Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance

The River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by Chairperson Jason Aufdenberg. The roll was called, and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. The meeting was held in a hybrid format with eleven voting and three non-voting members physically present, and two voting and one non-voting member virtually present. Rulings from the Florida Attorney General require that the members physically present vote to allow virtual participation due to "extraordinary circumstances."

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Ted Wendler to allow members attending virtually to participate and

vote. The motion was seconded by Mr. Doug Hall and carried unanimously.

II. <u>Public Comment/Participation</u>

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Recommend Approval of May 10, 2023 BPAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Hall to approve the May 10, 2023 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

B. Nomination and Election of BPAC Chairperson

Chairperson Jason Aufdenberg stated that he is not eligible to continue as Chairperson as he has served two terms.

Mr. Harris explained the bylaws for the election of a new Chairperson and noted that it is effective as of July 1st. The Chairperson also serves as a non-voting member of the TPO Board for a term of 1 year.

The following people were nominated for the position of BPAC Chairperson: Mr. Larry Coletti, Mr. Nic Mostert, and Mr. Ted Wendler. Mr. Coletti and Mr. Mostert declined.

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Belin to elect Mr. Wendler as the BPAC Chairperson. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

C. Nomination and Election of BPAC Vice Chairperson

Mr. Harris stated that the current BPAC Vice Chairperson is Mr. Wendler.

The following members were nominated for the position of BPAC Vice Chairperson: Ms. Gail Belin, Chairperson Aufdenberg, and Mr. Terry Lodge. Ms. Belin and Chairperson Aufdenberg declined to serve.

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Belin to elect Mr. Lodge as the BPAC Vice Chairperson. The motion was seconded by Mr. Leal and carried unanimously.

D. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2023-## Adopting the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Roll Call Vote Required

Ms. Nicoulin stated that TPO gave a presentation and discussion at last month's meeting about the development of the TIP and the bicycle and pedestrian projects that were in the TIP. She went on to say that the TPO compiled the final document and provided a link (due to the size of the document) in the agenda packet. She explained what is included in the TIP and discussed how the TIP is formatted differently this year due to not using the TIP tool platform going into the new fiscal year. She explained that the TPO will have the General Planning Consultant begin the activities to maintain the TIP. They will also create a dashboard for the TPO so that

everyone will be able to map the projects within the TIP. She noted that the TIP will be presented to the CAC/TCC and the Board for adoption next week and it is required to be submitted to FDOT by July 15, 2023.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to approve Resolution 2023-## adopting the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously by roll call vote.

E. Review and Recommend Approval of the Draft List of Prioritized Bicycle/Pedestrian Projects

Mr. Harris discussed the List of Prioritized Bicycle/Pedestrian Projects and stated that there have been no changes to the list since last month's meeting.

Chairperson Aufdenberg asked about the Navy Canal Trail; if there is any way the BPAC could hear from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA)about their concerns about runway protection. They have had other concerns in the past such as funding and he is trying to understand why they haven't mentioned runway protection in the past.

Mr. Harris stated that he has discussed the project with the Daytona Beach staff. He stated that there is a long history with this project and the city began working on a design but the trail that ends at Clyde Morris Boulevard is in a protected airport area, and the city is not allowed to encroach on that area. He stated that they will have to redesign the trail for another alignment. Mr. Harris has asked if the city could give a report on the status in August.

Ms. Sharp asked for clarification of whom they were talking about when referring to the city.

Mr. Harris stated that it is the Engineering Department and that the city wanted to perform the design in-house with the intention of having the TPO fund construction. The design must be accepted by the city, Volusia County, the FAA, and FHWA, which is one of the reasons this project has been taking so long.

Discussion continued on the trail and the airport property.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Hall to approve the Draft List of Prioritized Bicycle/Pedestrian Projects. The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

F. Review and Recommend Approval of the Draft List of Shared-Use Non-Motorized (SUN) Trail Projects

Mr. Harris explained the changes to the List of SUN Trail projects including the deletions and additions.

Discussion continued.

Ms. Ardito asked when the trail on SR 40 going east from Highway 17 would be added to the Priority List.

Mr. Harris responded that the TPO asked Volusia County and Ormond Beach if they had any trails to be added to the Priority List and they responded that they did not. It is up to them to submit the project.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Coletti to approve the Draft List of Shared-Use Non-Motorized (SUN)
Trail Projects. The motion was seconded by Mr. Oebbecke and carried unanimously.

G. Cancellation of the July 12, 2023 BPAC Meeting

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Hall to approve the cancellation of the July 12, 2023 BPAC meeting. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentation and Discussion Items</u>

A. Presentation and Discussion of the SunRail Deland Station Groundbreaking

Mr. Harris gave a PowerPoint presentation on SunRail. The groundbreaking occurred on May 22, 2023, and over three hundred (300) people were in attendance. The grand opening is expected in the Summer of 2024.

Ms. Ardito asked when or how we will see the improved platform design.

Mr. Harris stated he did not know but would find out. He stated that the platform for needs to be ADA-compatible.

Discussion continued regarding the timing of SunRail service and future plans.

B. Presentation and Discussion on the Neighborhood Center Of West Volusia

Ms. Savannah-Jane Griffin and Mr. Waylon Niece gave a presentation on the Neighborhood Center of West Volusia (NHCWV). They explained their mission, the services that they offer and their facilities. They discussed the benefits of a partnership with the TPO including education, bicycle helmets for their clients, reflective vests, and bicycle light distribution.

Ms. Sharp asked what needs the NHCWV has.

Mr. Niece explained that they need bus passes, bicycles, bicycle lights, and reflective vests.

Discussion continued regarding homeless veterans and the effect of COVID-19 on the number of homeless.

V. Staff Comments

Ms. Moss asked for suggestions on how to help those who walk and bike along US 92 from DeLand to Daytona. She stated that FDOT has a partnership with the Volusia County Sheriff's Department, and she has spoken to Votran and Ms. Blankenship with the TPO; also the Crisis Center. Ms. Moss also talked about all the safety materials that can be provided to walkers/bikers to help.

Mr. Lodge stated that he has biked that road a few times and the shoulder is horrible as well as the transitions for roads. He asked if the shoulders could be maintained.

Ms. Moss stated she would have FDOT look at that.

Discussion ensued.

Mr. Harris introduced Ms. Donna King, the TPO's new Administrative Assistant.

Ms. Nicoulin noted that after this meeting the Federal Certification public meeting will be held. This is completed every four years. She encouraged the members to attend the public meeting. The public comment period is open through July 14th.

VII. BPAC Member Comments

Mr. Mostert thanked Chairperson Aufdenberg for serving as Chair of the BPAC committee.

Mr. Hall mentioned that there is a coalition being developed for Disability Awareness Day in October. They are looking for volunteers and will have a meeting tomorrow.

Mr. Coletti stated that he was saddened to hear that Mr. Paul Eik was no longer on the BPAC.

Chairperson Aufdenberg advised that the Governor signed a school zone speed enforcement bill in April, that allows counties to use speed detection systems for violations over 10 mph. They must enact a local ordinance and provide signage and public awareness campaigns.

B. REVIEW AND RECOMMEND APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2023-## AMENDING THE FY 2023/24 TO FY 2027/28 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) (ROLL CALL VOTE REQUIRED)

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) requests approval of an amendment to the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to include projects with funds rolling forward from FY 2022/23 to FY 2023/24. This amendment request is being made to ensure that the projects shown in the TIP are consistent with the projects shown in FDOT's Five Year Work Program.

Each year, FDOT develops the tentative 5-Year Work Program which becomes effective on July 1st. The TPO incorporates the tentative Work Program into the new Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which also becomes effective on July 1st. Year 1 of the TIP and the Work Program should always match. However, when the new TIP and Work Program become effective, there are often projects that were supposed to get authorized prior to June 30th (i.e.: when the previous TIP and Work Program were in effect) but did not. These projects will automatically roll forward in the Work Program, but not in the TIP. Hence, there is a need to reconcile the two documents and bring the new TIP up-to-date. This is accomplished by a routine procedure that is processed every year known as a "roll forward" TIP amendment.

The proposed amendment is authorized in Resolution 2023-## and incorporates the projects with funding that rolled forward from FY 2022/23 to FY 2023/24 into the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 TIP. The full Roll Forward TIP Report can be accessed through the following link:

Dear Ms. Nicoulin:

The purpose of this letter is to request River to Sea TPO amend the FY 2023/24-2027/28 TIP with the Annual Roll-Forward Report. The Roll Forward report reconciles differences between the TIP and Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) Adopted Five-Year Work Program. This is annual process is routine and assists the TPO with identifying projects using federal funds that were not committed during the previous state fiscal year (FY 2022/2023). These projects have automatically "rolled forward" in the FDOT Adopted Five-Year Work Program as of July 1, 2023. This amendment ensures that year one of the TIP matches year one of FDOT's Adopted Five-year Work Program.

The reason for this amendment is to ensure projects with federal funding can be authorized prior to the new Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) beginning on October 1 each year. Until then, Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) continue to recognize the FY 2022/23 – 2026/27 TIP as the effective document. Adopting the Roll Forward Report and amending it into the TIP ensure projects will continue to be authorized without interruption.

The affected projects are listed in the attached Roll-Forward Report dated July 5, 2023. The TPO is requested to add this report to the FY 2023/24-2027/28 TIP in its entirety.

RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION AMENDING THE FY 2023/24 TO FY 2027/28 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO shall annually endorse and amend as appropriate, the plans and programs required by 23 C.F.R. 450.300 through 450.324, among which is the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO's adopted TIP is required to be consistent with the Florida Department of Transportation's adopted Five-Year Work Program; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Department of Transportation has provided additional information to the River to Sea TPO regarding the FDOT adopted Five-Year Work Program.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the River to Sea TPO that the:

- 1. River to Sea TPO's FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 TIP is hereby amended as shown in Attachment "A" attached hereto and made a part of this resolution; and the
- 2. Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or his/her designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit the FY 2023/24 to FY 2027/28 TIP as amended to the:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation;
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation);
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and the
 - d. Department of FloridaCommerce.

I hope this letter finds you well. On behalf of the City of Edgewater, I am writing to formally request the inclusion of the Deering Park North Trail Segment TPO List of Priority Projects, Shared Use Nonmotorized (SUN) Trail Projects section.

The proposed Deering Park North Trail Segment would constitute a key addition to the 57-mile East Central Regional Rail Trail, as an integral link to the broader regional trail system and traversing a portion of the Florida Wildlife Corridor. As the current 12' wide trail concludes on the east side of I-95 along the south side of SR 442, extending the route to the west under the I-95 Overpass and then to the future Edgewater Wetland Park and then north to SR 44 in New Smyrna Beach between portions of the Deering Park North conservation area would significantly enhance the connectivity and accessibility of the entire regional trail network.

We appreciate the TPO's inclusion of the SR 442 Improvement projects in the priority list earlier this summer, which includes a dedicated 12' wide protected trail under I-95. Following this crossing, the Deering Park North Trail Segment will complete the connection of the trail system, ensuring an uninterrupted and safe transit experience for cyclists and pedestrians alike.

The Florida Legislature recently passed Senate Bill 106 (2023), which has designated \$200 million in funding for links of the Suntrail network traversing the Florida Wildlife Corridor, of which the five mile north south trail segment in Deering Park North fits within. Inclusion of the Deering Park North trail in the priority list is needed to be able to seek funding under SB 106.

The maintenance entity for this trail segment would be the Deering Park Stewardship District (DPSD), a local government unit. Moreover, the landowners have expressed their commitment to donating the trail right-of-way for the trail, which we support.




BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is conducting a maintenance project for the segment of Nova Road (SR 5A) from Flomich Street to US 1, a distance of approximately 3.91 miles. Maintenance projects provide FDOT an opportunity to resurface a roadway and make other minor improvements. The goal of this maintenance project is to rehabilitate the pavement while incorporating proposed safety improvements that can be implemented within the existing right of way.

As part of this effort, the Nova Road Coalition was formed to study the corridor, identify issues, and engage the local community in identifying solutions that improve safety for all users. Final Recommended Concept





Drivers Hit and Killed More Than 7,500 Pedestrians Last Year, Most Since 1981, New Projection Shows

Dangerous driving, inadequate infrastructure, larger and heavier vehicles contribute to record death toll, with 20 people walking killed every day

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Drivers struck and killed at least 7,508 people walking in the United States in 2022 – the most pedestrian deaths since 1981 – according to a new report released today by the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA). The report also includes an analysis of 2021 data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) that reveals a troubling safety disparity for people on foot: Pedestrian fatalities have skyrocketed 77% since 2010, compared to 25% for all other traffic-related deaths.

Earlier this year, GHSA released a preview of state and national pedestrian traffic deaths for the first six months of 2022, based on preliminary data reported by the State Highway Safety Offices (SHSOs) in 49 states and the District of Columbia (D.C.). The report warned that not only has the number of pedestrian deaths continued to rise over the past decade, but an uptick in dangerous driving behaviors that started in 2020 hasn't abated, further endangering people on foot. This new, comprehensive report, *Pedestrian Traffic Fatalities* by State: 2022 Preliminary Data, provides a detailed look at projected pedestrian deaths for the full year using additional preliminary data provided by the SHSOs. The data analysis was conducted by Elizabeth Petraglia, Ph.D., with the research firm Westat. The new report found that the projected 7,508 pedestrian deaths in 2022 was a 1% increase from the year before. Forty-nine states and D.C. provided pedestrian fatality data for the report; due to a technical issue, Oklahoma did not provide data. Considering that the state averaged 92 pedestrian deaths in recent years, the actual total number of U.S. pedestrian fatalities last year could be as high as 7,600. Nationwide, there were 2.37 pedestrian deaths per billion vehicle miles traveled (VMT) in 2022, continuing a troubling trend of elevated rates that coincided with the start of the pandemic.

"Every day, 20 people go for a walk and do not return home. These are people living their daily lives – commuting to and from school and work, picking up groceries, walking the

dog, getting some exercise – who died suddenly and violently," said GHSA Chief Executive Officer Jonathan Adkins. "The saddest part is that these crashes are preventable. We know what works – better-designed infrastructure, lower speeds, addressing risky driving behaviors that pose a danger to people walking. We must do these things and more to reverse this awful trend and protect people on foot. Enough is enough."

The GHSA report also explains how the comprehensive Safe System approach can improve pedestrian safety and gives numerous examples of how SHSOs and their partners are incorporating Safe System principles into their pedestrian safety work. Some of the proven and promising approaches include designing and building safer roadways, engaging with people experiencing homelessness, focusing traffic enforcement on dangerous driving behaviors such as speeding and driving impaired or distracted, and educating novice drivers about their responsibility to look out for and yield to pedestrians and other road users.

Pedestrian Safety Trends, 2010-2021

The GHSA report also examines 2021 data from NHTSA's Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) to provide insights on trends regarding when, where and how drivers strike and kill people on foot. Findings include:

- Most pedestrian fatalities continue to occur at night, although nighttime deaths have accounted for an even larger share over the past few years. In 2021, 77% of fatal pedestrian crashes occurred in the dark, with approximately 20% happening in daylight and 3% during dawn or dusk. Since 2010, nighttime fatal crashes have increased by 86%, compared with a 31% rise in daytime pedestrian deaths.
- Drivers of passenger cars have consistently accounted for the greatest number of fatal
 pedestrian crashes. However, over the past decade the number of pedestrian deaths in
 crashes involving sport utility vehicles (SUVs) increased at a far faster rate (120%) than
 deaths in crashes involving passenger cars (26%). Because of their greater body weight
 and larger profile, SUVs and other light trucks can cause more harm to a person on foot
 when a crash occurs.
- In 2021, 69% of pedestrian fatalities occurred in locations where no sidewalk was noted on the crash report, up from 59% in 2017 and continuing a steady upward trajectory in recent years. The presence of sidewalks can help protect people walking by separating them from motor vehicle traffic, but additional infrastructure design considerations, such as raised crosswalks and traffic calming that slows vehicle speeds, can provide even more protection.
- It is well documented that people of color are overrepresented in pedestrian fatalities. Although race and ethnicity data for 2021 pedestrian deaths were not available in FARS due to delays in processing death certificates, researchers looked at changes between 2018 and 2020. They found that the proportion of pedestrians whose race and ethnicity was reported as White non-Hispanic on their death certificate fell from 47% in 2018 to

- 41% in 2020, while the proportions rose for Black non-Hispanic (from 19% to 20%) and Hispanic (from 20% to 21%) pedestrians.
- The percentage of pedestrian deaths involving speeding was 8.1% in 2021, a slight decrease from the year before but higher than before the pandemic, when approximately 6-7% of pedestrian fatalities involved a speeding driver. The average risk of death for pedestrians increases exponentially the faster a vehicle is traveling, from 10% at 23 mph to 90% at 58 mph.
- Non-freeway arterial roads, which typically carry large volumes of traffic at high speeds, are the most dangerous for people on foot, accounting for 60% of all fatalities in 2021. Approximately 18% of pedestrian deaths were on freeways. Stranded motorists exiting their vehicles, first responders and tow truck drivers are all examples of pedestrians who have been killed on freeways. While all states have Move Over laws that require drivers to slow down and change lanes when approaching a stopped vehicle, the fact that more than 1,300 pedestrians died on freeways indicates these laws need to be strengthened, better publicized and more heavily enforced.

This August, traffic safety, public health, law enforcement, government and business leaders will come together in New York City for the <u>GHSA 2023 Annual Meeting</u>. They will discuss, among other things, the increase in pedestrian deaths and how to leverage the Safe System approach to help protect people on foot.



Project Description

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) proposes to improve safety and enhance mobility along Mason Avenue (State Road (S.R.) 430) from Clyde Morris Boulevard to east of Beach Street in the City of Daytona Beach.

In addition to repaving this segment of Mason Avenue, the project intends to incorporate additional safety concepts developed during the 2022 Mason Avenue Corridor Planning Study.

One proposed pedestrian safety concept is to construct four raised midblock crossings that would be equipped with pedestrian activated signals known as Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons (PHBs) and include in-road lighting to help increase visibility at the crossing. Recommended crossing locations are at Fairmount Road, near Edwards Street, near Washington Street and at Mulberry Street.

The project also plans to construct new sidewalk along the north side of Mason Avenue and reconstruct pedestrian curb ramps in accordance with current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.

Traffic signal and pedestrian signal upgrades are proposed at signalized intersections, along with upgraded lighting at pedestrian crossings.
