I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum/Pledge of Allegiance

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of August 21, 2018 CAC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Gillespie to approve the August 21, 2018 CAC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Villanella and carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Support for the 2018 Regional List of Priority Projects and Updated Priority Process for the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA)

Ms. Nicoulin stated members of the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA) work together to develop a regional list of priority projects that is based off each individual TPO/MPOs priority project lists. The draft list is included in the agenda in strikethrough/underline format to show what was removed and what has been added this year. In addition to changes to the list, there have been recommendations for changes to the policy that guides the process of developing the list; the policy was initially developed in 2013. Providing a recommendation of approval, the three TPO Board members that are members of the CFMPOA will vote to adopt this list and the updated process at their next meeting.

Mr. Peterson asked if the projects struck through in red have been completed or if they were deleted.

Ms. Bollenback replied it is a combination; there are projects that are already funded and then there are Tiers 1, 2, and 3; in some cases projects moved from a tiered list to the already funded list. There has been a lot of movement this year; Tiers 1 and 2 are funded through the state and some transit projects have been completed. Generally, either the project has been completed or it is being moved to a different list.

Mr. Peterson asked if any projects have been added to the list.

Ms. Bollenback replied there have been a couple of projects added to the Strategic Intermodal Systems (SIS) list. The Lake Sumter MPO asked to add a project to the list; they thought the project would be funded through other means and now that may not happen. Also, in Brevard County, the Space Coast TPO was directed by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) to add two replacement bridge projects that are in the early stages of funding.

Mr. Peterson referred to the projects that were added and asked if any projects were lowered on the list because of the additions.

Ms. Bollenback replied projects are added in depending on how far along they have progressed; whether they are still waiting on funds, in design or need construction.

Mr. Peterson referred to the changes in verbiage of the process policy; at the top of page 51; it did state "would be the expedited construction" and now it states "is intended to expedite construction". This is a weakening of the intent and he asked why it was done.

Ms. Bollenback replied this was originally written in the future tense; that in the future this is what it would do. It has been changed to a more current tense because this had not been launched yet in 2013. It was what was expected to be done with the process. If there is a specific change he would like to suggest, she can carry it forward.

Mr. Peterson stated it weakens the verbiage and asked if it changes the thought process; if it was not intended to be an absolute.

Ms. Bollenback replied it could be changed from "would be" to "will" as it is what the CFMPOA intends to do. This is not a required activity but is done to show FDOT that the TPO/MPOs in the region collectively share a vision.

Ms. Elliott referred to project 5 that is struck through, the US 17 widening, and asked if it had been deleted.

Ms. Bollenback replied no, it has moved to the fully funded list. The CFMPOA also wants to add two additional lists; one for regional planning studies and the other for Transportation Systems Maintenance & Operations (TSM&O) technology projects. There is a regional group that has regional projects they would like to advance and be able to access funding. for The TPO will be incorporating TSM&O projects into its process in order to feed into this regional list.

MOTION:

A motion was made by Mr. Blais to recommend support for the 2018 Regional List of Priority Projects and updated Priority Process for the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA). The motion was seconded by Mr. Peterson and carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2018-## Adopting the I-95 to SR 417 Connector Feasibility Study Report

Ms. Nicoulin stated a presentation was given in June by the consultant for the I-95 to SR 417 Connector Feasibility Study. At that time, the recommendation from the consultant was to take no further action and it was directed by the committees and TPO Board that the consultant to close the study. This resolution finalizes the study. A link to the study was provided in the agenda.

MOTION:

A motion was made by Mr. Peterson to recommend approval of Resolution 2018-## adopting the I-95 to SR 417 Connector Feasibility Study Report. The motion was seconded by Ms. Bledsoe and carried unanimously.

D. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2018-## Adopting the Roadway Safety Evaluation and Improvement Study

Ms. Nicoulin stated a presentation was given last month by the consultant for the Roadway Safety Evaluation and Improvement Study. The draft report was opened for comments; the TPO received comments from staff, the Ormond Beach Police Department and the city of Palm Coast. Those comments were incorporated into the final draft report which was provided as a link in the agenda. They were minor grammatical changes and a request to create two tables regarding mitigation. These include a matrix of the intersections and segments with the recommendations on a single page.

MOTION:

A motion was made by Mr. Storke to recommend approval of Resolution 2018-## adopting the Roadway Safety Evaluation and Improvement Study. The motion was seconded by Mr. Blais and carried unanimously.

E. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2018-## Adopting the Resilient Flagler County Report

Ms. Nicoulin stated the Resilient Flagler County Report was presented last month; the draft report was made available for comment. The TPO received minor comments from staff regarding the language and those have been incorporated in the final draft which was provided as a link in the agenda.

MOTION:

A motion was made by Mr. Blais to recommend approval of Resolution 2018-## adopting the Resilient Flagler County Report. The motion was seconded by Ms. Elliott and carried unanimously.

IV. <u>Presentation Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Annual Call for Projects and Priority Project Ranking Process of the</u> R2CTPO

Ms. Nicoulin stated each year at this time, the TPO reviews its annual call for projects process; a flow chart of the process was provided in the agenda. The TIP Subcommittee and the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee will meet soon to discuss the process, any changes to the process and the policies that

govern the process. The hot topic items that have arisen this year deal with cost overruns, cost increases and how to deal with those during the process. Another issue is project readiness; there may be projects the TPO is ready to program but the project may not be ready or the estimate may not be accurate. This year, the TPO is looking to convene the TIP Subcommittee and BPAC Project Review Subcommittee in one joint meeting to discuss the general issues surrounding the call for projects that apply to both subcommittees. The TPO receives applications for Traffic Operations and Safety projects, bicycle/pedestrian projects and planning studies. Once the general issues have been discussed and direction is received from the board, there will be follow-up subcommittee meetings to discuss the specifics that pertain to each subcommittee.

Ms. Gillespie commented that she served on the TIP Subcommittee the two previous years and they worked hard on this only to have the TPO Board not accept their recommendations.

Ms. Nicoulin replied there was a lot of discussion at the board meeting regarding this. She asked if Ms. Gillespie was referring to the application itself.

Ms. Gillespie replied yes and the follow-up by the cities that they are required to provide updated cost estimates.

Ms. Nicoulin replied that issue was incorporated into the policies in terms of providing updated costs. This was the first year that practice was initiated so it did not apply to projects already programmed. That is one of the issues that will be discussed at the subcommittee meeting. The TPO cannot include a contingency when submitting to FDOT.

Ms. Gillespie stated when a project is re-scoped and brought back as the same project the subcommittee knows it was re-scoped. She does not want the TPO to pay for something a city may want to add at the last minute.

Ms. Nicoulin stated one of the main objectives of the cost overrun policy is to not let the scope increase beyond what was initially asked for.

B. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft FY 2017/18 Public Involvement Report

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2017/18 Public Involvement Report. The TPO's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30. She reviewed the social media outreach and gave an overview of the community presentations and events the TPO attended throughout the year including bike helmet fittings; a total of 977 bike helmets were distributed to adults and children last year which is an increase of 15%. The 2018 "Tell the TPO" survey received 2,176 responses and it is estimated the survey reached 62,363 people. For FY 2018/19, the TPO will be reaching out to the "younger crowd" beginning with the TRAC (Transportation and Civil Engineering) program through Mainland High School. She is looking for engineers and transportation experts to serve as volunteer mentors. The Public Outreach Summary is provided in the agenda for review.

Mr. Peterson referred to the number of 35,212 people reached via Twitter and asked how the TPO knows that many were reached.

Ms. Blankenship explained that Twitter enables a user to look at each tweet, each impression it made and the re-tweets. For example, one of the tweets reached 16,000 people.

Mr. Peterson asked if each tweet was individual or if any were duplicates.

Ms. Blankenship replied individual; it tracks the IP addresses and includes how many times the tweet was re-tweeted and how many people saw the re-tweet.

Ms. Gillespie suggested Oak Hill for a bike helmet fitting.

Ms. Blankenship replied the TPO participates in the Oak Hill Community Festival each year; last year approximately 67 helmets were fitted. This year, the TPO will participate in the South Daytona Movie in the Park and will be fitting helmets.

Ms. Lendian asked what the date is for White Cane Day Awareness Day.

Ms. Blankenship replied it will be October 27, 2018 from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm.

Ms. Lendian asked if Mainland High School or Daytona State College would be participating.

Ms. Blankenship replied she was not sure but she can check with the schools.

C. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft Congestion Management Process (CMP) and Performance Measures Report</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated the development of the Congestion Management Process (CMP) and Performance Measures Report is an annual requirement for the TPO. A link to the draft report was provided in the agenda and is an update from the report from last year. It is a five-year report so when it is updated, the fifth year is dropped off and a new one is added. The report looks at where there is re-occurring congestion in the TPO planning area. The report looks at congested or severely congested roads to identify where programming of projects could occur. The TPO expects to see project applications in these areas come in through the annual Call for Projects. Language has also been integrated pertaining to the performance measures targets. Earlier this year, the TPO adopted the safety performance measures targets and that language has been rolled into the report and as the other performance measures targets are adopted those will also be added. The TPO received comments back on the draft report pertaining to volumes on roadways specific to Palm Coast so those volumes will be incorporated into the report. This report provides a foundation and a key link in the long range planning process; the TPO is getting ready to update the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). It also ties in the TIP, priority process and the annual call for projects.

Ms. Foltz asked if adoptive level of service letters were used in the report.

Ms. Nicoulin replied yes; whatever the adopted level of service is for a particular road, it sets the capacity for that road. This item will be back next month for a recommendation of approval.

D. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Transportation Performance Measures and Transit Asset Management</u> (TAM) Plans

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation of Transportation Performance Measures and Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plans. This information has been presented before and is required to be integrated into TPO documents and decision making. FDOT and the TPO have a responsibility to measure and set targets on certain elements including safety, bridge and pavement conditions, travel time reliability; transit is also being asked to develop measures and set targets. The TPO has already set the safety targets. She reviewed bridge conditions in the TPO planning area and FDOT's targets. The deadline is November 14, 2018 and the TPO is recommending supporting FDOT's targets because they do the data and analysis for bridge inspections and direct bridge funding. The same is true for pavement conditions; she reviewed the pavement conditions for interstate and non-interstate roads in the planning area and stated 100% of both are in good condition. However, 25% of lane miles on the interstate system are missing data; that could be some of the construction areas. She reviewed the requirements for travel time reliability and the conditions in our planning area; the TPO is also recommending support of FDOT targets. Transit agencies (Votran, Flagler County Public Transit and SunRail) have to develop plans and targets. The goal is to have them maintain a "state of good repair"; keeping their vehicles and facilities in good operating order. The state is developing plans for small transit agencies like Flagler County Transit; that information is supposed to be available by October 1, 2018. Votran provided their plan last week and the TPO has not received a

plan yet from SunRail. She reviewed the performance measure requirements for transit and Votran's targets. The TPO is recommending supporting the transit targets set by the transit providers and FDOT. These targets have to be incorporated into the TPO's decision making so as we move forward with the call for projects, there will be more discussion on these items. The TPO has to roll information into the TIP so there will be a TIP amendment next month. These will also be incorporated into the next Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). FDOT has to submit a report to FHWA in October, an update in two years to show if significant progress is being made, and a four-year report. There are still a lot of unanswered questions as to where this is headed; once all the TPO/MPOs have reported their information there will be a better idea of what our measures look like relative to other areas of the country.

Discussion ensued regarding bridges.

Mr. Peterson asked if there was a schedule to inspect the remaining 25% of interstate roads. He added that there is no way 100% of our interstate roads are good; he has mentioned before that on I-95, from US 1 to SR 40, the interstate is badly cracking. He asked how long it will take to rate the remaining 25% of the interstate that were missing data.

Ms. Bollenback replied she has followed up with FDOT on the missing data and has not received an answer yet. The actual data on bridges and the interstate system is a security issue; they do not want to openly share that information. If there is a specific section of interstate he is concerned about she can send that to FDOT and ask for the rating and a reason for the rating.

Mr. Peterson stated the TPO needs to know why there is missing data. He understands why some bridge information should be withheld for security reasons but not why sections of I-95 are a security issue. Ms. Bollenback replied there are handouts available on the FDOT website that include the tables for each of these performance measures. If there is an area that members think warrant follow-up, please let her know.

Discussion continued.

E. FDOT Report

Ms. Wyche stated there are major lane closures for the 13 mile widening improvement on I-95 near Daytona Beach. The lane closures will occur over three weeks; westbound ramps on I-4 will be closed day and night starting at 10:00 pm Tuesday and will re-open October 9, 2018. She will send the updated information out weekly. She announced FDOT will hold a St. Johns River to Sea Loop US 1 Trail Workshop on October 1, 2018 from 9:00 am until 12:00 pm, to review and discuss alternatives and suggestions for the trail.

Ms. Gillespie asked where the workshop will be held.

Ms. Wyche replied at the FDOT DeLand office, 719 Woodland Boulevard.

Ms. Nicoulin commented that this is for the New Smyrna Beach and South Daytona gap.

F. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

Ms. Winsett stated the Volusia County Construction Report is provided in the agenda; the only change is the LPGA Boulevard widening project between Jimmy Ann Drive and Derbyshire Road is now complete.

The Flagler County Construction Report was provided in the agenda.

V. Staff Comments

Ms. Nicoulin referred to the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail Workshop and stated the consultant made a presentation to the BPAC last week; there was a lot of input from the BPAC. The TPO received a letter from the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Alliance in objection to the recommendations from the study; she will forward that letter to the committee members. This is a pause in the process to bring the parties together and get additional feedback before the project moves any further.

→ Update on SU Funding/Work Program

Ms. Nicoulin stated the TPO is working with FDOT on what the available SU funding is; a number of projects have been deferred in the current year so money has been added back. The TPO is hoping to have enough to fund more projects on the list; the challenge is this is current year funding and it needs to be put on projects that are ready to go. The TPO has a meeting scheduled with FDOT next month to discuss the priority list and identify which projects to program into the Work Program.

→ BPAC Action on Requests for Additional Funding

Ms. Nicoulin stated the TPO received a request from Ormond Beach for two small sidewalk projects that were sent out for bid; however, the bids came in higher than what was programmed. Since these projects are bicycle/pedestrian projects, they were action items on the BPAC agenda. A representative from the city of Ormond Beach was unable to attend the BPAC meeting and there were a number of questions from BPAC members that were unable to be addressed so the BPAC took action to table the items. These requests are on the TPO Board agenda as action items this month; it will be up to the board if they also want to table the items or take action.

Ms. Nicoulin stated the TPO will most likely be amending the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP); the 2045 update is scheduled to be done by September 2020 but it looks like there are two projects that will move forward prior to then so it will need to be amended. Those projects are the interchange at I-95 and LPGA Boulevard as well as the interchange at I-95 and Pioneer Trail. In order for FDOT to fund design for these projects they must be in the LRTP. Amending the LRTP also requires incorporating the performance measures. Hopefully, a draft will be ready in November for adoption in January.

VI. <u>CAC Member Comments</u>

Ms. Lendian referred to the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Summit that was held last year and asked if one was planned for this year.

Mr. Harris replied yes, it will be held in November in Palatka in Putnam County. He will find the dates and send them to her via email.

Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum ı.

Chairperson Papa called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) to order at 3:00 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was present.

II. **Press/Citizen Comments**

There were no press/citizen comments.

III. Action Items

A. Review and Approval of August 21, 2018 TCC Meeting Minutes

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Mendez to approve the August 21, 2018 TCC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Cheney.

Mr. Cheney referred to page 18 of the agenda and the discussion on the Regional Truck Parking Study where the consultant/FDOT representative stated a link to the report would be provided; he has not seen the link. The CAC was provided a link in their minutes on page 8; he would like the minutes to reflect where the link is located.

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Mendez to approve the August 21, 2018 TCC meeting minutes as amended. The motion was seconded by Mr. Cheney

The amended motion carried unanimously.

B. Review and Recommend Approval of Support for the 2018 Regional List of Priority Projects and Updated Priority Process for the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA)

Ms. Nicoulin stated members of the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA) work together to develop a regional list of priority projects that is based off each individual TPO/MPOs priority project lists. In addition to changes to the list, there have been recommendations for changes to the policy that guides the process of developing the list; the policy was developed in 2013. The CFMPOA is also proposing to add two new categories to the list; a Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSM&O) list and a Planning Studies list. By providing a recommendation of support, the three TPO Board members that are members of the CFMPOA will vote to adopt this list and the updated process at their next meeting.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Cheney to recommend approval of support for the 2018 Regional List of Priority Projects and updated Priority Process for the Central Florida MPO Alliance (CFMPOA). The motion was seconded by Mr. Holmes.

Mr. Cheney referred to page 37 of the agenda, the Privately Funded Transit Projects, Brightline/Hyperloop (Orlando – Tampa), and stated he is curious how this project made the list when there is no right-of-way. The Orlando to Jacksonville route has existing rail owned by the company operating Brightline (CSX); he asked how that route can be pursued.

Ms. Bollenback replied Brightline put in an unsolicited proposal to extend to Tampa as their next phase regardless of the fact that they do not own property. She attended a presentation yesterday with their CEO and he did address going to Jacksonville as the third leg. Currently, the Tampa to Orlando leg is what they are actively seeking approval for. It is not funded but is being pursued.

Mr. Cheney asked if the TPO could pursue the Orlando to Jacksonville leg.

Ms. Bollenback replied the TPO cannot under privately funded items. Brightline is actively pursuing this and we are just acknowledging it.

Mr. Cheney asked if it was being pursued by CSX/Brightline.

Ms. Bollenback replied yes.

Chairperson Papa asked how these projects are prioritized; if it was by ranking or consensus.

Ms. Bollenback replied they tried to fit projects in according to where they were in their evolution.

The motion carried unanimously.

C. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2018-## Adopting the I-95 to SR 417 Connector Feasibility Study Report

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Cheney to recommend approval of Resolution 2018-## adopting

the I-95 to SR 417 Connector Feasibility Study Report. The motion was seconded by Mr.

Dillard.

Mr. Paradise asked for an update on this item.

Ms. Nicoulin stated this was presented by the FDOT consultant in June with the recommendation that no further action be taken due to environmental impacts and high costs. This committee along with the TPO Board directed the consultant to close out the study with those recommendations.

The motion carried unanimously.

D. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2018-## Adopting the Roadway Safety Evaluation and Improvement Study

Ms. Nicoulin stated this item was presented last month by the consultant; comments were received from staff, Palm Coast and the Ormond Beach Police Department and have been incorporated into the study. A link to the draft study was provided in the agenda. TPO staff asked for a matrix be included that identified the recommended improvements in a concise table; the other changes were small typographical errors.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Cheney to recommend approval of Resolution 2018-## adopting

the Roadway Safety Evaluation and Improvement Study. The motion was seconded by Mr.

Walker and carried unanimously.

E. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2018-## Adopting the Resilient Flagler County Report

Ms. Nicoulin stated this item was also presented last month; the draft report was made available for review. There were minor comments from TPO staff that were incorporated into the draft report. A link to the draft report was provided in the agenda.

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Mendez to recommend approval of Resolution 2018-## adopting

the Resilient Flagler County Report. The motion was seconded by Mr. Paradise and carried

unanimously.

IV. Presentation Items

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Annual Call for Projects and Priority Project Ranking Process of the</u> R2CTPO

Ms. Nicoulin stated each year at this time the TPO reviews its annual call for projects process. The TIP Subcommittee and the BPAC Project Review Subcommittee will meet soon to discuss the process, changes recommended to the process and the policies that govern the process. This year, the TPO is looking to convene the TIP Subcommittee and BPAC Project Review Subcommittee in one joint meeting to discuss the general issues surrounding the call for projects that apply to both subcommittees. Once the general issues have been discussed and direction is received from the board, there will be follow-up subcommittee meetings to discuss the specifics that pertain to each subcommittee. The hot topic items that have arisen this year deal with cost overruns, cost increases and how to deal with those during the process. Last year, a new policy was put in place regarding cost estimates; the TPO would like to refine that process.

Mr. Cheney asked if she could provide the January 2018 recommendations since the TPO Board did not adopt those and deferred to what was previously done in 2017.

Ms. Nicoulin replied that most of those recommendations were specific to the applications and will be discussed at the break out meetings with the subcommittees. This was also a concern for the CAC. The first meeting will be a general discussion of the process and certain issues that have come up specific to cost; this is a hot topic issue that has been discussed at the committees and TPO Board. Project readiness is also an issue. This past year, there were several projects that were deferred; they were programmed but were not ready to move forward. That leaves the issue of how to program those funds in current year. It will be an idea driven discussion on these issues that have come up throughout the year and the potential solutions to alleviate them.

Ms. Mendez asked if the local match would be discussed.

Ms. Nicoulin replied potentially, yes.

Mr. Paradise asked if this was to discuss the cost overrun conundrum.

Ms. Nicoulin replied yes.

Mr. Paradise stated in this day and age of escalating costs, the only thing that is certain is change. It is not a perfect system but going to the TPO Board is the best avenue for relief. The TPO has tried to impose some degree of hardship or otherwise data and analysis which has not been as readily adhered to as it should. It is difficult to reconcile because he does not recollect the TPO Board rejecting any of the requests for additional funding as all of them have had some degree of merit. The TPO has tried to benchmark it as best it can by requiring periodic cost updates to projects and even those have proved to be inadequate to fully capture the true and actual cost of these projects. The best thing is to leave it up to the board to make a decision but have some sort of explicit determination where the money will come from to address cost overruns and how it will impact other projects.

Ms. Nicoulin replied further defining cost overruns has been discussed in-house; if it is because of something unforeseen, if the scope changes or if not enough due diligence was done at the time the estimate was done so it was programmed at a low amount. There are a lot of issues surrounding this and how to address it. There have been situations where cost estimates were updated immediately prior to programming and then the bids came back higher than the amount programmed.

Discussion continued.

B. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft FY 2017/18 Public Involvement Report

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2017/18 Public Involvement Report. The TPO's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30. She reviewed the social media outreach and gave an overview of the community presentations and events the TPO attended throughout the year including bike helmet fittings; a total of 977 bike helmets were distributed to adults and children last year which is an increase of 15%. The 2018 "Tell the TPO" survey received 2,176 responses and it is estimated the survey reached 62,363 people. For FY 2018/19, the TPO will be reaching out to the "younger crowd" beginning with the TRAC (Transportation and Civil Engineering) program through Mainland High School. She is looking for engineers and transportation experts to serve as volunteer mentors. She announced the next event the TPO will be attending is Port Orange Family Days on October 6, 2018.

Mr. Cheney commented the TPO is doing outstanding work and asked if the TRAC training this Friday was from 8:00 am to 3:00 pm.

Ms. Blankenship replied yes; the training will encompass different modules that the teachers will use; environmental engineering, motion and mag-lev modules. They will go through two of the modules on Friday. Volunteers will decide where they fit best as a mentor and how to do the experiments.

Mr. Cheney stated Volusia County is volunteering Mr. Sean Castello.

C. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft Congestion Management Process (CMP) and Performance Measures Report</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated the development of the Congestion Management Process (CMP) and Performance Measures Report is an annual requirement for the TPO. It is a five-year document; when it is updated, the fifth year is dropped off and a new one is added. The report looks at where there is re-occurring congestion in the TPO planning area. The report also looks at congested or severely congested roads to identify where programming of projects could occur. The TPO expects to see project applications in these areas come in through the annual Call for Projects. Language has also been integrated pertaining to the performance measures targets. Earlier this year, the TPO adopted the safety performance measures targets and that language has been rolled into the report and as the other performance measures targets are adopted those will also be added. This report provides a foundation and a key link in the long range planning process; the TPO is getting ready to update the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). It also ties in the TIP, priority process and the annual call for projects. The TPO received comments back on the draft report pertaining to volumes on roadways specific to Palm Coast so those volumes will be incorporated into the report.

Mr. Cheney asked if there was a deadline for comments.

Ms. Nicoulin replied the project manager is Ms. Aarti Sharma is not in but she will confer with her and send out an email update.

Mr. Paradise stated the city of Deltona just completed updating traffic counts and asked if the TPO needs that information.

Ms. Nicoulin replied yes.

D. <u>Presentation and Discussion of Transportation Performance Measures and Transit Asset Management</u> (TAM) Plans

Ms. Bollenback gave a PowerPoint presentation of Transportation Performance Measures and Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plans. This information has been presented before and is required to be integrated into TPO documents and decision making. The idea is to link funding to these performance driven areas; this becomes important when we see how our area compares to others in the nation. FDOT has to report to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the TPO/MPOs have to roll up activities to support any changes that may occur. Safety was the first performance measure target adopted; bridge and pavement conditions, travel time reliability and transit are the other measures that need to be set. There is a bridge inventory system that rates bridges; FDOT has evaluated the bridges in the state. The reports are available online.

Mr. Cheney stated the reports used to be available to the public but for security reasons they no longer give that information out. The condition index or sufficiency rating is available but that is all.

Ms. Bollenback continued the presentation and reviewed bridge conditions in the TPO planning area and FDOT's targets. The TPO is recommending supporting FDOT's targets because they do the data and analysis for bridge inspections and direct bridge funding. The same is true for pavement conditions; she reviewed the pavement conditions for interstate and non-interstate roads in the planning area and stated 100% of both are in good condition. However, 25% of lane miles on the interstate system are missing data; that could be some of the construction areas.

Mr. Cheney asked if there was anything that precluded this TPO from having a two-year target.

Ms. Bollenback replied it is not required to have a two-year target.

Mr. Cheney stated there should be two-year targets.

Mr. Karet asked if there are any projects that would improve this over a two-year period.

Mr. Cheney stated the county does resurfacing projects every year based on the pavement condition index. Those that are ranked "poor" or "fair" are the projects done. There should be a two-year baseline target.

Ms. Bollenback replied preservation of the existing system is supposed to be the number one priority. The TPO does not control funding for bridge and pavement conditions. This state does well with that but we do not know how other states do and there is a desire to have national measurements. Florida has been strong with budgeting and funding and we have a good, strong system. FDOT does a good job of maintaining the system. The concern is we may take a hit on the federal level because we do not have huge issues. She reviewed the requirements for travel time reliability and the conditions in our planning area; the TPO is recommending support of FDOT targets. If anyone has any suggestions or comments regarding these measures please let her know. This will be back next month for a recommendation of approval so it can be submitted prior to the November 14, 2018 deadline. Transit agencies (Votran, Flagler County Public Transit and SunRail) have to develop plans and targets. The goal is to have them maintain a "state of good repair". The state is developing plans for small transit agencies like Flagler County Public Transit; that information is supposed to be available by October 1, 2018. Votran provided their draft plan last week as well as language to drop into the TIP. This will be back next month for a recommendation of approval for adoption of the performance measures, transit targets and a TIP amendment.

Mr. Cheney asked about SunRail.

Ms. Bollenback replied the TPO has not received their plan yet; the infrastructure measurement applies to SunRail so a plan is needed from them. She reviewed the performance measure requirements for transit and Votran's targets. The TPO is recommending supporting the transit targets set by the transit providers and FDOT. These targets have to be incorporated into the TPO's decision making so as we move forward with the call for projects, there will be more discussion on these items. The TPO has to roll information into the TIP so there will be a TIP amendment next month. These will also be incorporated into the next Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). FDOT has to submit a report to FHWA in October, and an update in two years to show if significant progress is being made. There are still a lot of unanswered questions as to where this is headed; once all the TPO/MPOs have reported their information there will be a better idea of what our measures look like relative to other areas of the country.

Mr. Cheney referred to the transit performance measures and asked if there was a reason they are basing the measurement on "useful" life as opposed to mean rate of failure.

Ms. Bollenback replied a state of good repair has been a common concept used in transit for a long time. Transit has been submitting performance measures for years through the National Transit Database and they monitor things like this; useful life and breakdowns, etc.

E. FDOT Report

Ms. Wyche stated there are major lane closures for the 13 mile widening improvement on I-95 near Daytona Beach. The lane closures will occur over three weeks; westbound ramps on I-4 will be closed day and night starting at 10:00 pm Tuesday and re-opening October 9, 2018. She will send the updated information out weekly. She announced FDOT will hold a St. Johns River to Sea Loop US 1 Trail Workshop on October 1, 2018 from 9:00 am until 12:00 pm, to review and discuss alternatives and suggestions for the trail.

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F. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

Mr. Cheney stated the LPGA Boulevard four-lane widening project from Jimmy Ann Drive to Derbyshire Road has been completed.

The Flagler County Construction Report was provided in the agenda.

V. Staff Comments

Ms. Nicoulin referred to the workshop FDOT is holding for the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail on October 1, 2018; this is the gap PD&E study from New Smyrna Beach to South Daytona. This committee received a presentation on this previously and the consultant presented again last week to the BPAC where there was a lot of discussion regarding the route. The TPO also received a letter from the St. Johns River to Sea Loop Alliance regarding their concerns with the route and the recommendations from the study. She will be sending the committee the letter.

→ Update on SU Funding/Work Program

Ms. Nicoulin stated the TPO is working with FDOT on what the available SU funding is; a number of projects have been deferred in the current year so money has been added back. The TPO is hoping to have enough to fund more projects on the list; the challenge is this is current year funding and it needs to be put on projects that are ready to go. The TPO has a meeting scheduled with FDOT next month to discuss the priority list and identify which projects to program into the Work Program.

→ BPAC Action on Requests for Additional Funding

Ms. Nicoulin stated the TPO received a request from Ormond Beach for two small sidewalk projects that were sent out for bid; however, the bids came in higher than what was programmed. Since these projects are bicycle/pedestrian projects, they were action items on the BPAC agenda. A representative from the city of Ormond Beach was unable to attend the BPAC meeting and there were a number of questions from BPAC members that were unable to be addressed so the BPAC took action to table the items. These requests are on the TPO Board agenda as action items this month; it will be up to the board if they also want to table the items or take action.

Ms. Nicoulin stated the TPO will most likely be amending the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP); the 2045 update is scheduled to be done by September 2020 but it looks like there are two projects that will move forward prior to then so it will need to be amended. Those projects are the interchange at I-95 and LPGA Boulevard as well as the interchange at I-95 and Pioneer Trail. In order for FDOT to fund design for these projects they must be in the LRTP. Amending the LRTP also requires incorporating the performance measures. This is the first TPO to do this. Hopefully, a draft will be ready in November for adoption in January.

VI. <u>TCC Member Comments</u>

Mr. Cheney stated the impact fee study update should go to the Volusia County Council at their first meeting in October. After the draft report is sent to the council it will be placed on the county website. The county has received requests from consultants and the cities for the annual average daily traffic spreadsheet; that will also be made available on the website. FDOT was doing ETDM on behalf of the county for LPGA Boulevard and he asked Ms. Wyche to send him the status and comments for the report.

Mr. Griffith announced SR A1A in Flagler Beach is out for bid and should be under construction by the end of the year. He asked if there ever were trains or railways in the TPO's long term planning. This country is behind the world because we do not have adequate train transportation.



TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED LOCAL COORDINATING BOARD (TDLCB) PUBLIC HEARING: THE TDLCB HELD AN ANNUAL TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED PUBLIC HEARING ON NOVEMBER 8, 2017 FOLLOWING THE TDLCB MEETING. PUBLIC COMMENTS WERE RECEIVED FROM THREE PEOPLE AT THE HEARING WHICH WAS ATTENDED BY TEN PEOPLE.

RIVER TO SEA TPO BOARD RETREAT: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO HELD ITS ANNUAL RETREAT ON MARCH 23, 2018 IN COORDINATION WITH THE VOLUSIA COUNTY ASSOCIATION FOR RESPONSIBLE DEVELOPMENT (VCARD). THE RETREAT FOCUSED ON THE FUTURE OF TRANSPORTATION TECHNOLOGY. MORE THAN 125 MEMBERS OF THE RIVER TO SEA TPO BOARD, COMMITTEES, ELECTED OFFICIALS, GOVERNMENT STAFF, MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC, CONSULTANTS AND NEWS MEDIA ATTENDED THIS EVENT WHICH WAS SCHEDULED FROM 9:00 A.M. TO 12:00 A.M. AT THE BRANNON CIVIC CENTER IN NEW SMYRNA BEACH. FOUR AUTONOMOUS VEHICLES WERE ON DISPLAY INCLUDING A FULLY AUTONOMOUS TESLA. TEST RIDES WERE PROVIDED TO DEMONSTRATE THE FEATURES OF THIS VEHICLE. ALSO ON DISPLAY WERE A CHEVY CAMARO ECOCAR, MARITIME ROBOTX BOAT AND A FULLY AUTONOMOUS FORD ESCAPE. A FOLLOW-UP SURVEY WAS DISTRIBUTED TO COLLECT FEEDBACK ON THE RETREAT. TWENTY-NINE RESPONSES WERE RECEIVED AND THE OVERALL RETREAT WAS RANKED A 9 OUT OF 10.

TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP); 2018 TRANSPORTATION PRIORITY PROJECT LISTS; AND FY 2018/19 AND 2019/20 UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP): WHILE ALL RIVER TO SEA TPO MEETINGS ARE OPEN TO THE PUBLIC AND TIME FOR COMMENT IS SCHEDULED, THE TPO FORMALLY ANNOUNCED VIA LEGAL ADVERTISEMENTS THE AVAILABILITY OF THE FOLLOWING THREE DOCUMENTS FOR PUBLIC REVIEW AND COMMENT: THE FY 2018/19 – 2022/23 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP), THE 2018 TRANSPORTATION PRIORITY PROJECT LISTS AND THE FY 2018/19 AND 2019/20 UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP). THERE WERE NO PUBLIC COMMENTS RECEIVED ON THESE DOCUMENTS.

SR 44 @ MISSION RD/WALLACE DR/CANAL ST ALTERNATIVE INTERSECTION ANALYSIS DESIGN STUDY PUBLIC MEETINGS: ON JULY 11, AUGUST 31, AND OCTOBER 3, 2017, THREE PUBLIC MEETINGS WERE HELD TO SOLICIT PUBLIC AND BUSINESS INPUT ON THE INTERSECTIONS AT SR 44 AND MISSION ROAD, WALLACE DRIVE AND CANAL STREET IN NEW SMYRNA BEACH. THE MEETINGS WERE HELD IN THE NEW SMYRNA BEACH CITY COMMISSION CHAMBERS. MORE THAN 85 PEOPLE ATTENDED THESE THREE MEETINGS.

PRINTED MATERIALS, PROMOTIONAL ITEMS AND RELEVANT DOCUMENTS:

VOLUSIA COUNTY BICYCLING MAP FOR THE EXPERIENCED CYCLIST: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO PRODUCED THE FIRST COUNTYWIDE BICYCLING MAP FOR THE EXPERIENCED CYCLIST CONSISTING OF BICYCLE ROUTES THROUGHOUT VOLUSIA COUNTY. THE MAP WAS DEVELOPED IN COOPERATION WITH THE FLORIDA BICYCLE ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA FREEWHEELERS BICYCLE CLUB, BIKE FLORIDA, INC. AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS IN VOLUSIA COUNTY. THIS MAP IS MADE AVAILABLE AT KIOSKS IN THE VOLUSIA COUNTY PARKS, THE OFFICE OF THE WEST VOLUSIA ADVERTISING AUTHORITY AS WELL AS THE DAYTONA BEACH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND THE DAYTONA BEACH/PORT ORANGE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. THE MAP IS HANDED OUT AT EVENTS THAT THE TPO PARTICIPATES IN AND IS ALSO AVAILABLE THROUGH DIRECT REQUEST. APPROXIMATELY 500 BICYCLE MAPS WERE DISTRIBUTED IN FY 2017/18. THE MAP IS CURRENTLY UNDERGOING AN UPDATE TO INCLUDE BOTH VOLUSIA AND FLAGLER COUNTIES AND ADD SUITABILITY LEVELS FOR CYCLISTS; THE NEW MAP WILL BE TITLED "THE RIVER TO SEA TPO BICYCLE SUITABILITY MAP". THIS UPDATE IS EXPECTED TO BE COMPLETED IN THE LATE SUMMER/EARLY FALL OF 2018.

VOLUSIA TPO WALK & RIDE DVD: THE VOLUSIA TPO WALK & RIDE DVD GIVES TIPS TO BICYCLISTS AND PEDESTRIANS ON THE RULES OF THE ROAD. THE DVD IS PROVIDED TO THE VOLUSIA COUNTY SCHOOL SYSTEM AND HANDED OUT AT THE EVENTS THE TPO PARTICIPATES IN AS WELL AS THROUGH DIRECT REQUEST. THE WALK AND RIDE BICYCLE & PEDESTRIAN SAFETY VIDEO IS A TPO PROJECT FUNDED BY THE FLORIDA SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM AND PRODUCED BY WDSC-TV CHANNEL 15. THE VIDEO AND ACCOMPANYING PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS PROMOTE SAFE PRACTICES FOR WALKING AND BIKING. ENGLISH AND SPANISH VERSIONS OF THE VIDEO ARE AVAILABLE. THE WALK AND RIDE BICYCLE & PEDESTRIAN SAFETY VIDEO WAS SELECTED FOR A BRONZE TELLY AWARD IN 2010. APPROXIMATELY 300 WALK AND RIDE DVDS WERE DISTRIBUTED IN FY 2017/18.

<u>BICYCLE SAFETY CAR DECALS:</u> THE BICYCLE SAFETY AWARENESS DECAL (IT'S THE LAW DECAL) WAS DEVELOPED BY THE RIVER TO SEA TPO AND PROMOTES FLORIDA STATUTE 316.083 (1) — A STATUTE THAT STATES THE DRIVER OF A VEHICLE PASSING A BICYCLE OR OTHER NON-MOTORIZED VEHICLE MUST PASS THE

BICYCLE OR OTHER NON-MOTORIZED VEHICLE AT A DISTANCE OF AT LEAST THREE (3) FEET. DECALS ARE DISPLAYED PUBLIC AND PRIVATE VEHICLES ALIKE. THE RIVER TO SEA TPO DISTRIBUTED APPROXIMATELY 400 BICYCLE SAFETY CAR DECALS IN FY 2017/18.

TPO SCRAPBOOK: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO KEEPS A SCRAPBOOK OF RELEVANT NEWS ARTICLES, PRESS RELEASES AND LEGAL ADS THAT ARE OF INTEREST TO THE TPO OR THE TPO IS REFERENCED IN. IN THE FY 2017/18 RIVER TO SEA TPO SCRAPBOOK, THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 80 NEWSPAPER ARTICLES PUBLISHED MENTIONING THE RIVER TO SEA TPO AND 16 LEGAL ADS/PRESS RELEASES ISSUED.

PROJECT WORKSHOPS, COMMUNITY PRESENTATIONS AND EVENTS:

SUMMER SCHOOL BICYCLE HELMET FITTINGS: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO CONDUCTS BICYCLE SAFETY AWARENESS PROGRAMS THAT INCLUDE FITTING AND DONATING BICYCLE HELMETS. BICYCLE HELMETS ARE PURCHASED BY THE RIVER TO SEA TPO AND AWARDED BY THE BICYCLE HELMET PROMOTION GRANT FROM THE FLORIDA'S PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLING SAFETY RESOURCE CENTER. EACH SUMMER, THE BICYCLE HELMETS ARE FITTED AND DONATED TO A NUMBER OF CHILDREN IN VOLUSIA AND FLAGLER COUNTY SCHOOLS. DURING THE 2017/18 YEAR, THE RIVER TO SEA TPO STAFF WENT TO THE FOLLOWING SCHOOLS, GAVE A PRESENTATION ON BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY AND PROPERLY FIT AND DONATED HELMETS:

JULY 6, 2017: PINE TRAIL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – 33 HELMETS FITTED

July 17-18, 2017: Flagler County Summer School Program – 265 helmets fitted

JUNE 7, 2018: SPIRIT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – 53 HELMETS FITTED

June 21, 2018: Port Orange Elementary School – 50 Helmets Fitted

JUNE 28, 2018: OSTEEN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – 54 HELMETS FITTED

VCARD ICEBREAKER: ON SEPTEMBER 28, 2017, THE RIVER TO SEA TPO STAFF ATTENDED AND STAFFED A DISPLAY BOOTH AT THE VCARD ICEBREAKER. THE BOOTH WAS GEARED TOWARDS PROJECTS IN THE TPO'S PLANNING AREA.

PORT ORANGE FAMILY DAYS: PORT ORANGE FAMILY DAYS IS AN AREA-WIDE COMMUNITY EVENT THAT DRAWS CLOSE TO 60,000 PEOPLE OVER THREE DAYS. THE RIVER TO SEA TPO PARTICIPATED IN PORT ORANGE FAMILY DAYS ON SEPTEMBER 30, 2017; APPROXIMATELY 196 HELMETS WERE PROPERLY FITTED AND DONATED DURING THIS EVENT AS WELL AS A LARGE NUMBER OF PROMOTIONAL ITEMS DISTRIBUTED.

INTERNATIONAL WALK TO SCHOOL DAY: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO PARTICIPATED IN WALK TO SCHOOL DAY ON OCTOBER 4, 2017 AT INDIAN RIVER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND PALM TERRACE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL. THIS EVENT CELEBRATES THE JOYS OF WALKING AND OPENS THE EYES OF STUDENTS, FAMILIES, SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY LEADERS AND PARTNERS IN SEEING THE POSSIBILITIES FOR WALKING TO SCHOOL EVERY DAY. THE TPO STAFF WALKED WITH THE KIDS FROM A DESIGNATED LOCATION TO THE SCHOOL.

LOADS OF SMILES PEDIATRIC CARE CENTER: THE TPO ATTENDED SAFETY DAY AT THE PEDIATRIC CARE CENTER IN DAYTONA BEACH. A PRESENTATION ON BICYCLE & PEDESTRIAN SAFETY WAS GIVEN TO MORE THAN 50 CHILDREN AND ADULTS; 18 HELMETS WERE FITTED FOR MEDICALLY AND MENTALLY-CHALLENGED CHILDREN.

WHITE CANE AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY DAY: ON OCTOBER 26, 2017, THE TPO PARTICIPATED IN WHITE CANE AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY DAY. THIS INCLUDED PARTICIPATING IN THE WHITE CANE CHALLENGE; FOR THE CHALLENGE, EACH PARTICIPANT WAS BLINDFOLDED AND LED THROUGH CROSSWALKS ON ALL FOUR LEGS OF AN INTERSECTION BY A GUIDE. THIS YEAR'S EVENT WAS HELD AT THE INTERSECTION OF BEVILLE AND NOVA ROADS IN DAYTONA BEACH.

ST. Johns River to Sea Loop Summit: This three day event, on October 26-28, 2017, celebrated the promise of the Loop and emphasized the continuing process and partnerships required to fulfill that promise. The events spanning three days included a stakeholder meeting, community outreach and bike ride and rodeo. The TPO participated in the planning of this event as well as in the summit celebration held on October 28, 2017 by staffing a table, providing safety and promotional items and fitting and donating 51 bicycle helmets to adults and children.

VOLUSIA COUNTY GEOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION SYSTEMS (GIS) DAY: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO PARTICIPATED IN GIS DAY ON NOVEMBER 15, 2017 AND PROVIDED A TABLE DISPLAY OF THE TPO'S DRAFT BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN MASTER PLAN MAPS AS WELL AS PROMOTIONAL ITEMS AND INFORMATION.

<u>Dale Avenue SUN Trail Ribbon Cutting:</u> On November 18, 2018, the TPO attended the ribbon cutting of the Edgewater Dale Avenue SUN Trail – the first SUN Trail funded project to be constructed in Florida.

<u>LIGHT UP MIDTOWN HEALTH FAIR:</u> THE RIVER TO SEA TPO HAD A BOOTH AT THE LIGHT UP MIDTOWN HEALTH FAIR AND FIT AND DONATED 110 HELMETS AS WELL AS GIVING AWAY SAFETY PROMOTIONAL ITEMS.

ANNUAL TPO TOY DRIVE AND HOLIDAY OPEN HOUSE: DURING THE MONTH OF DECEMBER, THE TPO HELD A TOY DRIVE FOR THE CHILDREN'S HOME SOCIETY OF FLAGLER AND VOLUSIA. THE TOY DRIVE CONCLUDED WITH A HOLIDAY OPEN HOUSE HELD BY THE TPO; MORE THAN 24 PEOPLE ATTENDED AND PROVIDED TOYS AND DONATIONS DURING THE OPEN HOUSE. UPWARDS OF 75 TOYS WERE DONATED AS A RESULT OF THIS OUTREACH.

THE TPO STAFF GAVE A NUMBER OF PRESENTATIONS TO THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY THROUGHOUT THE FY 17/18 YEAR. SOME OF THESE PRESENTATIONS INCLUDED: DELTONA CITY COMMISSION; DELAND ROTARY CLUB; ROTARY CLUB OF DAYTONA BEACH; DAYTONA BEACH ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY BOARD; FLORIDA SCENIC HIGHWAYS PROGRAM STATEWIDE MEETING; VOLUSIA COUNTY AND FLAGLER COUNTY LEGISLATIVE DELEGATIONS; FLAGLER COUNTY CHAMBER; AND ONE VOICE FOR VOLUSIA.

TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED (TD) LEGISLATIVE AWARENESS DAY: ONE FEBRUARY 14, 2018, THE TPO STAFF, ALONG WITH MEMBERS OF THE TPO'S TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED LOCAL COORDINATING BOARD (TDLCB) AND VOTRAN TRAVELLED TO TALLAHASSEE FOR TD AWARENESS DAY TO SPEAK WITH LEGISLATORS REGARDING TD ISSUES AND CONCERNS.

"Not So Noisy" Bike Fair: On February 19-21 and 24 2018, the River to Sea TPO participated in the Not So Noisy Bike Fair. TPO Staff manned a booth at Daytona State College, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, and Bethune-Cookman University. Promotional items and safety information were distributed. On the final day of the week-long event, a bicycle ride and safety Fair was held at Bethune-Cookman University where the TPO fit and donated 51 bicycle helmets.

2018 "TELL THE TPO" SURVEY CAMPAIGN: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO KICKED OFF IT BI-ANNUAL TELL THE TPO SURVEY CAMPAIGN ON APRIL 30, 2018 WHICH RAN THROUGH JUNE 30, 2018. THE GOALS OF THE SURVEY INCLUDED INCREASING AWARENESS AND BRANDING OF THE RIVER TO SEA TPO; BUILDING THE TPO'S DATABASE OF INTERESTED RESIDENTS, BUSINESSES AND VISITORS; BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS WITH OTHER AGENCIES, CIVIC ORGANIZATIONS, AND THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY; ENGAGING THE PUBLIC IN THINKING ABOUT TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ISSUES; OBTAINING INFORMATION ABOUT PUBLIC OPINION ON "HOT BUTTON" TRANSPORTATION ISSUES AND DESIRES RELATED TO MOBILITY OPTIONS; AND COMPARING RESULTS OF THE 2018 SURVEY TO PRIOR YEARS' SURVEYS. A SIGNIFICANT SOCIAL MEDIA CAMPAIGN WAS LAUNCHED RESULTING IN 107 UNIQUE FACEBOOK PAGES/PEOPLE SHARED AND 43 UNIQUE TWEETS ON TWITTER. THE SURVEY WAS MADE AVAILABLE AT ALL THE LOCAL VOLUSIA COUNTY AND FLAGLER COUNTY LIBRARIES AS WELL AS THE PALM COAST COMMUNITY CENTER, STEWART - MARCHMAN CENTER, VOTRAN OFFICE AND TRANSFER PLAZA, VOLUSIA COUNTY TAG & TITLE OFFICE IN DAYTONA BEACH. THE ONLINE VERSION OF THE SURVEY WAS HOUSED ON ITS OWN WEBSITE, WWW.TELLTHETPO.COM. HARD COPIES OF THE SURVEY WERE MADE AVAILABLE UPON REQUEST AND AT THE LOCATIONS LISTED ABOVE. TWO-THOUSAND ONE-HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-SIX RESPONSES WERE RECEIVED. THIS REPRESENTS A 70% INCREASE OVER PREVIOUS YEARS' SURVEYS. MEDIA OUTREACH INCLUDED 13 MEDIA ARTICLES, TWO TELEVISION INTERVIEWS AND TWO RADIO INTERVIEWS, INCLUDING NEWS-13, NEWS DAYTONA BEACH AND VOLUSIA MAGAZINE. MORE THAN 200 HARD COPIES OF THE SURVEY IN ENGLISH AND SPANISH WERE DISTRIBUTED IN THE PIERSON AREA THROUGH THE ROTARY CLUB OF FLAGLER BEACH'S FOOD DISTRIBUTION EVENT. IT IS ESTIMATED THAT 62,200 PEOPLE WERE MADE AWARE OF, OR CAME IN CONTACT WITH, THE RIVER TO SEA TPO AND THE TELL THE TPO SURVEY THROUGH THE NEWS MEDIA (RADIO, TELEVISION AND PRINT), SOCIAL MEDIA OUTLETS, ORGANIZATIONAL WEBSITE LINKS AND EVENTS.

OAK HILL COMMUNITY FESTIVAL: ON MAY 5, 2018, THE TPO STAFF ATTENDED THE OAK HILL COMMUNITY FESTIVAL. FIFTY-SIX BICYCLE HELMETS WERE FITTED AND DONATED AS WELL AS PROMOTIONAL ITEMS GIVEN AWAY. THE 2018 TELL THE TPO SURVEY WAS ALSO DISTRIBUTED.

<u>CAREER DAY:</u> ON MAY 18, 2018 TPO STAFF PRESENTED DURING CAREER DAY AT VOLUSIA PINES ELEMENTARY SCHOOL IN LAKE HELEN. THE TPO STAFF EXPLAINED WHAT THE TPO IS AND ITS FUNCTIONS AS WELL AS CAREERS IN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING.

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY: THE RIVER TO SEA TPO PARTICIPATED IN VOLUSIA COUNTY'S NATIONAL TRAILS DAY ON JUNE 2, 2018 AT DEBARY HALL. APPROXIMATELY 40 BICYCLE HELMETS WERE FITTED AND PROMOTIONAL ITEMS WERE DISTRIBUTED.

C. REVIEW AND RECOMMEND APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2018-## ADOPTING THE TRANSPORTATION PERFORMANCE TARGETS

Background Information:

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) issued the final rule-making needed to implement requirements established through the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) and subsequent provisions in the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act), which identified national transportation programs for measuring, reporting and target setting of the transportation system. The final rule requires targets to be set by the State Departments of Transportation (DOTs) and Metropolitan/Transportation Planning Organizations (M/TPOs) for the following performance measures:

- Safety
- Bridge Condition
- Pavement Condition
- Travel Time Reliability
- Transit Asset Management

Safety targets were previously adopted by the River to Sea TPO in January of 2018. Resolution 2018-## adopts the River to Sea Transportation Performance Measure Targets for the remaining four performance measures: bridge condition, pavement condition, travel time reliability and transit asset management.

RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION ADOPTING TRANSPORTATION PERFORMANCE MANAGEMENT (TPM) TARGETS

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and portions of Flagler County inclusive of the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

On July 26, 2016, FTA published the final Transit Asset Management rule. This rule applies to all recipients and subrecipients of Federal transit funding that own, operate, or manage public transportation capital assets. The rule defines the term "state of good repair," requires that public transportation providers develop and implement Transit Asset Management (TAM) plans, and establishes state of good repair standards and performance measures for four asset categories as shown in the following table. The rule became effective on October 1, 2018.

TAM Plans and Targets

The Transit Asset Management (TAM) rule requires that every transit provider receiving federal financial assistance under 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53 develop a TAM plan or be a part of a group TAM plan prepared by a sponsor (i.e. FDOT). As part of the TAM plan, public transportation agencies are required to set and report transit targets annually. Transit providers or their sponsors must also share these targets with each M/TPO in which the transit provider's projects and services are programmed in the M/TPO's TIP. M/TPOs can either agree to support the TAM targets, or set their own separate regional TAM targets for the M/TPO's planning area.

The River to Sea TPO planning area is served by three (3) transit service providers: Flagler County Public Transit (FCPT), Votran, and SunRail. Votran and SunRail are considered Tier I providers and, as such, each must develop a TAM Plan. FCPT is considered a Tier II provider and thus is included in a group TAM plan developed by the FDOT Public Transit Office in Tallahassee.

In support of the transit providers, the River to Sea TPO adopted these targets on October 24, 2018. Adoption of the transit asset targets represents an agreement by the TPO to plan and program projects in the TIP that will, once implemented, make progress toward achieving the transit provider targets. The River to Sea TPO FY 2018/19 to 2022/23 TIP was developed and is managed in cooperation with Flagler County Public Transit (FCPT), Votran, and SunRail. It reflects the investment priorities established in the current 2040 LRTP. The investments addressing transit state of good repair are included in Section VI - Transit & Transportation Disadvantaged Projects. Projects in this section of the TIP include the funding of equipment, vehicles, infrastructure, maintenance and/or facilities in the TPO planning area.

Transit asset condition and state of good repair is a consideration in the methodology used by the public transit providers and the River to Sea TPO to select projects for inclusion in the TIP. As such, the TIP includes specific investment priorities that support all of the MPO's goals, including transit state of good repair, using priorities established in the LRTP. This includes the allocation of 30% of the Transportation Management Area (TMA) funding available to the TPO to support the replacement of capital assets. The River to Sea TPO evaluates, prioritizes and funds transit projects that, once implemented, are anticipated to improve state of good repair in the TPO's planning area. The TPO's goal of supporting local transit providers to achieve transit asset condition targets is linked to this investment plan, and the process used to prioritize the projects within the TIP is consistent with federal requirements.

Bridge, Pavement and System Performance Measures (PM-2 and PM-3)

The second of the performance measures rules issued by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) became effective on May 20, 2017, establishing measures to assess the pavement and bridge condition on the National Highway System (NHS). Requirements involve measuring the condition of these facilities and reporting conditions that are considered "Good" and those considered "Poor." Facilities rated as Good suggest that no major investments are needed. Facilities rated as Poor indicate major investments will be needed in the near term.

The FDOT is staffed appropriately to collect and maintain data regarding bridge and pavement condition. This information was reported to the River to Sea TPO in the aggregate for the planning area. Detailed data sets were not provided and the River to Sea TPO makes no statement regarding these data sets.

In October 2018, the River to Sea TPO adopted pavement and bridge condition performance targets in support of the measures and targets set by FDOT. All new projects added to the TIP by the TPO that will help achieve the pavement and bridge condition performance targets will include a statement to that effect. The TPO is not prepared at this time, however, to add statements regarding the selection methods for projects added by other agencies such as FDOT. Additional commentary may be added in the future pending guidance from federal and state agencies. The River to Sea TPO further recognizes that funding is set-aside to support system preservation activities including bridge maintenance and replacement for roadway resurfacing, restoration and rehabilitation. The allocation of these funds uses a data-driven process that is managed outside the M/TPO processes.

The third of the three performance measures rules issued by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) became effective on May 20, 2017, establishing measures to assess the performance of the National Highway System (NHS), freight movement on the Interstate System, and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ). The Air Quality programs do not apply to the River to Sea TPO planning area. However, the travel time reliability for interstate, non-interstate NHS and travel time reliability for freight are applicable and consistent with the TPO's process for establishing project priorities. All new projects added to the TIP by the TPO that will help achieve the system performance targets will include a statement to that effect. The TPO is not prepared at this time, however, to add statements regarding the selection methods for projects added by other agencies such as FDOT. Additional commentary may be added in the future pending guidance from federal and state agencies.

This TIP includes specific investment priorities that support all of the TPO's goals including system preservation, congestion mitigation and freight movements, as acknowledged previously in the LRTP. The TPO's goal of preserving the existing transportation infrastructure and maximizing efficiency is linked to this investment plan and the process used in prioritizing the projects is consistent with federal requirements. Going forward, the project evaluation and prioritization process will continue to be modified to utilize a data-driven strategy to evaluate projects that will support the system performance targets and the TPO will continue updating the process used in prioritizing the projects to ensure it's consistent with federal requirements.

The River to Sea TPO also recognizes that continued efforts must be made to incorporate transportation system performance (PM-2 and PM-3) into the institutional decision-making and documents of the organization. This includes using a project selection and prioritization process that supports the FDOT goals and close coordination with agencies that most significantly control these decisions. The TPO will continue to coordinate with FDOT and transit providers to take action to further modify evaluation criteria to incorporate performance measures as they are established and are more fully understood.

RE: Project Priorities, Costs and Management of Extra Urban (SU) Attributable Funds

Dear Board Member:

During the September meeting of the River to Sea TPO Executive Committee, members of the committee engaged in a lengthy discussion regarding project cost increases, cost over-runs and the impacts these requests have on the overall funding of prioritized projects for the River to Sea TPO. The discussion reflected many of the comments and concerns expressed in recent months by members of the Citizen Advisory Committee, the Technical Advisory Committee and the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee.

Members of the Executive Committee understand the goals of the TPO to rank and fund the most needed projects throughout our communities and they recognize the need to maintain some flexibility in order to support projects to completion. The committee members also recognize, however, that increases in project costs have a negative impact on the advancement of other projects awaiting funds. Concerns have been voiced previously by the TPO board and advisory committee members and a variety of policy changes have been implemented to reduce requests for additional project funding by project sponsors. Unfortunately, these requests have persisted over the past year.

The TPO is about to begin a review of the Annual Call for Projects and Priority Ranking Process as we do each year. The Executive Committee urges TPO members to work with their staff to bring forward additional suggestions that will reduce the continued reliance on TPO funding to bolster project funding requests that are insufficient. The committee also encourages TPO Board members to make clear, that concurrent with the next update to the List of Prioritized Projects, the TPO will deny requests for project costs increases unless substantial documentation is provided to demonstrate that the increase was unavoidable and not within the control of the project sponsor.
