I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum/Pledge of Allegiance

TDLCB Chairperson Billie Wheeler called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB) to order at 11:00 a.m.

The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was not present.

II. Public Comment/Participation

There were no public comments.

IV. <u>Discussion Items and Presentations</u>

*Due to a lack of a quorum, Discussion and Presentation Items were heard first.

A. Presentation and Discussion of FY 2017/18 Annual Operating Report (AOR)

(Handout)

Mr. Harris stated the draft Fiscal Year (FY) 2017/18 Annual Operating Report (AOR) was distributed to members along with the summary from consultant Tindale-Oliver, Inc. He introduced Mr. Joshua Barber, Tindale-Oliver, Inc., to give the presentation.

Mr. Barber gave a PowerPoint presentation and stated Chapter 427 of the Florida Statutes requires each Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) to submit an AOR to the Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD) by September 15 each year. The CTD uses this information to profile statewide operations of the Florida Coordinated Transportation System. They evaluate performance on a system basis and individual organization basis to substantiate additional funding. He gave an overview of the changes from the last FY to this FY for passenger trips, vehicle information, employees, revenue sources and expense sources. Votran was awarded a Transportation Disadvantaged (TD) grant this year of \$52,000 that it did not receive the prior FY. The AOR is complete and needs to be approved and submitted to the CTD by September 15, 2018 or an extension can be requested until September 14, 2018.

Mr. Jackson asked if the extension was to October 14, 2018.

Mr. Barber replied no, the report must be submitted by September 15, 2018 or they have until September 14, 2018 to request an extension.

Ms. Blanck explained the information is submitted into the system that the TD will utilize to more fully vet some of the questions Votran has; depending on how they want Votran to handle the differentials, she will bring back any modifications or newly assigned amounts for this report at the next meeting.

Ms. Lipovsky asked if Votran would be purchasing new buses.

Ms. Blanck replied that Votran has a program of bus replacements and new buses needed for additional new services; there have been frequency improvements of Route 20 and 60 and service implemented on SR 44 in New Smyrna Beach. There will also be a new implementation as part of Volusia County's budget to provide service along Howland

Boulevard in Deltona. Votran does buy new buses to take older buses out of service that are not functioning or are more demanding of service and parts replacement. The life of a fixed route bus is 12 years or up to 500,000 miles. This year Votran will be buying about 11 new buses.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Transportation Performance Measures and Transit Asset</u> <u>Management (TAM) Plans</u>

Mr. Harris stated transportation performance measurement (TPM) is a strategic approach to using system information to manage system performance outcomes. As a result of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, there are planning factors that must be taken into account that include resiliency and reliability of transportation, storm water impacts and enhancement of travel and tourism. Public participation is also required. A TPM is intended to link investment policies and project programming decision making. It is meant to inform decisions, provide feedback on transportation system performance and should reflect the priorities and demonstrate sound stewardship of resources. FDOT also has to set targets and established measures to report to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The TPO set safety targets earlier this year and will be setting additional targets including bridge conditions, pavement conditions and travel time reliability. These are areas where funding is not directly controlled by the TPO so the TPO will most likely adopt what measures FDOT adopts to support them. The deadline for Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plans is October 1, 2018 and the deadline for Public Transit Agency Safety Plans has been delayed. He reviewed the other measures provided for automobiles and other modes.

A quorum was obtained at this point in the meeting and the Action Items were discussed.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of the July 11, 2018 TDLCB Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Craig to approve the July 11, 2018 TDLCB

meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bumb and carried

unanimously.

B. Review and Approval of the Community Transportation Coordinator's (CTC's) Monthly Paratransit Reports

Ms. Blanck stated the report is in the agenda on page 13; the report is an impression of how the overall system has been operating vis-à-vis the people that have limited access to fixed route service as well as fixed route service. Fixed route ramp deployments in June had a 22% increase and a 7% increase in July. Wheelchair boardings for paratransit in June were up 4% and 9% in July. Votran is providing a large amount of assistance to individuals with disabilities to the best of its ability.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Jack to approve the Community Transportation Coordinator's (CTC's) monthly paratransit reports. The motion was seconded by Ms. Craig and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Discussion Items and Presentations</u>

C. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft FY 2017/18 Public Involvement Report

(Handout)

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2017/18 Public Involvement Report. The TPO's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30. She reviewed the social media outreach added the TPO has a master database and an email contact list as well as individual public contact logs for each staff member. She reviewed the public meetings and hearings and stated the TPO sets aside time at each regular committee and board meeting for public comments. She gave an overview of the community presentations and events the TPO attended throughout the year including bike helmet fittings; a total of 977 bike helmets were distributed to adults and children last year which is an increase of 15%. The 2018 "Tell the TPO" survey received 2,176 responses and it is estimated the survey reached 62,363 people. The TDLCB came in third in the Committee Ambassador Challenge and the TPO Board Ambassador Winner was Council Member Jeff Allebach from Orange City. For FY 2018/19, the TPO will be reaching out to the "younger crowd" beginning with the TRAC (Transportation and Civil Engineering) program through Mainland High School. The TRAC program looks at different hands on activity to teach students about transportation and civil engineering.

Chairperson Wheeler commented the TPO did a great job this year.

D. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft Roadway Safety Evaluation & Improvement Study</u>

Mr. Harris introduced Ms. Martha Moore, Alfred Benesch and Company, to give the presentation.

Ms. Moore gave a PowerPoint presentation on the draft Roadway Safety Evaluation and Improvement Study. She has been working with the TPO since the spring to build on the 2017 Crash Analysis Study completed by the TPO to see what can be done using the three Es; engineering, education and enforcement. They are working within the TPO planning area and going back five years to look at all the crash data using the Signal Four Analytics program to identify segments and intersections that have the most frequent crashes and the most severe crashes to see if there are any engineering solutions to improve them. If not, then they will look to see if education or enforcement could help improve the crash rates. They have excluded Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) projects and intersections and segments that already have studies or projects planned or being done. She reviewed the statistics of the collisions, fatalities and injuries for severity and frequency as well as the project scope. She reviewed the schedule of the study and stated the final report will be presented to the TPO Board for adoption in September.

Mr. Jack asked if the study is available online; he would like to know what areas to tell his operators to avoid.

Ms. Moore replied the study covers a lot of information; these are not the worst locations within the TPO's planning area; these are locations that were sorted out of the data. Distracted driving is a big problem in Volusia County and was noticed during their field review. The entire study is available on the TPO's website.

Mr. Harris commented that a link to the draft study was provided in the agenda on page 27.

Ms. Moore stated in some cases they recommended low cost solutions and in others it will need to be education and enforcement.

V. Staff Comments

(Handout)

Ms. Blanck announced new Votran service has begun on SR 44 in New Smyrna Beach; in 2010, regular fixed route services in New Smyrna Beach were assessed and those that traveled east to west were eliminated. The mailer distributed to members was sent to all residents and commercial enterprises within one mile of the route. She recognized Ms. Edie Biro, Votran Customer Service Manager, and Ms. Colby Stallings, Votran Finance Department, for their help. She also recognized Mr. Frank Alverez, Votran Senior Planner, for his participation.

Ms. Blanck announced Votran would be participating with the TPO in a Mobility Week effort at the New Smyrna Beach Farmer's Market on October 27, 2018. Votran will have a "Ride with Rob" event; Mr. Rob Stevens, Votran General Manager, will be riding the bus between 11:00 am and 1:00 pm that day. Votran and the TPO will also be ending Mobility Week by participating in the Halifax Art Festival.

→ River to Sea TPO Staff Update

Mr. Harris announced that Mr. Vince Wang, TPO Transit Planner, has resigned from his position. Mr. Harris will be providing TPO support to the TDLCB for the time being.

→ Close-out of Transit Planning Studies

Mr. Harris stated two transit planning studies that were underway; the Volusia County Bus Stop Inventory Study and the Flagler County Transit Operations Study, have been closed out by the TPO. A letter from TPO Executive Director, Ms. Lois Bollenback, will be forwarded to members regarding this matter.

Ms. Craig referred to the Volusia County Bus Stop Inventory Study and stated that the bus stop in DeLand in front of the Family Health Source on Plymouth Avenue is on the road itself. There was an inquiry as to how to provide a safer area but it was incumbent upon the property owners to pay for it; it is a very unsafe place. She sits on the West Volusia Hospital Board and they rent that space to the Family Health Source; these are people that are in need and in bad health and she is concerned about the safety of the bus stop location. She asked if this could still be looked at.

Ms. Blanck replied Votran will look into that.

Mr. Harris announced TPO Executive Director, Ms. Lois Bollenback, was in attendance today.

VI. TDLCB Member Comments

Ms. Lipovsky stated an announcement regarding the White Cane/Pedestrian Safety Awareness Walk was sent out last month; it was originally scheduled for October 13, 2018 but has been moved to October 27, 2018. The location is the intersection of International Speedway Boulevard (ISB) and White Street from 9:00 am until 12:00 pm. White Cane Safety Day is in recognition of the blind and visually impaired and to educate motorists.

Chairperson Wheeler commented that she has participated in this in the past and encouraged members to attend.

VII. TDLCB Chairperson Comments

Chairperson Wheeler recognized Votran driver, Mr. Paul Okumu, for his bravery in preventing a violent sexual attack on the bus he was driving on July 20, 2018 in Ponce Inlet. He was recently presented with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Town of Ponce Inlet and will be honored at the next Volusia County Council meeting for his outstanding service to Votran. She also recognized Votran driver, Mr. "Doc" Wilson, for being selected as the National Safety Council Safe Driver Award recipient for the South Atlantic Region. He has driven over 3 million miles without a preventable incident and has participated in several difficult emergency evacuations and medical emergencies. We need to celebrate these employees and heroes and be proud of them.

Votran Annual Operating Report – Significant Changes and Update to Local Coordinating Board

The following serves as an update to the Local Coordinating Board (LCB) on the Annual Operating Report (AOR) submitted to the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2017-2018.

Passenger Trip Info

- The number of daily trip tickets purchased increased 25% compared to last year.
- The number of weekly passes purchased increased 155% compared to last year.
 - It is unclear why there is such a variance from the previous year. Ridership has increased overall and additional service has been provided.
- The number of School Board trips decreased 78% compared to last year.
 - The School Board did not pay for bus trips as it has in the past; possible due to budgetary changes or the improved economy.
- Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT)-funded trips decreased 35% compared to last year.
 - The ridership for the rural area is down overall; the assumption is this is due to lower fuel prices and increased employment.
- Other federal program trips decreased 78% compared to last year.
 - Headstart-ridership and funding are down overall.
- Medical purpose trips increased 22% compared to last year.
 - Votran no longer participates with Medwaiver.
 - Paratransit demand is up overall.
- Employment purpose trips increased 31% compared to last year.
- Total complaints decreased by 6% while total commendations increased by 8%.

Vehicle Info

- The total number of vehicle and revenue miles remained consistent between last FY and this FY, as well as the distribution of revenue miles and vehicle miles between the CTC, Coordination Contractors, and Transportation Providers.
 - The CTC accounted for around 61% of total vehicle and revenue miles,
 Transportation Providers accounted for 31% of vehicle and revenue miles, and
 Coordination Contractors accounted for around 8% of vehicle and revenue miles
 this FY.
- The number of chargeable total accidents (person only) increased from 1 to 3 this year, while non-chargeable total accidents (person only) decreased from 4 to 3 this year.
 - o There was an error when initially entered last year, which has been corrected.



- The number of chargeable total accidents (vehicle only) decreased from 4 to 2 this year.
- The grand total of accidents decreased from 15 in FY 2016-2017 to 10 this FY.

Employee Information

- The number of part-time drivers increased 100% compared to last year from 6 to 12.
 - More employees were needed to try and meet the demand for service.
- The number of schedulers decreased from 5 in FY 2016-2017 to 3 in FY 2017-2018, or approximately 40%.
 - Less schedulers at this time, as automation is helping with this need.
- The number of call intake/reservations/customer service employees increased from 10 to 12, or by 20%, compared to last year.
 - o More employees were needed.
- The number of administrative support employees for Coordination Contractors increased from 1 in FY 2016-2017 to 7 in this year, an increase of 600%.
 - Increased demand for services, extra employees needed.

Revenue Sources

- Revenue from the Department of Education's (DOE) Department of Blind Services decreased from \$17,431 in FY 2016-2017 to \$3,404 this year. And revenue from Vocational Rehabilitation decreased from \$18,344 in FY 2016-2017 to \$4,186 this year – a decrease of approximately 80% for each revenue streams.
 - o Ridership is down.
- Revenue from the DOE's Day Care Programs increased from \$0 in FY 2016-2017 to \$33,180 this year.
 - o This revenue source was not reported last year.
- Revenue from the Department of Elder Affair's Community Care for the Elderly increased from \$16,760 in FY 2016-2017 to \$58,477 this year, an increase of 249%.
 - o This is a result of increased demand.
- Revenue from the Department of Health's Office of Disability Determination increased from \$1,389 in FY 2016-2017 to \$84,102 this year, an increase of nearly 6000%.
 - This is a result of increased demand and costs.
- Revenue from Local Government's Complementary ADA Service decreased from \$3,488,197 in FY 2016-2017 to \$2,501,806 this year, a decrease of nearly 29%.
 - This number represents what we use to cover the cost of services that were not billable, due to the increase in ridership and price per trip for Department of Elder Affairs and ADA this number amount decreased from previous years.
- A grant was awarded by the TD Commission for \$52,143 this year, categorized under Other Local Non-Government revenues.



- Revenue from the Head Start program decreased from \$29,917 in FY 2016-2017 to \$8,211 this year, a decrease of 73%.
 - o This decline is a result of billing issues throughout the year.

Expense Sources

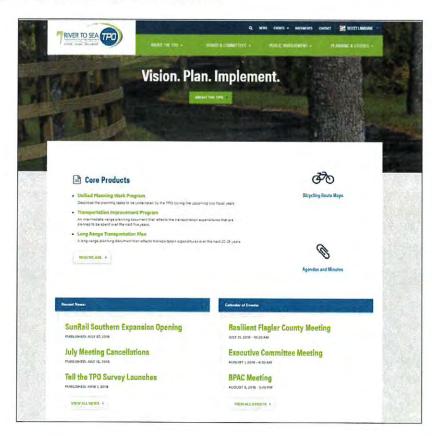
- Fringe Benefits (502) expenses decreased from \$1,323,536 in FY 2016-17 to \$890,737 this year, a decrease of 33%.
 - Votran is unsure how this was calculated in previous fiscal years. This number matches our expense reports for paratransit.
- Services (503) expenses increased from \$435,308 in FY2016-2017 to \$1,655,645 this year, an increase of 280%.
 - The cost of contracted paratransit services increased.
- Utilities (505) expenses increased from \$17,855 in FY 2016-2017 to \$22,826 this year, an increase of 28%.
 - Votran is not sure how this number was configured historically. This is a percentage of the overall cost for the year and will be calculated in the same manner in the future.
- Casualty and Liability (506) expenses increased from \$58,034 in FY 2016-2017 to \$104,560 compared to last year, an increase of 80%.
 - The increased cost this fiscal year is due to when the actual expenses hit during the state calendar year vs insurance billing year.
- Taxes (507) expenses decreased from \$6,954 in FY 2016-2017 to \$0 this year.
 - Votran does not pay taxes and-this has been misreported historically.
- Allocated indirect expenses increased from \$0 in FY 2016-2017 to \$373,909 this year.
 - This was not reported over the last several years and should have been, this will be reported in the future as is appropriate.

THIS YEAR'S EVENT WAS HELD AT THE INTERSECTION OF BEVILLE AND NOVA ROADS IN DAYTONA BEACH.

ST. JOHNS RIVER TO SEA LOOP SUMMIT: THIS THREE DAY EVENT, ON OCTOBER 26-28, 2017, CELEBRATED THE PROMISE OF THE LOOP AND EMPHASIZED THE CONTINUING PROCESS AND PARTNERSHIPS REQUIRED TO FULFILL THAT PROMISE. THE EVENTS SPANNING THREE DAYS INCLUDED A STAKEHOLDER MEETING, COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND BIKE RIDE AND RODEO. THE TPO PARTICIPATED IN THE PLANNING OF THIS EVENT AS WELL AS IN THE SUMMIT CELEBRATION HELD ON OCTOBER 28, 2017 BY STAFFING A TABLE, PROVIDING SAFETY AND PROMOTIONAL ITEMS AND FITTING AND DONATING 51 BICYCLE HELMETS TO ADULTS AND CHILDREN.

THE GOALS OF THE SURVEY INCLUDED INCREASING AWARENESS AND BRANDING OF THE RIVER TO SEA TPO; BUILDING THE TPO'S DATABASE OF INTERESTED RESIDENTS, BUSINESSES AND VISITORS; BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS WITH OTHER AGENCIES, CIVIC ORGANIZATIONS, AND THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY; ENGAGING THE PUBLIC IN THINKING ABOUT TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ISSUES; OBTAINING INFORMATION ABOUT PUBLIC OPINION ON "HOT BUTTON" TRANSPORTATION ISSUES AND DESIRES RELATED TO MOBILITY OPTIONS; AND COMPARING RESULTS OF THE 2018 SURVEY TO PRIOR YEARS' SURVEYS. THE ONLINE VERSION OF THE SURVEY WAS HOUSED ON ITS OWN WEBSITE, WWW.TELLTHETPO.COM. HARD COPIES OF THE SURVEY WERE MADE AVAILABLE UPON REQUEST AND AT THE LOCATIONS LISTED ABOVE. TWO-THOUSAND ONE-HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-SIX RESPONSES WERE RECEIVED. THIS REPRESENTS A 70% INCREASE OVER PREVIOUS YEARS' SURVEYS. MEDIA OUTREACH INCLUDED 13 MEDIA ARTICLES, TWO TELEVISION INTERVIEWS AND TWO RADIO INTERVIEWS, INCLUDING NEWS-13, NEWS DAYTONA BEACH AND VOLUSIA MAGAZINE. MORE THAN 200 HARD COPIES OF THE SURVEY IN ENGLISH AND SPANISH WERE DISTRIBUTED IN THE PIERSON AREA THROUGH THE ROTARY CLUB OF FLAGLER BEACH'S FOOD DISTRIBUTION EVENT. IT IS ESTIMATED THAT 62,200 PEOPLE WERE MADE AWARE OF, OR CAME IN CONTACT WITH, THE RIVER TO SEA TPO AND THE TELL THE TPO SURVEY THROUGH THE NEWS MEDIA (RADIO, TELEVISION AND PRINT), SOCIAL MEDIA OUTLETS, ORGANIZATIONAL WEBSITE LINKS AND EVENTS.

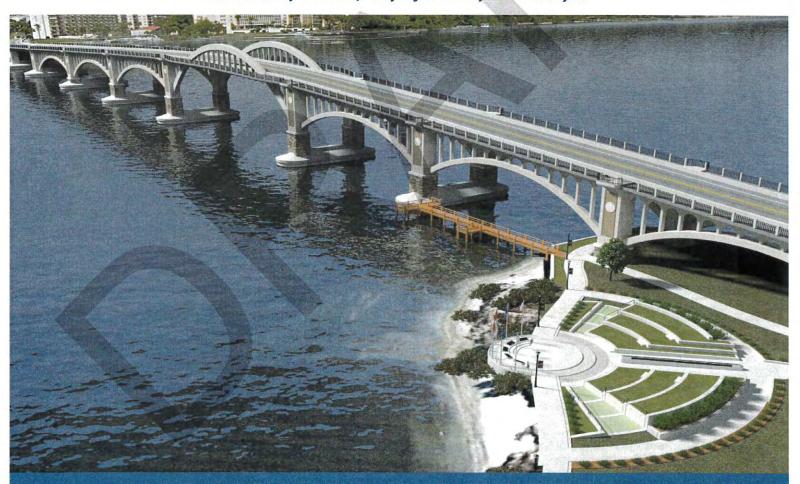

2019 Legislative Positions

Adopted by River to Sea TPO Board 11-28-2018

- Preserve the existing MPO structure
- Maintain transportation funding & increase funding flexibility
- Improve transportation safety by discouraging texting while driving & improving pedestrian safety

Thank you for considering the legislative positions established by the River to Sea TPO. As these positions were developed, consideration was given to the positions established by organizations throughout the state of Florida including the Florida Association of Counties (FAC), the Florida League of Cities (FLC), Florida Public Transit Association (FPTA) and the Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council (MPOAC). We value our relationship with these organizations and appreciate the support and leadership they provide.

River to Sea TPO Legislative Issues Subcommittee

Transportation Priority -- Preservation of MPOs

The River to Sea TPO <u>opposes</u> legislation that attempts to impose restrictions on Metropolitan Planning Organizations.

Background

Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) play a key role in ensuring local input in transportation decision-making. Core activities of an MPO include communication, collaboration and continuous planning to ensure the provision of a safe and efficient transportation system. The contribution of local knowledge and understanding brought by members of an MPO helps to better address matters of transportation safety, public engagement, economic development, transportation disadvantaged populations, resiliency, and congestion management.

During the last legislative session bills were filed that sought to reduce the number of voting members on MPO Boards, remove the ability to have a weighted vote, and place term limits on board members. These restrictions would have a negative and disruptive impact on the River to Sea TPO Board's current structure and processes and would result in an unnecessary expense to the organization.

<u>MPO Membership</u> - The River to Sea TPO Board currently consists of 19 voting members representing the diverse interests of our planning area which spans two counties and includes 20 municipalities. When the TPO's planning area was expanded in 2013, members of the board took a strong position that supported the inclusion of all local governments that are impacted by the decision-making of the organization. Limiting the voting membership is contrary to that position.

<u>Weighted Voting</u> - Since the River to Sea TPO planning area represents local governments with varying population sizes, the TPO currently utilizes a weighted vote process where votes are allocated to each voting member based on their respective municipality's population. Additionally, a small city alliance, consisting of the smallest municipalities within the planning area, was formed with one vote allocated based on the cumulative population of the small cities. Eliminating the option for a weighted vote would diminish the proportionate voting representation provided by the largest cities while elevating the influence of much smaller governments.

<u>Term Limits</u> - The River to Sea TPO Board members currently serve at the will of the member local governments, thereby providing each local government the discretion of how they are represented on the TPO Board. Imposing term limits specific to the TPO Board undermines this authority of the local government. Additionally, placing term limits on board members will lead to a loss of institutional knowledge, experience, expertise, and continuity that are crucial to effective policy making.

Benefit

The River to Sea TPO functions well within the current rules established for membership. The board operates collaboratively and effectively and maintains a strong relationship with local advocacy groups, chambers of commerce and citizen groups. There would be no gain from legislation that disrupts our current membership or operating practices.

Transportation Priority -- Funding

The River to Sea TPO <u>supports</u> legislation that <u>preserves transportation</u> funding and provides greater flexibility of funding to support the safety, efficiency and preservation of the transportation system.

Background

Transportation revenue is collected to support the preservation and development of a safe and efficient transportation system that supports economic development, freight mobility, tourism, bicycle and pedestrian safety, accessibility and public transit among others. Actions that protect these programs include:

Consider Funding Options that Stabilize Local and State Transportation Funding

The Florida Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council (MPOAC) completed a Transportation Revenue Study in 2012. The study found that transportation revenues were not keeping pace with increased costs over time. Subsequent analysis of fuel taxes by the Florida Transportation Commission also found the current structure to be unsustainable. The River to Sea TPO supports efforts to index city/county fuel taxes and to further evaluate options that would provide a more sustainable revenue source for transportation.

• Increasing and Stabilizing Funding Levels for the Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP)

TRIP funding promotes regional transportation planning and project development and has been used to fund important infrastructure improvements. The program is funded primarily through Documentary Stamp proceeds and the allocations have varied significantly in recent years from a low of \$11 million in 2016 to approximately \$157 million in 2014. The R2CTPO supports stable and consistent funding through TRIP.

• Protecting the State Transportation Trust Fund and the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund

In prior years, revenues generated by transportation-related surcharges have been directed outside the Transportation Trust Fund for other purposes. Overall, such diversions degrade the state's infrastructure and impacts overall competitiveness for federal discretionary funding. Likewise, revenue impacts to the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund diminish transportation services provided to the most vulnerable citizens. The R2CTPO supports the use of transportation funding for transportation purposes.

Identify Resources for the Maintenance and Preservation the States SUN Trail System

During the 2015 legislative session, the Florida Shared-Use Non-motorized Trail (SUN Trail) network was established. The River to Sea TPO supports this program and is currently developing projects that will help to complete the Coast to Coast Trail as well as the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail. We recognize, however, that preservation of transportation infrastructure is a key requirement of program and the River to Sea TPO supports efforts to plan for and direct funding to ensure these statewide assets are maintained over time.

Benefit

Efficient transportation systems are necessary to support a strong economy. Inadequate funding to support capital projects as well as operations and maintenance will lead to increased congestion and degradation of vital infrastructure. Increased traffic congestion has negative economic and environmental impacts.

Transportation Priority -- Safety

The River to Sea TPO supports legislation that improves transportation safety.

Background

These items are intended to support safety initiatives in the State of Florida as well as the national emphasis on safety improvements outlined in the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act.

Pedestrian Safety

Florida consistently ranks at or near the top of the nation in pedestrian injuries and fatalities. Increasing safety and reducing these rates will require education, engineering and law enforcement efforts. The River to Sea TPO supports:

- > enhanced funding for educational programs that show positive results;
- > strengthening of existing pedestrian safety laws; and
- > performance driven funding for projects that address unsafe conditions.

The 2016 Dangerous by Design report listed the Deltona-Daytona Beach-Ormond Beach Metropolitan Area as the fifth most dangerous area in the nation. Florida DOT is using the Alert Today, Alive Tomorrow program along with changes in design standards to drive down pedestrian fatalities and injuries throughout the state. Though not in the top 10, Flagler County has also recorded bicycle and pedestrian crashes, which may be addressed through proactive efforts involving evaluation, education, engineering and enforcement.

Texting While Driving

Recent crash analyses completed by the River to Sea TPO shows that crashes resulting from distracted driving occur at a rate almost five (5) times as frequent as other crash types. While further research is needed to determine the role of handheld devices in these crashes,

The 2013 Florida legislature enacted the "Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law." The law prohibits operation of a moving motor vehicle while manually typing, sending or reading interpersonal communication (texting, e-mailing, instant messaging, etc.) using a wireless communications device, with certain exceptions. The law provides for enforcement of the ban as a secondary offense, meaning a driver would have to be pulled over for some other violation to be ticketed.

The River to Sea TPO supports legislation that would increase the penalty, making it a primary offense. Additionally, the River to Sea TPO supports expanding the law to include all uses of handheld electronic devices while driving. This would strengthen the enforcement mechanism for the texting while driving ban by making it a primary offense to use handheld electronic wireless devices while driving.

Benefit

Transportation safety is critical for residents and for the thousands of visitors who choose to vacation here. Changes in Florida law along with other crash reduction efforts improve quality of life and support economic development.

Additional Positions

The River to Sea TPO also <u>supports</u> legislation that:

- Offers incentives for employers that reduce peak-hour demand by allowing off-peak commuting and telecommuting options to employees.
- Increases MPO/TPO involvement in growth management, mobility planning and visioning activities to promote a stronger linkage between land-use, transportation and economic development.
- Allows Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) funds to be used on roads and other transportation facilities not designated on the SIS if the improvement will relieve congestion on the SIS.
- Allows state funds to be used for improvements to county, or other local service, collector and distributor roads that provide alternative access to controlled access state facilities.
- Increases the percentage of the state transportation capacity program allocated to non-SIS highways and transit programs in order to improve mobility on regional and metropolitan area transportation facilities.
- Requires TPO concurrence for public-private partnership agreements related to the lease or sale of transportation facilities that are publicly owned and operated within metropolitan areas and any subsequent modifications to such agreements.
- Promotes interoperable and multi-modal smartcard technology that is compatible, universal and accessible for use by all other smartcard technology systems.
- Maintains gross vehicle weight limitation and restrictions by not raising the maximum weight limit above 80,000 pounds (exceptions should only be granted when authorized by state and local governments and adequate compensation is paid to mitigate the impact to state and local transportation facilities).
- Provides mandatory funding for driver education programs in high schools.
- Changes the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act (CCNA) to allow agencies to introduce a "best-value" option that considers cost as a factor when selecting a firm.

The River to Sea TPO will monitor legislation that:

- Authorizes counties to form a regional transportation finance authority for the purpose of financing, constructing, maintaining and operating transportation projects that are consistent with MPO plans.
- Proposes to establish Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts associated with expressway or passenger rail
 corridors for the purposes of financing the debt issued to pay for the project.
- Promotes the continued development and expansion of bus and rail transit as well as efforts to accommodate the growing demand for alternative mobility vehicles (low-speed vehicles, electric vehicles and golf carts).
- Establishes reasonable limits on the amount of business damages awardable in an eminent domain action.
- Encourages continued intergovernmental coordination and support of shoreline stabilization efforts for SR A1A in Flagler County.
- Considers changes to the transportation analysis required for Developments of Regional Impacts (DRI).



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
