I. <u>Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum</u>

Chairman Dan D'Antonio called the meeting of the Volusia Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Citizens' Advisory Committee (CAC) to order at 1:35 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was present.

Chairman D'Antonio recognized the recent tragedy in Boston with a moment of silence.

II. Consent Agenda

A. Approval of March 19, 2013 CAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: Mr. Storke moved to approve the March 19, 2013 CAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ball and carried unanimously.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2013-XX Amending the FY 2012/13 to 2016/17 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) by Adding FM# 4337731 – Safety Materials Training

Mr. Keeth explained that FDOT had requested the amendment which includes \$75,000 to be given out in the form of mini-grants for school related bicycle and pedestrian equipment and safety materials in the current fiscal year.

MOTION:

Ms. Blanck moved to recommend approval of Resolution 2013-XX amending the FY 2012/13 to 2016/17 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) by adding FM# 4337731 – Safety Materials Training. The motion was seconded by Ms. Craig and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2013-XX Amending the FY 2012/13 - FY 2013/14 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Ms. Bollenback stated that the UPWP is a two-year document which outlines planning studies to be undertaken and how staff will be utilizing their time. When the document is developed it is based on estimates which change over time. The TPO has had a number of changes in staffing and therefore, staff's time was spent differently than expected. The UPWP amendment moves money out of tasks where less staff time was spent and into tasks where more time was spent. More time was devoted to the Information Technology Systems and Website Support, Transportation Improvement Program and the Bicycle/Pedestrian Planning and Implementation tasks. Less time than anticipated was spent on the Transportation Data Information Management and Reapportionment Activities tasks.

MOTION:

Ms. Craig moved to recommend approval of Resolution 2013-XX amending the FY 2012/13 – FY 2013/14 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2013-XX Defining the Local Match Requirements Placed on Member Local Governments Utilizing the TPO's Urban Attributable (XU) Funds and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Funds

Mr. Keeth explained that this resolution reaffirms the TPO's policy requiring a 10% local match on XU funded projects and institutes a 20% match on Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) projects. He noted that this discussion occurred in November when project applications were updated and that today's decision would provide official recognition.

Ms. Bollenback added that many years ago a more significant local match had been required but with the downturn in the economy the local match was reduced. She noted that recently, interest had been shown in discussing increasing the local match requirements. She stressed that no changes would take place until next year.

MOTION:

Mr. Storke moved to recommend approval of Resolution 2013-XX defining the local match requirements placed on member local governments utilizing the TPO's Urban Attributable (XU) funds and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds. The motion was seconded by Ms. Elliott and carried unanimously.

IV. Presentations, Status Reports, and Discussion Items

A. <u>Presentation of the Draft Fiscal Year 2013/14 to 2017/18 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Comparison Report</u>

Mr. Keeth noted that the draft TIP had been presented last month and would be on the May CAC agenda for final review and a recommendation for approval [Note: review and recommendation for approval of FY 2013/14 to FY 2017/18 TIP will be on the June TCC agenda]. He added that he had only received local projects from New Smyrna Beach, Volusia County and Port Orange; Mr. Keeth stressed that the remaining jurisdictions needed to submit their locally-funded projects as soon as possible.

Chairman D'Antonio recommended that the CAC members view the TIP and Comparison Report on the TPO website.

B. <u>Presentation on the Freight, Goods and Services Plan and Economic Impact on Central Florida</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated that the Freight, Goods and Services Plan has been an ongoing study over the past year. MetroPlan Orlando is the facilitator and Mr. Cheney has been Volusia County's representative during that time.

Mr. Cheney, Volusia County Traffic Engineer, gave a PowerPoint presentation on the regional freight study. He stated that all of the information in the study is available on MetroPlan Orlando's website; he would send the website address to Ms. Blankenship to distribute to the members.

Discussion ensued.

C. Presentation on the Background and Vision of the City of Palm Coast

Mr. Jose Papa, Palm Coast Senior Planner, gave a PowerPoint presentation on the history and vision of the city of Palm Coast.

Ms. Craig asked about the availability of accommodations for the disabled.

Mr. Papa responded that all improvements must be ADA compliant and as Palm Coast continues to improve intersections they are taking into account the needs of the disabled. If a request is received from a disabled person who is in need of additional accommodations it is taken seriously by the city council. Palm Coast's capital budget has always included a small amount of funding for these intersection improvements.

D. <u>Discussion of the Request to Amend the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) to Add an Interchange on I-95 at Pioneer Trail</u>

Ms. Bollenback provided the history of the Pioneer Trail interchange, noting that discussions began in the late 1990's when the TPO was developing its 2020 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The Pioneer Trail Interchange was included in both the 2020 and 2025 LRTPs. In 2008, New Smyrna Beach expressed concern about the interchange, passed a resolution opposing it and requested that it be removed from the 2025 LRTP. After lengthy discussion and public outreach, the TPO Board voted to remove the project from consideration. During the development of the 2035 LRTP, the interchange was not included in the plan. A number of studies have been done since the 1990's, including the Southeast Volusia Regional Transportation Study (SEVRTS). The recommendations from that study did not include the interchange. Another study was undertaken by FDOT in 2005 that looked at the interaction of three interchanges, SR 44, Dunlawton and Pioneer Trail; it found that that an interchange at Pioneer Trail would not create any issues on I-95 and would actually relieve traffic on the other interchanges. Ms. Bollenback stated that Volusia County had requested that the Pioneer Trail Interchange be added to the 2035 LRTP Unfunded Needs Plan and the city of Port Orange passed a resolution supporting the county's request. She added that the purpose of this agenda item was to discuss the TPO process for amending the LRTP as well as FDOT's process, Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM). Part of the amendment process is to run the project through the ETDM screening process as well as public involvement and public notice. She noted that if the members had any thoughts, questions or concerns they should voice them so that Chairman D'Antonio could accurately reflect the CAC's position at the TPO Board meeting next week.

Chairman D'Antonio stated that the LRTP amendment procedures establish May and November as the only times that amendments can be requested; he asked if the Pioneer Trail Interchange would be on the May agenda if the TPO Board decides to pursue the change to the LRTP.

Ms. Bollenback responded that it would be on the May agenda to authorize staff to begin the activities needed for the amendment process.

Mr. Cheney clarified that the proposed interchange would be located within the city of Port Orange not New Smyrna Beach.

Mr. Sachs stated that the predominant thought in New Smyrna Beach was against the interchange, and he personally did not support it either. The interchange will have a great impact on the lifestyle and nature of New Smyrna Beach. The city will be impacted by Port Orange's growth. The idea was that by opening up the interchange traffic would be reduced in other areas. He stated that he would like to have a seat at the table even though the New Smyrna Beach Commission is split as to whether to vote to approve the interchange or vote against it.

Mr. Blais stated that the interchange would cause the rain to drain into the Spruce Creek Preserve area.

Mr. Sachs stated that comments were generally relegated to the end of meetings when there typically is no time and if the Volusia County Council wanted input they would provide the time to do so.

Chairman D'Antonio commenced public comment on the Pioneer Trail Interchange.

Mr. George W. Weir, a new resident of New Smyrna Beach, stated that he opposed the Pioneer Trail Interchange.

Mr. Eric Hill, President of the Turnbull Bay Community, Inc., stated that the Turnbull Bay Community was against the interchange. He noted that the Pioneer Trail Interchange had been proposed a number of years ago. At that time, the TPO decided to remove it from LRTP due to the recommendations of the Southeast Volusia Regional Transportation Study (SEVRTS) which concluded that extending Williamson Boulevard down to Pioneer Trail and SR 44 would alleviate the traffic more effectively than an interchange at Pioneer Trail. Mr. Hill stated that he has been an aerospace and mechanical engineer for 42 years and taught at Embry Riddle Aeronautical University for the past 26 years. He pointed out that he did not understand why a study would be commissioned by Port Orange, Volusia County, Edgewater and New Smyrna Beach, at a cost of \$200,000, only to be ignored. It was not ignored in 2008 when the TPO Board agreed to remove it from the LRTP and it should not be ignored now. He added that the SR 44 interchange has 3,000 cars per day; federal guidelines require 28,000 cars per day to warrant an interchange. In regards to the proposal from the county, it states that the FDOT study from 2005 states that the Pioneer Trail Interchange will not cause any harm but he is unsure how that can be said when the interchange will cost \$70 million versus only \$10 million to extend Williamson Boulevard. Many issues that came out of that study, including that the interchange would break down Pioneer Trail and Turnbull Bay Road because of the increased traffic. The citizens will have to pay for those roads to be fixed.

Mr. Robert Wolfle, Turnbull Bay Road resident, stated that he had moved to the area six months ago and the Pioneer Trail Interchange does not make sense; it is not necessary. He stated that the interchange will run through a residential area and if it is opened to interstate traffic it will become a detriment. Cyclists, horseback riders and school buses use the local roads and to open it up to 18-wheelers and interstate traffic will create a potentially dangerous situation. He stated that he is opposed to the interchange, as are most of the residents in the area. He noted that the residents had recently put signs up to voice their opinions but they were confiscated.

Ms. Lorelle Friend, Turnbull Bay resident, stated that in 2008, the TPO Board assured a concerned crowd that the Pioneer Trail Interchange would be treated as all other projects and be subjected to the same criteria. The interchange was then submitted to the 2035 LRTP Unfunded Needs List but it failed to meet the criteria established for the 2035 LRTP. She noted that I-95 through Volusia County is one of the safer sections of the interstate in Florida because it has adequate spacing between interchanges. An interchange at Pioneer Trail would reduce spacing to less than three miles between interchanges. Federal guidelines show that this would increase accidents and mortality. The extension of Williamson Boulevard down to the interchange at SR 44 is a better alternative and is currently on the 2035 LRTP. However, the segment of Williamson that runs to Pioneer has been scheduled to be completed more than 15 years prior to the segment that goes to SR 44. According to FDOT data that was provided in 2009 to the 2035 LRTP Subcommittee, scheduling of the partial extension of Williamson Boulevard to Pioneer Trail, 15 years before continuing to SR 44 would result in unnecessary local transportation disruption causing Pioneer Trail to fail. She stated that the solution is for the extension of Williamson Boulevard from Pioneer Trail to SR 44 to occur in the same five-year road plan as the extension of Williamson Boulevard from its current terminus to Pioneer Trail.

Mr. Tomm Friend, Turnbull Bay resident, stated that the Pioneer Trail Interchange had been submitted for the 2035 LRTP Unfunded Needs List but did not meet the criteria. Currently, applications are being taken for the 2040 LRTP. Anyone can submit projects to the 2040 LRTP. He recommended that the interchange be submitted for the 2040 LRTP. He stated that the only reason to ask for it to be on the 2035 LRTP is to have it tied into 2015. In reference to the funding, the city of Port Orange gave the builder the right to sell \$52.5 million in tax exempt bonds; those will not be paid back by the builder, they will be paid by the taxes on the development. He asked where the trucks would end up going. Pioneer Trail will fail unless Williamson Boulevard is extended to SR 44, which will be a viable alternate to I-95 as well as an evacuation route. The Williamson commercial project stated clearly that before it could be built it was essential that the extension of Williamson Boulevard be completed so the trucks could get off at SR 44 and come up Williamson.

Chairman D'Antonio stated to the public speakers that this was the first step in the process which will include a great deal of public involvement. He stated that at the TPO Board meeting on Tuesday he would provide the voice of the CAC, not the public speakers. If the speakers wanted to give their perspective to the TPO Board they should plan to attend and speak at that meeting.

Ms. Bollenback asked the members to review the materials in the agenda and think about the comments that have been made and let her know if there are any questions, comments and/or information that would help the committee to make a recommendation in the future. She added that she wanted to make sure that the people that needed to speak to the issue were in attendance (i.e. project sponsors, FDOT, New Smyrna Beach, etc.).

Mr. Ball stated that he was the CAC representative for Port Orange and that he supported the interchange. He noted that he has relatives that live in the area so he understands the need. He stated that New Smyrna Beach has developed Venetian Bay and amended their comprehensive plan to allow some development to occur as well. He asked if there was a more concise history of the interchange so that everyone can be at the same starting point.

Ms. Bollenback responded that she would distribute a timeline with the information that the TPO has. Much of the information is from 2007 and 2008 so it has been archived. TPO staff is still working on putting that information together.

Ms. Bollenback noted that once TPO staff confirmed that they had most recent draft of the Southeast Volusia Regional Transportation Study, it would be placed on the TPO website. The FDOT Pioneer Trail Interchange Feasibility Study was already on the website.

Mr. Sachs stated that New Smyrna Beach had no malice toward Port Orange and New Smyrna Beach wants to be a good partner.

E. FDOT Report

Chairman D'Antonio welcomed the new TPO Liaison, Ms. Claudia Calzaretta, and requested that in the interest of time the CAC members review the FDOT reports as well as the Volusia County construction report on their own.

Chairman D'Antonio called the CAC meeting back to order at 2:53 p.m.

VI. <u>CAC Member Comments</u>

Mr. Sachs stated that the Volusia County Council had recently had a discussion on the proposed Spaceport. He noted that the Spaceport had been on their agenda as a non-action, discussion only item but became an item they voted on. The council would like to propose and encourage Florida's Spaceport to occupy a National Wildlife Refuge. He asked if a discussion could occur at the next CAC meeting regarding the Spaceport and requested a "symbolic vote" on whether the members support the Spaceport.

Ms. Bollenback responded that the TPO typically does not vote and take positions on items that are not directly transportation related. In this instance, through the Space Coast TPO, space activity is considered part of the transportation discussion. She noted that she would look into the specific activity to see if it would be appropriate and bring it to the Executive Committee.

Mr. Sachs responded that the public has very little forum regarding this future land use.

Mr. Lingenfelter moved to recommend approval of Resolution 2013-XX amending the FY 2012/13 – FY 2013/14 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Ferrell.

Mr. McCord pointed out that the amendment included references to SAFETEA-LU which was no longer in effect. He added that the references should be to the new transportation bill, MAP-21. In addition, the reference to the Brevard MPO should be the Space Coast TPO.

Ms. Bollenback responded that the UPWP tasks had been developed prior to MAP-21 and the amendment only changed the monetary figures not the references.

The motion carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2013-XX Defining the Local Match Requirements Placed on Member Local Governments Utilizing the TPO's Urban Attributable (XU) Funds and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Funds

Mr. Keeth explained that the resolution reaffirms the TPO's policy requiring a 10% local match on XU funded projects and institutes a 20% match on Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) projects. He noted that this discussion had occurred in November when the project applications were updated and that today's recommendation would serve as official recognition.

Mr. Cheney asked about the abbreviations for the new funding sources. He asked what source of TAP funds the resolution affected; the county had a project that was not subject to a local match and he wanted to make sure that this would still be the case.

Mr. Keeth responded that the TPO would honor the local match that was required at the time the project was submitted and the resolution prescribes that. The TPO share of the TAP funding is about \$457,000 per year.

Ms. Bollenback explained that 50% of the total allotted TAP funding is distributed to TPOs with populations over 200,000 and the amount is based on the area's relative share of the population; the remaining 50% is given to FDOT for obligation anywhere in the state. The money available to the TPO which requires a 20% local match can only be spent in the planning area. FDOT will require a soft match for their TAP funding.

MOTION:

Mr. Cheney moved to recommend approval of Resolution 2013-XX defining the local match requirements placed on member local governments utilizing the TPO's Urban Attributable (XU) funds and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) funds. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ferrell and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentations, Status Reports, and Discussion Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation of the Draft Fiscal Year 2013/14 to 2017/18 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Comparison Report</u>

Mr. Keeth noted that the draft TIP had been presented last month and would be on the May TCC agenda for final review and a recommendation for approval [Note: review and recommendation for approval of FY 2013/14 to FY 2017/18 TIP will be on the June TCC agenda]. He added that he had only received local projects from New Smyrna Beach, Volusia County and Port Orange. Mr. Keeth stressed that the remaining jurisdictions needed to submit their locally-funded projects as soon as possible.

B. <u>Presentation on the Freight, Goods and Services Plan and Economic Impact on Central Florida</u>

Mr. Cheney, Volusia County Traffic Engineer, stated that MetroPlan Orlando was the facilitator for the regional Freight, Goods and Services Plan. He stated that the State of Florida was also doing a statewide freight study and the results of the Central Florida study were being incorporated into the state's study. He gave a PowerPoint presentation.

Discussion ensued on Rails to Trails.

Mr. Cheney concluded that the study will present recommendations and solutions in regards to the freight and goods movement.

C. Presentation on the Background and Vision of the City of Palm Coast

Mr. Jose Papa, Palm Coast Senior Planner, gave a PowerPoint presentation on the history and vision of the city of Palm Coast.

Mr. Cheney asked at what point Palm Coast would be asked to sit at the table during TPO meetings, even if non-voting.

Ms. Bollenback responded that it would be discussed at the Reapportionment Subcommittee meeting next week. Elected officials from the incoming entities have been invited to sit in on the Reapportionment Subcommittee and the Bylaws Subcommittee but the timing of the transition is not well marked. The transition cannot occur prior to the jurisdictions agreement with the Reapportionment Plan.

D. <u>Discussion of the Request to Amend the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) to Add and Interchange</u> on I-95 at Pioneer Trail

Ms. Bollenback provided the history of the Pioneer Trail Interchange, noting that discussions began in the late 1990's when the TPO was developing its 2020 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The Pioneer Trail Interchange was included in both the 2020 and 2025 LRTPs. In 2008, New Smyrna Beach expressed concern about the interchange, passed a resolution opposing it and requested that it be removed from the 2025 LRTP. After lengthy discussion and public outreach, the TPO Board voted to remove the project from consideration. During the development of the 2035 LRTP, the interchange was not included in the plan. A number of studies have been done since the 1990's, including the Southeast Volusia Regional Transportation Study (SEVRTS). The

recommendations from that study did not include the interchange. Another study was undertaken by FDOT in 2005 that looked at the interaction of three interchanges, SR 44, Dunlawton and Pioneer Trail; it found that that an interchange at Pioneer Trail would not create any issues on I-95 and would actually relieve traffic on the other interchanges. Ms. Bollenback stated that Volusia County had requested that the Pioneer Trail Interchange be added to the 2035 LRTP Unfunded Needs Plan and Port Orange had passed a resolution supporting the county's request. She added that the purpose of the agenda item was to discuss the TPO's process for amending the LRTP as well as FDOT's process, Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM). Part of the amendment process is to run the project through the ETDM screening process as well as public involvement and public notice.

Ms. Lorelle Friend, Turnbull Bay resident, stated that in 2008, the TPO Board assured a concerned crowd that the Pioneer Trail Interchange would be treated as all other projects and be subjected to the same criteria. The interchange was then submitted to the 2035 LRTP Unfunded Needs List but it failed to meet the criteria established for the 2035 LRTP. She noted that I-95 through Volusia County is one of the safer sections of the interstate in Florida because it has adequate spacing between interchanges. An interchange at Pioneer Trail would reduce spacing to less than three miles between interchanges. Federal guidelines show that this would increase accidents and mortality. The extension of Williamson Boulevard down to the interchange at SR 44 is a better alternative and is currently on the 2035 LRTP. However, the segment of Williamson that runs to Pioneer has been scheduled to be completed more than 15 years prior to the segment that goes to SR 44. According to FDOT data that was provided in 2009 to the 2035 LRTP Subcommittee, scheduling of the partial extension of Williamson Boulevard to Pioneer Trail, 15 years before continuing to SR 44 would result in unnecessary local transportation disruption causing Pioneer Trail to fail. She stated that the solution is for the extension of Williamson Boulevard from Pioneer Trail to SR 44 to occur in the same five-year road plan as the extension of South Williamson Boulevard from its current terminus to Pioneer Trail.

Mr. Eric Hill, President of the Turnbull Bay Community, Inc., provided a background of his education, noting he had the mindset of an engineer. He explained his involvement with the Space Shuttle program and how during Space Shuttle Columbia's mission, management ignored the technical staff's concerns which resulted in the Columbia disaster. Mr. Hill explained that the reason he told the story was because he did not want the same thing to happen with the Pioneer Trail Interchange; he did not understand why a study would be commissioned by Port Orange, Volusia County, Edgewater and New Smyrna Beach, at a cost of \$200,000, only to be ignored. A number of years ago, the TPO Board chose to remove the interchange from LRTP as a result of the recommendations that came out of the Southeast Volusia Regional Transportation Study (SEVRTS). The study concluded that extending Williamson Boulevard down to SR 44 would alleviate the traffic more effectively than an interchange at Pioneer Trail.

Mr. Tomm Friend, Turnbull Bay resident, stated that the 2009 report that said the interchange would do no harm to the I-95 corridor did not look at whether it would harm the local roads, environment or existing neighborhood. He pointed out that Palm Coast is directing all of the traffic at their new interchange away from roads with driveways; the Pioneer Trail Interchange would put all of the traffic on the roads with driveways. When the New Smyrna Beach Utilities Commission was asked for the right-of-way to get through to SR 44, the Woodhaven commercial project stated that without access to SR 44 and its interchange, which would allow the trucks to come up Williamson to service the project, it would be a dead deal. Now, rather than continuing through to Williamson, an interchange is going to be put on Pioneer Trail, causing it to fail. He asked where the trucks would go. He stressed that the alternate solution was already on the LRTP; Williamson Boulevard as an alternate to I-95 at SR 44. Instead, the Volusia County Council wants to put in a four-lane road where there are no homes. The only reason to put in a four-lane road is because federal guidelines dictate that you cannot ask for an interchange unless it is on a four-lane road. The 2010 FHWA Sketch Study recommends that the minimum spacing between intersections be six miles and if you reduce it to three miles mortality and accidents will increase. The interchange will be funded with taxpayer money. It can be submitted for the 2040 LRTP. He stated that the only reason to ask for the 2035 LRTP to be amended is if they are looking to gain access to federal and state money from the end of the amendment period until 2015. In reference to the funding, the city of Port Orange gave the builder the right to raise \$52.5 million in tax exempt bonds. That money will not be paid back by the builder, it will be collected by the city of Port Orange and if anything goes wrong, Port Orange or Volusia County will end up paying it. He explained the Community Development District (CDD) and

the encumbrance of the land. He concluded by stating that Williamson Boulevard extension, which is already in the 2035 LRTP, should be added to the same five-year road plan.

Ms. Henrikson stated that the New Smyrna Beach City Commission was split in their vote on whether or not to support the Pioneer Trail Interchange and as a result they are keeping their policy to not support the interchange. At their April 23, 2013 city commission meeting, the Williamson Boulevard extension will be discussed because it is their preferred choice in place of the interchange. She asked if the 2009 feasibility study was the same as an interstate justification report. She asked if there was justification.

Mr. Cheney responded that he did not believe so; there was a feasibility study in 2005 which the county referenced, not the sketch plan from 2009. He added that there was no interchange justification report to his knowledge. If the interchange was added to the 2035 LRTP Unfunded Needs List it would not circumvent any of the federal processes.

Ms. Henrikson expressed concern with the TPO Board being able to do whatever it chooses even when it requires circumventing its policies. She also stated her concern with the timeframe if the TPO Board takes action in May.

Ms. Bollenback explained that LRTP amendment requests are accepted in May and November. In terms of the TPO policy, the timing for the request is correct. At the April TPO Board meeting, the discussion will be on the process and getting a sense of whether they would like to pursue this. The initial response from FDOT if the board chooses to move forward has been that they have no objections.

Mr. Holmes asked if there was a reason for the urgency.

Mr. Cheney responded that the county council strongly desires that the interchange be added to the 2035 LRTP and that he had no additional information in regards to the urgency of the request. He noted that he had heard numerous comments from citizens and Ms. Henrikson about the Williamson Boulevard extension; the county has no money and there is an ongoing disagreement on where the extension will actually go. The project is not in the county's five-year road plan and was initially envisioned as an economic development road. In reevaluating the county's strategic roads, if the Pioneer Trail Interchange is not built, the question becomes how trucks will service the commercial facilities on Pioneer Trail. He noted that many studies and discussions have taken place on the interchange. At the TPO Board meeting, some of the council's questions will be on the history of the interchange and whether it is a "new" project or if it is something that just needs to be added back. They will ask about the necessity of doing another technical review to look at what has already been done. He requested that the TPO staff provide a clear definition as to whether this meets the definition of a new project and whether a task team of the three jurisdictions as well an independent city needs to be formed to look at the process and decide what can be used and will not need to be repeated.

Mr. Paradise stated that he had been on the TCC for four years and the common theme is that there is never money and resources continue to dwindle. In light of that, it makes no sense to consider an interchange when there is no money to address the current transportation deficiencies in the county. He asked if a cost benefit analysis had been done or if need had been demonstrated. He stated that in the absence of this information, it was premature to even contemplate putting such an important and expensive improvement in the unfunded needs portion of the LRTP.

Mr. McCord stated that if the board was asking for a recommendation from the TCC, more information would need to be provided first. He added that the six-laning of I-95 was occurring well in advance of when it was anticipated. He stated that he supported following the LRTP amendment process which would conclude about the time the process for the 2040 LRTP begins. The Pioneer Trail Interchange should not be treated any differently than any other project.

Ms. Bollenback noted that the studies referenced would be posted on the TPO website. She added that she was informed that the SEVRTS was never formally completed or adopted and asked the members for assistance in obtaining the most recent version of the study prior to posting it to the website. She stressed that the TPO

may not have funding to do the data analysis at this time; funding was available during the 2035 LRTP and will be during the 2040 LRTP process.

- Mr. Goss asked why the interchange was originally removed from the LRTP.
- Mr. Cheney responded that when the 2035 LRTP was being updated there was no project champion.
- Ms. Bollenback explained that originally New Smyrna Beach asked for the interchange to be removed; the board decided not to go through the amendment process to remove it but agreed to take it off the priority list.
- Mr. Cheney, noting that FDOT has moved the six-laning of I-95 forward, asked the FDOT project managers to look at the road and the future design to see if it will accommodate a future interchange.
- Mr. Harowski noted that during the development of the Venetian Bay area, an analysis of the shell transportation network included an interchange at Pioneer Trail and the Williamson Boulevard extension as a supporting network. At that time, there was strong support from New Smyrna Beach Utilities Commission for the construction of the interchange along with supporting network of roads. Currently, the Utilities Commission has a different view. He stated that both the interchange and Williamson Boulevard needed to be looked at at the same time.
- Mr. Cichon asked which agency would be responsible to fund the ongoing repair and maintenance of interchange once completed.
- Ms. Bollenback replied that it would be considered unfunded at this point but ultimately it would be FDOT's responsibility.

E. FDOT Report

Ms. Claudia Calzaretta, FDOT TPO Liaison, briefly reviewed updates to the FDOT report.

F. Volusia County Construction Report

[Handout provided]

Mr. Cheney stated there was nothing new to report.

V. <u>Staff Comments</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated that in prior years, when three LED signal replacement projects were submitted during the call for projects, there had been a discussion about whether the projects were operational improvements eligible for funding or just maintenance projects not eligible for funding. It was decided that they did qualify for funding as operational improvements and they were added to the Work Program. She stated that she had just been notified by FDOT that FHWA did not consider them eligible for XU funding because they were considered maintenance projects. The combined cost for the three projects is \$375,000 and FDOT has asked to move that money to another project as quick as possible. TPO staff reviewed the lists and recommends that, if required, the money be placed on the Orange Avenue project in Daytona Beach.

Ms. Calzaretta stated that she had spoken with FHWA to try to categorize them as safety projects but they said the criteria had not been met. The Orange Avenue project has additional section that needs mast arms and if that is the project that the members want the money put on then she would need an updated scope.

Discussion ensued on the process that TPO staff followed in identifying a project to receive the current year funding.

Ms. Bollenback commented that she would like to receive something in writing from FDOT stating why the projects did not qualify for XU funding.

Mr. Cheney suggested moving the funding to the Orange Avenue project pending clarification from FHWA; if they reverse the decision then those three cities should be next in line to get funding next time.

Ms. Bollenback stated that staff would continue to work with FDOT to try to swap funds but if it was not possible staff would move forward with Mr. Cheney's recommendation. An update would be presented at the May TCC meeting.

Mr. Cheney pointed out that it was a federal requirement in the MUTCD to upgrade signals to LEDs.

Ms. Bollenback stated she would place a formal request for a response from FHWA.

There was a general consensus of the TCC members by a show of hands to place the money where it is most appropriate in Volusia County.

Mr. Ferrell stated when a response is received from FHWA and FDOT, the documentation should show the response as well as who provided it.

Reapportionment Plan – Status of Pending Resolutions/Transition

Ms. Bollenback reported that about ten supporting resolutions had been received and there had been an indication that some of the jurisdictions were not comfortable yet. She stated that if anyone had any questions to please let her know.

Mr. Lingenfelter asked what the issues were.

Ms. Bollenback stated that the city of Bunnell had a project funding issue, which was not related to the TPO and Palm Coast was looking for more information.

Background Information:

During the development of the 2012 Priority Project Lists, the Volusia TPO identified and ranked an Alternatives Analysis Study for a mass transit connection between SunRail in west Volusia County and the Daytona Beach International Airport. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) programmed funding for this study in FY 2015; however, changes intended to streamline project development for mass transit under MAP-21 eliminated the requirement for an Alternatives Analysis leaving some questions regarding the scope that would be needed to evaluate the project and the associated cost estimate for the work.

FDOT staff members have been in consultation over the study requirements and have developed a scope of services and cost estimate for consideration by the Volusia TPO. The cost estimate will establish the local match requirement that will have to be identified for the project to advance.

Staff from FDOT will be on hand to present this information and to answer questions regarding the proposed approach and cost estimate.

The Volusia TPO, through its priority process, annually develops seven categories of priority projects: Strategic Intermodal System Projects (SIS), Regionally Significant Non-SIS Roadway Projects, Bicycle and Pedestrian Projects, Traffic Operations/Intelligent Transportation System (ITS)/Safety Projects, Transportation Alternatives Projects, Bascule Bridges and Transit Projects.

These lists are developed through an annual "call for projects" that typically begins at the beginning of each year. Project applications submitted to the TPO are reviewed and ranked based upon the criteria developed through the committee process and approved by the Volusia TPO Board. Once adopted, the lists are transmitted to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) district office for use in allocating transportation funds to the area.

The "working" draft priority lists presented here reflect changes to the status of projects already on the lists (e.g., completed phase(s), updated cost estimates, etc.) and new XU Traffic Operations/ITS/Safety projects and XU Bicycle/Pedestrian projects received during the 2013 "call for projects." The new projects were added in ranked order according to the scores assigned by the TIP Subcommittee (Traffic Operations/ITS/Safety projects) and BPAC Project Review Subcommittee (Bicycle/Pedestrian projects).

The draft 2013 Volusia TPO Priority Project Lists are provided for your review. Please note that the Bicycle/Pedestrian priority list is presented for information only.

 - B. PRESENTATION ON THE SR 40 PROJECT DEVELOPMENT & ENVIRONMENT (PD&E) STUDY FROM BREAKAWAY TRAIL TO WILLIAMSON BOULEVARD

Background Information:

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is conducting a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study to evaluate alternative roadway concepts for the fourlane to six-lane widening of the segment of State Road (SR) 40 from Breakaway Trail to Williamson Boulevard, a distance of approximately two (2) miles. The overall goal of this study is to develop a preferred alternative concept satisfying the project purpose and need; minimizing social, economic and environmental impacts; and receiving community consensus and approval from the department and agency partners. The study team has evaluated the public and agency input received in conjunction with the technical analyses and has recommended a preferred alternative. An overview of the comparative analysis leading to this recommendation and a description of the recommended preferred alternative will be provided.

A public hearing will be held in June 2013 to receive additional public input regarding the results of study. The hearing will include a presentation along with corresponding graphical representations of the recommended preferred alternative and opportunities for public testimony.  - C. PRESENTATION ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF REGIONAL PROJECT PRIORITY LISTS THROUGH THE CENTRAL FLORIDA MPO ALLIANCE (CFMPOA)

Background Information:

The Volusia TPO participates in the Central Florida Metropolitan Planning Organization Alliance (CFMPOA). The group is comprised of six MPOs/TPOs serving the Central Florida area which meet quarterly to discuss regional transportation matters and to coordinate transportation activities. Over the past several months, the CFMPOA members have been working to develop a concept for prioritization of regional projects including strategic intermodal systems (SIS), regional trails and regional transit.

A draft concept is provided in the agenda and is being used to guide the development of regional priority project lists. The CFMPOA is looking for feedback regarding the approach and they expect to have a draft set of lists available for the Volusia TPO meetings in June. The lists are expected to reflect updated priorities being developed by each MPO/TPO as part of the current call for projects.

Regional Prioritization Initiative April 2013

The Concept

The Central Florida MPO Alliance has been active as a six-MPO forum for more than a decade, meeting quarterly to address regional transportation issues and legislative items. Although the group has been successful in building consensus on regional transportation issues, the Alliance does not have a formal role in the prioritization process with the Florida Department of Transportation. Each member-MPO individually engages with FDOT to establish priorities for transportation funding, however, the Alliance has never acted on a regional list of priorities.

An opportunity awaits for each MPO to work through the CFMPOA to collectively benefit from a regional prioritization process. By working as an Alliance to prioritize appropriate regional projects, each MPO will individually benefit while also benefitting the Central Florida Region. Through a unified approach, additional funding resources can be leveraged by working as an Alliance with the FDOT.

The Project Categories

Not all transportation projects and funding categories are appropriate for a regional approach. However, three categories have emerged through the consensus-building process. Strategic Intermodal System projects are of regional and statewide importance. Therefore SIS projects, both interstate and non-interstate projects, would be addressed by the Alliance in order to potentially leverage increased transportation resources for the region. This category would not include US highways and state roads that are funded through the FDOT's Other Arterials program.

As a result of the "Close the Gaps" initiative that began in Central Florida in 2012, Regional Trails would be a second category of transportation projects to be prioritized by the Alliance. Through this regional approach, greater resources could be leveraged by prioritizing among the five MPOs within FDOT District 5 the trail projects that could most quickly lead to completed systems of trails that connect populations and attractions, thus resulting in eco-tourism opportunities for the region. This category would include regional, showcase trails, not sidewalks, local trails and other enhancement projects.

The third category for prioritization would include regional transit projects that contribute to connectivity on a regional scale. Transit projects that cross county lines and MPO boundaries could be considered for the Alliance prioritization process. Mass transit projects like SunRail and connections to the commuter rail system would be considered for regional priority. This category would not include localized transit projects.

The Process

Each MPO adheres to an annual prioritization process to establish funding needs within individual MPO Areas. That annual process typically begins in April-May and usually concludes in August of each year in order to meet the Sept. 1 statutory deadline. September-November, the FDOT begins the process of gaming, which results in new projects entering into the FDOT's Tentative Work Program or programmed projects being advanced in the Tentative Work Program. The five District 5 MPOs working on a unified priority list will empower the FDOT to incorporate the actions of the Alliance into the new work program.

The process will respect each MPO's order of projects within the three aforementioned categories. The CFMPOA prioritization process will follow the order within each MPO's list while melding the five lists into one regional list. Costs, the scale of magnitude of projects and the cost-benefit factor of projects will be considered, as well as the urbanized population and visitor population served by projects. To achieve a sense of equity, effort will be made to rotate as feasible among the five MPOs to ensure that each MPO's priority list is respected.

The Timeline

In order to meet the FDOT's deadline for release of the Tentative Work Program, each MPO will individually follow its own process. Meanwhile, the CFMPOA will review and recommend on a draft list of priorities beginning at the April meeting. Opportunity for further comment will remain open from April until July. Just prior to the July meeting, the executive directors will reconvene to refine the priority list for presentation to the Alliance. Based on action by the CFMPOA, the priority list will be compared to each individual MPO's priority list to ensure consistency with individual MPO priorities. Final action will occur in August on each individual MPO's List of Priority Projects.

Once each MPO has taken action and transmitted their LOPPs to the FDOT, the executive directors will reconvene to review actions and to make a determination if changes are needed to the CFMPOA priority list. The finalized list will be presented to the Alliance at the October meeting for ratification and the list will be formally transmitted to the FDOT. From the time of adoption of each individual MPO's LOPP until ratification by the Alliance, the executive directors will remain in communication

with FDOT personnel on the pending CFMPOA priority list to ensure awareness of progress on the regional effort.

The Outcomes

Once the CFMPOA ratifies the list in October, a landmark moment occurs in Florida as an unprecedented level of regional transportation coordination is formalized. For each of the three project categories, the potential outcomes are unique. For SIS priorities, the regional list affords the Central Office of FDOT an opportunity to look at the Central Florida Region in a new manner. When examining the potential funding of megaprojects, a unified list incorporating the five MPO's and nine counties of District 5, and potentially Polk County and the Polk County TPO, will enhance the process between MPOs and the FDOT of establishing priorities and programming funds. The planned outcome is the leveraging of greater resources to the region.

In light of the changes in federal funding opportunities for regional trail projects, a unified list of regional trail priorities is critical to meeting the goals of the "Close the Gaps" initiative. Leveraging additional FDOT funds is the focus of the regional trail priority list. By creating a master list of regional trail projects, ordered by phases so that shovel-ready projects are top priority, District 5 will have an opportunity to program funds for multiple projects. The result would be the expedited construction of multiple trail segments that will begin closing the gaps in the regional network. This approach will catalyze an eco-tourism opportunity of national and international proportions.

Regarding regional transit projects, the CFMPOA process is focused on mass transit that has regional implications beyond localized transit services. The Alliance list is intended to coalesce efforts throughout the region into a unified approach. Rail and bus-rapid-transit projects would be the focus of the CFMPOA list, while localized transit services would remain part of each individual MPO's prioritization process. This approach will aid the FDOT in developing a regional mass transit vision for Central Florida beyond the initial phases of SunRail.
