Chairperson Kerry Karl called the meeting of the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) to order at 1:15 p.m. The roll was called and it was determined that a quorum was physically present. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the meeting was held in a hybrid format with 12 voting and two non-voting members physically present and two voting and one non-voting members virtually present.

Chairperson Karl stated the members attending virtually are doing so as a result of social distancing restrictions associated with COVID-19. Rulings from the Florida Attorney General require that members physically present vote to allow virtual participation and voting due to "extraordinary circumstances".

MOTION: A motion was made by Mr. Martel to allow CAC members attending virtually to participate and vote. The motion was seconded by Ms. Biro and carried unanimously.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

### II. <u>Public Comment/Participation</u>

Ms. Jenny Nazak, Daytona Beach Permaculture Guild, stated she was attending virtually as she is very interested in transportation resilience, cycling, walking and other modes of transportation. The Daytona Beach Permaculture Guild is about the sustainable design of the human built environment.

### III. Action Items

### A. Review and Approval of the August 17, 2021 CAC/TCC Meeting Minutes

Mr. Peterson stated that in the comments under "Call to Order" it should read "Immediate Past Vice Chairperson" and not "Chairperson".

**MOTION:** 

A motion was made by Mr. Peterson to approve the August 17, 2021 CAC meeting minutes as corrected changing "Chairperson" to "Vice Chairperson". The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

### B. Review and Recommend Approval of Resolution 2021-## Adopting the Paratransit Service Analysis

Mr. Harris stated the Paratransit Service Analysis identifies changes in the industry that have had a negative or positive impact on efficiencies in service provision and on budgets. A presentation was given last month by Tindale Oliver on the report and a link was provided in the agenda. A few minor comments were received but the final report will be the same one as provided. An accompanying resolution will be adopted by the TPO Board this month.

Mr. Collins stated it would be nice if a glossary of terms was included in the report to explain the terms, tables and the different parameters as well as what the industry standards are; not only statewide but for others around the country. He asked if the Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) no longer handled the funds from the Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD).

Mr. Harris replied no; it changed in 2015 where the funds go to a broker system where private companies are hired to provide services instead of the CTC such as Votran.

Mr. Collins asked if the Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board's (TDLCB) role is the same as it was previously as far as monitoring the transit providers.

Mr. Harris replied the TDLCB's role has not changed; what has changed is how the funding makes its way down to the providers of transportation services. It used to go to the CTCs' such as Votran but when it began to go to the brokers, it was funding that came out of the CTCs' budgets. It was a decline in budget and it has shown to also be a decline in ridership.

Discussion continued regarding the Paratransit Service Analysis Report.

**MOTION:** 

A motion was made by Mr. Blais to recommend approval of Resolution 2021-## adopting the Paratransit Service Analysis with the inclusion of a glossary of terms. The motion was seconded by Mr. Storke and carried unanimously.

### IV. <u>Presentation Items</u>

### A. Presentation and Discussion of Transportation Congestion Management Process (CMP)

Mr. Travis Hills, Kittelson and Associates, gave a PowerPoint presentation of the Transportation Congestion Management Process (CMP). He explained that congestion management is the application of strategies to reduce congestion and improve reliability and performance of the transportation system. The CMP is a regionally accepted approach for managing that congestion. They use the most up-to-date information to identify strategies to manage congestion. He noted that the CMP is a federally required process that every TPO must have and the hope is to update it annually moving forward. The CMP ties the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) to the project priorities and the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). He reviewed the schedule of the CMP and announced that there will be working group meetings as well as future presentations to keep everyone up-to-date on the progress.

Ms. Foltz asked what the definition or threshold is for a congestion management area; if it was intersections or a failing level of service.

Mr. Hills replied that they will be looking at intersections, corridors and sections of roadways

Ms. Foltz asked when an area is considered to be congested; if it is the early morning, all day, etc.

Mr. Hills replied they look at a volume to capacity ratio of .85; he explained that International Speedway Boulevard (ISB) is an eight-lane roadway and has a certain capacity or denominator and a certain volume throughout the day (24-hour period). You divide that volume by the capacity to get the ratio; anything .85 or higher is deemed to be approaching congestion and anything below that is deemed to be okay.

Ms. Foltz asked if they were using existing data from the cities and the counties.

Mr. Hills replied yes; the CMP is a step down from the LRTP but they are not going to do a planning or safety study. The will use readily available data and will identify different data sources. They will have a guide with a lot of data and will look at what other data sources are out there to further refine the process in the coming years.

Mr. Castagnacci asked if the only consideration is vehicular or if they would also look at bicycle/pedestrian facilities.

Mr. Hills replied the network they will be looking at is primarily vehicular focused because it is a congestion management plan although they realize that intelligent transportation systems (ITS) is a big part of that; they will look at the bicycle/pedestrian network because they know there are other ways to move people around. They will also be looking at the transit system and transit metrics to tie them back to the performance measures for transit.

Discussion continued regarding the CMP.

### B. Presentation and Discussion of Draft R2CTPO FY 2020/21 Public Involvement Activities Summary

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2020/21 Public Involvement Activities Summary. She explained how COVID-19 affected public outreach throughout the year and the events that were cancelled due to the pandemic. There were three advisory and TPO Board meetings that did not reach a

quorum. She reviewed the new ways the TPO conducted public outreach and the social media outreach conducted through Facebook and Twitter. Promotional and informational items were distributed at the few inperson events that were held. She reviewed upcoming outreach events including Mobility Week, Love to Ride Challenge, and Port Orange Family Days. She encouraged members to let her know if they have groups they would like the Speaker's Bureau to come and speak to.

Ms. Foltz asked if the TPO could go to the high schools and driver's education classes to give presentations about distracted driving, etc.

Ms. Blankenship replied that she is working on getting into the schools and on an education awareness campaign for kindergarten through grade 12.

Mr. Collins asked if school board members were on the TPO Board or advisory committees.

Mr. Harris replied yes.

Mr. Collins commented that is a way to into to the school system; to work with those members.

Ms. Blankenship replied that Flagler and Volusia County School Board members are on the TPO Board; she is working with the school districts.

Chairperson Karl commented there is a vacancy on the TPO Board; she asked who the school board members on the TPO Board are.

Ms. Stewart clarified that the TPO Board member from the Volusia County School Board is Mr. Ruben Colón; the Flagler County School Board member for the TPO Board is currently vacant.

Discussion continued.

### C. Presentation and Discussion of the Flagler County Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update

Mr. Martin Catalá, Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR), gave a PowerPoint presentation of the Flagler County Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update. He explained that the TDP is a ten-year planning document that helps design the future of public transit in Flagler County; it is an FDOT requirement to receive funding. The TDP is an unconstrained vision balanced with attainable targets; what is needed and what is attainable. He reviewed the elements of the TDP including the public involvement process. There is a survey available online and an on-board survey for users. He asked Flagler County residents to please complete the survey.

Mr. Collins asked if this was a ten-year plan.

Mr. Catalá replied yes; it is a ten-year plan that produces a stepped process to go from the goals and objectives to alternatives, evaluation and then an implementation plan.

Mr. Collins commented that it used to be a five-plan; he asked when it changed.

Mr. Catalá replied that is correct; the five-year plan was too short of a horizon when looking at the future so FDOT implemented the change. There is an annual progress report to the TDP and a major update every five years; this is that major update.

Discussion continued regarding the TDP; Mr. Harris announced the QR code and link to the Flagler County TDP survey is available on the TPO's website.

### D. FDOT Report

The FDOT report was provided in the agenda. Mr. Burgett announced there will be an online public hearing for the Five-Year Work Program from October 25, 2021 through October 29, 2021. The public can also attend in person at the Deland FDOT District 5 office. The purpose of the public hearing is to showcase the projects FDOT anticipates for the next five years; they can be viewed and get an idea of what is being proposed. FDOT will be accepting comments and concerns regarding the proposed Work Program for two weeks following the public hearing; FDOT will be accepting input from October 29, 2021 through November 12, 2021. Following the public comment period, the Work Program will be sent to the Governor and then the Legislature to be approved. He announced that this week is Rail Safety Week; September 20, 2021 through September 26, 2021. FDOT is celebrating the work they have completed over the last couple of years with "dynamic envelope" projects which included additional striping at rail crossings across the state. They completed the work eight months ahead of schedule. FDOT has coordinated with Ms. Blankenship for bicycle/pedestrian safety events; one was held this past Saturday in New Smyrna Beach and two more are scheduled for October 2, 2021 at Sun-Splash Park in Daytona Beach and on October 16, 2021 at Andy Romano Park in Ormond Beach.

Ms. Lendian asked what the landscaping will be at the SR 472 interchange; she wants to know if it will be water tolerant.

Mr. Burgett replied he would have to check with the project team and get back to her with the answer.

Mr. Collins commented that he did not see the Maytown Road project on FDOT's website; he asked what was happening with that project.

Mr. Mo Hassan, FDOT, replied that is a local government project FDOT was executing; it is not a state road project but a county road.

Mr. Collins stated the project limits showed I-95; he asked if anything was being done at I-95.

Mr. Hassan replied nothing at I-95; it is west of I-95 on a small two-lane county road.

### E. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

The Volusia and Flagler County construction reports were provided in the agenda. Ms. Winsett stated there are no updates this month; everything on the list is moving forward. She announced Volusia County is holding their Road Program public workshops; an email from Volusia County Traffic Engineering Director, Mr. Jon Cheney, was sent to the TPO to forward to committee and TPO Board members with the dates. The next one will be tomorrow in New Smyrna Beach at the Brannon Center from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm; following the next week in Deltona and the following week in DeLand at the Volusia County Administration Building. She will make sure the information is sent to the TPO for distribution.

Mr. Storke referred to projects 4, 5 and 6 that are under design; they were listed as waiting on Volusia County Council approval. He asked if those projects had been approved.

Ms. Winsett replied she did not know but will find out the status and let him know. It was the same status as of a week ago.

Ms. Lendian asked what time the public hearing will be tomorrow in New Smyrna Beach.

Ms. Winsett replied from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm; there will be a presentation and attendees will be asked to submit their top five county road projects they would like to see completed.

Ms. Lendian referred to the completed Spring to Spring Trail connection in DeLeon Springs and stated the pedestrian flashing lights are blinking constantly; she asked if that is supposed to be happening.

Mr. Harris replied he will look into it and get back to her.

Ms. Deyette asked if there are any plans to restripe Saxon Boulevard through Deltona; the lines and reflectors cannot be seen at night especially in the rain.

Ms. Winsett replied she will look into it; she asked if there was an end point.

Ms. Deyette replied it is from Finland Drive to Providence Boulevard.

Ms. Nice asked that more notice be given to the public regarding public meetings; the Ormond Beach public hearing only had four people attend because of the one-day notice.

Ms. Lendian referred to Arredondo Grant Road off of Spring Garden Branch Road in DeLeon Springs and stated it also need restriping; there is no striping on either side of the road.

Mr. Castello replied it is a very narrow road which is probably why there is no striping but he will look into it.

Ms. Deyette asked for the dates of the public meetings for Deltona and DeLand.

Ms. Winsett replied she will send an email to the TPO with those dates; Deltona is September 29, 2021 from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm and DeLand is October 7, 2021 from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm.

Mr. Cheney added that there is a conflict so the Deland date has changed to October 13, 2021; the public can register online or contact Ms. Christine Viera.

The CMP ties the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) to the project priorities and the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). He reviewed the schedule of the CMP and announced that there will be working group meetings as well as future presentations to keep everyone up to date on the progress.

### B. Presentation and Discussion of the Draft R2CTPO FY 2020/21 Public Involvement Activities Summary

Ms. Blankenship gave a PowerPoint presentation of the draft FY 2020/21 Public Involvement Activities Summary. She explained how COVID-19 affected public outreach throughout the year and the events that were cancelled due to the pandemic. There were three advisory and TPO Board meetings that did not reach a quorum. She reviewed the new ways the TPO conducted public outreach and the social media outreach conducted through Facebook and Twitter. Promotional and informational items were distributed at the few in-person events that were held. She reviewed upcoming outreach events including Mobility Week, Love to Ride Challenge, and Port Orange Family Days. She encouraged members to let her know if they have groups they would like the Speaker's Bureau to come and speak to.

### C. Presentation and Discussion of the Flagler Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update

Mr. Martin Catalá, Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR), gave a PowerPoint presentation of the Flagler County Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update. He explained that the TDP is a ten-year planning document that helps design the future of public transit in Flagler County; it is an FDOT requirement to receive funding. The TDP is an unconstrained vision balanced with attainable targets; what is needed and what is attainable. He reviewed the elements of the TDP including the public involvement process. There is a survey available online and an on-board survey for users. He asked Flagler County residents to please complete the survey.

### D. FDOT Report

The FDOT report was provided in the agenda. Mr. Burgett announced there will be an online public hearing for the Five-Year Work Program from October 25, 2021 through October 29, 2021. The public can also attend in person at the Deland FDOT District 5 office. The purpose of the public hearing is to showcase the projects FDOT anticipates for the next five years; they can be viewed and get an idea of what is being proposed. FDOT will be accepting comments and concerns regarding the proposed Work Program for two weeks following the public hearing; FDOT will be accepting input from October 29, 2021 through November 12, 2021. Following the public comment period, the Work Program will be sent to the Governor and then the Legislature to be approved. He announced that this week is Rail Safety Week; September 20, 2021 through September 26, 2021. FDOT is celebrating the work they have completed over the last couple of years with "dynamic envelope" projects which includes additional striping at rail crossings across the state. They completed the work eight months ahead of schedule. FDOT has coordinated with Ms. Blankenship for bicycle/pedestrian safety events; one was held this past Saturday in New Smyrna Beach and two more are scheduled for October 2, 2021 at Sun Splash Park in Daytona Beach and on October 16, 2021 at Andy Romano Park in Ormond Beach.

### E. Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports

The Volusia and Flagler County Construction Reports were provided in the agenda. Ms. Winsett stated there are no updates this month; everything on the list is moving forward. She announced Volusia County is holding their Road Program public workshops; an email was sent to the TPO to forward to committee and TPO Board members with the dates. The next one will be tomorrow in New Smyrna Beach at the Brannon Center from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm; next week in Deltona and on October 13, 2021 in DeLand at the Volusia County Administration Building; that meeting will be in person as well as virtual. She will make sure the information is sent to the TPO for distribution.

### V. Staff Comments

Mr. Harris stated every fall, after the completion of the priority project process, the subcommittees meet to review and recommend improvements for the next cycle; he announced the TIP Subcommittee will be meeting next month. Ms. Nicoulin will be scheduling that meeting.

Mr. Harris announced Congress is working on a new transportation bill to replace the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act which expires this month. The TPO is cautiously optimistic that it will be signed into law; when more information is available, it will be provided to members.

The Eastern Federal Lands Highway Division (EFLHD) is currently conducting a Call for Projects for the Federal Lands Access Program in Florida for Federal Fiscal Years (FY) 2023 through FY 2026. 
The Black Bear Scenic Trail, also referred to as the SR 40 Black Bear Trail, will be a multi-use trail along SR 40 from Levy Hammock Road in Marion County to US 17 in Volusia County. The 27-mile long trail will traverse Eastern Marion County, Northern Lake County, and Northeast Volusia County. The trail will fill the largest gap within the Heart of Florida Loop, which is a network of trails spanning ten Central Florida counties and encompassing 250 miles, linking existing trails. The Black Bear Scenic Trail will link the local communities of Silver Springs, Astor Park, Astor, and Barberville, as well as natural landmarks such as the Ocala National Forest and the St. Johns River. The Black Bear Scenic Trail will provide connections to other trails in the area, such as the Florida National Scenic Trail and St. Johns River to Sea Loop Trail.

The Lake Sumter MPO is requesting a letter of support from the River to Sea TPO and the Ocala Marion TPO to apply for Project Development & Environmental (PD&E) funding through the FLAP Call for Projects for this trail project.

A map of the Black Bear Scenic Trail Corridor is provided with this agenda packet for reference. TPO staff will provide additional information on the project and the proposed application.

**WHEREAS**, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that every urbanized area with a population of 50,000 or more, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, shall have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for the designated Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) comprised of Volusia County and the urbanized areas of Flagler County including the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

Local Initiatives (traffic operations focused) Project Priorities, 30% of the total SU funds will be used for Transit Project Priorities, and 30% of the total SU funds will be used for Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian focused) Project Priorities;

- 2. Annual set-asides of oOther state and federal funds identified in the 20405 Long Range Transportation Plan for Local Initiatives will be made available in the following manner: 50% of the funds will be used for Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives (traffic operations focused) Project Priorities and 50% will be used for Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian focused) Project Priorities;
- 3. Mixed projects (defined as a project that is not a stand-alone bicycle or pedestrian project) will only be accepted and ranked in both the bicycle/pedestrian focused and the traffic operations focused project categories if the bicycle/pedestrian cost component of the project is greater than 20% of the total project cost. Projects that do not meet this threshold shall be submitted and ranked in the traffic operations focused category only. The project applications shall include the cost breakdown between the bicycle/pedestrian component and the traffic operations component of the project. When programming mixed projects, funding amounts drawn down from each set-aside category (bicycle/pedestrian focused vs. traffic operations focused) shall be consistent with the cost component of that category;
- 4. For projects funded in whole or in part with Urban Attributable (SU) funding and/or other state and federal funds obtained through the TPO's Priority Project Process, if the recipient of the funds chooses to display any signs or markers at the project site, said signs or markers shall include language acknowledging the River to Sea TPO, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), and/or other funding partners, as may be applicable, for providing funding for the project. In addition to the language, the sign or marker shall include these agencies' official logos.

Additionally, any public pronouncements made by or on behalf of the recipient regarding the project, including press releases, publications, annual reports, video credits, and dedications, shall acknowledge the funding support provided by the TPO, FDOT, FHWA, and FTA.

- 5. Any remaining Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) Urban Attributable (SU)funds in the current fiscal year may be reallocated for other projects on the priority list or to cover project cost increases consistent with Resolution 2021-XX.

**WHEREAS**, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for the designated Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) comprised of Volusia County and the urbanized areas of Flagler County including the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

**WHEREAS**, the FDOT funds projects in the Work Program based on the plans and priorities set by the TPO; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea TPO desires to provide, whenever possible, financial assistance to governmental entities to allow them to pursue transportation projects and programs which are consistent with the TPO's plans and priorities and benefit residents of and visitors to our planning area; and

**WHEREAS**, the River to Sea TPO wants to leverage the state and federal transportation funds programmed on transportation projects in TPO's MPA and ensure a measure of local financial commitment to transportation projects and programs utilizing these funds;

### **Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the River to Sea TPO that:

- 1. Every governmental entity receiving state and/or federal transportation funds for a project on any of the following Priority Project Lists shall provide a local match at a minimum ratio of 10% local funds to 90% state and/or federal funds:
  - a. Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects;
  - b. Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects.

This match requirement shall not apply to projects on the State Highway System; and

 Every governmental entity receiving state and/or federal transportation funds for a project on the TPO's Priority List of Transportation Planning Studies shall provide a local match at a minimum ratio of 10% local funds to 90% state and/or federal funds; and

- 3. A local match shall not be required for any project on the TPO's Priority Lists of Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects, Regionally-Significant Non-SIS Roadway Projects, or Transit Projects, subject to any other funding program requirements that may apply (e.g., Transportation Regional Incentive Program); and
- 4. the River to Sea TPO determines that "local match" shall be defined as non-state/non-federal cash match and/or in-kind services of eligible costs that advance the project in question; and
- 5. notwithstanding the terms prescribed in subparagraph 1 and 2, above, the required local match shall not exceed the ratio required in the current policy of the TPO Board at the time the governmental entity requests funding unless the local government entity commits to a higher local match for the project; and
- 6. the River to Sea TPO reserves the right to waive or adjust the local match requirements if the TPO Board deems there exists sufficient reason or circumstance; and
- 7. the River to Sea TPO defines a cost overrun as an increase in the amount of the cost of any programmed project phase due to a change in scope, project limits or project approach that could have reasonably been foreseen or is the result of an incomplete, insufficient or out of date cost estimate; and
- 8. the River to Sea TPO reaffirms its policy that any cost overruns encountered on a project funded with state and/or federal transportation funds will be the responsibility of the governmental entity identified as the project originator with the following exception: if the project is on the state highway system and the State DOT is the project manager of record then the state shall be responsible for any cost overruns utilizing state dollars; and
- the River to Sea TPO defines a cost increase as an increase in the cost of any programmed project phase due to unforeseen market changes or a change in requirements and/or standards for projects that have current and complete cost estimates; and
- 10. Requests for additional state and/or federal funds must be submitted to the TPO and include a statement of hardship or justification by the governmental entity identified as the project sponsor along with supporting documentation that includes detailed justification of the change in cost; and
- 11. the River to Sea TPO Executive Director may authorize the use of state and/or federal funds to cover some or all of a <u>justified</u> cost increase on any project phase. up to and including 10% of the project cost estimate for that phase; and
- 12. the use of state and/or federal funds to cover cost increases exceeding 10% of the project cost estimate for any phase may be authorized only by the River to Sea TPO Board; and
- <u>13.12.</u> the policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed or amended by the TPO; and
- <u>14.13.</u> the Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or their designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit this resolution to the:
  - a. Florida Department of Transportation;
  - b. Federal Transit Administration (through the Florida Department of Transportation);

### RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION REAFFIRMING THE POLICY FOR ESTABLISHING AND MAINTAINING TRANSPORTATION PRIORITY PROJECTS

**WHEREAS**, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that every urbanized area with a population of 50,000 or more, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, shall have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for the designated Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) comprised of Volusia County and the urbanized areas of Flagler County including the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

**WHEREAS**, 23 C.F.R. 450.104 provides that the River to Sea TPO shall annually endorse, and amend as appropriate, the plans and programs required, among which is the Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) projects list of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) submission; and

**WHEREAS**, each year the appropriate River to Sea TPO committees made up of a cross-section of interested citizens and technical staff are charged with the responsibility of drafting a list of prioritized projects; and

**WHEREAS**, it is the responsibility of the River to Sea TPO to establish project priorities for all areas of the TPO's MPA; and

**W**HEREAS, the River to Sea TPO reaffirms its commitment to the priority process and related policies;

**Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved** by the River to Sea TPO that the following policies are established to prioritize transportation projects throughout the TPO's MPA:

- 1. The project application and evaluation criteria approved by the River to Sea TPO Board shall be used to solicit and evaluate projects for priority ranking in the transportation program categories listed below:
  - a. Florida Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects;
  - b. Regionally Significant, Non-SIS Roadway Projects and Major Bridge Projects;

- c. Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects;
- d. Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects;
- e. Public Transit Projects; and
- f. Transportation Planning Studies.
- 2. River to Sea TPO projects that were previously ranked and have a Financial Management (FM) number and are in the Florida Department of Transportation Work Program will automatically be prioritized above projects that are not currently in the FDOT Five-Year Work Program;
- 3. Projects which are ranked one through five on the Prioritized List of Florida Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects are deemed to be protected, and will remain in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 4. Projects which are ranked one through five on the Prioritized List of Regionally Significant, Non-SIS Roadway Projects and Major Bridge Projects are deemed to be protected, and will remain in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 5. Projects which are ranked one through eight on Tier "B" of the Prioritized List of Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects are deemed to be protected, and will be ranked in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 6. Projects which are ranked one through three on Tier "B" of the Prioritized List of Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects are deemed to be protected, and will be ranked in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program;
- 7. If, at any time, two or more lists of prioritized projects are merged into a new list, every project that was protected prior to the merger shall retain its protected status, and no new or previously unprotected project shall be deemed to be protected unless and until it advances to the protected rank prescribed for the new, merged list.
- 8. The River to Sea TPO will only re-prioritize or add projects when the TPO Board determines: a) unusual circumstances support such action, b) the circumstances are not of a recurring nature, c) the circumstances do not result from the actions of the project sponsor, and d) the proposed reprioritization or addition will not be contrary to the public interest;
- 9. Requests to change the priority or to add a project must include a statement of hardship by the requestor along with supporting documentation that includes

- detailed justification of need and an assessment of the impacts to the programming of prioritized projects;
- 10. It is the responsibility of the River to Sea TPO and FDOT staffs to provide the River to Sea TPO members with current information and data on project status and to assist the members in their efforts to make informed decisions regarding the prioritized projects lists;
- 11. The River to Sea TPO shall, in its discretion, make all decisions regarding the final prioritized project lists that are annually submitted to FDOT;
- 12. Once a project has attained protected status, it should be programmed within 3 years. If it has not been programmed during that time due to inactivity on the part of the project sponsor, then the project will be removed from the list of priority projects. The project sponsor may resubmit the project for open ranking on any subsequent call for projects.
- annually submit a letter to the River to Sea TPO affirming their continued support to retain each project on the priority list and provide updated cost estimates for all unfunded phases of each project they sponsor on the Regionally Significant Non-SIS, Tier "A", and Tier "B" project lists. Updated cost estimates for projects or project phases that are currently funded/programmed are considered a request for additional funding and subject to the TPO's cost increase/cost overrun policy. Requests for additional funding shall be submitted to the TPO on the appropriate form. The letter shall also provide support from the project sponsor for any Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) eligible project(s) which they are ready to advance into the Work Program and TIP and provide a commitment of local matching funds, if required.
- 14. The River to Sea TPO shall use this project prioritization process to support the development of Regional Priority Lists in the areas of Trails, Transit, Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSM&O), and Planning Studies
- 15. The policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed or amended by the TPO; and
- the Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO, (or their designee) is hereby authorized and directed to provide a copy of this resolution to the:
  - a. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT);
  - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and
  - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation)

### **Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects**

### **General Instructions:**

For the 2021 2022 Call for Projects, the R2CTPO is accepting applications for Feasibility Studies and Project Implementation.

The R2CTPO has two different application forms for Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects. One is to be used when applying for a Feasibility Study; the other is to be used when applying for Project Implementation. When applying for Project Implementation, the Applying Agency will also be required to submit a completed copy of FDOT's Project Information Application Form.

No project will advance beyond a Feasibility Study unless the R2CTPO receives an application for prioritization of the Project Implementation phase. Applications for prioritization of the Project Implementation phase will be accepted only if a Feasibility Study has already been completed or if the project does not require a Feasibility Study.

Applications will be ranked based on the information supplied in the application. The TPO is not obliged to consider information pertaining to the project request that is not included in the project application. However, applying agencies are encouraged to be present for the evaluation their applications to provide clarification, if needed.

Incomplete applications will not be accepted.

### **Project Qualification:**

Except for certain improvements identified in 23 U.S.C. §133¹, only projects located on Federal-Aid Roads (roads on the National Highway System (NHS) or functionally classified as Urban Minor Collector or higher) may be funded through this program.

Only applications for traffic operations, intelligent transportation systems (ITS), safety, and local initiatives (traffic operations focused) projects will be considered. These projects are enhancements to improve the operational efficiency, reliability, and/or safety of the existing traffic circulation system. The following list of projects is representative of qualifying projects; however, it is not exhaustive:

- 1. Adding or extending left and/or right turn lanes;
- 2. improved signage or signalization;
- 3. targeted traffic enforcement;
- 4. limitation or prohibition of driveways, turning movements, truck traffic, and on-street parking;
- 5. modification of median openings;
- 6. replacement of standard intersections with traffic circles or roundabouts;
- 7. traffic incident response plans;
- 8. realignment of a road;
- 9. intelligent transportation systems (ITS) such as dynamic message signs and adaptive signal control systems;
- 10. traffic calming roadway designs or devices;

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> These exceptions include: carpool projects, fringe and corridor parking facilities and programs, bicycle transportation and pedestrian walkways, modification of public sidewalks to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act, highway and transit safety infrastructure improvements and programs, hazard eliminations, projects to mitigate hazards caused by wildlife, and railway-highway grade crossings.

- 11. street lighting to improve traffic safety; and
- 12. other local initiatives which address complete streets retrofits, adaptation of transportation systems to climate change, and other improvements that directly support the goals of the TPO's Long Range Transportation Plan.

### **Award Limits:**

There are no award limits for projects on the Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects list. Projects on this list may be funded with any combination of federal, state, and/or local funds.

### **Local Match Requirement:**

R2CTPO Resolution 2020-242021-XX provides that the governmental entity requesting state and or federal transportation funds for any project that is not on the State Highway System (SHS) shall be required to match those funds programmed on the project with local funds at a minimum ratio of 10% local to 90% state and/or federal. The match shall be by project phase for each programmed phase including feasibility study. A local cash match is required for a feasibility study. For all other phases, the local match is defined as non-state/federal cash match and/or in-kind services of eligible costs that advance the project. This resolution also reaffirms the R2CTPO's policy that the Applying Agency (project originator) shall be responsible for any cost overruns encountered on a project funded with state and/or federal funds unless the project is on the SHS, in which case, the State DOT shall be responsible for any cost overruns.

### **Electronic and "Hard Copy" Submittal Requirement:**

- 1. Applications and supporting documentation shall be submitted as digital media in Portable Document Format (PDF), compatible with MS Windows and Adobe Acrobat.
- Electronic documents must be submitted through the R2CTPO FTP site.

- 4. All document pages shall be oriented so that the top of the page is always at the top of the computer monitor.
- 5. Page size shall be either 8-1/2" by 11" (letter) or 11" by 17" (tabloid).
- 6. PDF documents produced by scanning paper documents are inherently inferior to those produced directly from an electronic source. Documents which are only available in paper format should be scanned at a resolution which ensures the pages are legible on both a computer screen and a printed page. We recommend scanning at 300 dpi to balance legibility and file size.
- 7. If you are unable to produce an electronic document as prescribed here, please call uscontact R2CTPO staff to discuss other options.
- 8. If you are unable to upload to the R2CTPO FTP site, please contact R2CTPO staff to discuss other options.
- <u>8.9.</u> In addition to the digital submittal, we require one (1) complete paper copy of the application and all supporting documents. This must be identical to the digital submittal.

# **Transportation Planning Studies**

#### **General Instructions:**

The R2CTPO coordinates transportation planning activities with FDOT staff to establish needs throughout the R2CTPO's Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) and to determine the most effective agency and approach for completing the work. Studies are funded in part by the TPO using federal planning funds allocated to MPOs. In addition, studies are pursued throughout FDOT District V using planning funds available to the department. SU funds are also available to be used for planning activities when the cost of the planning studies exceeds the PL funding available.

Recognizing that the R2CTPO member local governments are well positioned to identify transportation issues as they arise, the R2CTPO wants to encourage their participation in the development of a list of priority planning studies to address these issues. The R2CTPO will annually, as part of the Call for Projects, reach out to member local governments to identify and define transportation planning studies for inclusion on a prioritized list, and to assist in identifying the agency that should take the lead in funding and managing the study. In some cases, the result may be a funding partnership between organizations. Support may also be identified through other fund sources as (safety, operations, grants etc.).

Planning studies ranked in the top five for funding by FDOT will require an FDOT 4P project application to be completed.

Projects requiring a full PD&E should be included in the TPO's Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and should be listed on other project priority lists established by the TPO.

#### **Process:**

- 1. The annual "Call for Projects" will include an invitation to submit requests for planning studies.
- 2. To be considered for prioritization, planning study requests will include the following:
  - a. Project Title and Description (including area or termini)
  - b. Cost Estimate
  - c. Purpose & Need (including data & other facts)
  - d. Previous/related Studies
  - e. A page may be added to include a map, picture or other graphical illustration of the project.
- 3. No local match will be required.
- 4. The TIP Subcommittee will rank the requested planning studies in order of priority with consideration of applicable ranking criteria. The TIP Subcommittee's recommended ranking will then be presented to the CAC, TCC, and BPAC for review and comment before being presented the TPO Board for approval.

#### **Ranking Criteria:**

Federal Planning Factors -

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the United States, the States, metropolitan areas, and non-metropolitan areas, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- 2. Increase the safety and security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- 3. Increase accessibility and mobility of people and freight;
- 4. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;

- 5. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- 6. Promote efficient system management and operation;
- 7. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system;
- 8. Improve transportation system resiliency and reliability;
- 9. Reduce (or mitigate) the stormwater impacts of surface transportation.

#### Other Criteria -

- 1. The study is necessary to identify a solution (the solution is not evident without a study);
- 2. The study would be best undertaken now (should not be delayed); and
- 3. The study will provide needed guidance for decision-makers regarding future projects.

- 2. Corridor Improvement Studies;
- 3. Route Development Plans;
- 4. Environmental Assessments and Impact Studies;
- 5. Alternative Route Studies;

- Multi-Modal Connectivity Plan
