must meet these criteria to the greatest extent possible:

- Supports and further establishes national, state or regional trail projects, plans and initiatives.
- Builds on past and programmed state and federal investments in trails, particularly when matched by funding from local and private sources.
- Includes long-distance trails or provides connections between long-distance trails and/or long loops to join multiple counties and population centers.
- Demonstrates broad regional and community support, especially those entities willing to commit to trail management and long-term maintenance.
- Enhances access to nature-based tourism and economic development by connecting natural, recreational, cultural and historic sites.
- Enhances connections to state parks, greenways and trails.
- Coincides with and supports the Florida Ecological Greenways Network priorities.
- Protects public safety by offering non-motorized use that is separated from highways.

FLORIDA GREENWAYS & TRAILS SYSTEM (FGTS)

MAP UPDATE 2021 - 2022

Land trail opportunities within the Florida Greenways and Trails System are corridors that represent existing, planned and conceptual non-motorized, multi-use trails. These corridors form a land-based trail network that cross, or have the potential to cross, jurisdictional boundaries. The corridors on maps are represented as approximately 1-mile wide to allow for flexibility in the proposed trail locations as they are refined. The land trail opportunity map is a synthesis of trail planning efforts conducted by cities, counties, transportation planning organizations, nonprofits and other agencies throughout Florida. This map does not include all existing, proposed and conceptual trails in Florida but focuses on trails that can form a comprehensive connected system when complete.

To be recognized as a **Land Trail Opportunity**, the corridor must meet the following criteria to the greatest extent possible:

- Crosses or has the potential to cross county boundaries.
- Documented evidence of local or regional government endorsement.
- Leads to, or connects to, a destination that provides natural scenic qualities and diverse experiences.
- Provides access to conservation lands and historic, recreational or cultural sites.
- Supports the Florida Ecological Greenways Network.

Paddling Trail Opportunity corridors represent the vision for a comprehensive water-based trail system.

To be recognized as a **Paddling Trail Opportunity**, the corridor must meet the following criteria to the greatest extent possible:

- Recognized as an existing or potential tourism destination due to the scenic qualities and diverse experiences.
- Spans at least three miles in length.
- Navigable during most months in an average year.
- Benefits from increased visitation without harm to the natural environment.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The TPO is required by 23 U.S.C. 134(j) Florida Statute 339.175 to develop a Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The TIP is a program of transportation projects covering a period of five years. The TIP is developed and formally adopted by the TPO each year. It must be consistent with the Long Range Transportation Plan, and required for projects to be eligible for funding under title 23 U.S.C. and title 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53. The TIP is developed in cooperation with FDOT, local governments, public transit operators and the public.

The TIP lists capital and non-capital surface transportation projects supported with state and/or federal funds. Also required to be included are all regionally significant projects requiring an action by FHWA or FTA regardless of funding source and projects that implement paratransit plans required for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Florida law also requires the TIP to include a list of locally and privately-funded projects for informational purposes.

TPO staff will lead a discussion regarding the development of the draft FY 2022/23 to FY 2026/27 TIP and provide an update on notable changes to the bicycle and pedestrian projects.
