The Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund pays for planning activities that serve transportation disadvantaged and disabled persons in Volusia County. The grant funding is distributed by formula and a resolution and grant application are required to be submitted annually to support TPO activities.

L. REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2020-13 AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF THE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION AGREEMENT FOR THE USE OF FEDERAL PLANNING FUNDS. The Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement established between the FDOT and the River to Sea TPO provides funding for the completion of transportation related planning activities set forth in the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) approved by the R2CTPO Board in May. The agreement states the terms and conditions upon which Federal funds will be provided, and sets forth the manner in which work tasks within the UPWP will be undertaken and completed. The existing agreement covering Fiscal Years (FY) 2018/19 to 2019/20 expires on June 30, 2020. This updated agreement will cover TPO planning activities for Fiscal Years 2020/21 to 2021/22, and will take effect on July 1, 2020.

#### M. REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S CONTRACT AND SALARY RECOMMENDATION A performance evaluation of the River to Sea TPO's Executive Director was completed late 2019. Additionally, the employment agreement for the Director expired on March 1, 2020. Based upon the satisfactory results of the evaluation and a review of peer agencies, the Executive Committee recommends renewing the employment contract for another three (3) year period and increasing the base salary from \$110,000 annually to \$120,000 annually. No other changes are proposed.

#### I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum

The meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Board was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by TPO Chairperson Rob Gilliland. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held online and via teleconference pursuant to the Florida Governor's Executive Orders 20-62 and 20-114 which suspended the Florida Statutes that require a physical quorum to be present in person and allows the use of telephone and video conferencing. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was present online.

Ms. Stewart announced that Vice Mayor Bryan, Daytona Beach Shores, would be the voting member for the Small City Alliance.

MOTION: A motion was made by Volusia County Council Chair Kelley to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion was seconded by Council Member Wheeler which carried unanimously.

#### V. <u>Action Items</u>

#### A. <u>Review and Approval of Resolution 2020-06 Adopting the FY 2020/21 and 2021/22 Unified Planning Work</u> <u>Program (UPWP)</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO develops the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) every two years; it is the Work Program that identifies the work TPO staff will be undertaking over the next two years and will take effect July 1, 2020. It includes the deliverables and how projects and programs will be funded. The draft UPWP tasks and funding allocations were presented in February; the complete document was then compiled and submitted to FDOT and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) for review and comment. They

provided comments and the draft was updated; a link to the full document was provided in the agenda. The FDOT and FHWA comment letters were added to the appendix to the document.

#### MOTION: A motion was made by Volusia County Council Chair Kelley to approve Resolution 2020-06 adopting the FY 2020/21 and 2021/22 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The motion was seconded by Vice Mayor Ramos and carried unanimously.

#### B. <u>Review and Approval of River to Sea TPO Board Slate of Officers for FY 2020/21</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated each year as the term of the current TPO Chairperson ends a slate of officers is proposed for the upcoming fiscal year (FY) to take effect on July 1, 2020 for FY 2020/21. The Executive Committee met on May 6, 2020 and proposed the following slate of officers: Commissioner McGuirk will move from 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Chair to Chairperson; Council Member Wheeler from 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice Chair to 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Chair and Council Member Girtman has been recommended as to 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice Chair.

#### MOTION: A motion was made by Volusia County Council Chair Kelley to approve the River to Sea TPO Board slate of officers for FY 2020/21. The motion was seconded by Council Member Allebach and carried unanimously.

#### C. <u>Review and Approval of Resolution 2020-07 Adopting the Sea Level Rise Planning Policy Statement</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated planning and responding to sea level rise is an important component to resiliency planning which is a requirement for TPOs. The Sea Level Rise Planning Policy Statement recognizes model predictions and the varying nature of those estimates and is provided for review and approval.

#### MOTION: A motion was made by Council Member Wheeler to approve Resolution 2020-07 adopting the Sea Level Rise Planning Policy Statement. The motion was seconded by Council Member Girtman and carried unanimously.

#### D. <u>Review and Approval of Revised Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Public Involvement</u> <u>Plan (PIP)</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Public Involvement Plan (PIP) was developed prior to the onset of COVID-19 and the resulting restrictions placed on public gatherings; in response, the TPO has amended the format to incorporate virtual technology as part of the public outreach activities. A video platform was used yesterday to discuss the needs plan with the public and presentations regarding the Connect 2045 LRTP were given to various Rotary Clubs using virtual technology. Public comments received have been as much, if not more than, traditional public outreach.

#### MOTION: A motion was made by Volusia County Chair Kelley to approve the revised Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Public Involvement Plan (PIP). The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lindlau and carried unanimously.

#### VI. <u>Presentations and Discussion Items</u>

#### A. Presentation and Discussion of the Development of the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)

Ms. Bollenback stated the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) is a lengthy and comprehensive document that usually takes one to two years to develop. She encouraged members to contact staff with any questions or comments they may have regarding the development of the 2045 LRTP. She introduced Mr. Jim Wood and Mr. William Roll, Kimley-Horn, to give the presentation.

Mr. Jim Wood, Kimley-Horn, gave a presentation of the alternative scenarios and technical scoring criteria. He reviewed the resiliency scenario first and gave the 2040 horizon year of sea level rise upper and lower boundaries. He reviewed the potential impact to projects identified as needs as well as the corresponding

maps. The intent is to look at increased sea level rise, sustained water levels and its influence on the road structure. There are existing facilities that could be potentially impacted and were identified in previous resiliency studies conducted by the TPO; they will be documented in the LRTP.

Mr. Wood reviewed the technology scenario and stated it builds on prior TPO studies and is combined with scenarios from FDOT's regional planning model. It is used to identify and create a prioritized set of projects that would provide potential good gains and would be most appropriate for technology improvements moving forward. The 2045 LRTP Subcommittee recommended that \$40 million be set aside for technology projects as part of the long range planning process; this is consistent with the 2040 LRTP where \$38 million was set aside. Technical scoring criteria were used to develop the prioritized list of potential projects; however, two of the criteria have not been completed yet (Activity Center for Tourism and Economic Activity and Unique Attributes).

Mr. William Roll, Kimley-Horn, gave a presentation on the development of the draft preliminary Cost Feasible Plan. He reviewed the projects in the three roadway categories that were identified for funding in the LRTP. The first category, Group A, is Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) projects; roadway corridors that FDOT prioritizes and funds with state funding. Group B is other state roadways and local initiatives projects that are funded with state funds or a mix of state funds. The third category is local roads; major city or county roads. He reviewed the projects from the needs assessment and explained how they were prioritized using the technical criteria. He referred to Group B and stated the TPO has the ability to prioritize these projects and submit them to FDOT to fund a phase in order to move it forward. He reviewed the top five identified projects which are protected as a matter of TPO policy. This is also the category in which the \$40 million was recommended for technology projects. He explained how the projected revenue of \$497 million was reached. Out of this funding category, the TPO can flex the full 10% of this revenue to fund local initiatives projects; this funding category, the Cost Feasible Plan with the remaining funding and asked the members for guidance on any project being included or excluded from the Cost Feasible Plan.

Chairperson Gilliland commented the 10% set aside used to fund local projects has been done for quite a period of time; he asked if members had any objection to continuing this strategy of funding set aside. There were no objections. He referred to the proposed list of projects for consideration to be included in the 2045 LRTP and asked if members had any questions.

Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO's revenue estimates are based on state and federal funding; by law, state funding must be used on state roads but federal funding can be used on local roads. This is important to cities such as Deltona and Palm Coast that have many local roads and few state roads; it is also important for Volusia County. The TPO wants to confirm the direction that the amount of available federal funding for local roads be used to fund projects on those roads off the state highway system which is consistent with the last LRTP.

Chairperson Gilliland commented the TPO is continuing on the path of the 2040 LRTP and asked if there are any objections or suggestions on a different strategy; there were none. This will be back for action in June.

Ms. Bollenback clarified the TPO will not be asking for the project list to be adopted next month but for approval for it to go out for final public comment regarding the projects the TPO is considering for the Cost Feasible Plan and which ones will fall into the needs sections. Public outreach will be conducted through July and the draft project list and plan will be back for review in August and adoption in September.

#### B. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft FY 2020/21 to 2024/25 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Ms. Nicoulin stated every year the TPO develops the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); the current fiscal year is dropped and a new fifth year is added to the out year which is 2024/25. The TIP is a five-year program of transportation funding activity that includes a variety of activities such as construction funding, right-of-way acquisition, engineering, design, etc. The TPO works with FDOT to identify projects that are moving into the TIP for funding. She reviewed the notable, new projects being moved into the new TIP. Links to the new draft TIP as well as the Comparison Report were provided to members for review; she encouraged the members to review the document and provide comments. It is a large document and suggested they focus

on projects important to them or that are in the area they represent. Comments received will be incorporated into the document and it will be made available for public review. The final updated draft TIP will be presented next month for approval.

#### C. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Update to the R2CTPO's Public Participation Plan (PPP)</u>

Ms. Bollenback stated the Public Participation Plan (PPP) is the document that outlines the ways for the public to provide input and how the TPO will encourage and promote public participation. Due to COVID-19 and social restrictions, the Governor issued an Executive Order to allow the use of virtual meetings; this method of holding meetings is new to the TPO which requires the PPP to be updated. Updates to the PPP require a 45-day public comment period which began on May 10, 2020 and will run through June 24, 2020 when the TPO Board will take action on the amendment to the PPP. Changes to PPP include verbiage to hold virtual meetings when physical meetings are not feasible due to unusual emergency situations and/or when prohibited by federal, state, county or local guidance.

#### D. Presentation and Update of Non-Motorized Traffic Count Program

Mr. Harris gave a PowerPoint presentation update of the Non-Motorized Traffic Count Program and stated the purpose of the program is to collect non-motorized vehicle data using automated counters and provide decision-making information to improve bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, safety, planning and programming decisions. He reviewed the fiscal year 2020/21 tentative project schedule. The TPO will have to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with FDOT for the short-term mobile counters and hopes to begin operations between April and June 2021.

#### E. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft River to Sea TPO 2020 List of Priority Projects (LOPP)

Ms. Nicoulin stated that during the annual Call for Projects local governments submit applications for competition of funds set aside in the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) specific to bicycle/pedestrian and traffic operations projects. The TIP Subcommittee reviews the traffic operations project applications and the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee reviews the bicycle/pedestrian project applications; the applications are ranked, scored, and incorporated into the draft List of Priority Projects (LOPP). Cost estimates for projects on the LOPP are also updated at this time. The draft LOPP and supporting documentation was provided yesterday. She noted the format was changed last year from a strikethrough/underline format to an Excel spreadsheet to allow projects to be searched for more easily. She reviewed the changes and new projects added to the LOPP. Mr. Harris is available to answer any questions regarding the projects on the bicycle/pedestrian list. A new list was added this year for planning studies funded with SU funds; she reviewed the SU funding amounts available for the next fiscal year.

#### F. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Connected and Automated Vehicle (CAV) Readiness and Technology</u> <u>Transition Plan</u>

Ms. Bollenback introduced Ms. Abby Morgan, Kittelson and Associates, to give the presentation on the Connected Automated Vehicle (CAV) Readiness and Technology Transition Plan.

Ms. Morgan gave a PowerPoint presentation and stated she has been working with the TPO to understand the impacts of new technologies including CAVs on the planning area and how to focus not only on normal plans and policies but communication and coordination among local agencies to educate ourselves on new technologies and plan for their impacts. She reviewed the four steps used to conduct the study; they focused not only on CAVs but also on the impacts of many emerging technologies they expect to see in the planning. They considered ride share services, and micro-mobility devices such as electric bikes, etc. They outlined what the training and resources will be as well as how to share data across agencies and the private sector. They also reviewed existing plans and policies to be able to keep pace with new and emerging technologies. They met with local agencies and reviewed regional and local plans. While we do not yet know what the impacts of CAVs are going to be, we can start collecting and monitoring data to identify trends and changes to land use and transportation planning to address in future plans. Local stakeholders have stated they need to improve

their communication and knowledge sharing across agencies, both public and private. They also reached out to developers, law enforcement, universities, etc. for input. The TPO will form a working group to help create opportunities to share information and identify potential pilot projects. Technology is changing so rapidly we have to adapt the planning process to keep up. The key part of this study was to develop readiness goals regarding new technologies; these are mobility, accessibility, safety and equity and they align with the TPO's overall planning goals. Much more detail regarding new and emerging technologies as well as recommendations for the next steps are provided in the full report.

#### G. Presentation and Discussion of Draft FY 2020/21 River to Sea TPO Budget

Ms. Bollenback stated each year the TPO staff reviews the projected revenues and proposes a new budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The draft budget and background materials were reviewed by the Budget Subcommittee on April 24, 2020. The TPO budget revenues and expenditures typically remain stable. The TPO receives funding from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the Federal Transit Administration and local match funds as well. One primary change is to the Special Studies which are studies that use SU funding and includes the development of the 2045 LRTP. The other changes are minor.

Council Member Wheeler commented that during the Budget Subcommittee discussion, the membership fees charged to each city and county within the TPO planning area was discussed. The committee directed staff to research how long the \$.10 per capita policy had been in place; she asked if that information had been found.

Ms. Bollenback replied she has not had the opportunity to review the details; the Executive Committee also directed staff to research the member assessment and conduct a peer review with other MPOs.

Council Member Wheeler commented the 2020 Census is being conducted and the population will be updated; she believes the amount is well under what is needed and that everyone needs funding. She encouraged members to think about this and take it to their staff for consideration.

Chairperson Gilliland noted the member assessment has not changed in a long time and it is worth exploring and to see how we compare to other TPOs.

#### H. Presentation and Discussion of FDOT Continuing Services Contract and R2CTPO Local Match Requirements

Ms. Bollenback stated the Local Agency Program (LAP) allows local governments to implement projects using federal funds. They enter into an agreement with FDOT and FDOT reimburses the local governments as they pursue those projects. TPO policy requires a 10% local match for these projects which is typically met when the local government submits invoices for reimbursement; FDOT withholds 10% of the reimbursement. FDOT has established a continuing services contract for design services, construction, engineering and inspection (CEI) which are required. By utilizing this continuing services contract, local governments can use it to issue a scope of services with FDOT and not have to issue a request for proposal (RFP); this will save time and money. This is not a requirement but an option for local governments if needed. FDOT is asking for the TPO's preference on how to provide the local match. This is not a policy issue and the TPO will move forward by providing direction to FDOT; however, she wanted to ensure TPO Board members are aware of this opportunity and inform them of the choices regarding the local match. They can execute the agreement with FDOT, estimate what the match will be, and amend the agreement to what the actual match is when bids are received. The other option is the TPO could approve 100% funding for the design phase and have the local government make up the local match later during the construction phase. One potential problem with that option is if there is a problem and the project stops moving forward, money will have been outlaid without the match being met. FDOT would prefer it not be a patchwork; that the TPO makes a decision and stays with it.

Volusia County Council Chair Kelley stated he would be remiss if he did not mention that the 10% local match needs to be revisited at some point.

Councilman Schoenherr asked if FDOT has chosen the engineering firm for the continuing services contract.

Ms. Bollenback replied she believes the contract has been executed but is not she sure of the firm chosen; she will find out and forward the information to members and their staff.

#### I. FDOT Report

The FDOT report was provided in the agenda.

#### VII. <u>Executive Director's Report</u>

Ms. Bollenback announced Interim FDOT D-5 Secretary, Mr. Jared Purdue, has been appointed as D-5 Secretary permanently.

#### → Update on 2020 "Tell the TPO" Survey

Ms. Blankenship stated the 2020 "Tell the TPO" survey kicked off March 30, 2020 and runs through May 30, 2020. The goal for the 2020 "Tell the TPO" survey is 3,000 responses; currently 851 responses have been received which is far from where she had hoped for it to be prior to COVID-19. Due to COVID-19, outreach has been different during this survey; the TPO worked with the public libraries which included a survey with their curbside book pick-up service. Social media has also been used extensivelyto get the word out. She referred to the ambassador challenge and announced currently, Vice Mayor Ramos is in the lead with 59 responses and Council Member Allebach, the reigning champion, is not far behind with 56 responses. Mayor Chasez is in third place with 21 responses. She will resend the individual TPO Board member links again today and encouraged members to share that link with family, friends, and colleagues. The survey website, <u>www.tellthetpo.com</u>, has a tool kit with rack cards, brochures, the survey, newsletter verbiage, etc. If members need help, please contact her and she will provide what is needed.

#### $\rightarrow$ Update on SU Funding/Work Program

Ms. Bollenback stated as we reach the end of the fiscal year and develop a new List of Priority Projects (LOPP) there is no new activity until the new LOPP is completed. There are a couple of projects in discussion now that are experiencing funding increases and changes in scope; she will have more information next month.

Ms. Bollenback referred to the information items and the letter of support from the TPO for Volusia County's BUILD grant application to fund transportation needs in the area.

#### VIII. River to Sea TPO Board Member Comments

Volusia County Council Chair Kelley announced at yesterday's Volusia County Council meeting, the council adopted a proposal to offer to the cities up to \$15 million the county has allocated to assist with COVID-19 expenses as well as the program in effect to help residents with mortgage and rent issues. Assistance is also available for small businesses and non-profit organizations.

Chairperson Gilliland thanked the Volusia County Council members for their decisions and as a representative of the city of Daytona Beach, he appreciates all they are doing to help.

THIS METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION AGREEMENT (Agreement) is made and entered into on this day of \_\_\_\_\_\_ 2020, by and between the STATE OF FLORIDA, DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (Department), an agency of the State of Florida, whose address is Office of the District Secretary, 719 South Woodland Boulevard and the [River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (MPO), whose address is 2570 West International Speedway, Suite 100, Daytona Beach, Florida 32114, and whose Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) Number is: 1398928190000 (collectively the "parties").

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and representation herein, the parties desiring to be legally bound, do agree as follows:

- Authority: The MPO and the Department have authority to enter into this Agreement pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 23 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR or C.F.R.) §450 and Section 339.175, Florida Statutes (F.S.), which, require the Department and the MPO to enter into an agreement clearly identifying the responsibilities for cooperatively carrying out the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) portion of the Metropolitan Planning Process and accomplishing the transportation planning requirements of state and federal law.
- 2. Purpose of the Agreement: The purpose of this Agreement is to pass through financial assistance through the Department in the form of FHWA funds to the MPO for the completion of transportation related planning activities set forth in the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) of the MPO (Project), state the terms and conditions upon which FHWA funds will be provided, and set forth the manner in which work tasks and subtasks within the UPWP will be undertaken and completed. The Project is more fully described in the UPWP, which is attached and incorporated into this Agreement as Exhibit "A".
- 3. Scope of Work: The UPWP, Exhibit "A", constitutes the Scope of Work for this Agreement.
- **4. Project Cost:** The total budgetary ceiling for the Project is \$2,042,969.00. The budget, including tasks, is summarized below and detailed in the UPWP, Exhibit "A". The budget may be modified by mutual agreement as provided for in paragraph 8, Amendments.

The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature. No work shall begin before the Agreement is fully executed and a "Letter of Authorization" is issued by the Department. The total of all authorizations shall not exceed the budgetary ceiling established for this agreement and shall be completed within the term of this Agreement:

- 5. Non-federal Share: The Department uses the U.S. Department of Transportation sliding scale federal/non-federal match ratio for metropolitan planning funds. This ratio is 81.93 percent federal and 18.07 percent non-federal. It is the policy of the Department to use a "soft match" using toll credits as authorized by Title 23 U.S.C. (Section 120) for the non-federal share for all FHWA sliding scale eligible funding programs. The MPO must identify and describe the soft match in its 2-year UPWP introduction and show the total amount of toll credits used to match the FHWA funds in the UPWP Summary Budget Tables.
- 6. Term of Agreement: This Agreement shall have a term of two (2) years. This Agreement shall begin on the later of July 1, 2020 or the date the Agreement is fully executed, whichever is later and expire on June 30, 2022. If the

Agreement is fully executed after July 1, 2020, then the term of the Agreement shall be less than two (2) years and the Agreement shall expire on June 30, 2022. Expiration of this Agreement will be considered termination of the Project. The cost of any work performed after the expiration date of this Agreement will not be reimbursed by the Department.

- 7. Renewals and Extensions: This Agreement shall not be renewed or extended.
- 8. Amendments: Amendments may be made during the term of this Agreement. Any amendment must be in writing and signed by both parties with the same formalities as the original Agreement.
  - A. Modifications versus Amendments to the UPWP: Modifications and amendments to the UPWP budget may occur periodically. Modifications shall not increase the FHWA approved UPWP final total budget or change the scope of the FHWA approved work tasks. If the MPO makes a modification to the UPWP budget, then the MPO shall immediately send any such modifications to the Department. The Department will then forward the modifications to FHWA. Each budget category subtotal and individual line item costs contained in this Agreement are only estimates. The total budgetary ceiling cannot be exceeded, however shifts between budget categories and budget line items are acceptable and shall not require an amendment of the UPWP or this Agreement. Changes in the scope of an approved work task, the addition or deletion of an approved work task, or changes altering the total funding of an FHWA approved UPWP shall be considered amendments to the UPWP. Amendments to the UPWP must be approved by FHWA. Proposed amendments to the UPWP shall be filed with the Department. Within a reasonable amount of time, the Department shall review and transmit the proposed UPWP amendment and supporting documents to the FHWA with a recommendation for approval or denial. Transmittal of the proposed UPWP amendment and supporting documents to FHWA may be delayed by the Department due to the MPO failing to include all documentation required for the UPWP amendment. The Department shall immediately forward to the MPO all correspondence that the Department receives from FHWA regarding the proposed UPWP amendment. If FHWA approves the amendment to the UPWP then this Agreement and supporting documentation must be amended immediately following such approval.

#### 9. General Requirements:

- A. The MPO shall complete the Project with all practical dispatch in a sound, economical, and efficient manner, and in accordance with the provisions in this Agreement, the Interlocal Agreement establishing the MPO, and all applicable laws.
- B. Federal-aid funds shall not participate in any cost which is not incurred in conformity with applicable Federal and State laws, the regulations in 23 C.F.R. and 49 C.F.R., and policies and procedures prescribed by the Division Administrator of FHWA. If FHWA or the Department determines that any amount claimed is not eligible, federal participation may be approved in the amount determined to be adequately supported and the Department shall notify the MPO in writing citing the reasons why items and amounts are not eligible for federal participation. Where correctable non-compliance with provisions of law or FHWA requirements exists, Federal funds may be withheld until compliance is obtained. Where non-compliance is not correctable, FHWA or the Department may deny participation in Project costs in part or in total. Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.
- **C.** The MPO's financial management system must comply with the requirements set forth in 2 CFR §200.302, specifically:
  - i. Identification, in its accounts, of all Federal awards received and expended and the Federal programs under which they were received.
  - **ii.** Accurate, current, and complete disclosure of the financial results of each Federal award or program in accordance with the reporting requirements set forth in §§200.327 Financial reporting and 200.328 Monitoring and reporting program performance.
  - **iii.** Records that identify adequately the source and application of funds for federally-funded activities. These records must contain information pertaining to Federal awards, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, expenditures, income and interest and be supported by source documentation.
  - iv. Effective control over, and accountability for, all funds, property, and other assets.

#### STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION AGREEMENT

- v. Comparison of expenditures with budget amounts for each Federal award.
- vi. Written procedures to implement the requirements of §200.305 Payment.
- vii. Written procedures for determining the allowability of costs in accordance with Subpart E—Cost Principles of this part and the terms and conditions of the Federal award.

#### 10. Compensation and Payment:

- A. The Department shall reimburse the MPO for costs incurred to perform services satisfactorily during a monthly or quarterly period in accordance with Scope of Work, Exhibit "A". Reimbursement is limited to the maximum amount authorized by the Department. The MPO shall submit a request for reimbursement to the Department on a quarterly or monthly basis. Requests for reimbursement by the MPO shall include an invoice, an itemized expenditure report, and progress report for the period of services being billed that are acceptable to the Department. The MPO shall use the format for the invoice, itemized expenditure report and progress report that is approved by the Department. The MPO shall provide any other data required by FHWA or the Department to justify and support the payment requested.
- **B.** Pursuant to Section 287.058, Florida Statutes, the MPO shall provide quantifiable, measurable, and verifiable units of deliverables. Each deliverable must specify the required minimum level of service to be performed and the criteria for evaluating successful completion. The Project and the quantifiable, measurable, and verifiable units of deliverables are described in Exhibit "A".
- **C.** Invoices shall be submitted by the MPO in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit based on the quantifiable, measurable and verifiable units of deliverables as established in Exhibit "A". Deliverables must be received and accepted in writing by the Department's Grant Manager prior to payments.
- D. The Department will honor requests for reimbursement to the MPO for eligible costs in the amount of FHWA funds approved for reimbursement in the UPWP and made available by FHWA. The Department may suspend or terminate payment for that portion of the Project which FHWA, or the Department acting in lieu of FHWA, may designate as ineligible for federal-aid. In regard to eligible costs, whichever requirement is more strict between federal and State of Florida requirements shall control. Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.
- E. Supporting documentation must establish that the deliverables were received and accepted in writing by the MPO and must also establish that the required minimum level of service to be performed based on the criteria for evaluating successful completion as specified in the UPWP, Exhibit "A", was met. All costs charged to the Project, including any approved services contributed by the MPO or others, shall be supported by properly executed payrolls, time records, invoices, contracts or vouchers evidencing in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges.
- F. Bills for travel expenses specifically authorized in this Agreement shall be documented on the Department's Contractor Travel Form No. 300-000-06 or on a form that was previously submitted to the Department's Comptroller and approved by the Department of Financial Services. Bills for travel expenses specifically authorized in this Agreement will be paid in accordance with Section 112.061 Florida Statutes.
- **G.** Payment shall be made only after receipt and approval of goods and services unless advance payments are authorized by the Chief Financial Officer of the State of Florida under Chapters 215 and 216, Florida Statutes. If the Department determines that the performance of the MPO fails to meet minimum performance levels, the Department shall notify the MPO of the deficiency to be corrected, which correction shall be made within a time-frame to be specified by the Department. The MPO shall, within sixty (60) days after notice from the Department, provide the Department with a corrective action plan describing how the MPO will address all issues of contract non-performance, unacceptable performance, failure to meet the minimum performance levels, deliverable deficiencies, or contract non-compliance. If the corrective action plan is unacceptable to the Department, the MPO shall be assessed a non-performance retainage equivalent to 10% of the total invoice amount. The retainage shall be applied to the invoice for the thencurrent billing period. The retainage shall be withheld until the MPO resolves the deficiency. If the deficiency is subsequently resolved, the MPO may bill the Department for the retained amount during the next billing period. If the MPO is unable to resolve the deficiency, the funds retained may be forfeited at the end of the Agreement's term.

- H. An invoice submitted to the Department involving the expenditure of metropolitan planning funds ("PL funds") is required by Federal law to be reviewed by the Department and issued a payment by the Department of Financial Services within 15 business days of receipt by the Department for review. If the invoice is not complete or lacks information necessary for processing, it will be returned to the MPO, and the 15-business day timeframe for processing will start over upon receipt of the resubmitted invoice by the Department. If there is a case of a bona fide dispute, the invoice recorded in the financial system of the Department shall contain a statement of the dispute and authorize payment only in the amount not disputed. If an item is disputed and is not paid, a separate invoice could be submitted requesting reimbursement, or the disputed item/amount could be included/added to a subsequent invoice.
- I. Records of costs incurred under the terms of this Agreement shall be maintained and made available upon request to the Department at all times during the period of this Agreement and for five years after final payment is made. Copies of these documents and records shall be furnished to the Department upon request. Records of costs incurred include the MPO's general accounting records and the project records, together with supporting documents and records, of the consultant and all subconsultants performing work on the project, and all other records of the Consultants and subconsultants considered necessary by the Department for a proper audit of costs.
- J. The MPO must timely submit invoices and documents necessary for the close out of the Project. Within 90 days of the expiration or termination of the grant of FHWA funds for the UPWP, the MPO shall submit the final invoice and all financial, performance, and related reports consistent with 2 CFR §200.
- **K.** The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is also contingent upon FHWA making funds available and approving the expenditure of such funds.
- L. In the event this Agreement is in excess of \$25,000 and has a term for a period of more than one year, the provisions of Section 339.135(6)(a), Florida Statutes, are hereby incorporated:

"The Department, during any fiscal year, shall not expend money, incur any liability, or enter into any contract which, by its terms, involves the expenditure of money in excess of the amounts budgeted as available for expenditure during such fiscal year. Any contract, verbal or written, made in violation of this subsection is null and void, and no money may be paid on such contract. The Department shall require a statement from the comptroller of the Department that funds are available prior to entering into any such contract or other binding commitment of funds. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the making of contracts for periods exceeding 1 year, but any contract so made shall be executory only for the value of the services to be rendered or agreed to be paid for in succeeding fiscal years, and this paragraph shall be incorporated verbatim in all contracts of the Department which are for an amount in excess of \$25,000 and which have a term for a period of more than 1 year."

M. Disallowed Costs: In determining the amount of the payment, the Department will exclude all Project costs incurred by the MPO prior to the effective date of this Agreement, costs incurred by the MPO which are not provided for in the latest approved budget for the Project, and costs attributable to goods or services received under a contract or other arrangements which have not been approved in writing by the Department. It is agreed by the MPO that where official audits by the federal agencies or monitoring by the Department discloses that the MPO has been reimbursed by the Department for ineligible work, under applicable federal and state regulations, that the value of such ineligible items may be deducted by the Department from subsequent reimbursement requests following determination of ineligibility. Upon receipt of a notice of ineligible items the MPO may present evidence supporting the propriety of the questioned reimbursements. Such evidence will be evaluated by the Department, and the MPO will be given final notification of the amounts, if any, to be deducted from subsequent reimbursement requests.

In addition, the MPO agrees to promptly reimburse the Department for any and all amounts for which the Department has made payment to the MPO if such amounts become ineligible, disqualified, or disallowed for federal reimbursement due to any act, error, omission, or negligence of the MPO. This includes omission or deficient documentation of costs and charges, untimely, incomplete, or insufficient submittals, or any other reason declared by the applicable Federal Agency.

Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.

- **N.** If, after Project completion, any claim is made by the Department resulting from an audit or for work or services performed pursuant to this Agreement, the Department may offset such amount from payments due for work or services done under any agreement which it has with the MPO owing such amount if, upon demand, payment of the amount is not made within 60 days to the Department. Offsetting any amount pursuant to this paragraph shall not be considered a breach of contract by the Department. Any determination by the Department made pursuant to this section of the Agreement is subject to the conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement.
- **O. Indirect Costs:** A state or federally approved indirect cost rate may be applied to the Agreement. If the MPO does not have a federally approved indirect cost rate, a rate up to the de minimis indirect cost rate of 10% of modified total direct costs may be applied. The MPO may opt to request no indirect cost rate, even if it has a federally approved indirect cost rate.

#### **11. Procurement and Contracts of the MPO**

- **A.** The procurement, use, and disposition of real property, equipment and supplies shall be consistent with the approved UPWP and in accordance with the requirements of 2 CFR §200.
- **B.** It is understood and agreed by the parties to this Agreement that participation by the Department in a project with the MPO, where said project involves a consultant contract for engineering, architecture or surveying services, is contingent on the MPO's complying in full with provisions of Section 287.055, Florida Statutes, Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act, the federal Brooks Act, 23 C.F.R. 172, and 23 U.S.C. 112. At the discretion of the Department, the MPO will involve the Department, to an extent to be determined by the Department, in the consultant selection process for all projects funded under this Agreement. In all cases, the MPO shall certify to the Department that selection has been accomplished in compliance with the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act and the federal Brooks Act.
- **C.** The MPO shall comply with, and require its consultants and contractors to comply with applicable federal law pertaining to the use of federal-aid funds.
- **12. Audit Reports:** The administration of resources awarded through the Department to the MPO by this Agreement may be subject to audits and/or monitoring by the Department. The following requirements do not limit the authority of the Department to conduct or arrange for the conduct of additional audits or evaluations of Federal awards or limit the authority of any State agency inspector general, the State of Florida Auditor General or any other State official. The MPO shall comply with all audit and audit reporting requirements as specified below.
  - A. In addition to reviews of audits conducted in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, monitoring procedures may include but not be limited to on-site visits by Department staff and/or other procedures including, reviewing any required performance and financial reports, following up, ensuring corrective action, and issuing management decisions on weaknesses found through audits when those findings pertain to Federal awards provided through the Department by this Agreement. By entering into this Agreement, the MPO agrees to comply and cooperate fully with any monitoring procedures/processes deemed appropriate by the Department. The MPO further agrees to comply and cooperate with any inspections, reviews, investigations or audits deemed necessary by the Department, State of Florida Chief Financial Officer (CFO) or State of Florida Auditor General.
  - **B.** The MPO, a non-Federal entity as defined by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, as a subrecipient of a Federal award awarded by the Department through this Agreement is subject to the following requirements:
    - i. In the event the MPO expends a total amount of Federal awards equal to or in excess of the threshold established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, the MPO must have a Federal single or program-specific audit for such fiscal year conducted in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements. Exhibit "B", Federal Financial Assistance (Single Audit Act), to this Agreement provides the required Federal award

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identification information needed by the MPO to further comply with the requirements of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F – Audit Requirements. In determining Federal awards expended in a fiscal year, the MPO must consider all sources of Federal awards based on when the activity related to the Federal award occurs, including the Federal award provided through the Department by this Agreement. The determination of amounts of Federal awards expended should be in accordance with the guidelines established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F – Audit Requirements. An audit conducted by the State of Florida Auditor General in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F – Audit Requirements, will meet the requirements of this part.

- **ii.** In connection with the audit requirements, the MPO shall fulfill the requirements relative to the auditee responsibilities as provided in 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements.
- iii. In the event the MPO expends less than the threshold established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, in Federal awards, the MPO is exempt from Federal audit requirements for that fiscal year. However, the MPO must provide a single audit exemption statement to the Department at <u>FDOTSingleAudit@dot.state.fl.us</u> no later than nine months after the end of the MPO's audit period for each applicable audit year. In the event the MPO expends less than the threshold established by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, in Federal awards in a fiscal year and <u>elects</u> to have an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, the cost of the audit must be paid from non-Federal resources (*i.e.*, the cost of such an audit must be paid from the MPO's resources obtained from other than Federal entities).
- iv. The MPO must electronically submit to the Federal Audit Clearinghouse (FAC) at <u>https://harvester.census.gov/facweb/</u> the audit reporting package as required by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, within the earlier of 30 calendar days after receipt of the auditor's report(s) or nine months after the end of the audit period. The FAC is the repository of record for audits required by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, and this Agreement. However, the Department requires a copy of the audit reporting package also be submitted to FDOTSingleAudit@dot.state.fl.us within the earlier of 30 calendar days after receipt of the auditor's report(s) or nine months after the end of the audit period as required by 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements.
- v. Within six months of acceptance of the audit report by the FAC, the Department will review the MPO's audit reporting package, including corrective action plans and management letters, to the extent necessary to determine whether timely and appropriate action on all deficiencies has been taken pertaining to the Federal award provided through the Department by this Agreement. If the MPO fails to have an audit conducted in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, the Department may impose additional conditions to remedy noncompliance. If the Department determines that noncompliance cannot be remedied by imposing additional conditions, the Department may take appropriate actions to enforce compliance, which actions may include but not be limited to the following:
  - 1. Temporarily withhold cash payments pending correction of the deficiency by the MPO or more severe enforcement action by the Department;
  - 2. Disallow (deny both use of funds and any applicable matching credit for) all or part of the cost of the activity or action not in compliance;
  - 3. Wholly or partly suspend or terminate the Federal award;
  - 4. Initiate suspension or debarment proceedings as authorized under 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and Federal awarding agency regulations (or in the case of the Department, recommend such a proceeding be initiated by the Federal awarding agency);
  - 5. Withhold further Federal awards for the Project or program;
  - 6. Take other remedies that may be legally available.
- vi. As a condition of receiving this Federal award, the MPO shall permit the Department, or its designee, the CFO or State of Florida Auditor General access to the MPO's records including financial statements, the independent auditor's working papers and project records as necessary. Records related to unresolved audit findings, appeals or litigation shall be retained until the action is complete or the dispute is resolved.

- **C.** The MPO shall retain sufficient records demonstrating its compliance with the terms of this Agreement for a period of five years from the date the audit report is issued and shall allow the Department, or its designee, the CFO or State of Florida Auditor General access to such records upon request. The MPO shall ensure that the audit working papers are made available to the Department, or its designee, the CFO, or State of Florida Auditor General access from the date the audit report is issued and shall allow the Department, or its designee, the CFO, or State of Florida Auditor General upon request for a period of five years from the date the audit report is issued unless extended in writing by the Department.
- **13. Termination or Suspension:** The Department may, by written notice to the MPO, suspend any or all of the MPO's obligations under this Agreement for the MPO's failure to comply with applicable law or the terms of this Agreement until such time as the event or condition resulting in such suspension has ceased or been corrected. The Department will provide written notice outlining the particulars of suspension.

The Department may terminate this Agreement at any time before the date of completion if the MPO is dissolved or if federal funds cease to be available. In addition, the Department or the MPO may terminate this Agreement if either party fails to comply with the conditions of the Agreement. The Department or the MPO shall give written notice to all parties at least ninety (90) days prior to the effective date of termination and specify the effective date of termination.

The parties to this Agreement may terminate this Agreement when its continuation would not produce beneficial results commensurate with the further expenditure of funds. In this event, the parties shall agree upon the termination conditions.

Upon termination of this Agreement, whether for cause or at the convenience of the parties, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, reports, maps, drawings, models, photographs, etc., prepared by the MPO shall, at the option of the Department, be delivered to the Department.

The Department shall reimburse the MPO for those eligible expenses incurred during the Agreement period that are directly attributable to the completed portion of the work covered by this Agreement, provided that the work has been completed in a manner satisfactory and acceptable to the Department. The MPO shall not incur new obligations for the terminated portion after the effective date of termination.

The Department reserves the right to unilaterally cancel this Agreement for refusal by the MPO or any consultant, sub-consultant or materials vendor to allow public access to all documents, papers, letters or other material subject to the provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, and made or received in conjunction with this Agreement unless the records are confidential or exempt.

The conflict and dispute resolution process set forth in Section 14 of this Agreement shall not delay or stop the Parties' rights to terminate the Agreement.

**14. Remedies:** Violation or breach of Agreement terms by the MPO shall be grounds for termination of the Agreement. Any costs incurred by the Department arising from the termination of this Agreement shall be paid by the MPO.

This Agreement shall not be considered as specifying the exclusive remedy for any dispute, but all remedies existing at law and in equity may be availed of by either party and shall be cumulative.

**15. Conflict and Dispute Resolution Process:** This section shall apply to conflicts and disputes relating to matters subject to this Agreement, or conflicts arising from the performance of this Agreement. If possible, the parties shall attempt to resolve any dispute or conflict within thirty (30) days of a determination of a dispute or conflict. This section shall not delay or stop the Parties' rights to terminate the Agreement. In addition, notwithstanding that a conflict or dispute may be pending resolution, this section shall not delay or stop the Department from performing the following actions pursuant to its rights under this Agreement: deny payments; disallow costs; deduct the value

of ineligible work from subsequent reimbursement requests, or; offset pursuant to Section 9.N of this Agreement.

- A. Initial Resolution: The affected parties to this Agreement shall, at a minimum, ensure the attempted early resolution of conflicts relating to such matters. Early resolution shall be handled by direct discussion between the following officials: for the Department the Intermodal Systems Development Manager; and for the MPO the Staff Director.
- **B.** Resolution by Senior Agency Official: If the conflict remains unresolved, the conflict shall be resolved by the following officials: for the Department the District Secretary; and for the River to Sea TPO the Chairperson of the MPO.
- **C.** Resolution of Conflict by the Agency Secretary: If the conflict is not resolved through conflict resolution pursuant to the provisions, "Initial Resolution" and "Resolution by Senior Agency Official" above, the conflict shall be resolved by the Secretary for the Department of Transportation or their delegate. If the MPO does not agree with the resolution provided by the Secretary for the Department of Transportation, the parties may pursue any other remedies set forth in this Agreement or provided by law.
- 16. Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Policy and Obligation: It is the policy of the Department that DBE's, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 26, as amended, shall have the opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Department funds under this Agreement. The DBE requirements of applicable federal and state laws and regulations apply to this Agreement.

The MPO and its contractors and consultants agree to ensure that DBE's have the opportunity to participate in the performance of this Agreement. In this regard, all recipients and contractors shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with applicable federal and state laws and regulations to ensure that the DBE's have the opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. The MPO and its contractors, consultants, subcontractors and subconsultants shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of contracts, entered pursuant to this Agreement.

#### 17. Compliance with Federal Conditions and Laws:

- A. The MPO shall comply and require its consultants and subconsultants to comply with all terms and conditions of this Agreement and all federal, state, and local laws and regulations applicable to this Project. Execution of this Agreement constitutes a certification that the MPO is in compliance with, and will require its consultants and subconsultants to comply with, all requirements imposed by applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations.
- **B.** The MPO shall comply with the "Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion Lower Tier Covered Transactions," in 49 C.F.R. Part 29, and 2 C.F.R. Part 200 when applicable and include applicable required provisions in all contracts and subcontracts entered into pursuant to this Agreement.
- **C. Title VI Assurances:** The MPO will comply with all the requirements imposed by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the regulations of the U.S. Department of Transportation issued thereunder, and the assurance by the MPO pursuant thereto, including but not limited to the requirements set forth in Exhibit "C", Title VI Assurances. The MPO shall include the attached Exhibit "C", Title VI Assurances, in all contracts with consultants and contractors performing work on the Project that ensure compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 49 C.F.R. Part 21, and related statutes and regulations.
- D. Restrictions on Lobbying The MPO agrees that to no federally-appropriated funds have been paid, or will be paid by or on behalf of the MPO, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence any officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement. If any funds other than federally-appropriated funds have been paid by the MPO to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL,

"Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions. The MPO shall require that the language of this paragraph be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly. No funds received pursuant to this Agreement may be expended for lobbying the Legislature, the judicial branch or a state agency.

- E. The MPO must comply with FHWA's Conflicts of Interest requirements set forth in 23 CFR §1.33.
- **18. Restrictions, Prohibitions, Controls, and Labor Provisions:** During the performance of this Agreement, the MPO agrees as follows, and shall require the following provisions to be included in each contract and subcontract entered into pursuant to this Agreement :
  - A. A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes, for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.
  - B. In accordance with Section 287.134, Florida Statutes, an entity or affiliate who has been placed on the Discriminatory Vendor List, kept by the Florida Department of Management Services, may not submit a bid on a contract to provide goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity.
  - **C.** An entity or affiliate who has had its Certificate of Qualification suspended, revoked, denied or have further been determined by the Department to be a non-responsible contractor may not submit a bid or perform work for the construction or repair of a public building or public work on a contract with the MPO.
  - D. Neither the MPO nor any of its contractors and consultants or their subcontractors and subconsultants shall enter into any contract, subcontract or arrangement in connection with the Project or any property included or planned to be included in the Project in which any member, officer or employee of the MPO or the entities that are part of the MPO during tenure or for 2 years thereafter has any interest, direct or indirect. If any such present or former member, officer or employee involuntarily acquires or had acquired prior to the beginning of tenure any such interest, and if such interest is immediately disclosed to the MPO, the MPO, with prior approval of the Department, may waive the prohibition contained in this paragraph provided that any such present member, officer or employee shall not participate in any action by the MPO or the locality relating to such contract, subcontract or arrangement. The MPO shall insert in all contracts entered into in connection with the Project or any property included or planned to be included in any Project, and shall require its contractors and consultants to insert in each of their subcontracts, the following provision:

"No member, officer or employee of the MPO or of the locality during his or her tenure or for 2 years thereafter shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof."

The provisions of this paragraph shall not be applicable to any agreement between the MPO and its fiscal depositories or to any agreement for utility services the rates for which are fixed or controlled by a governmental agency.

**E.** No member or delegate to the Congress of the United States shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit arising therefrom.

#### 19. Miscellaneous Provisions

- A. Public Records:
  - i. The MPO shall allow public access to all documents, papers, letters, or other material subject to

the provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, and made or received by the MPO in conjunction with this Agreement, unless such documents are exempt from public access or are confidential pursuant to state of federal law. Failure by the MPO to grant such public access shall be grounds for immediate unilateral cancellation of this Agreement by the Department.

- ii. In addition, the MPO shall comply with the requirements of section 119.0701, Florida Statutes.
- **B.** It is specifically agreed between the parties executing this Agreement that it is not intended by any of the provisions of any part of the Agreement to create in the public or any member thereof, a third party beneficiary hereunder, or to authorize anyone not a party to this Agreement to maintain a suit for personal injuries or property damage pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.
- **C.** In no event shall the making by the Department of any payment to the MPO constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Department of any breach of covenant or any default which may then exist on the part of the MPO and the making of such payment by the Department, while any such breach or default shall exist, shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Department with respect to such breach or default.
- **D.** If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected. In such an instance, the remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.
- **E.** By execution of the Agreement, the MPO represents that it has not paid and, also agrees not to pay, any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining an approval of its application for the financing hereunder.
- F. Nothing in the Agreement shall require the MPO to observe or enforce compliance with any provision or perform any act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable state law. If any of the provisions of the Agreement violate any applicable state law, the MPO will at once notify the Department in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made by the Department and the MPO to the end that the MPO may proceed as soon as possible with the Project.
- **G.** The MPO shall comply with all applicable federal guidelines, procedures, and regulations. If at any time a review conducted by Department and or FHWA reveals that the applicable federal guidelines, procedures, and regulations were not followed by the MPO and FHWA requires reimbursement of the funds, the MPO will be responsible for repayment to the Department of all funds awarded under the terms of this Agreement.
- H. The MPO:
  - i. shall utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by MPO during the term of the contract; and
  - **ii.** shall expressly require any contractor, consultant, subcontractors and subconsultants performing work or providing services pursuant to the state contract to likewise utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by the subcontractor or subconsultant during the contract term.
- I. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute the same Agreement. A facsimile or electronic transmission of this Agreement with a signature on behalf of a party will be legal and binding on such party.
- J. The parties agree to comply with s.20.055(5), Florida Statutes, and to incorporate in all subcontracts the obligation to comply with s.20.055(5), Florida Statutes.
- **K.** This Agreement and any claims arising out of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the United States and the State of Florida.

#### Exhibit "C" TITLE VI ASSURANCES

During the performance of this contract, the consultant or contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "contractor") agrees as follows:

- (1.) Compliance with REGULATIONS: The contractor shall comply with the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation (hereinafter, "USDOT") *Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21,* as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the *REGULATIONS)*, which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- (2.) Nondiscrimination: The Contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the selection and retention of sub-contractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The contractor shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by Section 21.5 of the REGULATIONS, including employment practices when the contract covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the REGULATIONS.
- (3.) Solicitations for Sub-contractors, including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under sub-contract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential sub-contractor or supplier shall be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under this contract and the *REGULATIONS* relative to nondiscrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex.
- (4.) Information and Reports: The contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the REGULATIONS or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the Florida Department of Transportation or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such REGULATIONS, orders and instructions. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information the contractor shall so certify to the Florida Department of Transportation, or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, or Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- (5.) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the Florida Department of Transportation shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, or Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
  - a. withholding of payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies, and/or
  - b. cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- (6.) Incorporation of Provisions: The contractor shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every sub-contract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the *REGULATIONS*, or directives issued pursuant thereto. **THIS AGREEMENT**, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2020, by and between the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization, an agency of the State of Florida organized and operating pursuant to Section 339.175, *Florida Statutes*, whose address, for the purposes of notice, is 2570 West International Speedway Boulevard, Suite 100, Daytona Beach, Florida 32114, hereinafter called "**R2CTPO**," and Lois Bollenback, whose address, for the purposes of notice is 30 Cochise Court, Palm Coast, Florida 32137, hereinafter called "**Employee**," both of whom understand as follows:

# WITNESSTH:

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the **R2CTPO** to provide certain benefits, establish certain conditions of employment, and to set working conditions of the Employee as she continues to serve the **R2CTPO** as the Executive Director of the organizations; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the R2CTPO to accomplish the following:

- 1. Secure and retain the services of the **Employee** and to provide inducement for her to remain in such employment;
- 2. Make possible full work productivity by assuring Employee's morale and peace of mind with respect to future security;
- 3. Establish employment terms which act as a deterrent against malfeasance or dishonesty for personal gain on the part of the **Employee**; and
- 4. Provide a just means for terminating Employee's services at such time as she may be unable to discharge her duties or when the **R2CTPO** may desire to otherwise terminate her employ; and

**WHEREAS,** Employee desires to continue employment as the Executive Director of the R2CTPO.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** be it agreed and resolved, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, that the parties hereto agree as follows:

#### Section 1: DUTIES

As established and authorized by the Interlocal Agreement for Creation of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (FDOT Form 525-010-01, Dated August 19, 2014) **R2CTPO** hereby agrees to employ Lois Bollenback as Executive Director to perform the functions and duties specified by the **R2CTPO**, and to perform such other legally permissible and proper duties and functions as the **R2CTPO** shall from time-to-time assign.

#### Section 2: TERM

- A. Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the **R2CTPO** to terminate the services of the **Employee** at any time, subject only to the provisions set forth in Section 3 A and B of this Agreement.
- B. Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the **Employee** to resign at any time from his position with the **R2CTPO**, subject only to the provisions set forth in Section 3 C of this Agreement.
- C. The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be binding on both parties and **Employee** shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of the **R2CTPO**. The length of the contract period is a three (3)-year term.

# Section 3: TERMINATION, SEVERANCE PAY, AND RESIGNATION

- A. The R2CTPO shall provide the Employee sixty (60) days notice of any termination of the Employee without cause. In the event the Employee is terminated by the R2CTPO, without cause, during such time that Employee is willing and able to perform the duties of Executive Director, then, in that event, the R2CTPO agrees to pay Employee a lump sum payment equal to twenty (20) weeks base salary plus benefits and accrued Paid Time Off (PTO) (as established in Section 215.425(4)(a) *Florida Statutes*) In the event that the Employee is terminated due to misconduct, as defined in Section 443.036(29), *Florida Statutes*, the R2CTPO shall have no obligation to pay the severance sum established in this Section.
- B. In the event **R2CTPO**, at any time during the employment term, reduces the salary or other financial benefits to **Employee** in greater percentage than applicable across-theboard reduction for all **R2CTPO** employees; or in the event that the **R2CTPO** refuses, following written notice, to comply with any other provision benefiting **Employee** herein; or the **Employee** resigns following a suggestion, whether formal or informal by the **R2CTPO** that she resign without any finding of misconduct, then, in that event, the **Employee** may, at her option, be deemed to be "terminated" at the date of such reduction or refusal to comply or suggestion that the **Employee** resign. "Termination" under this condition is considered "without cause" and **Employee** would receive severance as outlined in Subsection A of this Section.
- C. In the event that the **Employee** voluntarily resigns her position with the **R2CTPO**, then **Employee** shall give the **R2CTPO** sixty (60) days advance notice. In the event that the **Employee** resigns without the required sixty (60) days advance notice, she shall promptly reimburse the **R2CTPO** for any prepaid benefits hereunder, such as pre-paid premium for life insurance, disability insurance, retirement, etc. Alternatively, the **R2CTPO** may, at its discretion, deduct such reimbursement sums from Employee's final pay check provided that the Employee shall be, at a minimum, be paid the minimum wage established by law for the final pay check with any remaining sum due to be repaid constituting indebtedness that may be collected by any lawful means.

# Section 4: SALARY

The **R2CTPO** agrees to pay the **Employee** for her services rendered pursuant hereto the following annual (twelve (12) month) amount, payable in equal installments at the same time as other employees of the **R2CTPO** staff are paid:

Effective March 1, 2020...... \$120,000

The **R2CTPO** shall conduct a performance evaluation of the **Employee** on an annual basis, at least (3) months prior to the anniversary date of this Agreement, and shall occur subsequent to the recommendation of the Executive Committee being made no later than November 30 of each year. The **R2CTPO** shall utilize the Employee's annual performance evaluation as a basis for negotiation for salary or any other parts of this Agreement. Any subsequent salary increases shall be based upon the **Employee's** performance.

# Section 5: HOURS OF WORK

The **Employee** agrees to maintain regular office hours during the hours that the **R2CTPO** conducts its business, from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday (excluding holidays and emergency closing days). In addition, it is recognized by the **Employee** that she will be required to also devote time outside of the normal office hours to conduct the business of the **R2CTPO**.

# Section 6: AUTOMOBILE

The **Employee's** duties require that she shall require and have the exclusive use of an automobile at all times during her employment with the **R2CTPO**. To this end, the **Employee** is required to have and maintain a valid Florida driver's license and maintain a good driving record. The **R2CTPO** shall pay the **Employee** five hundred dollars (**\$500.00**) per month as an automobile allowance. The **Employee** shall be responsible for paying for liability, property damage, and comprehensive insurance, and for the purchase, operation, maintenance, repair, and regular replacement of said automobile. For any travel outside of the Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) boundary applicable to the **R2CTPO**, the **Employee** shall be paid the standard mileage rate as approved for all employees.

# Section 7: DUES AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

The **R2CTPO** agrees to budget and to pay a reasonable amount toward the professional and civic organization dues and subscriptions of the **Employee** necessary for her continuation and full participation in national, regional, State, and local associations and organizations necessary and desirable for her continued professional participation, growth, and advancement, and the good of the **R2CTPO**, subject to Executive Committee approval.

### Section 8: PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The **R2CTPO** hereby agrees to budget and to pay the travel and subsistence expenses of the **Employee** for professional and official travel, meetings, and occasions adequate to continue the professional development of the **Employee** and to adequately pursue necessary official and other

functions for the **R2CTPO**. The amount so budgeted and paid shall be a reasonable amount subject to Executive Committee approval. Any outside engagements not related to the **Employee's** professional responsibilities shall not interfere with the **Employee's** professional responsibility to this position.

# Section 9: GENERAL EXPENSES

The **R2CTPO** recognizes that certain expenses of a non-personal and generally job-affiliated nature are incurred by the **Employee** and agrees to reimburse or to pay said general expenses including, but not limited to, cellular telephone use. The **R2CTPO** hereby authorizes its Chief Financial Officer to disburse such monies upon receipt of appropriate expense or petty cash vouchers, receipts or statements for approval and any expenses disallowed will be reimbursed by the **Employee** to the **R2CTPO**. The particular procedures, limitations, and funding shall be as agreed between the **Employee** and the Chief Financial Officer, subject to the right of the **R2CTPO** to limit such expenses to a maximum of \$250.00 per occurrence.

# Section 10: PAID TIME OFF (PTO)

The **Employee** shall accrue and have credited to her personal account, Paid Time Off (PTO) leave at the same rate as other employees serving as staff to the **R2CTPO**. Accrued PTO shall be forfeited in the event that **Employee** voluntarily resigns her position with **R2CTPO** without giving notice as required by Section 3 C of this Agreement.

### Section 11: HEALTH INSURANCE

The **R2CTPO** agrees to provide hospitalization, surgical, and comprehensive medical insurance for the **Employee**, and her family, and to pay the premiums necessary to maintain that insurance; equal to that which is provided for all other employees serving as staff to the **R2CTPO**.

#### Section 12: RETIREMENT (PENSION PLAN)

The **Employee** is a participant in the Principal Financial Group Money Purchase Plan. The **R2CTPO** agrees to contribute each year to the **Employee's** retirement account nine and eighty-five one hundredths percent (9.85%) of the **Employee's** annual base salary. This is the current rate set by the **R2CTPO**, and any changes made by the **R2CTPO** to the pension plan will be addressed at that time. This rate shall not be applied to any auto allowance or other benefit.

#### Section 13: LIFE INSURANCE

The **R2CTPO** agrees to provide life insurance for the **Employee** equal to three (3) times **Employee's** annual salary.

# Section 14: RECORDS

All records, statements, files, financial, and other information shall be the property of the **R2CTPO**, as the case may be, and in the event her employment terminates for any reason, the **Employee** shall have no right to retention of such records.

# Section 15: OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT

- A. The **R2CTPO** shall fix any such other terms and conditions of employment as it may determine from time to time, relating to the performance of the **Employee**, provided such terms and conditions are not in conflict with the provisions of this Agreement or any law.
- B. All provisions and rules of the **R2CTPO** relating to **R2CTPO**, holidays, and other fringe benefits and working conditions as they now exist or hereafter may be amended, also shall apply to the **Employee** as they would to other employees of the **R2CTPO**, in addition to said benefits enumerated specifically for the benefit of the **Employee**, except as herein provided.
- C. The Chair of the **R2CTPO**, or in his/her absence, the Vice-Chair shall be the **Employee's** immediate supervisor.
- D. All amendments, alterations, or additions to this Agreement shall be in writing, shall be approved by the **R2CTPO** Board and the **Employee**, and shall be provided to the **R2CTPO** Office Manager for retention as part of the personnel file for the **Employee** which shall include this Agreement. An executed or certified copy shall be furnished to the **Employee** and a copy to the Chair of the **R2CTPO**.
- E. If any provision or any portion thereof contained in this Agreement is held to be unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement or portion thereof, shall be deemed several, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.

# Section 16: INDEMNIFICATION

The **R2CTPO** shall defend, save, hold harmless and indemnify the **Employee** against any tort, professional liability claim or demand or other legal action, whether groundless or otherwise, arising out of an alleged act or omission occurring in the lawful performance of the **Employee's** duties as Executive Director. The **R2CTPO** may compromise and settle any such claim or suit and pay the amount of settlement or judgment rendered thereon.

#### Section 17: GOVERNING LAW, VENUE, AND JURISDICTION

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida. Venue and jurisdiction as to any legal action commenced by any party hereto shall only be in the state court in and for Volusia County, Florida, and the parties hereto consent to such venue and exclusive jurisdiction of both person and subject matter.

#### Section 18: **ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS**

In the event that either party hereto brings suit for the collection of any damages resulting from, or the injunction of any action constituting, a breach of any of the terms or provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to receive from the other party such costs and attorney's fees as the prevailing party incurred in connection with the suit.

#### Section 19: **ENTIRE AGREEMENT**

This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof and, upon its execution and approval, shall supersede all prior agreements, understandings and arrangements, both oral and written, between the parties with respect to such subject matter. This Agreement may not be modified in any way unless by a written instrument signed by both parties.

#### Section 20: **CONSTRUCTION**

Each and every term of this Agreement has been mutually agreed to and negotiated by the parties hereto, and shall be construed simply according to its fair meaning and not strictly for or against any party.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the R2CTPO has caused this Agreement to be duly signed and executed in its behalf by its Chair and duly attested to in an appropriate manner; and the Employee has caused this Agreement to be executed, both in duplicate, the day and year first written above.

### Background Information:

The TPO is required by 23 U.S.C. 134(j) Florida Statute 339.175 to develop a Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The TIP is a program of transportation projects covering a period of five years. The TIP is developed and formally adopted by the TPO each year. It must be consistent with the Long Range Transportation Plan, and is required for projects to be eligible for funding under title 23 U.S.C. and title 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53. The TIP is developed in cooperation with FDOT, local governments, public transit operators and the public.

The TIP lists capital and non-capital surface transportation projects supported with state and/or federal funds. Also required to be included are all regionally significant projects requiring an action by FHWA or FTA regardless of funding source and projects that implement paratransit plans required for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Florida law also requires the TIP to include a list of locally and privately-funded projects for informational purposes.

The initial draft FY 2020/21 to FY 2024/25 TIP was presented to the TPO advisory committees and board for review in May. Resolution 2020-09 is for adoption of the FY 2020/21 to 2024/25 TIP. Due to its relatively large size, a link to the draft TIP can be accessed from the TPO's website at:

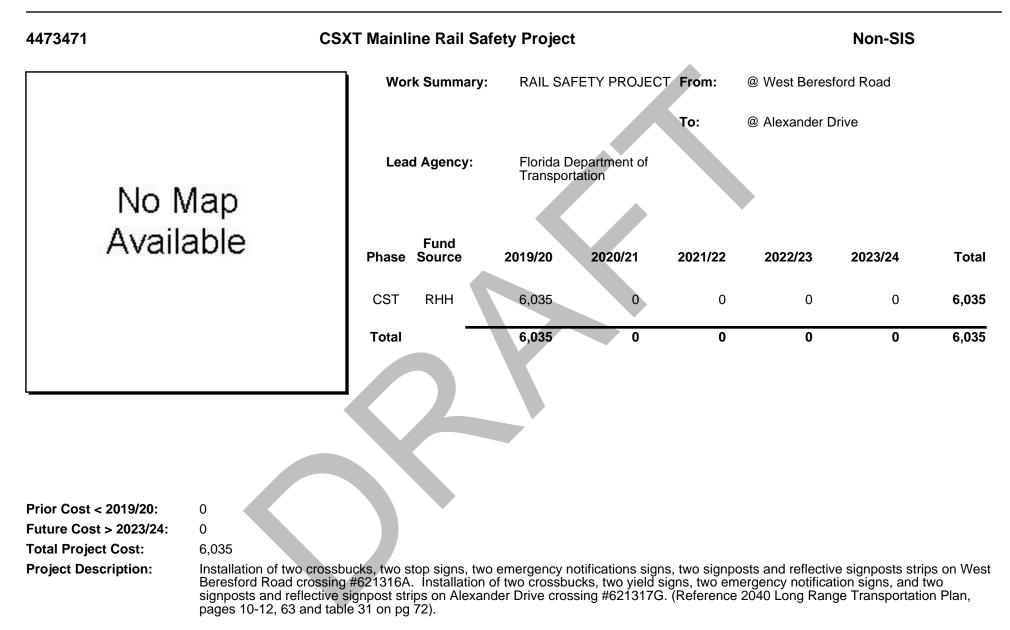

# Background Information:

Each year, the River to Sea TPO develops seven lists of priority projects (LOPP), each representing a different category of transportation projects. Once adopted, the lists are transmitted to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) district office for use in allocating transportation funds to the area.

The Strategic Intermodal System project list (SIS); the SIS Planning Studies List; and the Regionally Significant Non-SIS Roadway project List were updated to reflect changes to the status of projects already on the lists (e.g., completed phase(s), updated cost estimates, etc.).

The Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Project List (traffic operations-focused); the Bicycle/Pedestrian and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian-focused) projects; the Shared-Use Nonmotorized (SUN) Trail Project List; and the Transportation Planning Studies List are updated annually with the "call for projects". Project applications submitted to the TPO are reviewed and ranked based upon the criteria developed through the committee process and approved by the River to Sea TPO Board. Additionally, project sponsors submit updated cost estimates annually and these lists were revised to reflect the updated estimates.

For transit projects, the TPO generally defers to Votran and Flagler County Public Transportation to determine project priorities.

Two additional lists were added this year, the SU Funded Planning Studies List which identifies planning study activities that are funded with SU set aside funds and the Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) Eligible Project List which identifies projects that local governments have submitted for consideration for TRIP funding.

The draft Lists of Priority Projects (LOPP) reflect changes to the status of projects already on the lists (e.g., completed phase(s), updated cost estimates, etc.) as well as the incorporation of new projects received and ranked through the Annual Call for Projects.

An initial draft of the LOPP was presented to the CAC, TCC, and TPO Board in May. The enclosed final draft reflects additional changes made to the lists.

D. REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AN AMENDMENT TO THE R2CTPO'S PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN (PPP)

#### Background Information:

The River to Sea TPO's Public Participation Plan (PPP) outlines the various ways for people to provide input into planning and decision-making and it identifies how the TPO will promote and encourage public participation. During COVID-19, the Governor's Executive Order 20-69 has permitted the TPO to utilize virtual technology to hold meetings. Because the use of virtual meetings is new to the River to Sea TPO, it is necessary to update the TPO's Public Participation Plan to incorporate virtual meetings and their use. Changes to the PPP require a minimum 45-day public comment period which began on May 10, 2020 and ends on June 24, 2020 prior to the TPO Board taking action on the update to the PPP.

### **Public Participation Strategies and Outreach Tools**

#### Meetings

All meetings of the River to Sea TPO Board, committees, advisory groups and project meetings are open to the public and subject to the Florida's Sunshine Law. All materials presented during meetings become public record and are available for review online and at the TPO office during normal business hours. Copies of archived records are available upon request.

#### **Advance Notice**

Public notices for all River to Sea TPO meetings are distributed via email and posted on the TPO website at least five (5) business days in advance. Notices are also distributed to media outlets and made available for posting in public locations such as libraries. Notices include the date, time, and location for the event, a brief description of the purpose and a list of action items to be considered.

#### **Virtual Meetings**

Virtual public meetings use web-based services, such as Zoom, Microsoft Teams, or GoTo Meetings to supplement traditional, in-person meetings. They allow the public to participate, give feedback, and provide comments. Utilizing virtual public meetings can enhance and broaden the reach of public engagement efforts by making participation more convenient by enabling the public to participate remotely from their home or workplace. They also provide an opportunity for meeting participation when people are unable to attend physically. These meetings have recording capabilities that allow people to view a meeting or presentation at a later date. Virtual meetings are not intended to completely replace in-person meetings. The River to Sea TPO may, at times, utilize virtual meetings when physical meetings are not feasible due to unusual emergency situations and/or when physical meetings are prohibited by federal, state, county or local guidance.

#### **Emergency Meetings**

Special and/or emergency meetings may be called by the TPO Board Chairperson or by written request of two or more TPO Board members delivered to an officer. At least two (2) business days' notice must be provided to the members, alternates and the public for special meetings. A full explanation of the procedures is available in the TPO Bylaws located in Appendix E.

#### **Special Needs Access**

All TPO meetings are held in facilities that are accessible to persons with disabilities and to people who use public transit. People needing special accommodations to participate in TPO meetings should contact the River to Sea TPO five (5) business days in advance. Instructions for receiving assistance are included as part of meeting notices.

#### A. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF THE DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES OF THE CONNECT 2045 LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN (LRTP)

#### Background Information:

As part of the development of the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan, the TPO's LRTP Consultant, Kimley-Horn & Associates, will lead a discussion and present information on the funding scenario alternative. Supporting documentation is provided for review.

#### **Connect 2045 Funding Scenarios**

#### Background

At the heart of developing Connect 2045 is the prioritization and selection of projects for funding within the constraints of forecasted revenues. For each round of LRTP updates, FDOT develops the forecast of funds on the state highway system that are expected to be available over the 25-year planning period. The forecast uses factors known at the time it is developed. As with any long-range financial projection, actual revenue may vary due to unanticipated changes in economic conditions, revenue sources, and other factors. The evaluation of funding scenarios provides a window on potential changes to the Cost Feasible Plan (CFP) set of projects that could be applied in the wake of differing revenue levels.

Within the categories of the revenue forecast, the TPO has the greatest influence over where funds will be prioritized under the *Other Arterials* funding category. This category is the prime focus of the Cost Feasible Plan (CFP) and the funding scenarios.

The scenarios consist of both a LOW and HIGH funding amount relative to the baseline revenue forecast used for development of the Connect 2045 CFP. These funding amounts provide opportunity to illustrate how alternative futures would potentially change the projects and priorities included in the CFP.

#### **Scenario Alternatives**

Below is a summary of the baseline and two scenarios. The scenarios consist of three alternatives – two LOW alternatives and one HIGH alternative:

**BASELINE / 2045 Cost Feasible Plan** – This is the *Other Arterials* funding amount from the Connect 2045 Revenue Forecast being used to develop the CFP.

The BASELINE 2045 CFP consists of \$497,226,138 in *Other Arterials* funds -- \$447,503,524 for State Highway System (SHS) projects and a maximum of \$49,772,614 for local or "off-system" projects.

LOW Scenario / 2040 Plan – This is the Other Arterials funding amount from the 2040 LRTP Revenue Forecast. This funding amount acts as an appropriate surrogate for a more constrained financial situation. The potential factors that could drive a more constrained financial future include:

- growing shortfalls in federal transportation funding due to highway fuel tax remaining at the same level since 1993
- projected reductions in fuel tax revenue due to increasing vehicle fuel economy
- projected reductions in fuel tax revenue due to growth in sales of electric and other alternative fuel vehicles

The LOW Scenario assumes \$233,696,285 in *Other Arterials* funds -- \$210,326,656 for SHS projects and a maximum of \$23,369,628 for local or "off-system" projects.



*LOW Scenario A* assigns funding to the projects based on the rank as recommended by the LRTP Subcommittee. This scenario funds each of the SHS projects in the LOPP, \$40 million in SHS local initiatives (ITS and safety improvements), and the two highest-ranked projects. Of the two Old Kings Road projects included in the LOPP, the southern segment (Palm Harbor Village Way to Farnum Lane) can be fully funded. The remainder of the 10% *Other Arterials* funds earmarked for local projects is assigned to the other segment of Old Kings Road (Farnum Lane to Forest Grove Drive). This amount satisfies approximately 27% of the total needed funds. There is \$7,676,656 identified to fund operational improvements.

*LOW Scenario B* funds each of the SHS projects in the LOPP, \$40 million in SHS local initiatives (ITS and safety improvements), and approximately \$10 million (33%) of the highest-ranked SHS project (Tomoka River Bridge (LPGA Blvd)). This scenario enables a larger portion of the funds to be used for smaller-scale operational projects to maintain system performance. Of the two Old Kings Road projects included in the LOPP, the southern segment (Palm Harbor Village Way to Farnum Lane) can be fully funded. The remainder of the 10% *Other Arterials* funds earmarked for local projects is assigned to the other segment of Old Kings Road (Farnum Lane to Forest Grove Drive). This amount satisfies approximately 27% of the total needed funds. There is \$39,026,656 identified to fund operational improvements.

HIGH Scenario / 2045 + New Funding Source – This is the Other Arterials funding amount from the Connect 2045 Revenue Forecast plus a hypothetical new source of funding. For purposes of developing the specific funding amount, the figure is based on the estimate of 25% of a 1 cent sales tax going to transportation. This is not a policy recommendation. This example is used for illustrative purposes. The potential factors that could drive a more abundant financial future include:

- increase in federal highway fuel tax
- a new local sales tax
- increase in state funding
- implementation of a new revenue source based on miles driven rather than gallons of fuel sold

The HIGH Scenario assumes \$770,700,514 in funding. This is \$273,474,376 in addition to the BASELINE *Other Arterials* funding. The additional funding may or may not be restricted to 10% "off-system". For the purposes of this scenario alternative, we did not assume that restriction.

In the HIGH Scenario, all *Other Arterials* projects receive full funding. There is \$37,569,129 identified to fund additional operational improvements.

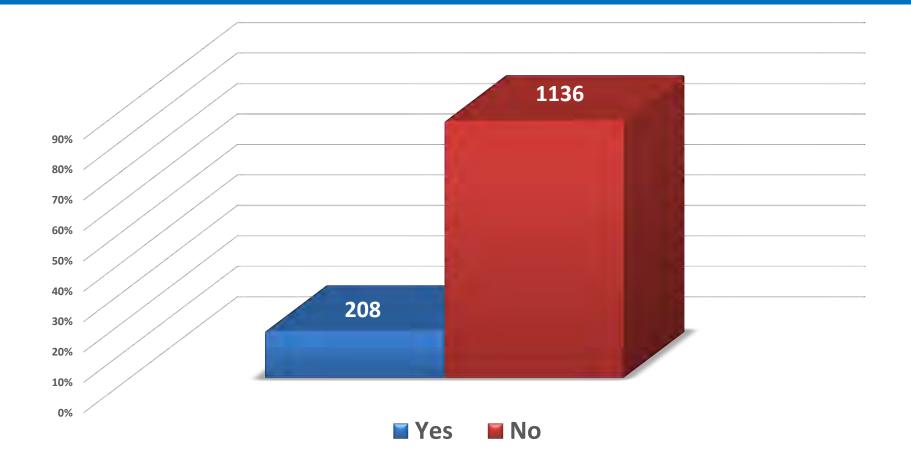




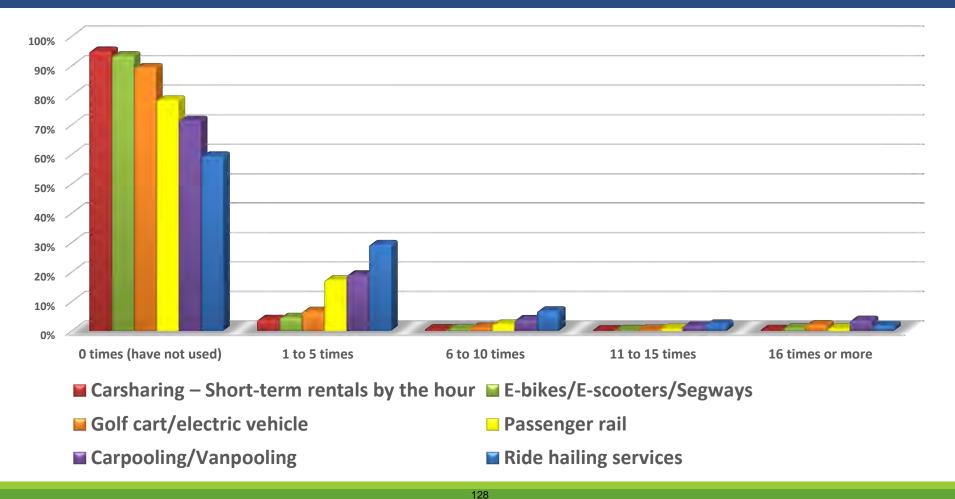
## Survey Responses by Zip Code



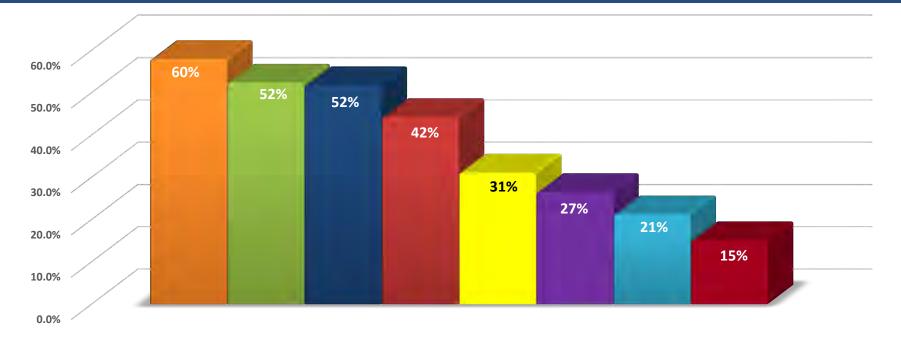
