I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum

Chairperson Deyette called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) to order at 1:15 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was present.

II. Press/Citizen Comments

There were no press/citizen comments.

III. Consent Agenda

A. Review and Approval of June 20, 2017 CAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Feldman to approve the June 20, 2017 CAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bove and carried unanimously.

IV. Action Items

A. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2017-## Amending the FY 2017/18 - 2021/22

Transportation Improvement Program

Chairperson Deyette stated FDOT and the city of Port Orange are requesting an amendment to the TIP for the Dunlawton Avenue Walk Light project. The amendment moves the project from the last fiscal year to this one and adds additional local funding.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Blais to recommend approval of Resolution 2017-## amending the FY 2017/18 - 2021/22 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Ms. Lipovsky and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2017-## Authorizing the Execution of a Supplemental Agreement to the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Agreement for the Use of Transportation Planning (PL) and Urban Attributable (SU) Funds and Amending the FY 2016/17 and 2017/18 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) (Exhibit A)

Chairperson Deyette stated the UPWP is the TPO's two-year work plan. The TPO staff is recommending several changes to allocate an additional \$106,772 in funding; adjust funding in tasks based on staffing changes; and to add and adjust various planning activities.

Ms. Bollenback stated there was an attachment provided in the agenda packet that explains the changes; an additional \$106,000 to use toward the work the TPO does is good news. The TPO has gone through some staffing changes over the last year. The Bicycle/Pedestrian Planner position was eliminated although Mr. Harris still carries out that role on the planning side. The TPO created a Community Outreach Coordinator position and Ms. Blankenship has moved into that position. Reflected here is more money toward community outreach and the development a program of the TRAC program which is a federal program that puts learning modules into a local high school to encourage students in the science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields. The students go through a variety of hands on activities to learn about engineering, bridge building and transportation careers. The TPO has added a few additional projects and is doing public outreach support for the I-95 to SR 417 Connector Study which is being managed by the Florida Turnpike Enterprise; the TPO will provide local support for that. The TPO has reallocated its time estimates; the UPWP is a two-year document and is based on estimates. It was developed in March 2015 and things have changed with time. This is an opportunity to reallocate funds in a way to use them best. The TPO has freed up funds to go to the consultant support teams to carry on some of the work and modified a couple of activities to better reflect what the TPO will be doing over the remainder of the year.

Ms. Jamison asked when the TRAC program would be available in the school.

Ms. Bollenback replied the TPO is trying to get it in to one of the high schools this year.

Ms. Jamison asked if it would be an engineering program in just one school and if it would travel throughout Volusia County to all the schools.

Ms. Blankenship replied it would be implemented in one school to start and the TPO does not know which one yet.

Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO wants to see how it goes. The agency has not previously worked with the school system but there are people who work with the TPO in the transportation engineering and planning fields that are willing to provide assistance to school faculty to implement these programs. It should be a great opportunity but until we go through it once, it is difficult to know what direction it will head after that.

Ms. Jamison asked if the TPO knew what school it would be in yet.

Ms. Blankenship replied not yet; it will either be New Smyrna Beach High School, Mainland High School or University High School.

Ms. Bollenback stated there is a coordinator in the Volusia County Schools that Ms. Blankenship has been in contact with; that individual works with the different science fields throughout the school district and will make that determination.

Mr. Bove referred to page 28 under Task 2.08, General Planning Studies, and asked if the completion date for the Sea Level Rise Report was correctly listed as September 2016.

Ms. Bollenback replied yes; the TPO completed a report last year and is currently doing a follow up study on sea level rise in addition to storm surge and a resiliency component. There are actually two reports.

Mr. Storke asked what "TRAC" stands for.

Ms. Blankenship replied it stands for transportation and civil engineering.

MOTION:

A motion was made by Mr. Blais to recommend approval of Resolution 2017-## authorizing the execution of a Supplemental Agreement to the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Agreement for the use of Transportation Planning (PL) and Urban Attributable (SU) funds and amending the FY 2016/17 and 2017/18 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) (Exhibit A). The motion was seconded by Ms. Lipovsky and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2017-## Adopting the Resilient Volusia County Report

Chairperson Deyette stated this project is being managed by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council. The report is not complete and TPO staff is requesting a motion to defer the item to September.

MOTION:

A motion was made by Ms. Lipovsky to defer recommendation of approval of Resolution 2017-## adopting the Resilient Volusia County Report until September. The motion was seconded by Ms. Elliott and carried unanimously.

V. <u>Presentation Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Implementing Transportation Performance Measures and Developing Targets for the River to Sea TPO</u>

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation on implementing Transportation Performance Measures and developing targets for the River to Sea TPO. Performance measures and targets were included as a requirement under MAP-21 (Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century) and subsequently under the FAST Act (Fixing America's Surface Transportation). They are the legislative programs that assign funding and determine the programs that the TPO has to follow. She reviewed the six elements established at the national level which include national goals established by Congress and the measures that are established through USDOT's rule-making process. The state DOTs and MPOs take these measures and try to improve upon them by setting targets that filters down to plans and reports that create transparency and

accountability. The safety measures and planning requirements are the first things that have to change; the safety measures and targets must be established and approved by the TPO by February 27, 2018. This is a day before the TPO Board meeting so the deadline will be January. The considerations for target setting range from minimum to aspirational. She reviewed the five performance measures for safety targets that include the number of fatalities and the rate of fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled (VMT).

Ms. Lipovsky asked if this included pedestrian fatalities as well.

Ms. Bollenback continued reviewing the five performance measures for safety targets which also include the number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries. This is an area the TPO has been trying to address but more people are being killed and injured by cars. FDOT has agreed to take the lead and provide the data for the performance measures for the MPOs to set their targets. The planning requirements state that the TPO must have performance based planning; the decisions made are based on this data and show why it is important and what a project, plan or program will do. The requirements also call for transit representatives to sit on the TPO Board; the TPO already has that representation on its board. However, a SunRail representative may need to be added once it is no longer managed by FDOT.

Ms. Bledsoe asked if under the FAST Act FDOT and the MPOs have to consider safety measures in planning and if that took priority over travel delay.

Ms. Bollenback replied that part of the guidance has not come out yet; when the TPO amends the TIP and moving targets into the TIP starting next year, it will have to explain why that project is going to help achieve the set targets. The decisions and how the TPO allocates funding in the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) will have to explain how they help meet the targets.

Ms. Bledsoe asked if it would be applied retroactively to projects already in the loop.

Ms. Bollenback replied no, but the TPO will update the LRTP. It will be for everything that is moved into the TIP. The TPO already programs projects for safety; that has been a priority so the new targets may not be terribly impactful. Any project that modernizes a design may help but it may impact the VMT; changing the number may change the rate. It remains to be seen how the details flesh out.

Ms. Gillespie asked if this would change scores or categories when ranking applications through the TIP process.

Ms. Bollenback replied that she could not answer that yet; the applications are a good example of the categories already.

Mr. Feldman commented that the TPO would set its own targets and asked if they would set their own measurements also.

Ms. Bollenback replied no; the measures are established for the TPO. The only thing the TPO does decide how many fatalities; if there are 100 fatalities this year, we would try for 95 next year.

Mr. Peterson commented most fatalities are operator error and not due to road conditions or things that the TPO could correct. He asked how the TPO would set goals when much of it is out of our control and unrelated to anything the TPO does.

Ms. Bollenback replied there are a lot of things out of our control; if it is driver behavior, it may require a law enforcement answer. The TPO has very limited ability to influence law enforcement. The TPO can try to develop awareness programs and work with law enforcement but cannot enforce their activities. It is a challenge in Flagler County also, and they have very favorable statistics.

Mr. Peterson asked what to do about I-95 and I-4; the people using those interstates may not be Volusia or Flagler residents.

Ms. Bollenback replied that the TPO cannot influence that at all, but we can benefit from technology and over the next decade that will act on our side.

Mr. Ferguson stated that although the area has a lot of tourists, these rules are national, so wherever they are from as US citizens, other regions and other MPO's are trying to do the same thing as we are.

Ms. Jamison asked how much of future planning is counting on driverless cars.

Ms. Bollenback replied she did know about the fully autonomous cars, but there are lots of different assisted features on cars now, such as automated braking.

B. Presentation and Discussion of the SUN Trail Project Listing

Chairperson Deyette stated this planning area is fortunate to have the Coast to Coast and the St. John's River to Sea Loop trails ranked as the Tier 1 and Tier 2 trail systems in Florida. FDOT has suspended the annual call for projects for Tier 3 this year.

Mr. Harris showed the list of Non-Motorized Shared Use or SUN Trail projects and commented it is considered a supplement to the list of Bicycle/Pedestrian projects. This list consists of all the projects currently in the Work Program that are SUN Trail funded. There are some redundancies between this list and the Bicycle/Pedestrian list. He explained that some projects came through the TPO's priority process, were put on the list and then were later funded by SUN Trail. SUN Trail is state funding; some project sponsors chose to develop their projects with the state funds and did not apply for federal funds; those projects were removed from the Bicycle/Pedestrian list. Some project sponsors chose to keep their projects on the TPO Bicycle/Pedestrian list to be eligible for federal funds because SUN Trail state funds only pay for the design and construction of the trail itself. It does not pay for any amenities such as water fountains, benches, rest rooms, benches, and signage. All the projects are in the Work Program and almost all are in Volusia County. All the projects but one are part of the St. Johns River to Sea (SJR2C) Loop.

Mr. Blais asked if any consideration was given to parking for these trails.

Mr. Harris replied yes; many times parking is part of the trailhead or other facility along the trail. The SUN Trail program does not pay for any amenities, just the physical trail itself. Amenities can be paid for with federal or local funds, which is why some project sponsors chose to keep their project on the TPO list.

Mr. Blais commented that Holly Hill has parking every mile; he referenced City Island and stated if there is an event going on parking is a premium. Bethune Point could be designated for parking.

Mr. Harris replied parking for motorized vehicles, bicycles and bike racks all enhance the user experience and are worthwhile additions to these trail projects; they just cannot be paid for with SUN Trail money.

Ms. Lipovsky asked if restrooms would be provided.

Mr. Harris replied restrooms can be provided; they would have to be paid for with federal or local funds.

Ms. Bledsoe referred to the "to be determined" comment in the estimated cost column and asked if that meant it was in the works.

Mr. Harris replied yes, the projects are in the works. He referenced the New Smyrna Beach to Port Orange gap in the SJR2C Loop and stated that is a project development and environmental study (PD&E). During the course of the study, the cost will be determined for future phases. When the list is updated and he has a cost, it will be inserted in.

Ms. Bledsoe stated she wanted to make sure the project was in the works.

Mr. Peterson commented that most of these projects are fully funded and asked if the projects with a "TBD" cost or those that are unfunded would move up to the top of the list and be the next ones to be funded.

Mr. Harris replied yes, hopefully so, but those projects do not have to wait until the fully funded projects drop off. Funding may become available and if so, the TPO will add the "fully funded" comment and the estimated cost.

Mr. Peterson asked if new projects were added to the list before these are funded or completed.

Mr. Harris replied it may not happen that way; there are still a few unfunded gaps on the SJR2C Loop. There is a stream of statewide funding of \$25 million a year. A new project could get on the list, it gets funded between now and next year, and still not have all fully funded projects drop off. New projects and funding can be added to the list.

C. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft 2017 River to Sea TPO Crash Analysis Report</u>

Chairperson Deyette stated each year the TPO completes a Transportation Performance Measures Report. Based on observations from the last Congestion Management Process (CMP) report, TPO staff looked more closely at crash data. A link to this report was provided in the agenda.

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation on the draft 2017 River to Sea TPO Crash Analysis Report. Last year, there were some data findings that required further research. At the end of the Crash Analysis Report, the TPO has suggested some follow up activities that could be helpful. TPO staff looked at a variety of automobile crashes; a more detailed bicycle/pedestrian fatalities area in a separate report. She reviewed the figures over a five-year period of time, 2011-2015 for Volusia and Flagler counties. She reviewed some of the findings. The TPO is trying to look at the information to see if there is a particular area that needs to be focused on.

Mr. Blais commented that part of I-4 has been under construction for the last couple of years.

Ms. Bollenback replied maybe the distractions were due to the construction or maybe people just were not slowing down for it. This is a human behavior issue. She reviewed the recommendations that should be pursued over time to decrease the number of crashes within the planning area, including rear-end collision and motorcycle crash detailed reviews in an effort to see actual engineering solutions that can lead to projects and what needs to be done regarding impaired and distracted driving. She encouraged the committee to review the report and provide input.

Mr. Peterson commented that rear-end collisions are a definite issue in both counties; he asked if the type of accident the distracted driver had could be pulled out of the data. There is not much that can be done about looking at cellphones but we can do something about drivers being distracted by someone spinning an advertisement sign. He wants to know what kind of crashes distracted drivers have.

Ms. Bollenback agreed; this is peeling back one layer and more layers need to be pulled back which is why the TPO is making these particular recommendations. The TPO does not have unlimited funds; we need to find what group we can have the greatest impact on and if we find a way to address that, then go to the next group. The TPO has made it a legislative priority to encourage making cell phone use a primary offense.

Mr. Blais asked in regards to the analysis and the accidents, how many cars had GPS.

Ms. Bollenback replied there are thousands of crash reports and the TPO does not have the resources to go through all of them; that is why the TPO is trying to figure out the obvious issues, such as rear-end crashes and what is causing them.

Ms. Lendian referred to the rear-end collisions and asked if speed involved was taken into account and if more crashes occurred in urbanized areas versus I-95 and I-4.

Ms. Bollenback replied the TPO has not looked at the detail; if they are speed related we need to share that information with law enforcement.

Ms. Gillespie stated she takes the Fifty-Five Alive program to get a discount on insurance. The program tells you to leave a space between vehicles and count to five to keep a safe distance but every time she does that, someone gets in the space. She commented that she is grateful for the extended turn lane into New Smyrna Beach High School and that there has not been an accident there yet.

Ms. Bollenback replied changing human behavior will be hard.

Ms. Lipovsky asked if people could get a traffic ticket for texting while driving.

Ms. Bollenback replied that in Florida it is a secondary offense; if a person is in an accident, then yes. They cannot pull you over for it without another primary offense.

Ms. Craig commented that she had been involved in a sideswipe accident and car manufacturers need to do something about the blind spots.

Ms. Bollenback replied that the technology is coming out.

Mr. Ferguson stated Florida Highway Patrol has a new ad out about using turn signals and how it can cut down on rear-end collisions and sideswipe accidents.

Ms. Bollenback added that people can behave like there is no one else on the road. One of the more dangerous crashes that was not studied in the report are left angle crashes.

Ms. Bledsoe asked who put the report together.

Ms. Bollenback replied the TPO put the report together; Ms. Aarti Sharma, TPO Database Manager.

Ms. Bledsoe suggested since the TPO spent time and energy to collect the data it was a perfect opportunity for public outreach such as a public service announcement (PSA) and to use the data to benefit the county.

Ms. Bollenback replied that was a great idea and people tend to make better decisions when they have information.

D. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the TPO's Annual Call for Projects and Project Priority Ranking Process</u>

Chairperson Deyette stated the TPO issues a call for projects each year and develops priority lists for the allocation of state and federal funding. At the end of each cycle, TIP Subcommittee members make recommendations for improvements to be considered during the next cycle.

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Call for Projects process and stated this is one of the more important processes the TPO works through. This is how the TPO develops projects, funds projects and how they are built. Projects are just one piece of a bigger system; there a lot of different choices people have to be on the roadways whether it is by car, bus, walking, or cycling. All of these different choices have to work together. There are a lot of organizations that build different parts of this system. There are different funding options at the state and federal level, grants and gas taxes. There a

many plans and documents that must to refer to each other. She stated the MPO's role was to provide local input for transportation decisions using state and federal funding based on a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive (3-Cs) planning process. She reviewed the process of project development and how FDOT develops their five-year plan. Once FDOT develops the five-year Work Program, the TPO develops the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), and those two plans have to match. She reviewed the three resolutions that guide the process; the resolutions delineate local match and project cost increases, establish project categories and ranking and allocate TPO set-aside funding. Because of the size of this TPO, it receives a little over \$5 million in set-aside funding which is allocated 40% to Traffic Ops/Safety projects, 30% to Bicycle/Pedestrian projects and 30% to Transit projects. Currently, the Transit goes to Votran but at some point it will also go to Flagler County Transit. She stated this TPO is one of the few in the state that has a process that is well mapped out and clear, with more objective rankings and a clear application process. She stated that each fall the TPO assesses the resolutions, applications and makes any changes that might need to be made to make the process better. The annual call for projects is issued in January; the big strategic intermodal systems projects come straight from the LRTP. She stated local governments could build their projects other ways; they do not have to come to the TPO for state and federal funding.

Ms. Lipovsky asked how it was determined whether a local government comes to the TPO or goes another route.

Ms. Bollenback replied it is a local government decision; she gave an example. Some local governments do not want to go through the federal process so they will look for local or state funds to build those projects.

Ms. Liposky asked if there were advantages and disadvantages on how they decide what to do.

Ms. Bollenback replied yes; the TPO does not try to determine what those might be. When a project application is submitted, the TPO presumes the local government is ready to federalize a project because it will be built with federal funds. She continued to review the priority process. When the legislature approves FDOT's five-year Work Program, the TPO updates its TIP. She discussed the issues to consider including the importance of supporting documentation.

Ms. Gillespie asked when the TPO will have the schedule for the TIP Subcommittee meetings.

Ms. Bollenback replied it will probably be set over the next couple of weeks. In the agenda packet is a list of those who served on the TIP Subcommittee; she announced that anyone is welcome to attend and provide input.

Ms. Gillespie requested that the meetings not be on Wednesdays.

E. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft 2017 Regional List of Priority Projects for the Central Florida</u> MPO Alliance (CFMPOA)

Ms. Bollenback stated in June this TPO adopted the current TIP and submitted it to FDOT. As an MPO, the R2CTPO is part of the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA) which includes MetroPlan, Space Coast TPO, Marion-Ocala TPO and Lake Sumter MPO, and the Polk TPO that joined together as a region to discuss the big regional projects. Each year after each MPO adopts their own priority list, the projects are combined into a regional list. The regional list is not a requirement of FDOT but as a region it helps to recognize what is going on outside our borders. She showed last year's marked up list and stated the TPO has not received the updated spreadsheet yet. She reviewed the categories and the projects that are being advanced in our area. All of the MPOs commit to adhering to the same priorities that are in our own prospective lists. They cannot change our list or the order of our projects. This is also done for trails; the Coast to Coast Trail is the number one system in Florida and the St. Johns River to Sea Loop is number two. The SUN Trail list Mr. Harris reviewed earlier has sixteen projects and ten are fully funded. She explained the SUN Trail funding breakdown. The CFMPOA meets quarterly and they want to approve this list in October. The finalized list will be presented next month. The bottom line is it matches the TPO's list.

C. FDOT Report

[Handout]

Mr. Ferguson stated the report was provided under separate cover and everything on his narrative list from the SR 5 resurfacing to the bridge deck repair at SR 44/North Causeway is set to be completed in early 2018. The only minor disappointment is the I-4, I-95 and US 92 System-to-System interchange project was scheduled to be complete by spring 2018 but has been moved out to summer 2018 due to weather conditions.

D. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

The Volusia County Construction Report and the Flagler County Construction Report are included in the agenda.

VI. Staff Comments

→ Update on the Allocation of the TPO Set-Aside Funding

Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO is still working with FDOT and those that have projects on the TPO priority list for set-aside funding; there is \$1 million in bicycle/pedestrian and \$1 million in traffic ops in the current year.

→ Update on the SR 44/Mission Rd/Wallace Rd/Canal St Alternative Intersection Design Study

Ms. Bollenback announced a SR 44 Intersection Design Study public meeting on September 14, 2017 at 5:00 pm in the New Smyrna Beach City Commission Chambers.

→ Update on the Draft Congestion Management Process/Performance Measure Report

Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO will be scheduling a Performance Measures Working Group meeting and a TIP Subcommittee meeting.

Ms. Bollenback introduced Ms. Colleen Nicoulin, the TPO Senior Planner.

I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum

Chairperson Ric Goss called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) to order at 3:02 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was present.

II. Press/Citizen Comments

There were no press/citizen comments.

III. Consent Agenda

A. Review and Approval of June 20, 2017 TCC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lear to approve the June 20, 2017 TCC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Ms. Winsett and carried unanimously.

IV. Action Items

A. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2017-## Amending the FY 2017/18 - 2021/22
Transportation Improvement Program

Ms. Bollenback stated this is a TIP amendment requested by FDOT and the city of Port Orange to move the Dunlawton Walk Light project from last fiscal year to the current fiscal year and add additional local funding.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lear to recommend approval of Resolution 2017-## amending the FY 2017/18 – 2021/22 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Holmes and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2017-## Authorizing the Execution of a Supplemental Agreement to the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Agreement for the Use of Transportation Planning (PL) and Urban Attributable (SU) Funds and Amending the FY 2016/17 and 2017/18 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) (Exhibit A)

Ms. Bollenback stated this is the TPO's two-year work plan; when it was developed in March 2015 the revenue available and staffing activities were estimated. The TPO has an additional \$106,000 available that had to be programmed into the second year activities. The TPO used that as an opportunity to reset some other costs in terms of how staff spends time. She reminded the committee that Mr. Harris moved from being a full-time Bicycle/Pedestrian Planner to a full-time Planner that does bicycle and pedestrian planning among other things. Ms. Blankenship moved from an administrative office assistant to Community Outreach Coordinator. The TPO also reallocated some FTA money, moved money from staffing to the consultant category and made changes to some of the deliverables. This is reflected in the agenda packet as well as the supplemental material provided by email.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Holmes to recommend approval of Resolution 2017-## authorizing the execution of a Supplemental Agreement to the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Agreement for the use of Transportation Planning (PL) and Urban Attributable (SU) funds and amending the FY 2016/17 and 2017/18 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) (Exhibit A). The motion was seconded by Mr. Lear and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2017-## Adopting the Resilient Volusia County Report

Ms. Bollenback stated this is a project the TPO is working on with the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council; they are writing the report and it is not ready yet. The TPO is asking for a motion to defer action until September.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Harowski to defer recommendation of approval of Resolution 2017-## adopting the Resilient Volusia County Report until September. The motion was seconded by Ms. King and carried unanimously.

V. <u>Presentation Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Implementing Transportation Performance Measures and Developing Targets for the River to Sea TPO</u>

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation on implementing Transportation Performance Measures and developing targets for the River to Sea TPO. Performance measures and targets are included as a requirement under MAP-21 (Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century) and subsequently under the FAST Act (Fixing America's Surface Transportation). Those are the programs that assign funding and determine the programs that the TPO has to follow. She reviewed the six elements established at the national level which include national goals established by Congress and the measures that are established through USDOT's rule-making process. The state DOTs and MPOs take these measures and try to improve upon them by setting targets that filter down to plans and reports to create transparency and accountability. She reviewed the national goals established by Congress and the Performance Measures chart. She referred to the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and TIP activity and stated the projects identified and programmed will have to demonstrate how they meet the targets that are set. The planning requirements state that the TPO must have performance based planning; the decisions made are based on this data and show why it is important and what a project, plan or program will do. The requirements also call for transit representatives to sit on the TPO Board; the TPO already has that representation. However, a SunRail representative may need to be appointed once it is no longer managed by FDOT. She explained that the use of planning products in project development means the information, the planning studies, and the work the TPO does up front should be carried throughout the life of a project. The safety measures and planning requirements are the first that have to be identified; the Safety Measures and targets must be established and approved by the TPO by February 27, 2018. This is a day before the TPO Board meeting so the deadline will be January. The considerations for target setting range from minimum to aspirational. She reviewed the five performance measures for safety targets. FDOT has agreed to take the lead and provide the data for the performance measures for the MPO's to set their targets.

Chairperson Goss asked if there was an established process for how targets will be chosen.

Ms. Bollenback replied no, not anything beyond bringing options through the committee process to discuss the pros and cons of reducing the fatality level in the Volusia and Flagler planning area.

Mr. Walsh referred to a target of the number of fatalities and asked how that would be ultimately used.

Ms. Bollenback replied it would impact how the TPO programs projects in the TIP and how it programs activity, funding and programs in the LRTP. The detailed guideline has not come out yet and FHWA is not ready to say what the TIP needs to look like as a project is moved into it. The TPO is getting ready to advance a project off the Tier B "waiting for funding" list into the TIP and needs to know if it needs data behind it or just a simple statement. The TPO will have to measure it and over time, show it.

B. Presentation and Discussion of the SUN Trail Project Listing

Mr. Harris showed the draft list of Non-Motorized Shared Use or SUN Trail projects and commented it is considered a supplement to the list of Bicycle/Pedestrian projects. The first project on the list is part of the Coast to Coast Trail which is a top priority for the SUN Trail network. All the other projects are in the St. Johns River to Sea Loop. All the projects are in the Work Program and almost all are in Volusia County, except the first project, which is in both Seminole and Volusia counties, the Spring to Spring Connector from Wayside Park to Lake Monroe Park. There are some redundancies between this list and the Bicycle/Pedestrian priority list. He explained that not all of the projects came through the TPO's priority process; some were added by the state. He reviewed some of the projects. A lot of these projects are fully funded but some are waiting for cost estimates and have a "to be determined" comment. Those will be updated when the cost estimates are complete.

C. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft 2017 River to Sea TPO Crash Analysis Report

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation on the draft 2017 River to Sea Crash Analysis Report and stated each year the TPO conducts an analysis of broad data which is a part of what has been leading to performance measures and congestion management. Last year, there were some data findings that were curious. There were some significant increases, especially with intersection crashes. At the end of the report, the TPO has come up with follow up activities that could be helpful. TPO staff looked at a variety of automobile crashes; and more detailed bicycle/pedestrian fatalities in a separate report. She reviewed the figures over a five-year period of time, 2011-2015 for Volusia and Flagler counties. She reviewed the FDOT Highway Safety Matrix ranked by population; not surprisingly, this area ranked high with motorcycle crashes. The TPO is trying to look at a lot of different information to see if there is an area that needs to be focused on. The ten highest intersection crashes are all on state roads.

Mr. Karet asked who ranked higher in motorcycle accidents than Daytona Beach; if it was Pierson.

Ms. Bollenback reviewed the ten intersections with the most frequent crashes and stated that looking at these intersections is one way to have an impact on reducing crashes. Looking at crash types, rear-end crashes eclipse all other crash types; five times as many rear-end crashes as any other kind in Volusia County and three times as often in Flagler County. This is something that does need to be looked at; it may not be an engineering fix but driver behavior programs. She showed the maps of impaired driving crashes and distracted driving crashes and commented that this does not seem to be an engineering issue; it is a human behavior issue. She encouraged the committee to review the report and provide input. The TPO must set targets and a good place to start is with the rear-end collisions, the high crash intersections, and possibly the motorcycle related crashes and try to determine what is an engineering issue and what might be a human behavior that needs to be addressed another way.

Chairperson Goss asked if these crashes were all vehicle-on-vehicle.

Ms. Bollenback replied that overall, they are just crashes and the TPO pulled out specific types of crashes.

Chairperson Goss asked if the TPO was also looking at bicycle/pedestrian crashes.

Ms. Bollenback replied there is a separate analysis for bicycle/pedestrian crashes; when the Dangerous by Design report came out, the TPO looked at pedestrian crashes in more detail. The non-motorized crashes are being looked at separately; while they are important, there are fewer crashes that are non-motorized.

Mr. Harowski commented it would be interesting to correlate the crash data with trends on traffic citations. The police do a lot less traffic work now than they used to; less violations means more crashes. People have modified their behavior.

Mr. Paradise stated all the proliferation of rear-end crashes suggests there be some capacity challenges; a lot of traffic and stop and go. He is not sure if traffic enforcement could help that.

Mr. Walsh asked if the TPO had looked at the crash rate volumes from the county.

Ms. Bollenback replied no, when the TPO starts to get down to the detail at these intersections it will probably be handed it off to one of the general planning consultants.

Mr. Walsh referred to the matrix and commented there was a lot of information from other cities and asked if the rankings were compared to other cities or counties of similar size.

Ms. Bollenback replied the matrix was put together by FDOT; they do a relative ranking of areas.

D. Presentation and Discussion of the TPO's Annual Call for Projects and Project Priority Ranking Process

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Call for Projects process. This is the time of year the TIP Subcommittee reviews the priority process and determines if any changes need to be made; the TPO Board has talked about a few things they would like to see. She stated when the TPO creates a priority list, they are project specific but those projects are part of a broader system. There are different transportation choices that have to fit together, different funding agencies that have to work together to coordinate that activity, different places to get money and a variety of different plans, studies including comprehensive plans that feed into this. The presumption is local governments put together their needs and decide which ones come to the TPO. The TPO is tasked with providing local input for state and federal funding and gives direction to FDOT. The TPO is required under state and federal law to provide "3-C" planning; continuing, cooperative and comprehensive. She gave an overview of project development and how the process flows, starting with the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). She reviewed the three resolutions that guide the priority process and how the TPO allocates set-aside funding; 40% to traffic operations, 30% to bicycle/pedestrian and 30% to transit. The TPO accepts project applications annually and those applications have to have backup. Without backup, there will not be reliable cost estimates or the ability to identify fatal flaws in advance. The process is a cycle and she stated this is a much clearer, more transparent and structured process than any other MPO in the state. She reviewed the issues to be considered including the local match requirements. The local match used to be 50% for set-aside projects and it has been dropped down to 10%. Some of the board members would like to see that go back up. The board recognizes that can be a concern for smaller local governments and is looking for options and solutions that might offset that. She stated a list of the current TIP Subcommittee members is in the agenda packet and that anyone is welcome to attend the meetings.

E. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft 2017 Regional List of Priority Projects for the Central Florida</u> MPO Alliance (CFMPOA)

Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO is part of the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA) which includes MetroPlan, Space Coast TPO, Marion-Ocala TPO, Lake Sumter MPO and the Polk TPO. They joined together as a region to discuss the regional projects after developing their own list of priority projects. The regional list has no standing with FDOT but it informs them that everyone is on the same page and what the broader regional needs are. The TPO's representatives to the Alliance are Volusia County Council Vice Chair Deb Denys, Vice Mayor Leigh Matusick and Lita Handy-Peters. The Alliance always maintains the order of our projects when they merge them. The TPO does not maintain the list. She showed the draft marked-up list and reviewed some of the projects. She will be bringing back a completed list next month for a recommendation for approval.

C. FDOT Report

[Handout]

Mr. Ferguson stated the I-4/I-95/US 92 Systems Interchange project has been moved back from completion in spring 2018 to summer 2018 due to weather constraints. The rest of the projects are on track for early next calendar year.

D. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

Ms. Winsett stated the Volusia County Construction Report was provided in the agenda and everything new is underlined.

The Flagler County Construction Report is included in the agenda.

VI. Staff Comments

Ms. Bollenback introduced Ms. Colleen Nicoulin, new TPO Senior Planner; she has sat on the BPAC and will be staff support at the TCC next month.

→ Update on the Allocation of the TPO Set-Aside Funding

This item was addressed at the end of staff comments.

→ Update on the SR 44/Mission Rd/Wallace Rd/Canal St Alternative Intersection Design Study

Ms. Bollenback stated a SR 44 public meeting has been scheduled for September 14, 2017 at 5:00 pm at New Smyrna Beach City Commission Chambers.

→ Update on the Draft Congestion Management Process/Performance Measure Report

Ms. Bollenback stated each year the TPO develops a draft Congestion Management Process/Performance Measure Report; Ms. Sharma is working on that. The TPO will be reaching out to the committee members who have provided review and input.

Ms. Bollenback stated there is a Truck Parking Study underway that came out of a discussion in Central Florida. A Seminole County rest stop has activity going that led to a broader truck stop study. She discussed the problems and the lack of truck stop parking on the major corridors. FDOT is leading this study throughout the region. She attended a recent industry meeting where they received input and one of the things she took away from that is that truckers do not want big truck stops; there should be some parking availability at the interchanges or changes in local city ordinances that would allow them to park safely and out of the way, such as an existing parking lot like at Walmart or Target.

→ Update on the Allocation of the TPO Set-Aside Funding

Mr. Harris showed the 2017 List of Priority Projects and Ms. Bollenback stated the TPO has money in the current fiscal year to program projects on the priority list; \$1 million in traffic operations and \$1 million in bicycle/pedestrian. The TPO is working with local governments and going down the list but struggling with finding projects to advance in the current fiscal year. She reminded the committee that even though a project is farther down the list, they still need to look at the projects ahead of them. She reviewed the projects on the list and explained that many projects are fully funded, some have issues and cannot move forward at this time, and some are just not ready to advance yet. She advised the committee to look at where their projects are and what is ahead of them and have their LAP certification ready. The question to consider is how far down the bicycle/pedestrian list to go before shifting to the number three traffic ops project.

Mr. Lear asked if the funds could be used for the Tier C list which is the feasibility studies.

Mr. Harris replied no, that is a separate set-aside.

Ms. Bollenback asked everyone to look at the lists and let the TPO know if they have a project that can be advanced. The TPO may want to come back if it runs out of opportunities and advance some design projects.

Mr. Ferguson stated in terms of bicycle/pedestrian projects, there is a lot of money sitting in the box for the next fiscal year as well. If a local government agency is not ready this year they need to get ready for next year. He advised that FDOT keeps the TPO informed and updated about all the projects they want to advance. They need to get the projects, personnel and local resources ready sooner rather than later. In addition to the SU funds, every year FDOT expects a certain amount of AC funds.

Ms. Bollenback stated FDOT has targets in each phase and that the longer we wait in the current year the greater the chance FDOT has obligated all their authority. Ideally, this would all be done before the fiscal year starts. She mentioned that Orange City has had issues with their LAP certification.

Mr. Walsh referred to the \$1 million available and the schedule and asked when things had to happen; does design have to be completed and construction let before June of next year in order to be able to utilize that money

Ms. Bollenback replied earlier; the bid package and scope schedule bid package must be in by February or March to get programmed; which is why if Orange City is not ready by the end of August, the TPO will need someone else ready to go. If the TPO does not draw this money down it will have less authority next year.

VII. TCC Member Comments

Ms. Winsett announced Mr. Rob Merrell, a land use attorney, has pitched an idea to have an east Volusia and west Volusia Transportation Impact Analysis (TIA), development, coordination, transportation, regional concerns meeting with the consultants and cities staff to talk about issues. Sometimes there are issues where the two sides of the county need to talk about different facilities and what a fix might be. She was asked to get feedback from the TCC regarding the possibility of a meeting.

Ms. King replied that there is a discussion going on now; Attorney Glenn Storch wants to get Port Orange, Edgewater and New Smyrna Beach together to discuss developments of regional impact (DRI) at Williamson Boulevard, Edgewater, and New Smyrna Beach.

Ms. Winsett replied that is a great example; that group does need to get together. There should be areas broken out such as the LPGA area in Daytona. Orange City, Deltona, DeLand and parts of DeBary are a concern. She asked if she should go back and say yes to a meeting or should the TPO put it as an agenda item on a future TCC agenda.

Ms. King stated it is a good idea to have Volusia County and Edgewater get together; so she will say yes on behalf of New Smyrna Beach.

Ms. Dodd commented DeBary has some concerns and would be interested.

Mr. Holmes stated he was curious as to what the mission was; there have already been so many regional studies.

Ms. Winsett replied this would not be a regional study; this would be to get together to talk about what is going on in the different jurisdictions. For example, DeLand has another phase of the DRI coming in that might impact some things Orange City or Volusia County are doing. It is a way to coordinate better. The idea is coming from the land use attorney and developer side. She thanked the committee for its feedback.

Ms. Bollenback stated the development of the TIA Guidelines is barely a year old and there were a lot of meetings, discussion and coordination that occurred. She asked if this is about the TIA or development in general.

Ms. Winsett replied development in general and the transportation impact; transportation is tied closely with land use.

Mr. Walsh stated it was about mitigation; everybody follows the TIA Guidelines but the development community is under the belief that if something is broken, they do not want to pay for it; the cities have another side to that. The challenge is what the right answer is for every development; each has a different impact. The TIA Guidelines do a great job of keeping it consistent.

Discussion continued.

Ms. Bollenback stated that the larger meetings could be held in conjunction with a TCC meeting. The Executive Committee has discussed looking at transportation issues in smaller sub-areas.

Mr. Ferguson added that he gets locked out of the Work Program the first week of October and the cities should have their projects identified and ready as soon as possible.

IV. ACTION ITEMS

A. REVIEW AND RECOMMEND APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2017-## AMENDING THE FY 2017/18 TO 2021/22 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

Background Information:

Each year, FDOT develops the Tentative 5-Year Work Program that becomes effective on July 1st. The TPO incorporates the tentative Work Program into the new Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which is also effective on July 1st. Year 1 of the TIP and the Work Program should always match. However, when the new TIP and Work Program become effective, there are often projects that were supposed to get authorized prior to June 30th (i.e. when the previous TIP and Work Program were in effect), but did not. These projects will automatically roll forward in the Work Program, but not in the TIP. Hence, there is a need to reconcile the two documents and bring the new TIP up-to-date. This is accomplished by what is known as a "roll forward" TIP amendment.

When FDOT releases the Roll Forward Report, the TPO receives a letter from our FDOT-MPO Liaison, Gene Ferguson, listing the "roll forward" projects and other changes needed to reconcile the TIP with FDOT's Five-Year Work Program. A copy of this request is included in the agenda package.

In addition to the "roll forward" projects, this amendment adds two new projects and updates information pertaining to two existing projects. These include:

- Changes to the project limits and funding for an existing project to install adaptive traffic signals on US 17/92 (FM# 4378421);
- Additional funding for design and right-of-way for a bridge replacement on Barracuda Blvd. (FM# 4379351)
- Adds funding for the design (PE) of intersection improvements on SR 15A (Taylor Road) at US 17/92 (FM# 4389682)
- Adds construction funding for ramp improvements on the I-4 interchange at Saxon Boulevard; (FM# 4410701)

The proposed TIP amendment is authorized in the enclosed Resolution 2017-## and will be fully represented in Attachment "A".

Background Information:

Recent guidance and directives have required that all planning agencies begin to assess and plan for concerns related to increased severe weather and flooding associated with sea level rise. In 2016, the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council (ECFRPC), in partnership with Volusia County, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), University of Florida Geoplan Center, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and the River to Sea TPO, conducted a Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Assessment of transportation-related infrastructure and assets in the TPO's planning area.

Resilient Volusia County, the second phase of the Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Assessment, accomplished the following in late 2016 and early 2017:

- Conducted a quality assurance review of the FDOT Sea Level Scenario Sketch Planning Tool and provided a workshop to local stakeholders
- Analyzed new impact areas resulting from 100-year storm coastal flooding + storm surge based on Sea Level Rise projections
- Identified implementation strategies and educational materials to enhance community resiliency
- Modeled Hurricane Dora (a Category 3 storm that made landfall in St. Augustine in 1964) for a base line representation of historical storm surge

The grant supporting this activity specifically defined the planning effort to include Volusia County. A separate effort will be pursued to address resiliency in the TPO planning area within Flagler County.

Background Information:

The purpose of this report is to provide a more detailed review and analysis of crash data in Volusia and Flagler Counties as a follow-up to the observations noted in the "Congestion Management Process and Performance Measures Report" completed in October 2016. Findings in this report are intended to enable traffic engineers and planners to determine safety concerns and locations that may require a more focused analysis. Follow up analyses will identify needed infrastructure improvements, awareness or enforcement programs, and/or other countermeasures. These countermeasures and improvements will reduce crashes and increase safety. This study analyzed auto crashes (rear-end, left-turn and sideswipes, right angle, head-on), bicycle and pedestrian crashes and also identified high crash intersections and road segments based on crash count, crash severity, and fatal crashes.

The crash data was primarily obtained from Signal Four Analytics, which is a statewide, interactive, web-based geospatial crash analytical tool developed and maintained by the GeoPlan Center at the University of Florida. The crash data analyzed for this report covers the period from 2011 through 2015. Data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Fatality Analysis Reporting System was also used to supplement this report.

The composition of selection committees is prescribed in the R2CTPO's Purchasing Manual as follows:

- a. The Selection Committee shall not be made up of fewer than three voting members.
- b. Voting members of the Selection Committee should include two (2) members of R2CTPO staff and a designated member of the R2CTPO's Technical Coordinating Committee. R2CTPO staff member representatives on the Selection Committee shall be determined by the Executive Director. The R2CTPO Technical Coordinating Committee member shall be determined by the Technical Coordinating Committee.
- c. Technical Coordinating Committee members who work for consulting firms shall not sit on the Selection Committee if their firm has submitted a bid/proposal for consideration by the committee
- d. A representative of FDOT District 5 may be included on the Selection Committee as a non-voting advisor. The FDOT District 5 representative shall be determined by FDOT District 5.
- e. For projects above \$200,000, the Selection Committee shall include an R2CTPO Board member as a voting member and a fifth person. These members should be determined by the R2CTPO Executive Director in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- f. The Selection Committee may choose to have a Selection Advisor to assist the committee in understanding the bids/proposals. The Advisor should be knowledgeable on the product(s) or professional service(s) being reviewed for potential procurement and able to advise the committee as needed during its evaluation process. This role may be filled by a member of the R2CTPO's staff or someone outside the organization. The Selection Advisor is chosen by the Selection Committee.

The West French Avenue Shared Use Path (FM #4355381) is programmed for design in the current fiscal year. \$426,015 in SU funds are already programmed on the project. The Engineer's Preliminary Estimate of Design Costs dated August 25, 2017 is \$536,156. The City of Orange City is requesting \$110,141 in additional SU funds for the design phase of the project.

Resolution 2016-01 (see attached) defines a cost overrun as the difference between the amounts programmed on any project phase and the actual cost for that phase. The resolution also reaffirms the TPO's policy that any cost overruns encountered on a project funded with state and/or federal transportation funds will be the responsibility of the governmental entity identified as the project originator (the City of Orange City).

 - b. Regionally Significant, Non-SIS Roadway Projects and Major Bridge Projects;

- c. Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects;
- d. Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects;
- e. Public Transit Projects; and
- f. Transportation Planning Studies.
- River to Sea TPO projects that were previously ranked and have a Financial Management (FM) number and are in the Florida Department of Transportation Work Program will automatically be prioritized above projects that are not currently in the FDOT Five-Year Work Program;
- Projects which are ranked one through five on the Prioritized List of Florida Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects are deemed to be protected, and will remain in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 4. Projects which are ranked one through five on the Prioritized List of Regionally Significant, Non-SIS Roadway Projects and Major Bridge Projects are deemed to be protected, and will remain in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- Projects which are ranked one through eight on Tier "B" of the Prioritized List of Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects are deemed to be protected, and will be ranked in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 6. Projects which are ranked one through three on Tier "B" of the Prioritized List of Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects are deemed to be protected, and will be ranked in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 7. If, at any time, two or more lists of prioritized projects are merged into a new list, every project that was protected prior to the merger shall retain its protected status, and no new or previously unprotected project shall be deemed to be protected unless and until it advances to the protected rank prescribed for the new, merged list.
- 8. The River to Sea TPO will only re-prioritize or add projects when the TPO Board determines: a) unusual circumstances support such action, b) the circumstances are not of a recurring nature, c) the circumstances do not result from the actions of the project sponsor, and d) the proposed reprioritization or addition will not be contrary to the public interest;
- Requests to change the priority or to add a project must include a statement of hardship by the requestor along with supporting documentation that includes

- detailed justification of need and an assessment of the impacts to the programming of prioritized projects;
- 10. It is the responsibility of the River to Sea TPO and FDOT staffs to provide the River to Sea TPO members with current information and data on project status and to assist the members in their efforts to make informed decisions regarding the prioritized projects lists;
- 11. The River to Sea TPO shall, in its discretion, make all decisions regarding the final prioritized project lists that are annually submitted to FDOT;
- Once a project has attained protected status, it should be programmed within 3 years. If it has not been programmed during that time due to inactivity on the part of the project sponsor, then the project will be removed from the list of priority projects. The project sponsor may resubmit the project for open ranking on any subsequent call for projects.
- The policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed by the TPO; and

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the River to Sea TPO that:

Annual set-asides of the River to Sea TPO's total Surface Transportation Program
(STP) Urban Attributable (SU) funding will be made in the following manner: 40%
of the total SU funds will be used for Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives

(traffic operations focused) Project Priorities, 30% of the total SU funds will be used for Transit Project Priorities, and 30% of the total SU funds will be used for Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian focused) Project Priorities;

- 2. Annual set-asides of other state and federal funds identified in the 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan for Local Initiatives will be made available in the following manner: 50% of the funds will be used for Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives (traffic operations focused) Project Priorities and 50% will be used for Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian focused) Project Priorities;
- Mixed projects (defined as a project that is not a stand-alone bicycle or pedestrian project) will only be accepted and ranked if the predominant cost component is consistent with the category of funding to which it is submitted. All other cost components are subject to eligibility of available funding. Mixed projects submitted by a member local government will be presented to the TPO Board for final determination prior to being ranked in the TPO's list of Priority Projects for Bicycle/Pedestrian facilities;
- 4. For projects funded in whole or in part with Urban Attributable (SU) funding and/or other state and federal funds obtained through the TPO's Priority Project Process, if the recipient of the funds chooses to display any signs or markers at the project site, said signs or markers shall include language acknowledging the River to Sea TPO, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), and/or other funding partners, as may be applicable, for providing funding for the project. In addition to the language, the sign or marker shall include these agencies' official logos.

Additionally, any public pronouncements made by or on behalf of the recipient regarding the project, including press releases, publications, annual reports, video credits, and dedications, shall acknowledge the funding support provided by the TPO, FDOT, FHWA, and FTA.

- Resolution 2016-03 is hereby repealed and replaced by this resolution;
- The policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed by the TPO; and
- 7. The Chairman of the River to Sea TPO (or his designee) is hereby authorized and directed to provide a copy of this resolution to the:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT);
 - Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation).

Background Information:

The Flagler County Fixed Route Transit Operation Plan began with a project kick-off meeting on May 31, 2017. The planning effort is intended to build upon the need for fixed route bus service as identified in both the TPO's Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and the Flagler County's Transit Development Plan (TDP). In addition, the change of Flagler County's eligibility status for federal funding in future years added the potential future revenue streams. The combination of these activities presents opportunities to finance and operate fixed route bus service in Flagler County.

This project will utilize the recommendations of Flagler County's TDP and prepare a detailed operational plan to guide the implementation of fixed route transit services in Flagler County. The project was initially programmed in the TPO's adopted Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and the project scope and expenditure was approved by the TPO Board during the April 26, 2017 board meeting.

TPO staff will discuss the transit planning and funding activities that will be evaluated as part of this planning effort.







C. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF THE DRAFT R2CTPO 2017 CONGESTION MANAGEMENT PROCESS (CMP) AND PERFORMANCE MEASURES REPORT

Background Information:

For Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) designated as Transportation Management Areas (TMAs), maintenance of a Congestion Management Process (CMP) is required under both federal and state law. This requires a systematic method to monitor and evaluate traffic operations to maintain and improve transportation efficiency and reliability.

In addition to congestion, MAP-21 (and subsequently the FAST Act) further required MPOs to monitor other indicators of transportation system performance including safety, reliability, physical condition, and environmental sustainability as part of a comprehensive performance-based planning and programming process.

Last Spring, the Technical Working Group reviewed and recommended specific data elements, calculations, and other parameters identified to measure relevant transportation system performance indicators as intended by the CMP. TPO staff then compiled the available data and prepared a Congestion Management/Performance Measures Report.

This year, an update to the data has been collected and processed by TPO staff. The draft report is available for review and download from the TPO's website at:

Staff will provide an overview of the updated document for discussion.
