

Role of the River to Sea TPO



- Required by federal and state law for urbanized areas (UZA) with a population greater than 50,000
- Ensures that expenditures of public funds for transportation are based on a <u>continuing</u>, <u>cooperative and comprehensive</u> planning process
- Provides local input in the prioritization of transportation projects utilizing state and federal funding



Role of the River to Sea TPO



- Federal Law 23 USC 134
 - Contains most of the authority and responsibility for T/MPOs
 - Areas greater than 50K Population must have a T/MPO to spend transportation funds – 2 Urbanized Areas
 - Areas Greater than 200K Population Transportation Management Areas
 - Must consider all modes and involve the public in transportation planning process

Role of the River to Sea TPO



- State Law F.S. 339.175
 - Establishes membership and required advisory committees
 - Governor approves Apportionment Plan based on latest Census
 - Currently 19 Voting Members on the Governing Board
 - Establishes Authority and Responsibility
 - Identifies Required Work Products

TPO Funding



- Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)
 - Signed into law November 2021
 - Reauthorization of the FAST Act and provides transportation funding through the year 2026
 - Federal Funds available through the Federal Highway Trust Fund and allocated through the State Department of Transportation


