



RE: Request for Revision to Fiscal Year (FY) 2025/26-2029/30 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Dear Ms. Nicoulin:

Florida Department of Transportation requests River to Sea TPO revise the FY 2025/26-2029/30 TIP.

Projects 456981-1& 456987-1 received a legislative appropriation for funding which added the project to FDOT's Five-Year Work Program in FY 26. These projects should be added to the TIP through the amendment process as it is considered a regionally significant project.

Project #446285-2 is a Local Agency Program (LAP) project with the City of Port Orange to enhance pedestrian connectivity. The City has elected to use the District's contract for construction engineering and inspection (CEI) services. As such a separate project segment (-2) has been added and will require a TIP modification so that federal funds can be authorized.

Project #449469-2 is a Local Agency Program (LAP) project with the City of Daytona Beach. The city has opted to use the District's contract for CEI services. As such a separate project segment (-2) has been added and will require a TIP modification so that federal funds can be authorized.

Resolution 2024-20

Sets policy for the allocation of funding for the Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program and other state and federal funds identified in the Connect 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan.

- Allocates TPO set aside funding (30/30/40)
- Defines mixed-projects and allocation of funding based on the project category
- Provides for the re-allocation of SU funds in the current fiscal year to other projects on the priority list or to cover project cost increases

Resolution 2024-21

Sets policy pertaining to local match requirements placed on member local governments for projects prioritized for funding by the TPO.

- Defines local match requirements
- Defines cost overrun vs cost increase
- Requires requests for additional funds that are submitted to the TPO include a statement of hardship and supporting documentation that includes detailed justification of the change in cost
- Provides the Executive Director with authorization to authorize additional funds up to 50% of a project phase cost estimate for justified cost increase
- Cost increases exceeding 50% require TPO Board authorization

Now, Therefore, Be IT Resolved by the Volusia-Flagler TPO that:

The Volusia-Flagler TPO's total Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program
Urban Attributable (SU) funding goals will be made in the following manner: 40% of
the total SU funds will be used for Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives
(traffic operations focused) Project Priorities, 30% of the total SU funds will be used

- for Transit Project Priorities, and 30% of the total SU funds will be used for Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian focused) Project Priorities; and
- Other state and federal funds identified in the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan for Local Initiatives will be made available in the following manner: 50% of the funds will be used for Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives (traffic operations focused) Project Priorities and 50% will be used for Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives (bicycle/pedestrian focused) Project Priorities; and
- 3. Mixed projects (defined as a project that is not a stand-alone bicycle or pedestrian project) will only be accepted and ranked in both the bicycle/pedestrian focused and the traffic operations focused project categories if the bicycle/pedestrian cost component of the project is greater than 20% of the total project cost. Projects that do not meet this threshold shall be submitted and ranked in the traffic operations focused category only. The project applications shall include the cost breakdown between the bicycle/pedestrian component and the traffic operations component of the project. When programming mixed projects, funding amounts drawn down from each set-aside category (bicycle/pedestrian focused vs. traffic operations focused) shall be consistent with the cost component of that category; and
- 4. For projects funded in whole or in part with Urban Attributable (SU) funding and/or other state and federal funds obtained through the TPO's Priority Project Process, if the recipient of the funds chooses to display any signs or markers at the project site, said signs or markers shall include language acknowledging the Volusia-Flagler TPO, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), and/or other funding partners, as may be applicable, for providing funding for the project. In addition to the language, the sign or marker shall include these agencies' official logos; and
- Additionally, any public pronouncements made by or on behalf of the recipient regarding the project, including press releases, publications, annual reports, video credits, and dedications shall acknowledge the funding support provided by the TPO, FDOT, FHWA, and FTA; and
- Any remaining Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program Urban Attributable (SU) funds in the current fiscal year should first be allocated to eligible projects within the same project category Priority List(bicycle/pedestrian focused or traffic operations focused). If no projects are eligible within the same category the remaining funds may be reallocated for other projects on the Priority List or to cover project cost increases consistent with Resolution 2024-##; and
- 7. The policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed or amended by the TPO; and

- 8. The Chairperson of the River to Sea TPO (or their designee) is hereby authorized and directed to provide a copy of this resolution to the:

FOR PROJECTS PRIORITIZED FOR FUNDING BY THE TPO

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization, DBA the Volusia-Flagler Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for the designated Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) comprised of Volusia County and the urbanized areas of Flagler County including the cities of Flagler Beach, Beverly Beach, and portions of Palm Coast and Bunnell; and

WHEREAS, the FDOT funds projects in the Work Program based on the plans and priorities set by the TPO; and

WHEREAS, the Volusia-Flagler TPO desires to provide, whenever possible, financial assistance to governmental entities to allow them to pursue transportation projects and programs that are consistent with the TPO's plans and priorities and benefit residents of and visitors to our planning area; and

WHEREAS, the Volusia-Flagler TPO wants to leverage the state and federal transportation funds programmed on transportation projects in the TPO's MPA and ensure a measure of local financial commitment to transportation projects and programs utilizing these funds; and

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Volusia-Flagler TPO that:

- 1. Every governmental entity receiving state and/or federal transportation funds for a project on any of the following Priority Project Lists shall provide a local match at a minimum ratio of 10% local funds to 90% state and/or federal funds:
 - a. Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects;
 - b. Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects.

This match requirement shall not apply to projects on the State Highway System; and

- Every governmental entity receiving state and/or federal transportation funds for a project on the TPO's Priority List of Transportation Planning Studies shall provide a local match at a minimum ratio of 10% local funds to 90% state and/or federal funds; and
- A local match shall not be required for any project on the TPO's Priority Lists of Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects, Regionally-Significant Non-SIS Roadway Projects, or Transit

- Projects, subject to any other funding program requirements that may apply (e.g., Transportation Regional Incentive Program); and
- The Volusia-Flagler TPO determines that "local match" shall be defined as non-state/nonfederal cash match and/or in-kind services of eligible costs that advance the project in question; and
- Notwithstanding the terms prescribed in subparagraphs 1 and 2, above, the required local
 match shall not exceed the ratio required in the current policy of the TPO Board at the time
 the governmental entity requests funding unless the local governmental entity commits to a
 higher local match for the project; and
- 6. The Volusia-Flagler TPO reserves the right to waive or adjust the local match requirements if the TPO Board deems there exists sufficient reason or circumstance; and
- 7. The Volusia-Flagler TPO defines a cost overrun as an increase in the amount of the cost of any programmed project phase due to a change in scope, project limits, or project approach that could have reasonably been foreseen or is the result of an incomplete, insufficient, or out of date cost estimate; and
- 8. The Volusia-Flagler TPO reaffirms its policy that any cost overruns encountered on a project funded with state and/or federal transportation funds will be the responsibility of the governmental entity identified as the project originator with the following exception: if the project is on the state highway system and the State DOT is the project manager of record then the state shall be responsible for any cost overruns utilizing state dollars; and
- The Volusia-Flagler TPO defines a cost increase as an increase in the cost of any programmed project phase due to unforeseen market changes or a change in requirements and/or standards for projects that have current and complete cost estimates; and
- 10. Requests for additional state and/or federal funds must be submitted to the TPO and include a statement of hardship or justification by the governmental entity identified as the project sponsor along with supporting documentation that includes detailed justification of the change in cost; and
- 11. The Volusia-Flagler TPO Executive Director may authorize the use of state and/or federal funds to cover some or all of a justified cost increase on any project phase up to and including 50% of the project cost estimate for that phase; and
- 12. The use of state and/or federal funds to cover cost increases exceeding 50% of the project cost estimate for any phase may be authorized only by the Volusia-Flagler TPO Board; and
- 13. The policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed or amended by the TPO; and
- 14. The Chairperson of the Volusia-Flagler TPO (or their designee) is hereby authorized and directed to submit this resolution to the:
 - Florida Department of Transportation;
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (through the Florida Department of Transportation);

- The project application and evaluation criteria approved by the Volusia-Flagler TPO Board shall be used to solicit and evaluate projects for priority ranking in the transportation program categories listed below:
 - a. Florida Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects;

- b. Regionally Significant, Non-SIS Roadway Projects and Major Bridge Projects;
- c. Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects;
- d. Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects;
- e. Public Transit Projects; and
- f. Transportation Planning Studies.
- Volusia-Flagler TPO projects that were previously ranked and have a Financial Management (FM) number and are in the Florida Department of Transportation Work Program will automatically be prioritized above projects that are not currently in the FDOT Five-Year Work Program; and
- 3. Projects which are ranked one through eight on Tier "B" of the Prioritized List of Traffic Operations, Safety, and Local Initiatives Projects are deemed to be protected, and will be ranked in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program; and
- 4. Projects which are ranked one through three on Tier "B" of the Prioritized List of Bicycle/Pedestrian, Transportation Alternatives, Regional Trails, and Local Initiatives Projects are deemed to be protected, and will be ranked in their current spot or move to the next available higher spot until they are completed and drop out of the Work Program; and
- 5. If, at any time, two or more lists of prioritized projects are merged into a new list, every project that was protected prior to the merger shall retain its protected status, and no new or previously unprotected project shall be deemed to be protected unless and until it advances to the protected rank prescribed for the new merged list; and
- 6. The Volusia-Flagler TPO will only re-prioritize or add projects when the TPO Board determines a) unusual circumstances support such action, b) the circumstances are not of a recurring nature, c) the circumstances do not result from the actions of the project sponsor, and d) the proposed reprioritization or addition will not be contrary to the public interest; and
- Requests to change the priority or to add a project must include a statement of hardship by the requestor along with supporting documentation that includes detailed justification of need and an assessment of the impacts to the programming of prioritized projects; and
- 8. It is the responsibility of the Volusia-Flagler TPO and FDOT staff to provide the Volusia-Flagler TPO members with current information and data on project status and to assist the members in their efforts to make informed decisions regarding the prioritized projects lists; and

- The Volusia-Flagler TPO shall, in its discretion, make all decisions regarding the final prioritized project lists that are annually submitted to FDOT; and
- 10. Once a project has attained protected status, it should be programmed within 3 years. If it has not been programmed during that time due to inactivity on the part of the project sponsor, then the project will be removed from the list of priority projects. The project sponsor may resubmit the project for open ranking on any subsequent call for projects; and
- 11. Per the approved Annual Call for Projects schedule, the project sponsor shall annually submit a letter to the Volusia-Flagler TPO affirming their continued support to retain each project on the priority list and provide updated cost estimates for all unfunded phases of each project they sponsor on the Regionally Significant Non-SIS, Tier "A" and Tier "B" project lists. Updated cost estimates for projects or project phases that are currently funded/programmed are considered a request for additional funding and subject to the TPO's cost increase/cost overrun policy. Requests for additional funding shall be submitted to the TPO on the appropriate form. Pending availability of funds, updates to planning level construction costs (CST/CEI) that were programmed prior to the completion of the design (PE) phase may be updated one time following the completion of the PE phase without being considered a request for additional funding; and
- 12. The letter shall also provide support from the project sponsor for any Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) eligible project(s) which they are ready to advance into the Work Program and TIP and provide a commitment of local matching funds, if required, and any SUN Trail eligible projects which the local government intends to submit for SUN Trail funding during the state's open call for funding. These projects shall be compiled into an unranked TRIP list and unranked SUN Trail list; and
- 13. The Volusia-Flagler TPO shall use this project prioritization process to support the development of Regional Priority Lists in the areas of Trails, Transit, Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSM&O), and Planning Studies; and
- 14. The policies set forth in this resolution shall remain in effect unless and until they are repealed or amended by the TPO; and
- 15. the Chairperson of the Volusia-Flagler TPO, (or their designee) is hereby authorized and directed to provide a copy of this resolution to the:
 - a. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT); and
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation); and
 - c. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) (through the Florida Department of Transportation).



Enhancing Coastal Protection Along S.R. A1A

The State Road (S.R.) A1A Resiliency Project is a major infrastructure initiative led by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to enhance the stability and safety of the state's coastline.

The project addresses the increasing vulnerability of coastal areas in Flagler and Volusia Counties to erosion and the destructive impacts of hurricanes and tropical storms.

This proactive initiative spans approximately 2.6 miles of S.R. A1A, involving the construction of two buried seawalls. The first segment, located primarily in Flagler County, began in March 2024 and was completed in June 2025. It spans from half a mile north of High Bridge Road to South Central Avenue. The second segment, located in Volusia County, extends from south Sunrise Avenue to Marlin Drive. Work on this portion began in fall 2024 and is ongoing.

The project utilizes buried secant walls to combat the region's coastal challenges and meet the needs of the community. This technology was chosen due to its superior durability, stability, and resistance to storm damage. The secant walls blend seamlessly with the natural beach environment and minimize beach intrusion, maintaining the ecological integrity and recreational value of the area. The design is expected to last for more than 50 years, and any sand that is lost from storm damage will be replenished as part of FDOT maintenance.

With this year's hurricane season already underway, ongoing collaboration with community partners and residents has been crucial in accelerating the construction process. FDOT has maintained a strong commitment to minimizing disruptions along S.R. A1A and ensuring that beach access remains available throughout the construction period.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$117 million and project completion is expected in early 2026. The S.R. A1A Resiliency project represents a forward-looking investment in Florida's coastal infrastructure and a critical step toward safeguarding shoreline communities from future storm impacts.

Connecting Communities: \$3.8 Million Plan Advances St. John River-to-Sea Loop

The St. Johns River-to-Sea Loop (SJR2C) Trail is a 260-mile long multi-use trail currently under development in northeast Florida. The completed trail will link five different communities including St. Augustine, Daytona Beach, Titusville,

Deland, and Palatka. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) presented a \$3.8 million design plan to residents on August 14, 2025, addressing a gap in the Volusia County portion of the SJR2C Trail, closing the loop. The design was recommended by a 2020 Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study and consists of a multi-use trail running along the east side of U.S. 17 from State Road (S.R.) 40 to Washington Avenue and from Palmetto Avenue to the Putnam County line, totaling 12.6 miles

The shared-use trail will accommodate both cyclists and pedestrians with widths ranging from 12 feet in rural areas to 8-10 feet in suburban and urban areas. The trail will be designated for non-motorized vehicles only and will feature key amenities including signage, pavement contrast, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant detectable warnings, safety railings, and a buffer on each side.

Benefits to this shared-use addition include higher property values, increased jobs and revenue, improved health, and quality of life, free recreation and transportation opportunities, and revitalization. The design plan is anticipated for completion in Fall 2026 and will not only serve as the final connection of SJR2C, but will also promote multi-modal transportation throughout the state.



Congestion Relief for Marion and Sumter Counties

Residents in Marion and Sumter Counties will see congestion relief on Interstate 75 (I-75) 10 to 15 years earlier than anticipated, thanks to the work of the Moving Florida Forward Initiative. The entire project runs from State Road (S.R.) 44 to S.R. 326, spanning approximately 30 miles. Due to the large size of the project, it has been broken up into south and north sections. The south portion spans from S.R. 44 to S.R. 200, whereas the north portion spans from S.R. 200 to S.R. 326.

Both projects will add auxiliary lanes in both directions, conduct improvements in some locations, and replace several overpass bridges along I-75 and adjacent county roads. Improvements to several interchanges are proposed, including modifications to those at S.R. 326 and S.R. 40. There are also plans to add a diverging diamond interchange to the 49th Street interchange, which will be the first of its kind in Marion County. This upgraded interchange will also accommodate the opening of Buc-ees, providing both transportation and economic benefits to the region.

Construction began on the south portion in spring 2025, and construction on the north will begin in late 2025 to early 2026. The improvements to I-75 are expected to enhance safety, reliability, and traffic flow along the corridor. Congestion is expected to be reduced by 88% southbound and 96% northbound, addressing the needs and concerns of the surrounding community.

W ith the 2025 hurricane season underway, FDOT is actively working to strengthen key transportation routes in Brevard County. A nearly \$1 million project is underway to restore storm-eroded bridge slopes and repair damages sustained during Hurricane Milton, with a focus on State Road (S.R.) 528 and several other vital causeways.

The restoration work includes rebuilding embankments, replacing protective materials, and installing concrete sidewalks and sod. They will also be replacing floating barriers to keep soil and debris from washing into the water. These efforts are crucial for community safety, as the causeways serve as major evacuation routes, particularly for residents of barrier islands.

Concrete repair work has already begun underneath the S.R. 528 bridge crossing the Indian River. Additional repairs are being conducted on the Pineda Causeway on S.R. 404, two bridges on S.R. 520, and the Melbourne Causeway on U.S. 192.

Local emergency management has welcomed the project, emphasizing the critical role bridges and causeways play in disaster preparedness and emergency response.

The entire project is expected to be completed by this fall, providing additional resilience during the peak of hurricane season.



The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is constructing a two-lane roundabout at the intersection of State Road (S.R.) 44 (E. New York Avenue) and Kepler Road in DeLand, Volusia County, to enhance safety and improve the flow of traffic.

Once completed, the roundabout will replace the existing signalized intersection. The roundabout will also have two travel lanes in each direction with right turn bypass lanes at three of the four road connections, a concrete apron to accommodate large trucks, and landscaping in the center island.

Pedestrian safety enhancements include new sidewalks and crosswalks equipped with Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) at the roundabout approaches. Each RRFB will include flashing yellow LED lights to increase drivers' awareness of pedestrians crossing at the roundabout. S.R. 44 will also be resurfaced from approximately 800 feet west of Kepler Road to Talisman Road. Kepler Road will be resurfaced from 650 feet south of S.R. 44 to 1,250 feet north of S.R. 44. Additionally, a center bi-directional turn lane will be added along S.R. 44 from east of Kepler Road to Lake Winnemissett Drive.



Update: The contractor is currently working on removing and pouring concrete, signalization, and Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon (PHB) installation.



The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is implementing safety improvements and resurfacing the roadway along Granada Boulevard (State Road (S.R.) 40) from U.S. 1 to S.R. A1A (Ocean Shore Boulevard/South Atlantic Avenue), except for the bridge over the Halifax River in Ormond Beach.

In addition to repaving this segment of S.R. 40, the travel lanes along this segment of Granada Boulevard will be slightly narrowed to ten feet and subtle changes in the roadway alignment will be introduced to encourage slower driving speeds. Pedestrian safety improvements include a new mid-block pedestrian crossing between Vining Court and Bovard Avenue. Upgrades will also be made to existing crossings at Washington Street and west of Beach Street.

The mid-block crossings located west of Beach Street and between Vining Court and Bovard Avenue will be slightly elevated to be level with the sidewalk and will include in-road lighting to further alert motorists of people crossing the roadway and encourage reduced speeds.

All three crossings will be equipped with a Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon (PHB) and overhead lighting to increase driver awareness and visibility of pedestrians. A PHB is an overhead traffic device that remains dark until a pedestrian activates the beacon, signaling for drivers to come to a stop and for pedestrians to cross. Audible pedestrian signals and detectible warning pads will also be installed at each crossing to provide accessibility for the visually impaired.

Intersection lighting will be upgraded, and new mast arm poles will be installed at the Ridgewood Avenue and S.R. A1A traffic signals. New bicycle lanes next to turn lanes, called keyholes, minor drainage improvements, median modifications, and a new directional median to reduce left-turn conflicts at Washington Street will also be included. Existing sidewalks and on-street parking will remain.

FDOT and Volusia-Flagler TPO's Smart Driving College Challenge Wins Big at AASHTO's TransComm Awards

Joint Campaign Earns Interactive Marketing Skill Award for Promoting Safer Driving

DELAND, Fla. – Launched earlier this year by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) in partnership with the Volusia-Flagler Transportation Planning Organization (TPO), the Smart Driving College Challenge received the Interactive Marketing Skill Award at the American Association of State Transportation Officials' (AASHTO) Transportation Committee (TransComm) Awards for steering students toward safer driving. The annual skill awards competition, hosted this year in Chicago on September 23, honors excellence in transportation communications from across all 50 state DOTs plus Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C.

The Smart Driving College Challenge targeted college students across four Volusia County campuses: Bethune-Cookman University, Daytona State College, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, and Stetson University to encourage safer driving habits and reduce distractions.

"We used a social marketing approach to this project. This helped us learn more about reaching college students in a manner that would be well received. Students were very eager to speak with us, especially when they learned that participating in the Smart Driving College Challenge could win them prizes," said Stephanie Phillips, Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator for FDOT District Five's Office of Safety.

The six-week pilot program turned safe driving into a friendly competition using the Safe Roads Challenge (SRC) app, which tracked driving behaviors like phone use, acceleration, and speeding. Over 750 students and community members participated through social media, digital displays, and outreach events, earning prizes such as gift cards. Daytona State College won the \$1,500 grand prize and earned the title of Volusia County's Safest College.

"By engaging the students through competition and technology, challenges like this transform safe driving from a rule they 'should' follow into a choice they 'want' to make," said Pam Blankenship, Community Outreach Coordinator for Volusia-Flagler TPO.

"I'm humbled for our project to be recognized by TransComm. It's great to know we are making a difference, and I hope the award brings inspiration to other transportation professionals about innovative ways to connect with people."

BICYCLE SAFETY PRESENTED DURING THE NEW SMYRNA BEACH LIBRARY'S "HOW-TO" FESTIVAL

Flagler County Design & Construction Projects Report

September 2025

Road & Bridge Program

- Walnut Avenue Paving Project 100% Design is complete. Plans finalization and permitting/easement acquisition process are anticipated to conclude in November 2025.
- Westmayer Place Paving Project Final Design is complete and has been accepted by the Department. Project closeout is underway.
- Canal Avenue (CR 302) from Water Oak Road to Forest Park Final design is complete
 and has been accepted by the Department. Contract and grant are in the process of
 closeout.
- Jungle Hut Road from A1A to beach access 60% design phase is underway. Plans finalization and permitting are anticipated to conclude in February 2026. Community Meeting is scheduled for September 30, 2025, 5-7pm at Hammock Community Center.
- Forest Park Street from CR 90 to SR 100 30% design phase is complete. Plans finalization and permitting are anticipated to conclude in July 2026.
- Flagler Central Commerce Parkway Connector Project Construction substantial completion occurred in August 2025, and the roadway was put into service. Final acceptance and project completion are anticipated by September 2025. Project closeout activities are to begin in October 2025.
- Old Haw Creek Road Final Inspection and acceptance of construction was on July 17, 2025. Contract is in the process of closeout and preparation of final invoice for reimbursement.
- CR 205 Resurfacing Project Required design update was being finalized in preparation of construction contractor procurement. Funding Agreement is planned for approval by BOCC in October 2025. Advertisement for Bid is planned for early 2026. Construction is anticipated to commence in first quarter 2026.
- CR 304 Resurfacing Project (CR 305 to SR-11) Design Plans update and permit activities are anticipated to begin in third quarter 2025. Construction is anticipated to commence in first quarter 2026.
- First Avenue Phase 2 Drainage Design phase is underway. Community Meeting is scheduled for September 30, 2025, 5-7pm at Hammock Community Center. Plan finalization is scheduled for November 2025.



Sidewalk & Trail Program

- Bulow Creek Headwaters Regional Park Planning phase is underway with the first public meeting held on June 4, 2025. Presentation/Update to County Commission was made at a BOCC workshop on September 15, 2025. Planning efforts are anticipated to conclude in Summer 2026 when the project will transition into design & permitting.
- Trailhead for GST & Lehigh Trail Coordination with the Department's CSC is underway and is being coordinated with planned Eco-Discovery Center. Design phase is anticipated to begin in first quarter 2026.
- Old Kings Road South Trail (SR100 to County Line) Design began in July 2025. Completion of design and permitting is anticipated by September 2026.

Vertical CIP Program

- Fire Rescue Station 51 Construction is to commence in winter 2025.
- Fire Rescue Administration Station 50 Construction is to commence in winter 2025.
- NEXUS Center Substantial Completion date was September 25, 2025. Final Completion is December 2025.
- SMA Integrated Stabilization Unit Currently CMAR is waiting for final approval by BOCC of GMP pricing on October 20, 2025. Construction is to commence in fall 2025.
- Eco-Discovery Center The BOCC approved award of Design-Build contract to The Collage Companies on September 15, 2025. Design-Builder has commenced preliminary design to establish the scope of the project.
- Multipurpose Emergency Preparedness Project Design–Build Firm has completed 100% design and preparation pricing for early construction packages. Construction will commence in October 2025 and project construction completion is expected by June 30, 2026.

Stormwater Master Plan Program

 Malacompra Canal Restoration and Resiliency Preliminary Conceptual Design is underway. Project completion is anticipated in July 2026.



Beach Management Plan Program

- Beach Reach 2 (North 7th St to Varn Park) FDEP permit and BOEM Lease Agreement have been received. USACE JCP draft permit was received as of September 26, 2025.
 Invitation to bid will be released in mid-October and construction timing will depend on the contractor's schedule. Contract will specify that the dredge project must be complete by September 1, 2026.
- Beach Reach 3 The Professional Services Agreement with Moffatt & Nichol was approved by the Board on April 21, 2025. Field work for permitting studies has begun and will continue through October 2025.
- Hammock Dunes Dune Restoration project An interim dune restoration project is being constructed between Varn Park and Jungle Hut Park that commenced on June 10, 2025. The project is jointly funded between FDEP, Flagler County, and Hammock Dunes Owners Association. Authorization for the project is under the Hammock Dunes JCP permit and the perpetual easement agreement between Flagler County and Hammock Dunes. The project is 95% complete. Plantings and gaps from turtle nests are to be filled in by mid-October 2025.
- Ocean Hammock/Hammock Beach and Golf Resort Emergency Dune Restoration project

 An interim emergency dune restoration project has begun between Jungle Hut Road and the southern edge of Malacompra park under the Emergency Final Order for Hurricane Milton. The project is being funded jointly by FDEP and the OHPOA and HBAG Resort.

VoTran to Host Public Meetings on Proposed 2026 Service Changes

VOLUSIA COUNTY – Volusia County Transit Services Division will hold a series of public meetings to gather feedback on proposed service changes to Votran bus routes, scheduled to take effect in early 2026.

Proposed Changes

East Volusia

- Route 1: This route would be eliminated. Service north of Granada Boulevard would be replaced by VoRide, and service along State Road A1A between International Speedway Boulevard and Granada Boulevard would be provided by Route 19.
- Route 3: The "A," "B," and "C" branches would be eliminated. All trips would operate between the Transfer Plaza and Thompson Creek Superstop, near the intersection of Granada Boulevard and U.S. 1. VoRide would replace service north of Granada.
- **Route 10**: Outbound trips would depart the Transfer Plaza at :35 past the hour. All timepoints would be adjusted by five minutes. Inbound trips would remain unchanged.
- Route 15: Off-peak service would be reduced to hourly departures from the Transfer Plaza, operating on the hour. Peak-hour service (6 to 9 a.m. and 3 to 7 p.m.) would continue every 30 minutes.
- **Route 17**: The "A" branch, which serves Ponce Inlet, would be eliminated and replaced with ondemand service. All remaining trips would follow the "B" branch and be known as Route 17.
- Route 19: Service would increase to run every 30 minutes.
- **NSB Flex Service**: This service would be converted to VoRide, operating from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- **Night Service**: Night service on Routes 3, 4, 10, 11 and 15 would be replaced by VoRide. A new Route 70 would operate from 7 p.m. to midnight, replacing service on Routes 1 and 17.
- Holiday Service: Service would not operate on New Year's Day, Thanksgiving Day or Christmas Day.

West Volusia

- **Route 30**: Service would run from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. on weekdays and from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. Saturday service would not include Spring Garden Avenue or Plymouth Avenue.
- Route 31: Saturday service would be reduced to operate from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- **Route 33**: Service between Market Place and the DeBary SunRail Station would be eliminated. Alternate service would be available via Route 31 or VoRide.
- Route 34: This route would be eliminated. Riders could use Route 30 or VoRide as alternatives.
- **DeLand SunRail Circulator**: This route would be eliminated. VoRide would provide service to the DeLand SunRail Station, with the option to pre-book trips.

Nova Road (S.R. 5A) From Flomich Street to U.S. 1

Volusia County

Financial Project Identification (FPID) Number: 450644-1



Project Description

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is planning to resurface approximately four miles of Nova Road (State Road (S.R.) 5A) from Flomich Street to U.S. 1 in the cities of Holly Hill and Ormond Beach.

The project also proposes to replace the existing center two-way left-turn lane on Nova Road between Granada Boulevard (S.R. 40) and Wilmette Avenue with a raised median to enhance safety and operations. Dedicated left-turn lanes and median openings will be provided to accommodate access along the corridor. Additionally, a new traffic signal with pedestrian crossings will also be constructed at Old Kings Road.

Through continued coordination with local partners, the design will maintain the existing three travel lanes in each direction on Nova Road between Granada Boulevard and Wilmette Avenue.

Farther south, a new directional median will be constructed at Arroyo Parkway to reduce the chances of severe left-turn and angle crashes. The median will allow left turns from Nova Road to Arroyo Parkway. However, traffic turning onto Nova Road from Arroyo Parkway will be restricted to right turns only.



Other improvements proposed along the corridor include upgrading traffic and pedestrian signals, enhancing lighting at all signalized intersections, and reconstructing pedestrian curb ramps as needed to comply with current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Standards.
