I. Call to Order / Roll Call / Determination of Quorum/Pledge of Allegiance

Chairperson Kerry Karl called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) to order at 1:15 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held in a hybrid format with ten voting and two non-voting members physically present; and six voting and one non-voting member virtually present.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Martel to allow members attending virtually to participate and vote. The motion was seconded by Ms. Biro and carried unanimously.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

II. <u>Public Comment/Participation</u>

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

A. <u>Review and Approval of the August 16, 2022 CAC Minutes</u>

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Feldman to approve the August 16, 2022 CAC minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

B. <u>Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2022-## Amending the Connect 2045 Long Range</u> <u>Transportation Plan (LRTP) (Roll Call Vote Required)</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated this LRTP amendment adds funding to a project already in the LRTP; it advances construction funding to the current year band of 2021 to 2025 for the Flagler Central Commerce Parkway Connector from US 1 to SR 100. Funding was received through an appropriation from the Florida Legislature and it is coming from the state's general fund. It is not displacing any project currently in the Work Program. The amendment is open for public comment. One comment was received via email in support of the project and citing the benefits it will provide to the area; she read the comment.

Mr. Peterson commented that although he agrees with the benefits of this project, it is different from other projects because it is going through private land that is environmentally sensitive. He is reluctantly supporting it. He is curious about where the money is coming from. If the funding is coming from FDOT's budget, it will hurt a project somewhere in the state.

Ms. Taylor explained that Flagler County filed this project as a bill during the last legislative session; it is being funded through the state's general revenue fund; the funding type is listed as GR23. It is not FDOT's money but is state money on top of what FDOT already has budgeted for the project. This is the first year the legislature has funded a project outside of FDOT funds.

Mr. Feldman stated this new road will provide better access to the new sheriff's headquarters and the new regional library; it will open areas for both residential and commercial development which is needed in Bunnell. It will also relieve traffic through Bunnell.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to recommend approval of Resolution 2022-## amending the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Feldman and carried unanimously by a roll call vote.

C. <u>Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2022-## Amending the FY 2022/23 to 2026/27</u> <u>Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) (Roll Call Vote Required)</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated this TIP amendment supports the project that was just amended into the LRTP and is amending the project into the current year of the TIP.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Martel to recommend approval of Resolution 2022-## amending the FY 2022/23 to 2026/27 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The motion was seconded by Mr. Heyne and carried unanimously by a roll call vote.

IV. <u>Presentation Items</u>

A. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the River to Sea TPO's Project Prioritization Process</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated every year the TPO reviews the project prioritization process and the three guiding resolutions prior to opening the next Call for Projects. The resolutions guide how we spend our set aside funds, establish project categories and rankings, and delineates the local match and project cost increases. The TPO

accepts project applications for traffic operations/safety and bicycle/pedestrian projects for feasibility studies and project implementation. The TPO also accepts applications for planning studies but we currently do not have dedicated funding for those so we have been working with FDOT to fund them. She reviewed the flow chart of the process and how it ties into the TIP and FDOT's Work Program. The process, project applications and resolutions are reviewed each year for any issues that may have come up during the previous cycle. The Call for Projects has opened in early December for the past two years to allow project applicants additional time to prepare their applications. The TIP Subcommittee and BPAC Project Review Subcommittee convene after the process closes to review and rank the project applications; they are ranked based on the set criteria within the applications. She reviewed the process the priority lists undergo and the three guiding resolutions. TPO staff will be scheduling the subcommittee meetings for the beginning of October to review these resolutions and project applications.

Mr. Collins asked for clarification that the implementation of planning studies is passed on to FDOT; if the policy is to direct management of the planning studies to FDOT.

Ms. Nicoulin replied yes; the TPO does not currently have SU funds for planning studies; FDOT does at times have funds for planning studies. It is more difficult to fund the studies If we do not have a prioritized list. The Mason Avenue Corridor study that is currently underway is the number one project on the planning study list and FDOT is funding and managing it.

Mr. Collins stated he understands the process FDOT uses to choose consultants but if these projects are coming from the TPO's process, the management of them should be locally-driven. He believes that any planning study that comes from the TPO should have local control. If the funding is dedicated to Volusia County, they should have control of the study.

Ms. Nicoulin explained that the TPO does not have a funding source for planning studies. The TPO works with FDOT on a number of projects, especially those on state roads to leverage state funding. FDOT can manage any project on our priority list if it is on a state road; not just planning studies. The TPO has very limited funds so if projects are on the statewide system, we coordinate with FDOT. The TPO cannot use local preference when selecting a consultant with federal funds.

Members continued to discuss the process and guiding resolutions. Changing the allocation percentages was discussed changed since traffic operations projects tend to be more expensive than bicycle/pedestrian projects. That will be discussed at the TIP Subcommittee meeting and more information and background can be provided then. Mr. Collins asked to be added to the TIP Subcommittee.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Storke to appoint Mr. Shawn Collins to the TIP Subcommittee. The motion was seconded by Mr. Peterson and carried unanimously.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft FY 2021/22 Public Involvement Activities Summary</u>

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2021/22 Public Involvement Activities Summary. She explained the effects COVID-19 had on the TPO's outreach over the last fiscal year. She reviewed the committee and TPO Board meeting attendance; the goal is 80% attendance but the average was 76%. Only the Executive Committee achieved the goal. She reviewed the media, news releases and news articles that mentioned the TPO in FY 2021/22; there were more news articles this year compared to previous years. She explained the various social media platforms the TPO uses including the TPO website, Facebook and Twitter pages. In 2021, the TPO implemented a monthly Constant Contact Newsletter that is sent to an average of 665 individuals, cities, counties, organizations, committee and board members, etc.; it covers a variety of transportation, bicycle/pedestrian, and safety-related topics. The TPO participated in 22 community outreach events in FY 2021/22 and partnered with FDOT for several events including Mobility Week and the Florida Love to Ride Challenge. The TPO held its annual Open House and Toy Drive in December and collected more than 155 toys and gift cards for the Department of Children and Families; it will be held in December again this year. Regarding the next steps, the TPO will focus on 3 "Cs"; communication, collaboration and community. Communication and collaboration with our stakeholders, partners and the public by increasing the TPO's presence within the community. We have several activities planned for the fall and are working on scheduling

more; staff will be at Port Orange Family Days to fit helmets; FDOT will be assisting since the TPO has limited staff. The TPO is also working with Ms. Ardito on an event on November 18, 2022 at DeBary Hall and the Florida Love to Ride Challenge is also coming up. She will have more information regarding these events next month.

Mr. Collins commented he is impressed with what the TPO has done and asked if meetings have been live broadcast on Facebook Live. He believes the elected officials would like to see the meetings broadcast live and Facebook Live is free. He would expect more participation if they were.

Ms. Blankenship replied no, we have not done that but she will look into it.

Chairperson Karl stated members that have the Next Door app could share information about the TPO especially when we are seeking public input. She asked what kind of input is helpful; it would be helpful to know what type of input is needed or what the public would have an influence on; if they could have input on prioritizing projects.

Ms. Blankenship replied it would help to know what is the most effective way to gather public input; whether it be through social media or at public meetings. It would be helpful to know what would get the public involved.

Ms. Nicoulin added that all of the TPO's meetings are open to the public and they can provide comments during the public comment period. Projects are submitted by member local governments. Members of the BPAC and CAC work closely with the agencies they are appointed by to identify projects for submittal; the public cannot submit projects. She suggested members get involved with the community they represent to discuss projects. She reminded members that the TPO is only one funding source for projects and that the cities have other funding sources. Each CAC member is appointed by a board member; there are vacancies on the advisory committees so if someone is interested in serving, TPO staff can facilitate it.

Members discussed the presentation and the various ways to reach the community. It was questioned if public meetings for particular projects are effective; sometimes they are and sometimes they are not. It was noted that new city council members do not always know who or what the TPO is. It was suggested that newly elected officials be invited to TPO meetings to understand what we do and how to get projects completed.

Ms. Nicoulin noted that she meets individually with new board members to explain their roles, discuss the various advisory committees, if there are vacancies they need to fill, and provide follow-up information. She is working to develop good relationships with the TPO Board members. She noted that with the upcoming election, the TPO Board members could change.

Ms. Lendian referred to the roundabout project at Victoria Park and commented she receives a lot of feedback about accidents and near accidents; people are complaining to Sheriff Chitwood who is not the right person. It was suggested to add blinking lights around the yield sign at that location.

Ms. Nicoulin replied that is a county project. Comments can always be brought to the TPO and staff can direct them to the correct agency.

Discussion continued. It was suggested to have an app like Volusia County has; it is a useful, inexpensive way to provide information.

C. FDOT Report

Ms. Taylor announced this week is Rail Safety Week and FDOT is bringing railroad crossing awareness with an online campaign and increased police presence at SunRail crossings by handing out safety materials and enforcing traffic laws. FDOT has started the Work Program development cycle and has tentatively scheduled the Work Program public hearing for the week of December 5 - 9, 2022 with an in-person meeting on Tuesday, December 6, 2022.

D. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

Mr. Castello gave the Volusia County Construction Report and noted new projects are underlined.

The Flagler County Construction Report was provided in the agenda.

V. Staff Comments

Ms. Nicoulin referred to the Work Program and stated the TPO has been working with the local governments to program projects into this cycle; FDOT has held several intake meetings with project sponsors. She announced that last week the TPO submitted the Safe Streets for All (SS4A) grant application.

VI. CAC Member Comments

Mr. Martel asked members to please raise their voices when speaking going forward.

Ms. Lendian announced DeLeon Springs State Park is celebrating it's 40th anniversary on October 15, 2022 from 11:00 am to 2:00 pm; there will be food, music and activities for the kids.

Mr. Storke stated that each CAC member was appointed by a city council member and they should be getting back to them with what happens here; he provides a letter each month on what has occurred to his council member to keep them informed.

Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held in a hybrid format with 13 voting and one non-voting member physically present and four voting members virtually present.

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Karet to allow TCC members attending virtually to participate and vote. The motion was seconded by Ms. Mendez and carried unanimously.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

Chairperson Walker welcomed new TCC members Ms. Noel Eaton, Daytona Beach Shores, and Mr. Marcus DePasquale, Bunnell.

There were no public comments.

III. Action Items

MOTION: A motion was made by Ms. Eaton to approve the August 16, 2022 TCC meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Karet and carried unanimously.

B. <u>Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2022-## Amending the Connect 2045 Long Range</u> <u>Transportation Plan (LRTP) (Roll Call Vote Required)</u>

Ms. Nicoulin stated this LRTP amendment adds funding to a project already in the LRTP; it advances construction funding to the current year band of 2021 to 2025 for the Flagler Central Commerce Parkway Connector from US 1 to SR 100. Funding was received through an appropriation from the Florida Legislature this year and it is coming from the state's general fund. It is not displacing any project currently in the Work Program. The amendment is open for public comment until the TPO Board takes action next week. One comment was received via email in support of the project and citing the benefits it will provide to the area; she read the comment. There was a discussion regarding this project during the CAC meeting earlier today; one member was concerned that the road was opening up to the development of private land and favored a private developer. Another CAC member provided comments that this road will provide access to the new sheriff's office and new regional library and opens the area up to both residential and commercial use which is needed in this section of Flagler County. The CAC did pass a recommendation of approval by a roll call vote.

Ms. Mendez asked what the significance is of this action.

Ms. Nicoulin replied FDOT has to program this project in this current year and the TPO's documents must also reflect it.

Ms. Miller asked if the process is for enhancement projects; not major highways, corridors, or state roads but smaller local roads. She asked how those projects are ranked.

Ms. Nicoulin replied that Complete Streets and/or sidewalk projects would come through the Call for Projects. Complete Streets projects may come in under the traffic operations category but if she has a particular project, it can be discussed and decided which category it fits in.

Members discussed the process, the resolutions, and the project applications. A mixed project must have at least 20% of bicycle/pedestrian components to fit in the traffic operations category. They discussed ranking projects for safety more heavily in reference to the Dangerous by Design Report that was discussed last month. Safety is a criterion already included in the applications but it may need to be weighted heavier. Any changes to the applications would be presented for a recommendation of approval to the CAC and TCC and approved by the TPO Board. The TPO sets the process but can contact FDOT for any suggestions they may have. FDOT does have safety funds for projects that are strictly safety. If there is an immediate safety issue, the TPO would coordinate with FDOT for their specific safety funds to get the project funded quicker; the TPO's process takes a long time. It was asked if there is a cost overrun, if the city has to match the 10% local match; the TPO would have to look at the reason for the cost increase. If additional funds are needed, then the local governments still have to match the 10% minimum on the additional funds. Forany project phase that is not programmed, the TPO requires an annual cost estimate update. Members continued to discuss the process and project applications.

B. <u>Presentation and Discussion of the Draft FY 2021/22 Public Involvement Activities Summary</u>

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2021/22 Public Involvement Activities Summary. She explained the effects COVID-19 had on the TPO's outreach over the last fiscal year. She reviewed the committee and TPO Board meeting attendance; the goal is 80% attendance but the average was 76%. She reviewed the media, news releases and news articles that mentioned the TPO in FY 2021/22; there were more news articles this year compared to previous years. She explained the various social media platforms the TPO uses including the TPO website, Facebook and Twitter pages. In 2021, the TPO implemented a monthly Constant Contact Newsletter that is sent to an average of 665 individuals, cities, counties, organizations, committee and board members, etc.; it covers a variety of transportation, bicycle/pedestrian, and safety-related topics. The TPO participated in 22 community outreach events in FY 2021/22 and partnered with FDOT for several events including Mobility Week and the Florida Love to Ride Challenge. Regarding the next steps, the TPO will focus on the 3 "Cs"; communication, collaboration and community. Communication and collaboration with our stakeholders, partners, and the public by increasing the TPO's presence within the community. We have several activities planned for the fall and are working on scheduling more; staff will be at Port Orange Family Days to fit helmets; FDOT will be assisting since the TPO has limited staff. The TPO is also working with Ms. Ardito on an event on November 18, 2022, at DeBary Hall and the Florida Love to Ride Challenge is also coming up. She will have more information regarding these events next month.

C. FDOT Report

Ms. Taylor announced this week is Rail Safety Week and FDOT is bringing railroad crossing awareness with an online campaign and increased police presence at SunRail crossings by handing out safety materials and enforcing traffic laws. FDOT has started the Work Program development cycle and is holding project intake meetings; they have tentatively scheduled the Work Program public hearing for the week of December 5 - 9, 2022 with an in-person meeting on Tuesday, December 6, 2022.

D. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

Mr. Castello gave the Volusia County Construction report and noted new projects are underlined. They will be conducting a traffic study for the Orange Camp Road widening project from US 17/92 to MLK Boulevard.

The Flagler County Construction Report was provided in the agenda.

V. Staff Comments

Ms. Nicoulin announced the TPO, with Volusia and Flagler Counties, filed for the Safe Streets for All (SS4A) safety grant last week; Flagler County is representing the rural part of the county so it will cover the entire county. We requested funding to develop a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan. The intent is to identify projects for funding for future implementation. The grant provides funding for up to five years and has the potential to be extended. This first grant is to develop the action plan and then file for a grant for implementation.

Chairperson Walker asked how much grant funding the TPO requested.

Ms. Nicoulin replied the requested total is \$400,000; \$320,000 is the federal amount. Volusia County committed \$60,000 and Flagler County committed \$20,000 towards the 20% match.
