I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance

The meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) <u>Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee</u> (BPAC) was called to order at 3:00 p.m. by Chairperson Robert Storke. The roll was called and it was determined that there was a quorum.

II. Public Comment/Participation

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of May 14, 2014 BPAC Meeting Minutes

Motion: A motion was made by Ms. Nicoulin to approve the April 9, 2014 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

B. Nomination and Election of BPAC Chair

Mr. Harris stated the bylaws of the BPAC call for the election of a chair and vice chair every June. The current Chair, Mr. Storke, was elected last June and has served one elective term. He took over the duties of chair around February of last year because the previous chair was appointed by former County Council Chair Frank Bruno. Once the current County Chair, Mr. Jason Davis, was elected he did not reappoint the previous BPAC chair so Mr. Storke assumed the duties of the chair and remained as vice chair. Although Mr. Storke has served as Chair since last February, he has served only one elected term and is eligible for a second elected term. Nominations are open to all BPAC members.

Motion: A motion was made by Mr. Mostert to re-elect Chairman Storke as BPAC Chair for a second term. The motion was seconded by Ms. Campbell and carried unanimously.

Ms. Merens asked if there was a two-term limit.

Mr. Harris replied yes, two consecutive terms is the limit.

C. Nomination and Election of BPAC Vice Chair

Motion: A motion was made by Ms. Masters to re-elect Mr. Mostert as BPAC Vice Chair for a second term. The motion was seconded by Ms. Campbell and carried unanimously.

D. Cancellation of July 9, 2014 BPAC Meeting

Motion: A motion was made by Ms. Nicoulin to cancel the July 9, 2014 BPAC meeting. The motion was seconded by Ms. Perney and carried unanimously.

IV. Presentation and Discussion Items

A. <u>Presentation on the Draft Prioritized Lists of XU Bicycle/Pedestrian Projects and Regional Trail Projects</u>

Mr. Harris stated the handout is the most recent list of XU Bicycle/Pedestrian projects and Regional Trail Projects. It is still in rough draft but what is set are the positions of the projects on the list. The list is broken down into three tiers; Tier A being projects with one or more phases funded, Tier B is projects that are ready for funding and Tier C is projects waiting for feasibility studies. The first four projects on Tier A are carry overs from the Tier A list last year. The rest of the projects are projects that moved up from Tier B last year. All of the Tier B projects from last year have at least one phase funded.

Chairman Storke asked if item four on Tier A was correct for Orange City.

Mr. Harris replied no, that was a mistake; it is an Edgewater project.

Mr. Harris stated the only project on the list that remains on Tier B is the Seminole Woods Boulevard Trail, which is a Palm Coast project. Last year this project was adopted on a separate list because the city of Palm Coast was not yet in our planning area and is still not until reapportionment is completed later this month. It is protected because it was on the adopted list and because there was language inserted in our resolution for establishing and maintaining the transportation priority projects; language that protected this project. The first three projects on the Tier B list are in the protected category. Everything else on Tier B are new projects that the TPO received this year. The TPO received about 16 new projects this year that were evenly split between feasibility studies and project implementation. The BPAC Project Review Subcommittee reviewed each project and scored them.

Mr. Harris stated the only project received this year that is not on the priority is an application for a feasibility study submitted by the city of DeBary; it is a study to look at filling in a sidewalk gap along Ft. Florida Road between the SunRail station and US 17/92. FDOT has offered to conduct the feasibility study on this project and because of that the TPO did not add it to the waiting list for other feasibility studies.

He stated the Tier C projects are feasibility studies. There were several projects from last year that were withdrawn and are not on this list. Also, any feasibility studies that were started, even if they are not finished, dropped off this list. Two of the projects that should be noted are from the city of Lake Helen. The city of Lake Helen informed the TPO they did

not have the local match but wanted the projects to stay on the priority list to undertake in the next fiscal year and so they dropped down a couple of positions. Nothing on Tier C is under a protected status so there may be a difference of position from last year due to scores.

Mr. Walters commented that on the project FDOT took over for the DeBary Votran station, they are trying to decide to go from the Spring to Spring Trail to the Votran station down US 17/92 or take it off directly on the trail between Lake Monroe Park and Gemini Springs. They are trying to hook the Votran station to the trails.

Mr. Harris replied that project is number 13 on the Tier C list. That project will look at the different options Mr. Walters just mentioned.

Ms. Nicoulin asked if that project was part of the regional trails.

Mr. Storke stated they were kind of grouped together; he asked Ms. Tyrone if she had any comment on combining the gap in Seminole and Volusia County across the bridge and tying into the trail.

Ms. Tyrone stated the additional \$15 million in funding that will come available in 2015 will be used to fund whatever phase is available and be handled through FDOT. FDOT wants the Seminole and Volusia gap looked at as one project; it will be the most efficient and expeditious route choice that FDOT will make. If the local agencies want to look at another route decision they can; that is their prerogative. FDOT's goal is to complete the Coast to Coast Trail as soon as possible.

Mr. Harris stated this project was submitted for both lists; the XU Bicycle/Pedestrian list for feasibility studies and the Regional Trail project list. The difference between the two is that the funding that FDOT has set aside to close this gap may not be applicable to all of the options laid out in the application. That may be why the county submitted it for a feasibility study; the study will look at other options rather than just closing the connection in the Coast to Coast Trail.

Mr. Piatek replied that was correct; the priority is to get the Coast to Coast connector completed and connect Volusia County to Seminole County. Also the SunRail station is very close in proximity so the opportunity to connect is there as well as to the trail system but it is in some ways two different animals. The feasibility study is intended to identify the best routing for connection to the SunRail station by a couple of different options. The county is very happy with FDOT's involvement in getting the Coast to Coast connector completed.

Ms. Nicoulin asked if the scoring was consistent between the different years; if it was based on the same scoring scale.

Mr. Harris replied the TPO looks at the scoring criteria every fall and there have been some relatively minor changes over the years.

Mr. Walters stated nothing has changed since 2011.

Mr. Harris stated the TPO's priority process is well established and this is the first year that the TPO did a list for regional trail projects. The TPO had hoped to receive several regional trail projects but only received one; the Volusia gap project. The other two applications received were XU Bicycle/Pedestrian projects; two segments along Beach Street of the Halifax Greenway Trail. This project is intended to be part of the East Coast Greenway; the city of Daytona Beach uses the name Halifax River Greenway to refer to the local East Coast Greenway segment. The TPO asked for and received permission to have this project on the regional trail list. The last segment is a bicycle/pedestrian project that was originally along County Road 3; it has been on the Transportation Alternative list for years with very little movement. The situation with County Road 3 is there are numerous challenges to developing a trail along that road; the biggest issue is the right of way is constrained. An agreement has been reached to take those improvements that were originally to be made on County Road 3 and move them to US 17 because US 17 will be going through a widening and it appears to be space within the corridor envelope to fit in a trail. FDOT will be taking the lead on that project instead of the county. The TPO did not receive an application for this but did receive permission to add to this list. The three priorities are the Volusia gap and the two Beach Street trail segments. The TPO has submitted this draft list of projects to the Central Florida MPO Alliance so they know these are our priorities for regional trails to utilize the TAP funding and to utilize the funding the legislature has allocated for closing gaps in the Coast to Coast connector.

B. Presentation on Motor Vehicle and Bicycle Safety

Mr. Harris gave an Internet presentation of a safety video sponsored by the League of Illinois Bicyclists. He stated he normally does not show presentations from out of state so there is no confusion with Florida laws but there is not much conflict with the laws that are cited in this video to Florida laws. It is very informative for motorists and bicyclists; it is important to know the rules of the road.

V. Staff Comments

Mr. Harris stated last Saturday was the National Trails Day event in New Smyrna Beach. It went very well; they fitted a lot of bicycle helmets and the school district had the Mobile Safety City set up.

Mr. Harris stated earlier today he held a pedestrian safety workshop with law enforcement officers in Deltona at Pine Ridge High School with about a dozen sheriff deputies. They set up at intersections around Deltona and motorists that did not stop for pedestrians in the crosswalk were pulled over and given the yellow warning notice to stop or yield for pedestrians in the crosswalk. The sheriff's office will be doing at least 20 more workshops this summer.

Mr. Harris announced there is a flyer in the agenda packet for the Complete Streets Workshop being held at the Health Department this Friday, June 13, 2014 from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon. Please RSVP to Suzanne Grubbs at the Health Department; he invited BPAC committee members to attend. He also announced he would be fitting helmets tomorrow at Port Orange Elementary School.

VII. BPAC Member Comments

Mr. Walters stated the connector between East Central Florida Rail Trail and Gemini Springs Trail is open.

Mr. Clark stated he likes the yellow warning notices; he would like to have something like that for people that pass school buses when they have the stop arm out.

Ms. Merens stated she has heard some complaints about a bunch of bicyclists biking together and go in a cluster instead of a line.

Mr. Walters replied that good bicyclists will pull into a line but bad ones are like bad drivers.

Mr. Hall stated one of the things he noticed is the number of cyclists that ignore red lights, which causes problems for cars with green lights. He referred to the earlier pedestrian safety workshop and stated Daytona Beach has a pedestrian awareness activity every October and Chief Chitwood has asked that they do it at least four times a year to educate drivers about pedestrians and cyclists. He encouraged everyone to come out and participate when they do this activity. He stated Daytona Beach was looking at putting in more roundabouts; the roundabout on US 1 and International Speedway Boulevard (ISB) is gone but they are still looking at a roundabout at SR A1A and ISB and one at Peninsula Drive and ISB. The study is only funded to look at cars; at vehicular traffic and not bicycle/pedestrians and how roundabouts affect them. Last night there was a public hearing about putting a roundabout in Holly Hill; he does not have any details but will check into it.

Ms. Masters stated there are roundabouts all the way down Palmetto Avenue and that people in Daytona Beach do not know how to navigate them. There needs to be a strong educational campaign if there are to be more roundabouts in Daytona Beach.

Mr. Hall replied that roundabouts are designed to keep cars moving but are dangerous for bicyclists and pedestrians.

Mr. Piatek thanked everyone that participated in the National Trails Day event on Saturday; Mr. Clark did a tremendous amount of work setting up the Mobile Safety City.

Ms. Haldeman stated she attended the National Trails Day event and enjoyed seeing the Mobile Safety City firsthand.

VIII. Adjournment

A. Presentation on design alternatives for the Titusville to Edgewater Loop Project Development & Environment (PD&E) Study

Background Information:

The Florida Department of Transportation has programmed a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study to evaluate the feasibility of establishing a trail connection between the City of Titusville in northern Brevard County and the City of Edgewater in southern Volusia County. The intent of the study is to develop and evaluate potential preliminary design alternatives/routes which would provide trail users (such as experienced bicyclists) a scenic opportunity through existing natural areas such as the Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge, Canaveral National Seashore, Indian River Lagoon and the Mosquito Lagoon, among others. The proposed Titusville to Edgewater Loop Trail is intended to provide a loop connection between the existing and proposed trail heads in Titusville and Edgewater which are associated with the East Central Florida Regional Rail Trail and is envisioned to be a potential national destination for both recreational and experienced trail users. The study area is generally bound by the City of Titusville to the south, the City of Edgewater to the north, US 1 to the west and the Atlantic Ocean coastline to the east.



Recommended Alternative between US 1 / Kennedy Parkway and US 1 / Park Avenue

- 1. Kennedy Parkway to SR 442:
 - Construct 10' or 12' wide Shared-Use path on the east side of US 1 from Kennedy Parkway to Dollar General driveway (200' south of Halifax Avenue) and from 660' north of Halifax Avenue to SR 442 – replace 5'-wide sidewalk, construct separate bridge structure over lateral ditches north of Golden Bay Road and south of Indian Creek Road.
 - o Resurface existing paved shoulders from 200' south to 660' north of Halifax Avenue
- 2. SR 442 to Orange Avenue
 - Resurface existing paved shoulders
- 3. Orange Avenue to Park Avenue
 - Keep existing 4' bike lanes

Recommended Alternative on Park Avenue between US 1 and Dale Street

- 1. US 1 to FEC RR Tracks
 - o Re-stripe to add 4' bike lanes
- 2. FEC RR Tracks to Dale Street
 - Resurface existing paved shoulders

Other Alternatives Considered

- A. Use existing paved shoulders/bike lanes on US 1 only. The shoulders would be resurfaced to provide bicyclists with a better riding surface.
- B. Use existing paved shoulders/bike lanes on US 1, north of SR 442, and would keep the 5'-wide sidewalk in Oak Hill and the 8'-wide sidewalk to be constructed in Edgewater. The shoulders would be resurfaced to provide bicyclists with a better riding surface.
- C. Off-US 1 route (US 1 / Roberts Road to Hibiscus Drive to Mango Tree Drive) preferred by the City of Edgewater. At the meeting held June 24, 2014, with the Volusia stakeholders, City of Edgewater staff

discussed alternative alignments for the segment north of SR 442, to minimize impacts on residential parcels. One alternative would follow SR 442, with cyclists using the existing bicycle lanes east to US 1, or west to the East Central Regional Rail Trail. The R2CTPO representative indicated that Alternatives #B and #C may be fundable as a regional trail however, that request would be prioritized along with other trail projects.

Potential Trailhead




Figure 1 Potential South Volusia Trailhead

A trailhead in the Bill's Hill area of south Volusia County would serve trail users coming from MINWR or cycling along US 1 from Edgewater / Oak Hill or from Titusville. Figure 1 shows three parcels on the east side of US 1 at the intersection with Kennedy Parkway were a trailhead could be located. Volusia County has designated the future land use as "Rural" on the front (US 1 portion) of the northern two (owned by James House and Hinrough LLC), and the back portion as "Environmental System Corridor". The 35 acre, owned by the US Bureau of Land Management (MINWR), has a future land use designation of "Conservation". The outcome of the EIS for the SpaceFlorida Shiloh Launch Site may affect the availability of this site.

Summary Report

Background Information:

The US 1 Corridor Improvement Program (CIP) Study, Phase I concluded with the identification of multi-modal transportation improvements along US 1 from the Brevard County line to I-95 in Ormond Beach. Phase II of the study will help determine the most effective way to have US 1 serve all users and modes of transportation along the corridor, and across the corridor. If desired, long-term transition of US 1 to a Complete Street/Complete Place will require changes in how both FDOT and some of the local communities view the roadway and how the space can be allocated to better serve transit, bicycles and pedestrians while still maintaining suitable automobile capacity and speeds. Phase II activities include:

- Providing a regional vision for all modes of transportation access and mobility
- Defining this vision and how it relates and supports local community livability and economic development goals and needs (through community districts/character districts)
- Outlining a strategic approach to accomplish the vision; and
- Identify specific action items (program, policy or infrastructure), their prioritization and timing, and potential funding mechanisms to implement the vision.

C. Presentation on Mobile Apps for Bicycle Parking and Pedestrian Safety

Background Information:

The bicycle parking project (www.bicycleparking.org) is powered by cyclists from all around who help build up the database of bicycle racks and other bicycle parking spaces creating a stronger bicycle community by making it easier to plan a ride and get around town without worrying about where to park your bike when you get there (wherever there may be). The project will also help identify locations lacking in bicycle parking and make an effort to coordinate new parking spots with city officials and business owners.

Anyone with the mobile app installed on their mobile device can enter bicycle parking data. **Required**: the mobile device must have a camera and must allow the app to access their GPS location. The app picks up your GPS coordinates when you snap a picture of the bike rack or bicycle parking area and sends that information to the main server to be processed. Once the data is processed and verified, the new parking space will be available on the public map for everyone to see!

The bicycle parking project began in the San Francisco Bay Area with hopes that it will catch on all over the country and even other countries if interest grows. The long term goal of the bicycle parking project is to give cyclists the tools to make cycling easier, safer and more convenient for everyone!

WalkSafe is an app for mobile phone users. The app was developed by researchers at Dartmouth College and the University of Bologna to increase the safety of pedestrians while crossing the street. The app can be downloaded at: http://goo.gl/GsXfH.

When complete, the Connector is expected to be over 250 miles and will link communities between St. Petersburg and Titusville into a major destination route that will allow residents and visitors to explore Central Florida by bicycle or foot. An estimated 75 percent of the trail corridor is already developed and open to the public or funded for construction.

FDOT Secretary Ananth Prasad said, "With the projects announced today, we will be moving forward this year on virtually every gap within the Coast to Coast Connector. FDOT is pleased to play such an instrumental role with our state and local partners to help advance this ambitious trail project. It will provide an exceptional experience and safe transportation route for our residents and visitors."

FDEP Secretary Herschel T. Vinyard Jr. said, "FDOT continues to be a great partner in the statewide trail effort. We are very excited that the Connector project will be the first of many efforts to complete the Florida Greenways and Trails Priority System."

Senator Andy Gardiner, Chair of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee for Transportation, Tourism and Economic Development, has been a strong advocate for the Connector and was instrumental in setting aside the new funding.

Senator Gardiner said, "It is very rewarding to see the combined efforts of so many come together to help close the gaps in the Coast to Coast Connector. These projects represent a significant step forward for this exciting effort."

The Connector is a collaborative effort of many agencies and organizations, including the eleven Central Florida metropolitan planning organizations that signed a joint resolution last summer making the trail project a regional priority.

Along with more than nine other long distance corridors, the Connector is a state priority in the 2013-17 Florida Greenways and Trails System Plan (Plan), developed by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Office of Greenways and Trails, the lead entity for statewide trail planning. The plan outlines the vision for the Florida Greenways and Trails System, defining the role of the system in advancing Florida's economy, tourism, health, transportation, recreation, conservation and quality of life.

President & CEO of VISIT FLORIDA Will Seccombe said, "Florida is an incredibly diverse destination with so much more to see and do than our visitors often realize. Stretching from Tampa Bay to the Space Coast, the Coast to Coast Connector will offer a unique opportunity for them to discover some of the Sunshine State's most scenic greenways and trails."

FDOT will supervise development of the remaining Connector gaps, and local governments or other managing agencies will be responsible for operation and maintenance of the completed trail segments.





February 2014

- TPO staff issues **call for new projects** application packets sent out to all interested parties (Monday, February 3).
- Except as noted below, local governments are NOT required to submit a new application for a
 candidate project already on the VTPO's List of Priority Projects (LOPP). However, if a local
 government would like for its project(s) to remain on a list for funding, that local government must
 submit a letter to the VTPO reaffirming its support for the project(s). Candidate projects on the list of
 projects ready for Feasibility Study will not be moved to the list of projects ready for Project
 Implementation until a Feasibility Study has been completed AND the local government has submitted
 an application for Project Implementation to the VTPO.
- TPO staff hosts **workshops** with local governments to discuss the Priority Project process and application requirements: East Volusia and West Volusia (scheduled February 20).

- Deadline to submit Priority Project applications and/or letters of support for "candidate project(s)" 5:00 p.m. Friday, May 9, 2014.
