1. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum / Pledge of Allegiance

The Volusia-Flagler Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by Vice Chairperson Larry Coletti. The roll was called, and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. The meeting was held in a hybrid format with twelve voting and two non-voting members physically present, and one voting member and two non-voting members virtually present.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Coletti to allow members attending virtually to participate and vote. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wendler and carried unanimously.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

2. Public Comment/Participation

Mr. Michael Lybarger introduced himself and Mr. Anthony Del Valle from Palm Coast, who were attending the meeting as new members from Palm Coast, unofficially, as their appointments had not been received yet.

3. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of the August 13, 2025 BPAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Ramos to approve the August 13, 2025 BPAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2025-## adopting the Volusia-Flagler 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)

Mr. Vaudo, Kimley-Horn and Associates, gave a presentation on the Volusia-Flagler 2050 LRTP. He stated that the 30-day public comment period was set to end next week, prior to the TPO Board meeting. The final plan will be posted after adoption, and he mentioned that there is an allowance of 90 days after adoption for the appendices to be compiled and posted. He thanked committee members and FDOT for all of their input throughout the process.

Mr. Aufdenberg asked if there were separate Transportation Alternatives (TA) funds for Volusia and Flagler Counties. Mr. Vaudo explained that the TA funds are for all of FDOT District 5, and urban TA funds are direct to the TPO.

Mr. Aufdenberg asked that a note be added regarding the TA funding distribution. He also mentioned that he would like to see bicycle-pedestrian funding grow, since it is only 2% of the total funding but 20% of fatalities.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lodge to recommend approval of Resolution 2025-## adopting the Volusia-Flagler 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The motion was seconded by Ms. Epps and carried unanimously by roll call vote.

4. Presentations and Discussion Items

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Volusia-Flagler TPO's Annual Call for Projects and Project Prioritization Process</u>

Mr. Harris reviewed the project prioritization process, stating that each year, improvements to the process are recommended for the next cycle. He referenced three guiding resolutions and reviewed the change in dates from last year, explaining that the call had opened in January, and that the timeline would regulate this fiscal year to be open from December to February. He reviewed the purpose and responsibilities of the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee.

Mr. Lodge inquired about inviting new members to the subcommittee. Mr. Harris stated that this would require a motion.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Wendler to open the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee to new members. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mostert and carried unanimously.

Mr. Lybarger of Palm Coast volunteered to serve on the subcommittee.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Lodge to confirm the existing members of the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee and appoint Mr. Lybarger as a new member. The motion was seconded by Ms. Belin and carried unanimously.

B. Presentation and Discussion of FY 2024/25 TPO Community Outreach Activities

Ms. Blankenship, TPO Community Outreach Coordinator, gave a presentation that is updated every year regarding the TPO's community engagement that occurred over the last fiscal year. She discussed meeting attendance and board and committee vacancy rates. She reviewed the TPO's social media, inviting members to follow.

Mr. Ramos encouraged members to like and share posts to reach more people.

Ms. Blankenship outlined several events that TPO staff were involved in, such as the VCARD Icebreaker, Public Involvement Transportation Decision Making training, Port Orange Bike Safety Day, White Cane Awareness Day, VZAP workshops, LRTP workshops, and more. She also highlighted the Safe Driving College Challenge she created in partnership with Ms. Phillips, FDOT.

Discussion ensued about the Safe Driving College Challenge.

5. Staff Comments

Mr. Harris discussed VoTran's 50th anniversary celebration being held on September 19, and referenced the press release handout provided on VoTran's service adjustments. Mr. Persad reviewed the adjustments and added that VoTran won three awards at the Florida Public Transit Association conference, for innovation, longtime driver Mr. Bernard Huggins, and a safety award.

Ms. Epps promoted White Cane Awareness Day on October 15th, noting that the TPO will send the updated details soon.

Mr. Aufdenberg mentioned that he and Mr. Wendler would be holding "Fix a Flat" training at the Volusia Library at City Island. Ms. Blankenship stated that TPO staff would also be at the event, but in New Smyrna Beach, providing bicycle safety information. Mr. Aufdenberg also brought attention to the Week Without Driving event, providing the website for anyone interested. Although she was not present, he thanked Ms. Phillips for the repainting of the Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University crosswalk.

Ms. Belin suggested that the TPO look into partnering with the beach cleanup occurring on September 20th.

8. Adjournment

The BPAC meeting adjourned at 3:13 p.m.

The BPAC Project Review Subcommittee held a meeting on September 29, 2025, to discuss revisions to the Volusia-Flagler TPO's policies and project applications for the Annual Call for Projects. No revisions were recommended to the TPO guiding resolutions. Revisions to the Bicycle/Pedestrian General Instructions and Bicycle/Pedestrian Project Applications recommended by the subcommittee are provided with this agenda packet for your review. Revised text is highlighted (additions) and stricken (deletions).

General Instructions for Bicycle/Pedestrian Project Applications

December 2024

General Instructions:

For the 2025 Call for Projects, the Volusia-Flagler TPO is accepting applications for Feasibility Studies and Project Implementation.

Feasibility studies assess the engineering and planning characteristics of bicycle/pedestrian projects. Feasibility studies must include, but not be limited to, the determination of available right-of-way, documentation and identification of the solutions of obstacles that may impede the project's constructability, permitting and socioeconomic constraints, landscaping, drainage and an engineer's estimate of related planning, design, right-of-way and construction costs.

The VFTPO has two different application forms for Bicycle/Pedestrian Projects. One is to be used when applying for a Feasibility Study; the other is to be used when applying for Project Implementation. For a given project, applications for Feasibility Study and Project Implementation must be submitted in separate application cycles.

When applying for Project Implementation, the applying agency will also be required to submit a completed copy of FDOT's Project Information Application Form. No project will advance beyond a Feasibility Study unless the VFTPO receives an application for prioritization of the Project Implementation phase. Applications for prioritization of the Project Implementation phase will be accepted only if a Feasibility Study has already been completed or if the project does not require a Feasibility Study. The applying agency is required to use the minimum threshold programming amount of \$250,000 for design (phase 38), \$250,000 for right-of-way (phase 48), and \$250,000 for construction (phase 58). There is no minimum threshold programming amount for construction engineering inspection (CEI). If the minimum threshold programming amount is not met for any project phase, the applying agency MUST submit an exception request with the project application. The exception request MUST contain the following information:

- What exception is being requested?
- Who is requesting the exception?
- Why is the exception being requested?
- How will the project proceed if the exception is not granted?

Applications will be ranked based on the information supplied in the application. The TPO is not obliged to consider information pertaining to the project request that is not included in the project application. However, applying agencies are encouraged to be present for the evaluation of their applications to provide clarification, if needed. Mixed projects (defined as a project that is not a stand-alone bicycle/pedestrian project) require

separate applications for the bicycle/pedestrian category and traffic operations/safety category. Updated cost estimates for projects on the bicycle/pedestrian list of prioritized projects are to be submitted with a letter of continuing support by February 28, 2025. After the List of Prioritized Projects is adopted by the VFTPO Board in June, if a project is withdrawn by the sponsor, an official letter of withdrawal and/or email must be submitted to the R2CTPO within thirty (30) days.

INCOMPLETE APPLICATIONS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED!

Eligible Project Sponsors for the 2025 Call for Projects.

- Local governments;
- Transit agencies;
- School districts or educational institutions;
- Any other local or regional governmental entity with responsibility for oversight of transportation or recreational trails (other than a metropolitan planning organization or a State agency) that the State determines to be eligible.

Eligible activities related to surface transportation that can be funded with **Transportation Alternatives funds**¹:

- Construction, planning, and design of on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and
 other non-motorized forms of transportation, including sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and
 bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting, signage, and other safety-related infrastructure, and
 transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.
- Construction, planning, and design of infrastructure-related projects and systems that will provide safe routes for non-drivers, including children, older adults, and individuals with disabilities to access daily needs.
- Construction, planning, and design of infrastructure-related projects on any public road or any bicycle
 or pedestrian pathway or trail in the vicinity of schools that will substantially improve the ability of
 students to walk and bicycle to school, including sidewalk improvements, traffic calming and speed
 reduction improvements, pedestrian and bicycle crossing improvements, on-street bicycle facilities, offstreet bicycle and pedestrian facilities, secure bicycle parking facilities, and traffic diversion
 improvements.

All construction and pre-construction work phases will be administered by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) or other Local Agency Program (LAP) certified local government. Reimbursements are distributed only to a LAP certified agency responsible for completing the tasks. FDOT assigns a LAP Design and LAP Construction Liaison for each project. Federal law requires that each project be administered under the rules

¹ It is the Volusia-Flagler TPO's intent to extend eligibility to all of the activities included within the meaning of the term "Transportation Alternatives" pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 101(a)(29) except the following:

^{1.} Construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas;

^{2.} Community improvement activities, including –

a. inventory, control, or removal of outdoor advertising;

b. historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities;

c. vegetation management practices in transportation rights-of-way to improve roadway safety, prevent against invasive species, and provide erosion control; and

d. archaeological activities related to impacts from implementation of a transportation project eligible under title 23;

Any environmental mitigation activity, including pollution prevention and pollution abatement activities and mitigation to –

a. address stormwater management, control, and water pollution prevention or abatement related to highway construction or due to highway runoff, including activities described in sections 133(b)(11), 328(a), and 329 of title 23; or

b. reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality or to restore and maintain connectivity among terrestrial or aquatic habitats

^{5.} Planning, designing, or construction boulevards and other roadways largely in the right-of-way of former Interstate System routes or other divided highways.

and procedures governing federally funded transportation projects. Certified Local Agencies comply with all applicable Federal statutes, rules and regulations.

Initial Project Screening:

Any project submitted by a local government for consideration needs to meet the following screening criteria:

For any proposed facility to be considered eligible through the TPO process, the project <u>must be</u> included on the Volusia-Flagler TPO's Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, <u>https://www.r2ctpo.org/planning-studies/bicycle-pedestrian/draft-bicycle-pedestrian-plan/</u> or a local government adopted <u>Bicycle/Pedestrian-Plan</u> or the Volusia-Flagler TPO's Bicycle Suitability Map 2019. Volusia-Flagler Vision Zero Safety Action Plan, Volusia County Trails Master Plan, Flagler County Comprehensive Plan (2010-2035 Transportation Element), or a local government Bicycle/Pedestrian Plan, Comprehensive Plan, or Capital Improvement Plan.

Is this **Shared Use Path** project at least 12 feet wide?

- If Yes the project is eligible.
- If **No** justification is required to determine eligibility.

Is this **Sidewalk** project at least 5 feet wide?

- If Yes the project is eligible.
- If No the project application is not acceptable.

Is this an activity that can be funded with Transportation Alternatives Funds?

- If **Yes** the project is eligible.
- If **No** the project application is not acceptable.

Local Match Requirement:

VFTPO Resolution 2024-## provides that the governmental entity requesting state and/or federal transportation funds shall be required to match those funds programmed on the project with local funds at the ratio of 10% local funds to 90% state and/or federal funds. For example, a local government requesting \$250,000 in federal funds for a sidewalk would be required to pay \$25,000 in local matching funds. This match requirement shall not apply to projects on the State Highway System. The match shall be by project phase for each programmed phase including feasibility study. A non-federal cash match is required for a feasibility study. For all other phases, the local match is defined as non-federal cash match and/or in-kind services that advance the project. This resolution also reaffirms the VFTPO's policy that the applying agency (project originator) shall be responsible for any cost overruns encountered on a project funded with state and/or federal transportation funds unless the project is on the state highway system, in which case, the State DOT shall be responsible for any cost overruns.

Other Funding Requirements:

All project applications are subject to approval by the VFTPO Board. Other funds (in addition to SU funds) may be used to fund project phases or overall costs.

Electronic Submittal Requirements:

Any project submitted by a local government for consideration MUST include the following information/materials:

1. Applications and supporting documentation shall be submitted as digital media in Portable Document Format (PDF).

Electronic documents must be submitted through the VFTPO FTP site: https://www3.mydocsonline.com/customerupload/c6343f81ab4330c5529f02a4163f

- 2. The application and all supporting documentation shall be included in one electronic PDF file.
- 3. All document pages shall be oriented so that the top of the page is always at the top of the computer monitor.
- 4. Page size shall be either 8-1/2" by 11" (letter) or 11" by 17" (tabloid).
- 5. PDF documents produced by scanning paper documents are inherently inferior to those produced directly from an electronic source. Documents which are only available in paper format should be scanned at a resolution which ensures the pages are legible on both a computer screen and a printed page. We recommend scanning at 300 dpi to balance legibility and file size. If you are unable to produce an electronic document as prescribed here, please contact VFTPO staff to discuss other options. If you are unable to upload to the VFTPO FTP site, please contact VFTPO staff to discuss other options.
- 6. Submit any available right-of-way information.
- 7. **Each application MUST include a Project Map** that <u>clearly</u> identifies the termini of the project, Proximity to Community Assets and Network Connectivity through the use of a one (1) mile radius buffer for Shared Use Path projects and **Transportation Alternatives Activities** and a one-half (½) mile radius buffer for Sidewalk projects. Maximum map size is 11" x 17".
- 8. In addition, all maps MUST include a **Scale** (in subdivisions of a mile), **North Arrow, Title** and **Legend**. Photographs are encouraged and must be captioned.

Projects that contribute directly to the completion or enhancement of the following trail systems may be eligible for inclusion as Regional Trail Projects:

- 1. SUNTrail Network
- 2. Priority and Opportunity Land Trails of the Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) Plan

Update on the SR A1A Resiliency Project

SUMMARY BACKGROUND:



The construction team working on the S.R. A1A buried seawalls project is excited to share construction updates below, along with a project update video.

North Wall (north of Highbridge Road in Volusia County to South Central Avenue in Flagler County) The North Wall has been completed. All dune walkovers are restored, and landscaping is mostly finished. The only pending work is in an area with an active sea turtle nest. After the nest is vacated, crews will finish dune shaping and planting.

The South Wall (Sunrise Avenue to Marlin Drive, Ormond-by-the-Sea, Volusia County) is progressing steadily. The wall's construction, including piles and the concrete cap, has been completed. Crews have finalized most dune reshaping activities, with only a few areas pending turtle nest clearance. Landscaping installation is approximately 70% complete, and around 20% of dune walkovers have been restored to date. The construction team will keep property owners informed regarding the timeline for their walkover reconstruction. It is anticipated that landscaping and dune walkovers will be largely completed by late fall 2025, with the entire project expected to conclude by early 2026.

To keep our workers and the community safe, please stay out of the work zone and use caution when driving through the area.



The roundabout will also have two travel lanes in each direction with right turn bypass lanes at three of the four road connections, a concrete apron to accommodate large trucks, and landscaping in the center island.



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Pedestrian safety enhancements include new sidewalks and crosswalks equipped with Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) at the roundabout approaches. Each RRFB will include flashing yellow LED lights to increase drivers' awareness of pedestrians crossing at the roundabout. S.R. 44 will also be resurfaced from approximately 800 feet west of Kepler Road to Talisman Road. Kepler Road will be resurfaced from 650 feet south of S.R. 44 to 1,250 feet north of S.R. 44. Additionally, a center bi-directional turn lane will be added along S.R. 44 from east of Kepler Road to Lake Winnemissett Drive.



The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is implementing safety improvements and resurfacing the roadway along Granada Boulevard (State Road (S.R.) 40) from U.S. 1 to S.R. A1A (Ocean Shore Boulevard/South Atlantic Avenue), except for the bridge over the Halifax River in Ormond Beach.

In addition to repaving this segment of S.R. 40, the travel lanes along this segment of Granada Boulevard will be slightly narrowed to ten feet and subtle changes in the roadway alignment will be introduced to encourage slower driving speeds. Pedestrian safety improvements include a new mid-block pedestrian crossing between Vining Court and Bovard Avenue. Upgrades will also be made to existing crossings at Washington Street and west of Beach Street.



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The mid-block crossings located west of Beach Street and between Vining Court and Bovard Avenue will be slightly elevated to be level with the sidewalk and will include in-road lighting to further alert motorists of people crossing the roadway and encourage reduced speeds.

All three crossings will be equipped with a Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon (PHB) and overhead lighting to increase driver awareness and visibility of pedestrians. A PHB is an overhead traffic device that remains dark until a pedestrian activates the beacon, signaling for drivers to come to a stop and for pedestrians to cross. Audible pedestrian signals and detectible warning pads will also be installed at each crossing to provide accessibility for the visually impaired.


Intersection lighting will be upgraded, and new mast arm poles will be installed at the Ridgewood Avenue and S.R. A1A traffic signals. New bicycle lanes next to turn lanes, called keyholes, minor drainage improvements, median modifications, and a new directional median to reduce left-turn conflicts at Washington Street will also be included.
